"Consruck stepped outside the door of the house just west of the Mayberry hotel to see what was going on as Mrs. Mayberry ran toward him and he caught her by the arm...

"Pete Nelson showed up on the scene then and called to Mart to give him his guns. Mart told him to come and get them and he held them out toward him...

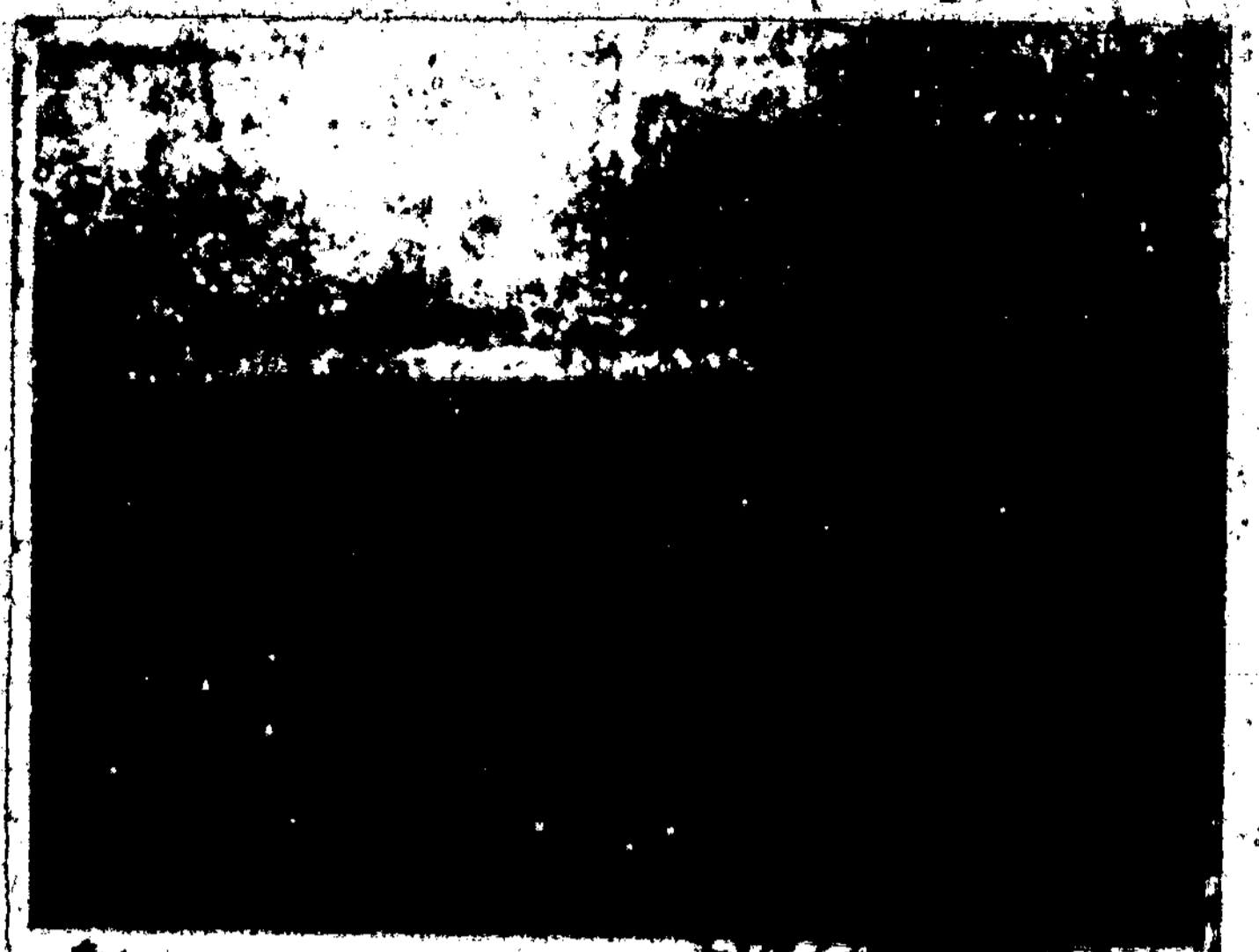

48th Anniversary For Gran Quivira On Sunday, Nov. 3

Gran Quivira National Monument will observe the 48th anniversary of its establishment on Sunday, Nov. 3, according to Channing Howell, supt.

