THE DEMOCRATS HAVE A PICNIC

Santa Fe, Sept. 16—Democrats at the party barbecue in Albuquerque were in a hard role ignoring Seven-Foot Pickett publicly and worrying about him privately. . . . The main topic in the party is not the next nominee for governor but how to block Pickett out of it. . . . Rep. Joe Montoya, only speaker at the barbecue dwelled on the danger of a mean primary fight for governor. . . . Tom Wiley's renewed interest in the nomination for governor was discussed mostly in the light of what effect his candidacy would have on dividing the anti-Pickett vote.

There were four ladies present with ideas of running for secretary of state but only three were introduced—Beatrice Roach Gottleib, Santa Fe; Eveline Robinson, Los Alamos; Betty Fiorina, Santa Fe. Left out but no less a candidate was Naomi Hogue of Hobbs. There will probably be three or four more in that race when the starting gun goes off.

The air of the meeting and the private talk of those present indicated free rides to renomination for Sen. Dennis Chavez and the representatives, John J. Dempsey and Joe Montoya. There was some growling about each of the three but no suggestion of opposition. Of course the Albuquerque crowd that put on the show doesn't have jurisdiction over those attending gave a pretty good indication of what to expect.

State Chairman Ernie Tucker of Roswell summoned state elective officials to a meeting following the barbecue but gave up until another date when reporters and others joined the session. The chairman wanted to complain about the money from statehouse job-holders going into a fund for current operation of party headquarters and not toward the several thousand that is still owed him for back services and for other bills holding over from last year. If he's getting impatient for his dough it's understandable.

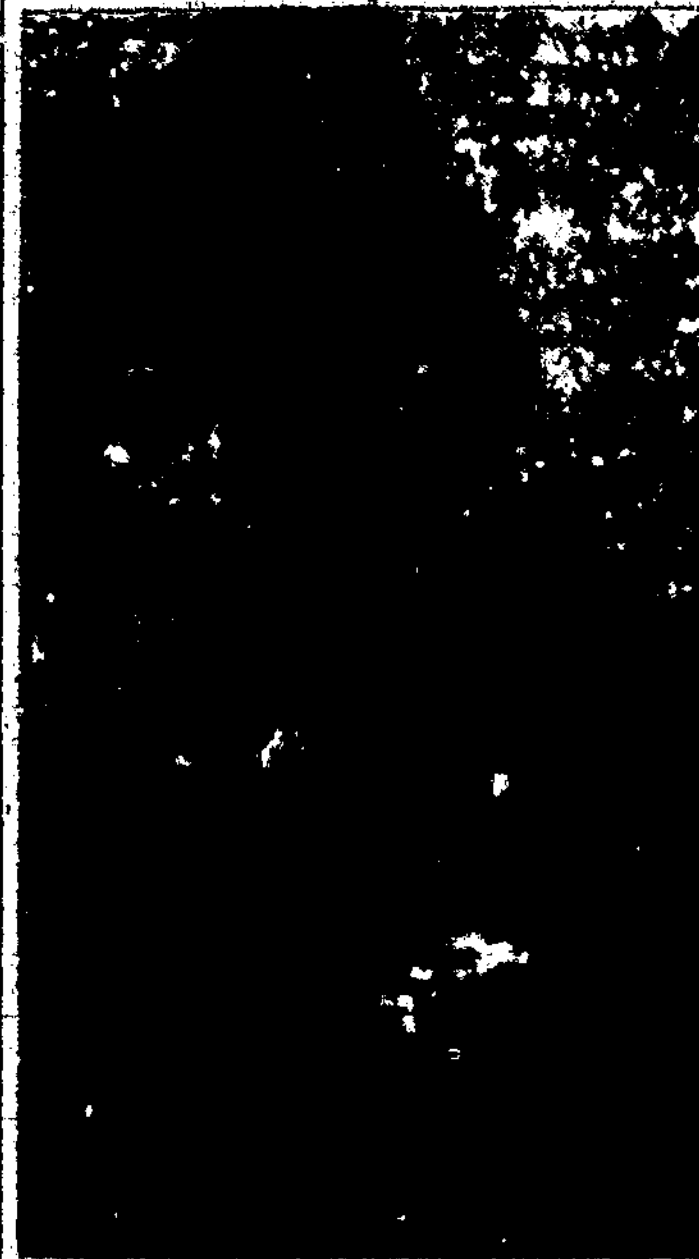
Collections from employees have been going to headquarters from the secretary of state's office which has jurisdiction over the big janitor force, the attorney general, the land office, treasurer and in curtailed amounts from the corporation commission. Georgia Lusk cut off education department contributions some time back with the observation that the money was being used to promote Joe Bursley's candidacy for governor. Bursley was an employe of the office at the time. The late Auditor J. D. Hannah did not turn in any collections from his staff. Tucker made it clear to any who asked that he was not planning on quitting the chairmanship. His term runs until next summer.

