Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

(The following is an account of a trip to New Mexico, made in August of 1953, by A. E. Priest, a News subscriber, who lives in Wallis, Tex. His wife and daughter were adamant about accompanying him because, they insisted, "it would be too hot in New Mexico." He decided to go anyway and accordingly left Wallis August 10, 1953, in his '42 Willys, with Ruldoso his destination. This account begins as he approaches Carlsbad.)

I'll turn my watch back when I get to Carlsbad. Think I'll go on down to Pecos Beach Park, take a swim, change clothes and camp in the park for the night. The swim was very invigorating. Checked the time; can't get the face off my watch so I'll leave it as is—I'll remember I'm one hour fast—what's the difference, anyway. Since I feel so good and rested and it will be a pleasant hour's drive to Artesia, us just mosey along.
For gosh sakes, just look at the beautiful green alfalfa being harvested. Some being blown into something like the old header barges of my Texas Panhandle harvest days of the early twenties. Those bales turned out by the traveling baler look like the legendary Paul Bunyan had thrown a double handful of chlorophyll chielets over the ground.
What could smell better than the aroma of new mown hay, especially if it's alfalfa or clover? Thunderheads in the north and east. I hope they get the hay hauled in. The lightning is coming closer and it's beginning to get dark. The plastic knob I turn my windshield wiper on with is crumbled away so I'll have to find my pliers in case it starts to rain.
Only about three miles to Artesia and I run into a light rain. Glad I have no traffic to face. The shower is over just before I enter Artesia. This is such a pretty place and seems to be growing. An air of hustle and bustle pervades the place. I pull into a Gulf station, show my credentials to the attendant and ask for permission to park in the rear and spend the night. He very politely granted same. I think this is fun, you meet such nice people and it gives one a feeling of pioneering or going west, young man feeling. Attendant closing up for the night informs me that he is leaving the rest room open for my convenience and wishing me a good night's sleep, melts into the darkness, homeward, family and supper bound.
It's morning. I wake up, shave

A flock of fat young geese are grazing near the hog wire fence, used to keep the geese in the field. I watch through my rear view mirror. Yep! Out they scramble and are scaling the fence. I run on apiece and decide to witness this right by pulling off the road and getting out.

The first boy has his goatin and is heading back to the fence. I walk to the center of the road facing down the road, with my arms akimbo. When the boy on top of the fence sees me watching, he pitches his bird down in the field, warning the others. They stop their hot pursuit of the geese and all make a run for the fence and hurdle it faster getting out than get-

ting in. The last one climbs in the car on the move and they make a quick getaway. Wonder what I would have done had they started to turn around? I had left the motor running, as I guess I would have exceeded my 35 m.p.h. making a run to Lake Arthur. I did some farmer a good deed for the day.

This is a fertile stretch of farmland where irrigation spells the difference between crop or failure. Planes are dusting the cotton. Smells like DDT. Roswell seems to have an Army camp, U. S. A., I reckon. Here's a big church, St. Peter's. Mass at 6 a.m. My time says 7, and I'm one hour early so I have made it just in time for mass. I enjoyed the visit, offered up my services for the safety of my darling wife and daughter during my absence from home. Offered thanks for a safe trip so far and asked for a continued one.

I turn left at the junction of U. S. 285 and 70 and stop for breakfast a few blocks from the main drag. Ten cents for coffee and little letters underneath say "No charge for seconds, drink all you want." I lose out on a bargain there as I ordered a short stack and drank milk. Headed due west now, sun at my back. Can see a hazy, purple (Continued on Back Page)

Cause of Death Of Truck Driver To be Determined

Word was awaited in Carrizozo this Wednesday on the report of an autopsy in Albuquerque to determine cause of death of Maurice Alden Hitch, 36, truck driver for the Whitfield Transportation Co.

The body of Mr. Hitch was found beside his parked truck last Saturday morning on Highway 54, 2 1/2 miles north of Carrizozo. A passing tourist made the discovery and reported to Tom O'Rear at the Monte Vista Station.