As one of the best-known of the early Spanish missions in the Southwest, Gran Quivira signifies a great and memorable era of American history. The monument contains the ruins of a large-Indian village, founded about 1300 A. D., and two Franciscan Mission churches.

The Spanish missionaries began to Christianize the Indians at "Humanas" early in the Seventeenth century. Later, in 1629, the first mission church was built by Father Letrado. Construction of the larger mission, San Buenaventura, was begun in 1659 by Father Santander.

The village was abandoned about 1675 because of drought and raids by the Apaches. The ruins were rediscovered in 1835 by Benjamin Wilson, after which the name of Gran Quivira was given to the ruined city.

Change in Method of Mailing Tax Forms

S. P. Vidal, district director of Internal Revenue for this district announces that the Internal Revenue Service has changed its method of mailing employment tax forms to employers who report and pay income tax withheld from wages and taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act.

Early in 1957, Form 941, Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return, was printed as a "self-mailer," and the practice of enclosing the forms in envelopes was discontinued.

On or about October 15, 1957, there will be a special mailing to employers of a booklet, captioned "Employer's Tax Information Forms," containing the following forms and publication which, in past years, were enclosed with Form 941.

Form W-4, "Employee's Withholding Exemption Certificate," for use by employees or by employers whose exemptions will be different next year. Six forms were provided in the booklet.

Publication No. 213, a bulletin board poster for use by the employer in reminding his employees of the importance of claiming their withholding exemptions correctly.

Form 011a, the continuation sheet of Form 941, for employers who have more employees than can be conveniently listed on Form 941.

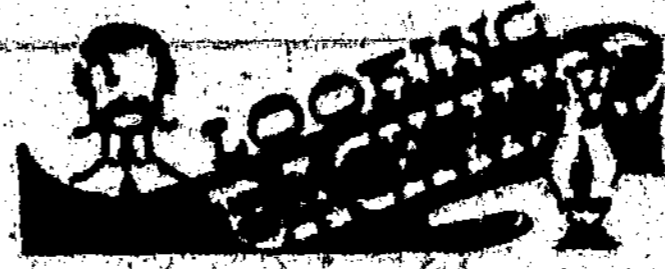
Form 701B, "Order for Employer's Tax Information Forms," to be used by the employer in requesting additional forms from the District Director.

Form W-2, "Withholding Tax Statement—1957," to be furnished to employees not later than January 31, 1958. The booklet contains separate forms for six employees.

Form W-3, "Reconciliation of Employer's Tax Withheld from Wages," to be filed by the employer not later than January 31, 1958.

Check list, for use by the employer in determining whether or not he is required to file Form 940, the annual return for employers of four or more employees under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act.

The booklet will not contain Form W-2 for 1958, but District Directors will furnish supplies of the form upon requests made during that year. The employer must furnish Form W-2 to each employee whose employment is terminated before the close of the calendar year, on or before the thirtieth day after the last payment of wages.

17 N. M. Counties Eligible for "Great Plains" Assistance

Activation of the Great Plains Conservation Program, authorized by Public Law 1021 enacted by Congress last year, was announced recently by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. A Congressional appropriation of \$10 million for the first year's operations became available in August.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Tait Benson issued regulations and operating procedures for the program, and designated 221 counties in 10 Great Plains States (17 in New Mexico) as eligible to receive program assistance.

Following is a list of the 17 counties in New Mexico designated as eligible to receive assistance under the program: Chavez, Colfax, Curry, DeBaca, Eddy, Guadalupe, Harding, Lea, Lincoln, Mora, Quay, Roosevelt, San Miguel, Santa Fe, Socorro, Torrance, and Union.

Purpose of the program, the Secretary said, is to assist farmers and ranchers in carrying out long-term cost-sharing contracts that will help to minimize climatic hazards and protect their lands from erosion and deterioration by natural causes.

The program is a new tool to help speed up objectives of the overall Great Plains program recommended to Congress in a message by President Eisenhower, January 11, 1956.

The new program, Secretary Benson emphasized, supplements existing programs and activities and does not replace any of them. It establishes no new agency. Administrative responsibility has been assigned to USDA's Soil Conservation Service.

Briefly here is how the program will operate: Farmers in the designated counties who wish to participate, prepare a workable plan of conservation operations with the assistance of USDA Soil & Water Conservation technicians. Then they enter into a contract with the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out the plan. The contract provides for a plan, a time schedule, and obligates the amount of needed cost-shares guaranteed by the Federal Government. The contract cannot run less than three years nor more than ten years, ending not later than December 31, 1971.