Tom Wiley's new interest and Joe Bursley's continued interest in trying for the Demo place for governor leave a couple of bases uncovered. Wiley had been considered a prospect for another go as state school superintendent and Bursley was looked upon as the likely nominee for state treasurer before the governor bugs got in their pants!

It would be kind of awkward for them to turn back now if others should declare themselves in the other races. Treasurer pays \$10,000, school superintendent \$12,720.

Ronnie Reynolds had grand champion lamb and Douglas McKnight, reserve champion. Other awards in the sheep division were: Wolf Jones, champion ram lamb; Joe Hays, champion ewe lamb; Betty Joiner, medium wool ewe (aged); Bob Crow, champion lamb.

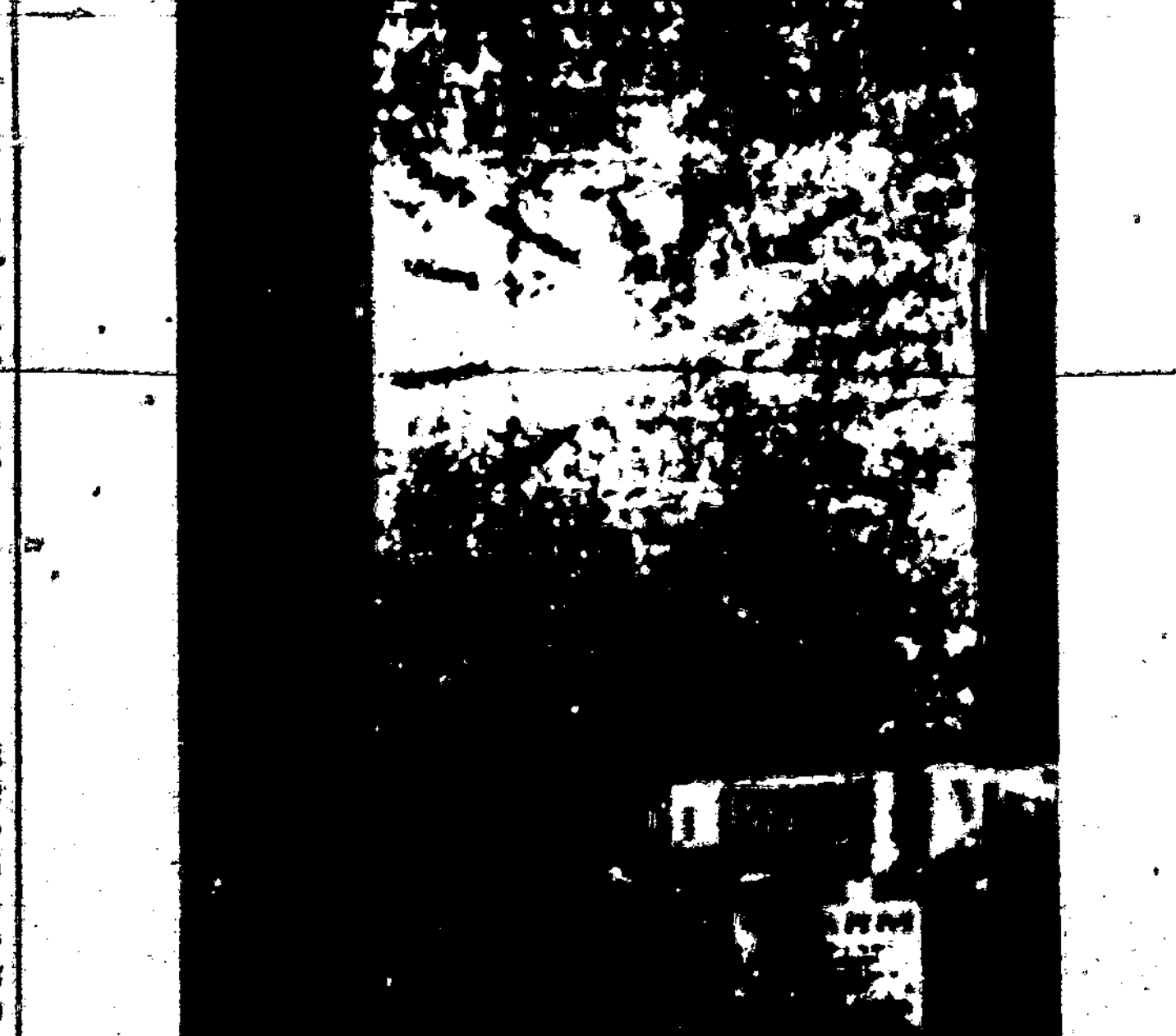

In the opening stanza, Gerald Maez, Hondo quarterback, took the pigskin on the kickoff and returned it to his own 30-yard line, where the Eagles were forced to punt.

After Jones, Vance and Salas advanced the ball for Capitan to the 1-yard line, McKnight eased over to pay dirt on a quarterback sneak. The conversion was no good. Score: Capitan 6.

Late in the first quarter, Eagle fullback, Fernando Salcido, intercepted a pass from McKnight and sprinted 75 yards for a Hondo touchdown. Maez passed to Gomez for the extra point which made the score 7-0 Hondo's favor.

Early in the second quarter the Tigers marched the ball down to the Hondo 5-yard line, where freshman halfback, Salas, ran a left guard hole for Capitan's second score of the game. Jones ran the extra point to make the score 13-7.