The tourist said he was en route north when he saw the man lying beside the truck. He drove on for about a mile, then decided because it was so cold, the man no doubt needed help.

He turned around and drove back to find the man apparently dead. He stopped a southbound passing car in which a man and woman were riding and the three came on in to Carrizozo to make their report.

Mr. O'Rear called State Patrolman James Clayton. Upon investigation by the officer and Sheriff S. M. Ortiz, it was found that the truck was parked four feet off the pavement and had not come to a sudden stop, indicating that the driver may have become sick. The tachometer on the truck showed it had been parked there since 7:20 the previous evening.

A preliminary autopsy by physicians in Carrizozo indicated no symptoms of heart attack or brain injury. The deceased man's stomach was sent to Albuquerque for analysis.

He is survived by his widow and a small son, of El Paso; also, by relatives in Lincoln, Neb. The body was shipped there Monday by the Shaw Mortuary.

To Form New Class In Carrizozo Band

A new instrumental music class is scheduled to begin September 24. Mr. Lara, band director, has announced that all Carrizozo fifth grade pupils and others interested in starting band will receive a music aptitude test Friday, Sept. 13. This will determine to a degree the aptitude of the individual and will also enable the prospective band pupil to select the instrument best suited to him.

Parents will be contacted personally, by telephone or through the mail, in order that those interested may have every opportunity to ask questions and be fully informed.

Plans are being made to make this the biggest beginning band class yet. Mr. Lara states that in order to establish a top future high school band, a good percentage of beginners need to be started every year. A state senator from Santa Fe, Fabian Chavez, has called on party officers to assemble a convention just in front of the primary to determine the ones the people shall favor with the nominations.

That came along as a little group in Albuquerque prepared for a big September 15 gathering to honor the state congressional delegation and signed the invitations "Democratic Central Committee." (That of course referred to the Bernalillo county committee but how many would know it wasn't the big state group?)

JJD, JOE, DENNY GET HEAD START

That congressional delegation of four includes three who will be up for renewal next year. The big party affair in their behalf must be kind of discouraging to other Demos who had been harboring schemes of maybe trying for the places.

The same ones promoting the party for expiring Sen. Dennis Chavez, Rep. John J. Dempsey and Rep. Joe Montoya are leading the movement for John Burroughs of Portales for nomination for governor.

It fits in that Mr. Burroughs' prospects for winning the big election in November would be improved by a smooth primary with no unpleasant, party-dividing fights for the Senate and House places.

There has been talk here that the ticket-making might be extended to cover even the little places like Lieutenant governor, auditor, treasurer and such, but that doesn't seem likely.

COLLINS-SCARES OTHER HOPEFULS

The Burroughs' people got in a major lick in securing Seaborn Collins of Las Cruces as campaign manager. Collins, fresh out of the role of national commander of the American Legion, had been much talked about as a candidate himself for governor or Congress.

His place in the Burroughs corner must be discouraging to others who had been nourishing hopes for the nomination for governor.

Altogether this whole picture at the moment is kind of discouraging to all but Burroughs and those guys from Washington.

Corporation Commissioner Seven-Foot Pickett who has come up as a major prospect for Demo nomination for governor, is not being overlooked in the strategy. His brightest prospect has been that of a race against several candidates. The Burroughs campaign seems to be aimed at keeping others out.

STATEHOUSE IN A HURRY

The report was so strong around here last week that State Senator Gene Lusk was getting ready to jump in the governor's run that his mom, State School Superintendent Georgia Lusk, telephoned to chide him for making such a decision without telling her. Gene's not running yet. Tiny Wells, former Demo chairman of Torrance who was let out of his job as liquor inspector by the Republicans, has gone to work for the highway department. . . . Charlie Bassett, another ex-chairman of Torrance and fixture around the statehouse for many years, is campaigning for his daughter Beatrice Roach Gottlieb for the nomination for secretary of state. . . . Charlie is quite a campaigner, having been largely responsible for Bea's first nomination (1950) and earlier for the nomination of Gene Allison for corporation commissioner. . . . Johnny Walker, land commissioner (1953-56) who looked like he was running for everything a few months ago, has subsided.