More Water Needed For More People

Expanding industry and rising standards of living require more and more water per person to satisfy American living. One-fourth of the population today is troubled with water shortage, poor water, or both.

The potential supply of water remains constant while needs for human use pyramid with growing population. From 1900 to 1950, while U. S. population doubled, total water use, other than for power, increased fourfold. By 1955 it was up another 50%. From 1955, water needs are expected to double again by 1975.

Average daily use for all purposes increased from 600 gallons per capita in 1900 to 1,100 gallons in 1950 and 1,300 in 1955. By 1975 the country will be using 1,800 gallons of water a day for every man, woman, and child.

Industry and irrigation are by far the largest users.

Water problems are largely watershed protection problems. Water control and conservation cannot be separated from soil conservation.

depends on the cost of doing the needed work and the rates established at state and county levels. The maximum cost-share rate will not exceed 80% of the average estimated cost of installing each eligible practice.

There is no limitation on the amount of cost shares an individual may earn under the program except a limitation of \$2,500 for cost shares for improving dams or ponds for irrigation.

Practices eligible for cost-sharing include: establishing permanent plant cover, field or contour stripcropping, contour cultivation, improving range cover, trees or shrubs for windbreaks or shelterbelts, establishing waterways, building terrace systems, chiseling or pitting range land, improving dams or ponds for irrigation, constructing wells for livestock, installing pipe, fencing, and controlling brush.

Cropland acreage allotments of those who participate in the program will not be decreased during the period of their contract by any actions they take in carrying out their plan of operations.

Farmers and ranchers may apply for assistance at any USDA county office.

STATE GAME DEPARTMENT

CONDITIONS EXCELLENT IN GILA WILDERNESS AREA

The annual inspection trip into the Gila Wilderness area was made last week by Game Commission Chairman Wright, Director Pickens, and officials of the Forest Service and the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Pickens commented with great enthusiasm on the fine range conditions. After four growing seasons without livestock on the area, and with the additional impetus of good moisture, the grass averages two feet in height and the brush is putting out new shoots, showing an excellent growth this year. Game conditions in general are good. Water everywhere accounts for the wide distribution of game throughout the area.

Quite a number of hunters had packed in and had taken a good many deer and a few turkeys.

The inspection party saw evidence of elk throughout the area and in one place they saw three bulls and a cow. A most unusual observation was made ten miles north of Collins Park—a covey of Mearns quail, which point up the good range conditions that provide habitat for this species.

LOTS OF DOVES

Dove hunters still have a chance until sundown October 25 to take some of the "plenty" reported to be in the southern part of the state. The Department of Game and Fish had had enthusiastic reports on the abundance of the birds in the south within the past several days.

DEER HIDES WANTED

Successful deer hunters who do not intend to use the deer hides are urged to donate the hides for occupational therapy work in Veterans' Hospitals.

Lodges of the BPOE are forming committees to further this project, and Elks and non-Elks alike are urged to participate.

The hides will be salted and bundled by the Lodges and baled and shipped to H. L. Cox Fur and Hide Company in Albuquerque. 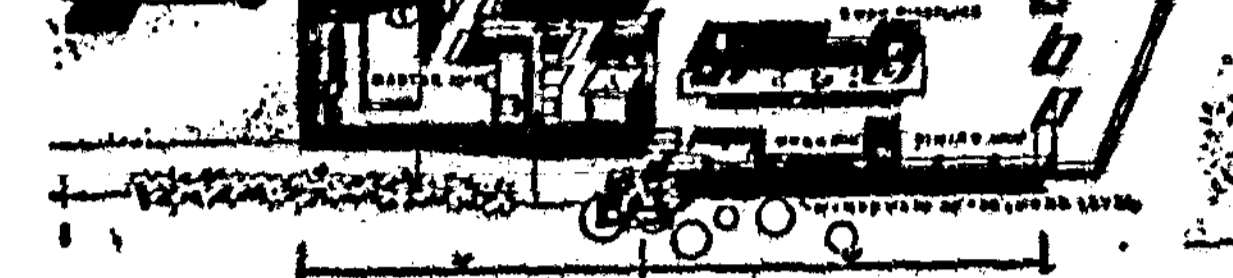