After the kick-off at the half, the home team moved the ball down to the Hondo 20-yard line. Jones broke loose and scurried twenty yards to make the score 10-7. Vance ran the extra point.

As the third section of the game drew short, McKnight completed a pass to Purbella for a 20-yard Tiger TD. Jones ran a right guard for the extra point.

In the closing quarter of the game, Kuslanovich blocked Hondo's attempted punt and gave Capitan possession of the ball. McKnight aerialized to Kerr for the final tally of the game. The attempt for the extra point was no good.

The Eagles' late period rally was crushed when defensive line backer Vance intercepted Maez's pass, seconds before the final gun sounded.

The Tigers were aided by the hard hitting and tackling of Walter Jories, Eloy Sedillo, and Roy Herrera.

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

(A. E. Priest, a News... scribe living in Wallis, Texas, writes about a trip he made in August of 1957, with Ruidoso his destination. The account continues as he travels along Highway 70 west of Roswell.)

Here I descend into the Hondo Valley. Not much different from the descent into the Pecos except this one looks green from up here on top. Zzzzzzz. Now what? I do believe I have a flat. I will ease it over to lean the bumper up against that big boulder and change tires. Wonder how far I'll have to go before I can get it repaired? I hate to drive without a spare. A Gulf disc looms up ahead, no station- there though, maybe farther on. Yep, here is a station. While they repair the tire I take a look at the...