FOLKLORE CORNER

By TED RAYNOR

DON ANTONIO GARCIA



Don Antonio Garcia, maternal grandfather of Mrs. Elizabeth Fountain Armendariz of Mesilla, came from Valle de Ayende in Mexico to the Mesilla Valley when he was a young man. He learned the blacksmithing trade at Fort Fillmore and was employed there by the U. S. Army for some time.

Don Antonio was taught the trade by a German at the fort south of Mesilla. The young man from Mexico showed such great skill in blacksmithing that the German wanted to adopt him and take him to Germany. But Garcia's mother said "No," and Don Antonio lived in the Mesilla Valley for virtually the remainder of his life.

In 1859 he opened the first general blacksmithing and gunsmith shop in Mesilla. He was also an expert lock maker and skilled in iron work. Garcia was active in his shop until the early 1890's when he died. He lived to be 65, and unlike most people who reach that age he had per-

fect teeth.

It was Don Antonio who made the special handcuffs for Billy the Kid while the outlaw was being held in the Mesilla jail before and during his trial for murder. The Kid had small wrists and could easily have slipped ordinary handcuffs.

It was Mrs. Armendariz' paternal grandfather, Col. A. J. Fountain, who defended the Kid in his trial at Mesilla, at which he was convicted and sentenced to be hanged.

Don Antonio was the leader of the Republican band in Mesilla, which had a pitched battle with the Democratic band in the Plaza on Aug. 27, 1871. Nine men were killed and between 40 and 50 wounded in the political riot.

Several of the Republican band instruments hang in the hallway of Mrs. Armendariz' home. One horn shows where Don Antonio soldered a bullet hole after the battle.

After the tragic political battle, Don Antonio, his family, and a number of other Republicans moved to La Acencion, Mexico, where they started a settlement. The colony suffered many hardships. Food was often scarce, and the settlers were in danger of Indian raids.

Rafael Bernudez of Mesilla, father-in-law of Don Antonio, sometimes sent the colony food. At other times the settlers depended on Don Antonio's skill as a hunter and expert marksmanship for food.

To light their dwellings, the settlers had tallow candles made by Don Antonio's wife, who had been Soledad Bernudez.

The Republican bandmen who went to La Acencion took their instruments with them, and these became instruments in a successful defensive strategy. Whenever Indians were in the vicinity and it appeared the colony might be in danger of an attack, the bandmen would play their instruments and beat the drum furiously. The Indians concluded there were great numbers in the settlement and did not attack.

Father Baca was among those who went with the group to La Acencion. While there, the colony built a church. Mrs. Armendariz' mother, Teresita B. Garcia, then a young girl, helped carry adobes for the building.

The colony returned to Mesilla after more than a year in La

The cinders are processed into cinderblocks in Roswell. Hauling to date, Mr. Volner says, has hardly made a dent in the cinder deposits in the area of the extinct crater.

Accencion.
Don Antonio was a devout Catholic. He never failed to attend daily mass if he were near a church. When attending mass, he always wore a black cape and subdued plaid trousers, clothing which Mrs. Armendariz still has in the collection in her private museum.

He never missed saying rosary at night and he always had his children recite it before they went to bed.

On hunting trips with his grandsons and others he as faithfully recited the rosary and insisted that others do so.

On one hunting trip a Catholic man refused to say the rosary before wrapping up in his blanket and lying down by the campfire to go to sleep. Don Antonio fixed his rifle several times. The fellow finally concluded that Don Antonio meant what he said, and he arose and recited the rosary.

Don Antonio could calculate figures quickly in his mind, but he could not read. He and his wife subscribed to Revista Catolica, then published in Las Vegas. In warm weather it was a familiar sight in Mesilla to see Don Antonio and his wife Soledad sitting on their front porch in the early evening while she read his magazine to him from cover to cover. He had the ability of memorizing easily what was read to him.