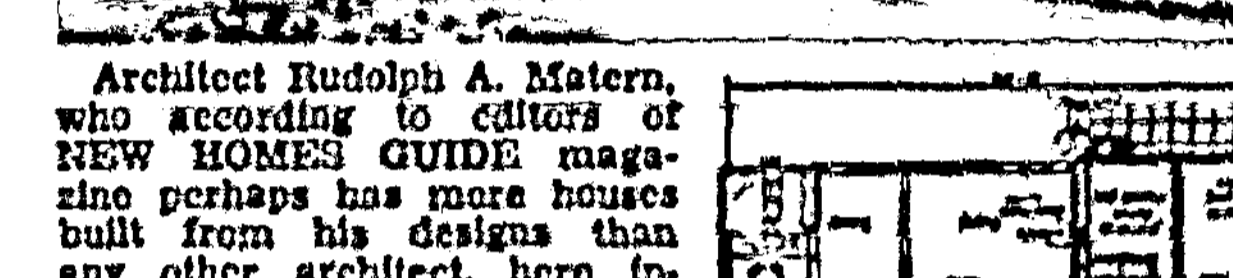

Karen Petty who is a third grader in Mrs. Wilson's room, is all smiles this week over the arrival of her baby sister.

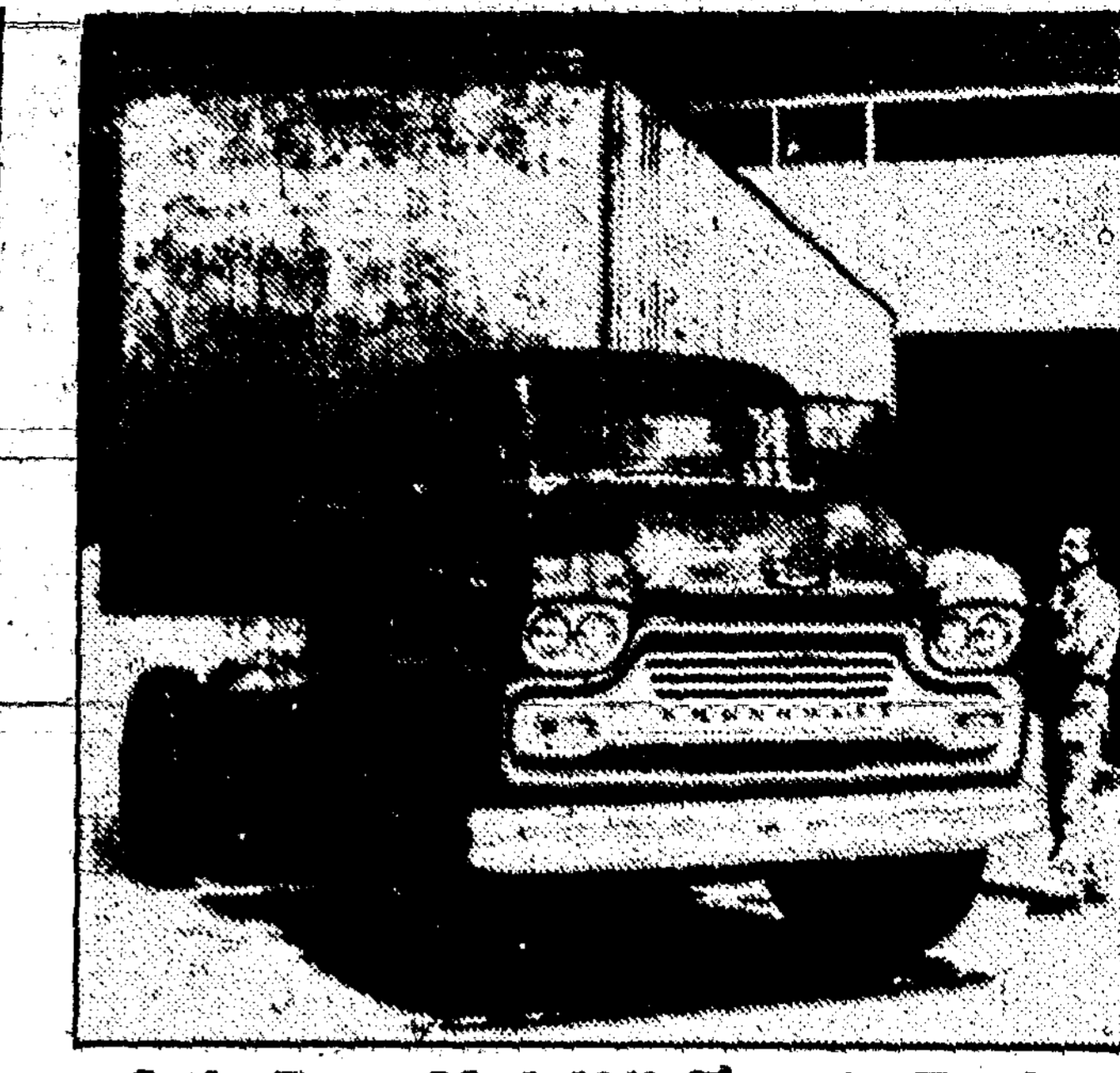

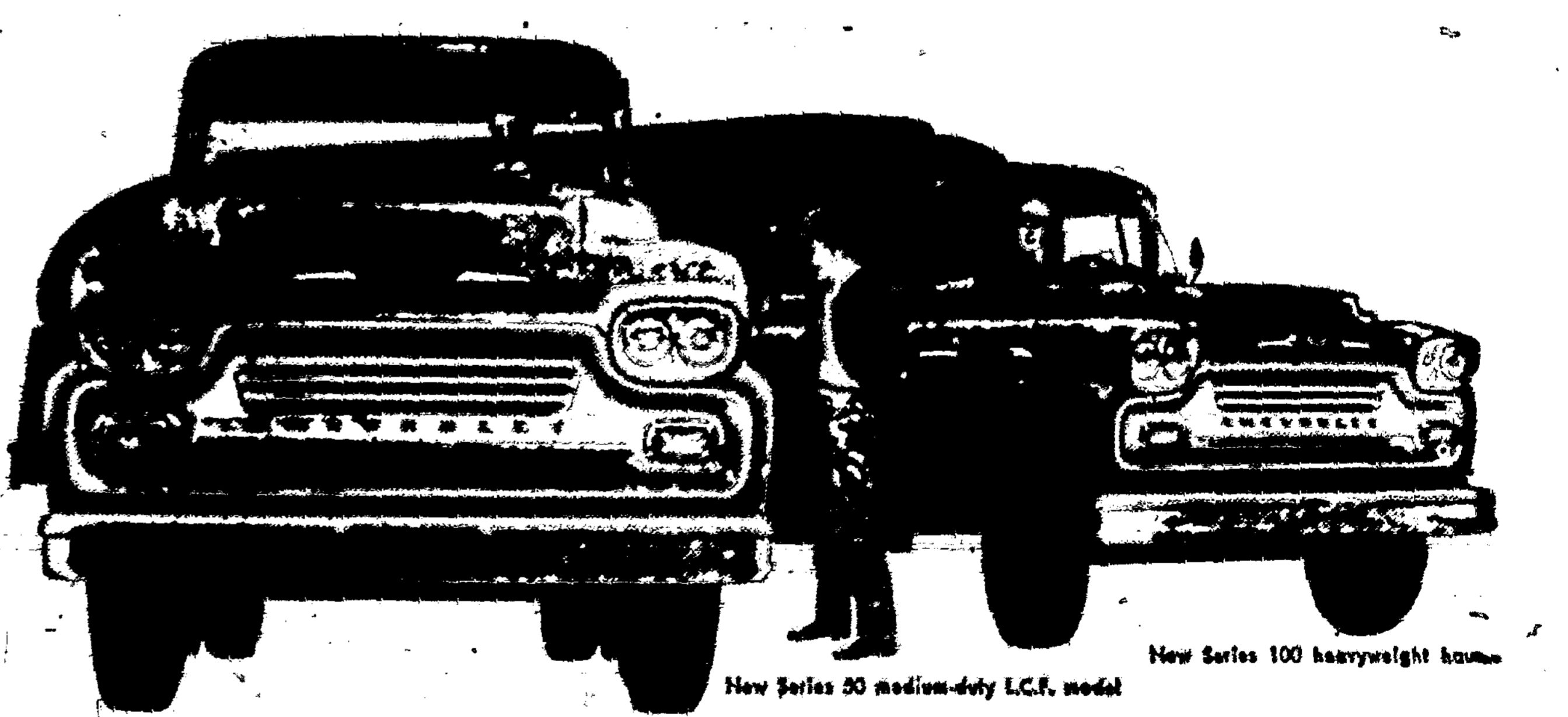