This is Riverside. Must be a deep valley. Have lost sight of the mountains. On up the valley I go to Hondo, where Highways 70 and 380 fork. I follow what looks like the low road, No. 70. The closeness of these little towns reminds me of the Rio Grande valley. Seems like my Willys is trying, no pep. Occasionally there's a green field of alfalfa or clover and these fruit stands have nothing but cherry cider and boy, is it pretty! Must be cherry trees down near the creek. Fox Cave believes in signs, I see so many of them. Wonder just what it is, if I ever get to it. I seem to be progressing very slowly. The valley gets wide, then narrows down again. A sharp curve to the right and I run right into what looks like a parking lot. It's Fox Cave and do they have the crowd. I get out, stretch, and walk over to the creek first. It's very muddy and very swift. Maybe Willys had a steeper hill to climb than it seemed to me.

Say! This location and building are very unique. An old rock mound like me, of course, has to examine the inside formation first. We have cut many a blue-gray shale core just like these walls, usually not far above oil-bearing sand. This is brand new and well stocked. Lots of Indian pottery and a very nice variety of curios. Pushing along up the valley, let's see, there has been Hondo, San Antonio, Glencoe, Fox Cave, Green Tree and now here's Hollywood and look across the creek at the raterack. That, maybe, accounts for all the quarter horses I saw near Roswell. I turn here to the place I have been looking for—Ruidoso. Not like I had it pictured. Is all this Ruidoso? A regular string town, only this looks like permanent improvements. Will be glad when I get to what might be considered the main part of town, which would be centered around the post office. It's beginning to sprinkle and here's the post office and I park there until the shower is over.

Such wonderful air, clean, cool and invigorating. I mail a card to the home folks telling them "My Willys can do anything—that I had a long trip and that it was well worth it." Mr. Helm told me such wonderful things about Lincoln County that I'm going to see as much of it as I can. I'm going to bring my family up here as soon as I can, which I hope will be on our vacation next year. I'm liking this life of camping out in the open. Have met such wonderful people here, both native and tourists. A U. S. Army captain and his wife and little girl are camped here in a nice little tent. He asked me to go to the drive-in theatre with them, but I declined because my dress clothes are too light to be out at night. The time has come when I must bid farewell to these wonderful people, tall pines and taller hills as my vacation is drawing to a close. I especially recommend that you grouchy husbands try a vacation of this kind. Hoping to see you grand scenery and enjoy your good climate again soon, here's another farewell to all of you.

THE DEMOCRATS HAVE A PICNIC

Santa Fe, Sept. 16—Democrats at the party barbecue in Albuquerque were in a hard role ignoring Seven-Foot Pickett publicly and worrying about him privately. The main topic in the party is not the next nominee for governor but how to block Pickett out of it. Rep. Joe Montoya, only speaker at the barbecue dwelled on the danger of a mean primary fight for governor. Tom Wiley's renewed interest in the nomination for governor was discussed mostly in the light of what effect his candidacy would have on dividing the anti-Pickett vote. Wiley, former state school superintendent, has been an on and off prospect for the race for several months. Observers thought they found a clue to the withdrawal of State Sen. Gene Lusk of Carlsbad from the gubernatorial race. Adair Gossett of Carlsbad was at the meeting talking about running for lieutenant governor. It wouldn't be likely that he would be making such plans if his neighbor and pal were trying for governor. There were four ladies present with ideas of running for secretary of state but only three were introduced—Beatrice Roach Gotlib, Santa Fe; Eveline Robinson, Los Alamos; Betty Florina, Santa Fe. Left out but no less a candidate was Naomi Hogue of Hobbs. There will probably be three or four more in that race when the starting gun goes off. The air of the meeting and the private talk of those present indicated free rides to renomination for Sen. Dennis Chavez and the representatives, John J. Dempsey and Joe Montoya. There was some grumbling about each of these but no suggestion of opposition. Of course the Albuquerque crowd that put on the show doesn't have jurisdiction over who runs for Washington but those attending gave a pretty good indication of what to expect. State Chairman Ernie Tuelier of Roswell summoned state elective officials to a meeting following the barbecue but gave up until another date when reporters and others joined the session. The chairman wanted to complain about the money from statehouse job-holders going into a fund for current operation of party headquarters and not toward the several thousand that is still owed him for back services and for other bills holding over from last year. If he's getting impatient for his dough it's understandable. Collections from employees have been going to headquarters from the secretary of state's office which has jurisdiction over the big janitor force, the attorney general, the land office, treasurer and in curtailed amounts from the corporation commission. Georgia Lusk cut off education department contributions some time back with the observation that the money was being used to promote Joe Bursley's candidacy for governor. Bursley was an employee of the office at the time. The late Auditor J. D. Hannah did not turn in collections from his staff. Tucker made it clear to any who asked that he was not planning on quitting the chairmanship. His term runs until next summer. Tom Wiley's new interest and Joe Bursley's continued interest in trying for the Demo place for governor leave a couple of bases uncovered. Wiley had been considered a prospect for another go as state school superintendent and Bursley was looked upon as the likely nominee for state treasurer before the governor bugs got in their pants. It would be kind of awkward for them to turn back now if others should declare themselves in the other races. Treasurer pays \$10,000, school superintendent \$12,720.