When Garcia donned charro costume, it was said that his boot heels and spurs were silver. His fur, silver-trimmed charro jacket remains in Mrs. Armendariz' collection.

Don Antonio was credited with saving the life of Gov. Larrazolo of New Mexico when the latter was a boy. Garcia was traveling with the boy in a wagon train bound from Valle de Ayende to St. Michael's College in Santa Fe. The train was attacked by Indians. Garcia concealed the boy under wagon seat, and Larrazolo was unharmed. The attack was repulsed. Larrazolo often expressed his gratitude to Don Antonio in later years.

Because he was an expert hand at repairing wagons and other equipment on freighter trains, Don Antonio sometimes traveled from Mesilla to St. Louis and Kansas City with the merchandise-hauling oxen train of his father-in-law. A round trip took between four and five months.

Leandro Garcia, Don Antonio's brother, was a versatile man, too. He was bookkeeper for the Bernudez train, a carpenter, and an "escrivano," one who wrote letters for persons unable to write.

Retired Hondo Teacher Dies at His Home in Denver

Emmet N. McBride passed away at his home in Denver, Colo., July 3 as a result of a heart attack. His death took place two months after he had attended a funeral of one of his brothers in Steubenville, O.

Mr. McBride began teaching in Hondo in the spring of 1914 and remained there until his retirement in 1930. During this period he earned the love and respect of those who knew him well.

It was nothing unusual to see him after a school day visiting his pupils giving them individual instruction in mathematics. He would walk to the different homes of his students, through rain or snow.

Teaching was a true profession with Mr. McBride. He gave over 30 years of his life to teaching, having taught in Estancia and Willard before coming to Hondo. His out-of-state teaching experience was in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Indiana, and Colorado. He held an A.B. degree from Westminster and a B.D. degree from Pittsburg.

He was about 60 years old at the time of his death, but he never lost contact with the Hondo schools and especially in the field of sports.

A letter written to Superintendent Montes, April 8, 1935, clearly expresses Mr. McBride's love for the Hondo-Ruidoso Valley and the people who live there:

"But, oh, so often in my wakeful hours, I start on the hill at Riverside, go round to Pecos, where are homes of a score of the parents and pupils (I could write their names), then up to Tinnie, where very devout preachers, men and women prayed and worshipped. Some tragedies came below and above our schools. Neighbors were good to all. San Patricia, with its Watson Alhambra, and its famous artist and tavern, seemed just like a village of Old Spain, which might once have been occupied by the Moors. On up the valley were the richest orchards, the mysterious Bonnell Ranch, the most beautiful Little Chapel . . . and on up past Ruidoso and Dark Canyon and the great trees near the pass, and the road to the seemingly forbidden Mesalero, with its commemorative memorial church, I seem to write of the places; but it is the people, the kindly men and women and the boys and girls of our algebra and geometry classes, and of our basketball trips, that hang up in dear old school-days memory."

As was his wish, Emmet N. McBride was buried July 5 near a baby daughter, Gwendolyn, in Crown Hill Cemetery in Denver.

Brucellosis Testing In Final Cleanup

By RALPH DUNLAP County Extension Agent

There are only 41 herds left in Lincoln County to be tested before it can be declared a certified-free brucellosis area.

I have received word through Dr. M. O. Nottingham, superintendent of brucellosis testing in Southeastern New Mexico, that any person refusing to test will be quarantined by the Cattle Sanitary Board and its brand inspector.

A final cleanup on testing will be done by Dr. Nottingham and myself on September 30 and October 1 and 2. Dr. Bond is cleaning up in the Corona area next week.

If you do not have your cattle tested, please contact me so that we can get the testing done by October 2.

If the testing goes on any longer than October 2, you will not be able to ship your cattle this fall even though you have already tested your 20%.

Only three reactors have been found in the 330 herds tested. If your neighbor hasn't tested, encourage him to test at least 20% of his cattle before the October 2 deadline.

On the state level, ten counties have already been certified. Let's get Lincoln County on that list as soon as possible.
