Navy Has Opportunity For High School Grads

High school seniors and graduates have only until November 16 to apply for the Navy's Reserve Officer Training Corps, (Adm. James A. Holloway, Jr., Chief of Naval Personnel, said this week. Applicants will take the nationwide competitive examination on December 14 as the first step toward an appointment as midshipman.

Designed to supplement the Officer output of the Naval Academy, the NROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a commission while studying at the civilian college of his choice which has an NROTC unit.

All tuition, fees and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives an annual retainer of \$600 for four years. During the summers the student goes on fascinating training cruises to many parts of the world.

After completing the usual four year college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty with the Navy's far-flung fleets.

High school seniors and graduates between the ages of 17 and 21 may apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a rigid physical exam early in 1958. From the pool of qualified young men remaining in competition, approximately 2,000 will be selected to begin naval careers next September.

The NROTC college training program is also open to enlisted men on active duty with the Navy or Marines.

Application forms are available at high schools, colleges, Navy Recruiting Stations or from the Chief of Naval Personnel, Washington 25, D. C.

MYSTERY MAN AGAINST CHAVEZ

Santa Fe, Nov. 6—The lumpy head section of the Democratic party has whispered around the word that a well-backed candidate will file against Sen. Dennis Chavez at the final hour next March 4.

His identity has been a well-kept secret this far; they will tell you this much about him: He is a Democrat regular, is known by party people throughout the state, is of clean background and generally respected, and once made a state-wide race. He is not a "big" or "major" state figure.

Those clues would take in a dozen or more people who made unsuccessful primary runs and would probably also take in some of the Democratic presidential electors of recent years. They hide "state wide races."

SECRET CANDIDATE HAS DOUBLE DUTY

The lumpy are those still suffering sore heads from last year when Sen. Chavez was blamed for defeating Demo Gov. John Simms.

They have a double purpose in proposing opposition to Chavez: 1.—To punish him for 1956 by either defeating him in the primary or softening him for the November finale.

2.—To keep him occupied with his own affairs and out of the Demo primary contest for governor—and out of the main event campaign for governor.

The lumpy are figures of the old John Simms group, they include members of the "palace guard" and little Demos who are sore because they lost their statehouse jobs in the 1956 upheaval.

The crowd commands a lot of money and could finance a campaign against Chavez.

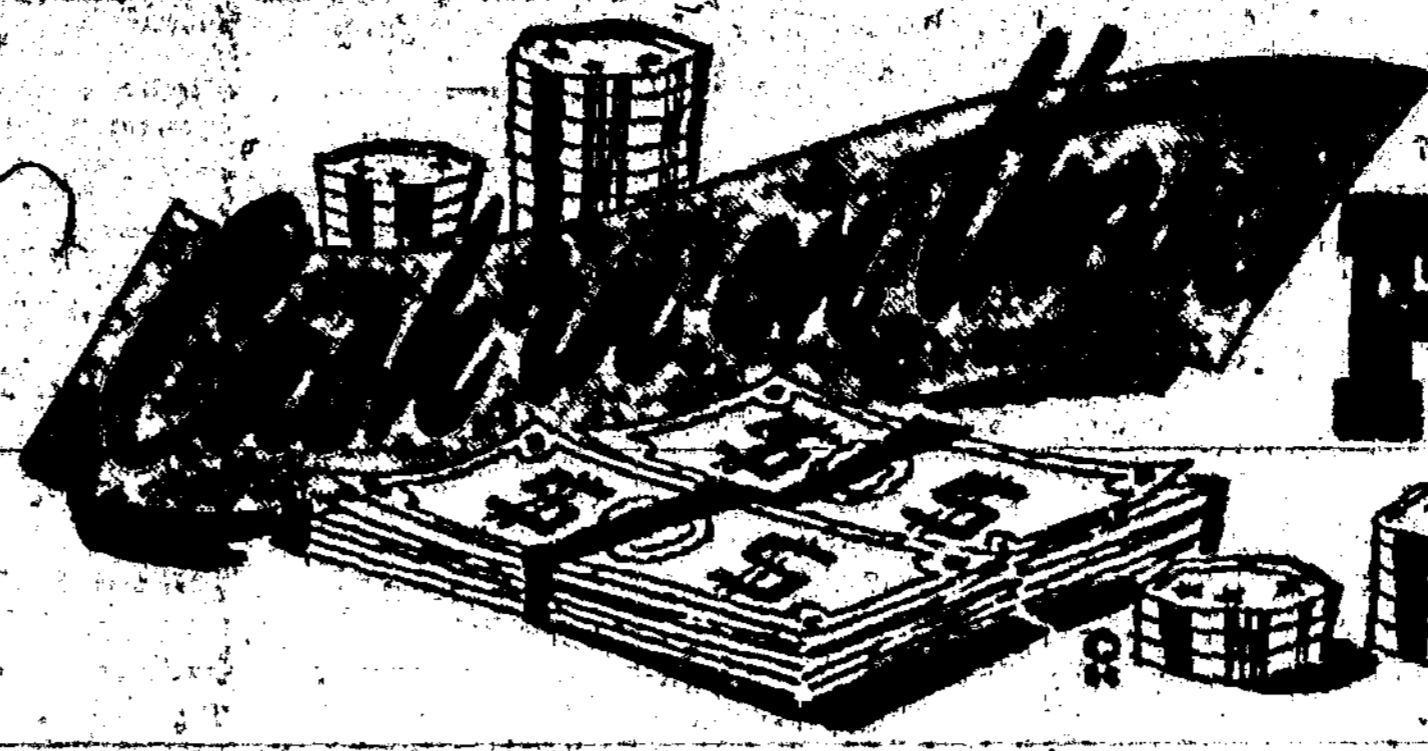