13 County Queens To be at State Fair

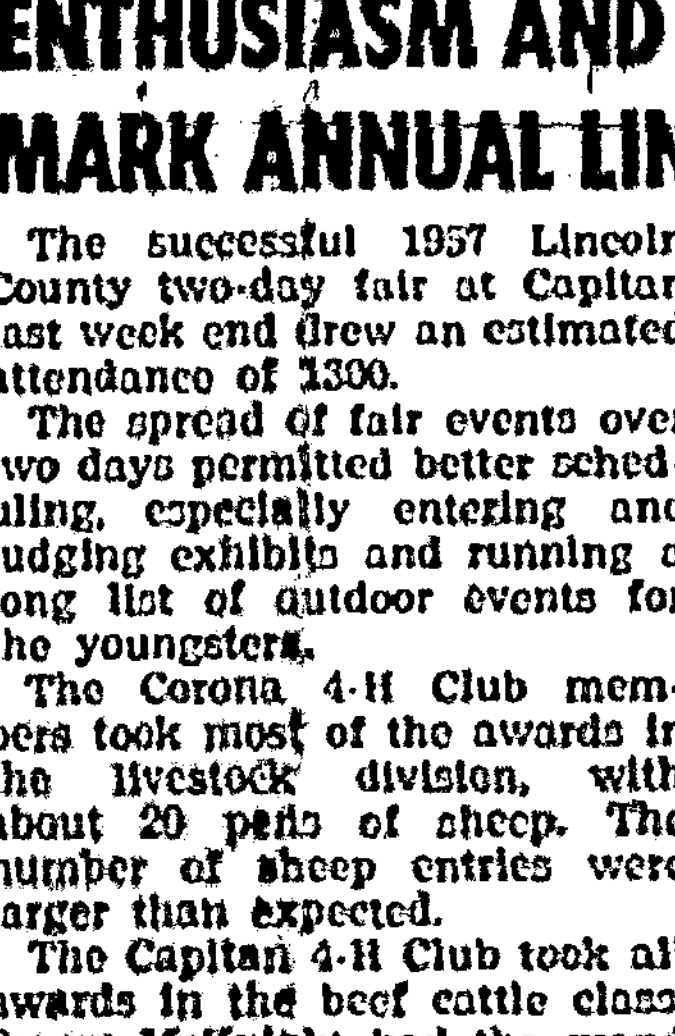

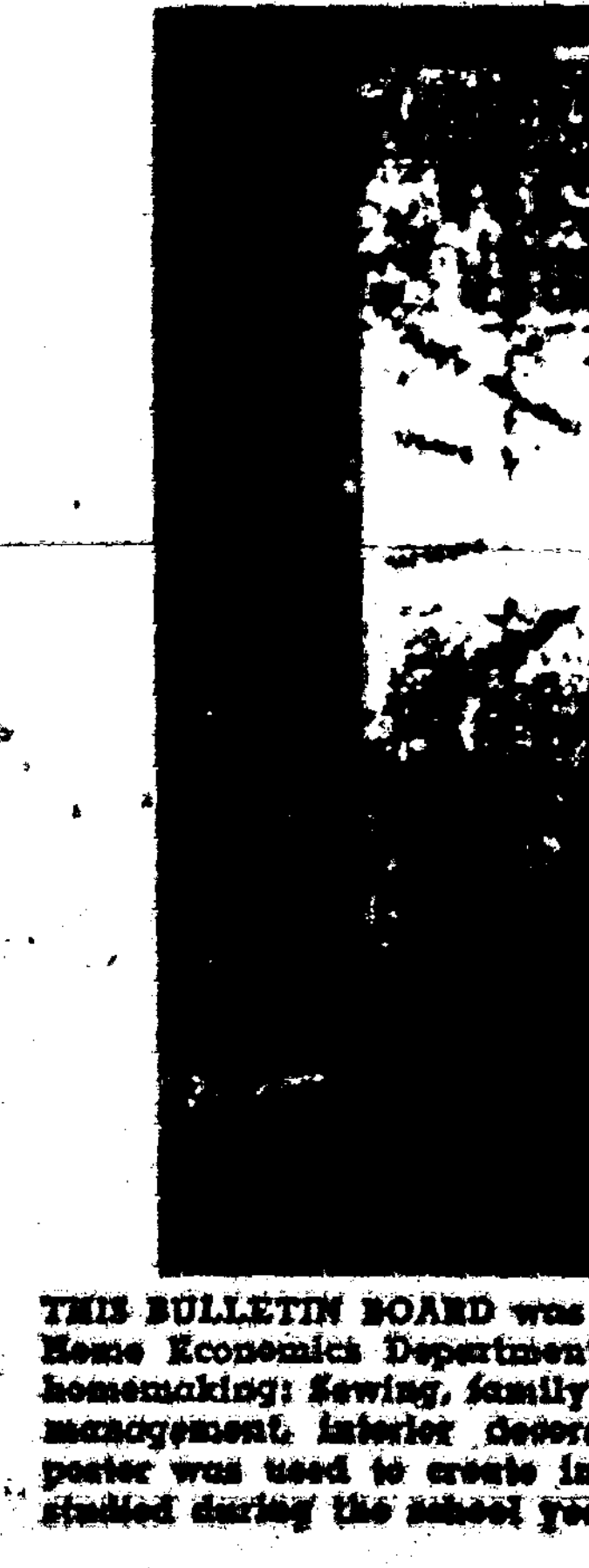

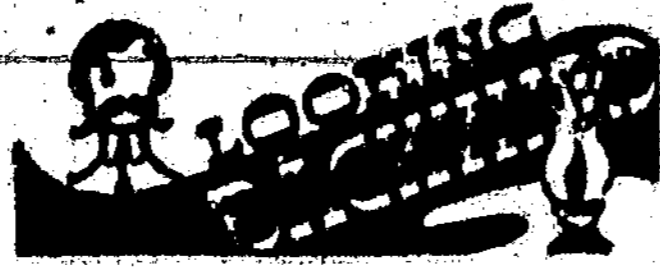


### Sight Plenty of Deer in White Mountains

Some choice deer-hunting areas are described by biologist Bob Stewart of the Department of Game and Fish, after his aerial surveys in the White Mountains of Lincoln County and Sacramento, Otero County.

In three hours of aerial counting time over the White Mountains during the latter part of August, Stewart counted 515 deer.

Ninety-three minutes of aerial counting time over the south and west sides of the Sacramento brought a count of 363 deer, and incidentally two bears. Too many deer for the range.

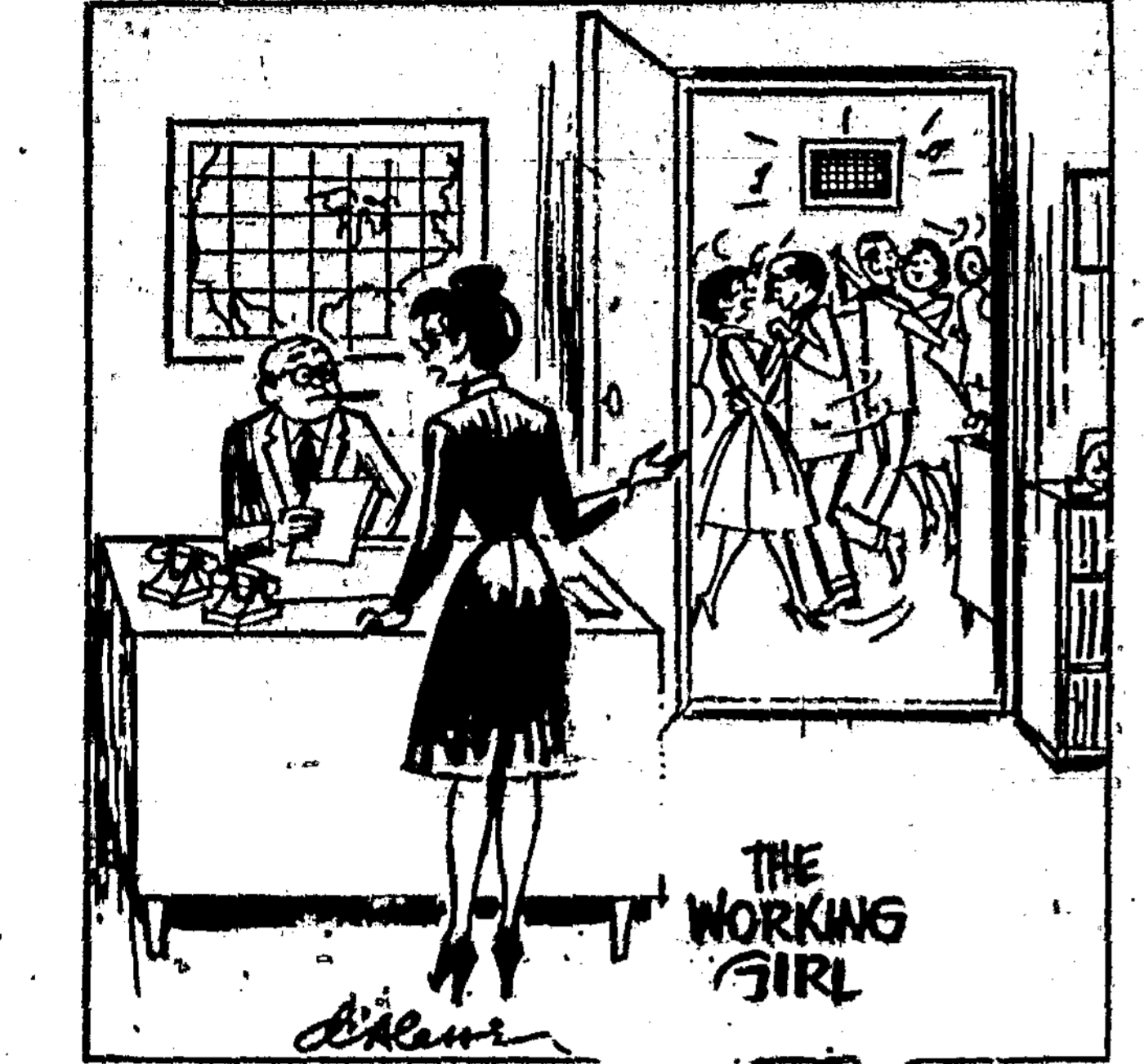
