

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

Soon after we arrived in Capitan I became acquainted with George Dingwall and his brother. They were both employees at the Coalinga Coal Company store.

The next young man I met was Bert Province. It so happened we met the same day that he began to work for Mr. George Titworth.

That year I met the Copeland brothers, Will and John; also Charlie Coe and several other young men who were employed at Fort Stanton.

Coming back to Capitan and its description, as I remember there was one home under the hill and on the north side of the creek (the Will Rely home, now owned by Mrs. Maud Clark) and one home on top of the hill, where Mrs. Newt Kemp lived for several years before her death.

Capitan had coal oil lights when I first saw the town and I don't know exactly when the electric plant was acquired. I left in 1928 (I think) and returned in 1932.

Capitan had a good school building, adequate for its needs for a good many years. In fact, for a long time the school used only the east half of the downstairs section.

However, Mr. and Mrs. Fisher (Carl Fisher's mother) were faithful. She superintended a Sunday School for a good many years and she'd play the organ and get whoever she could to lead the singing.

The schoolhouse was the community center really as I have said. The children attended school there, we went there to church (when there was any) and the uptakes part had a use also.

Though Capitan had a place of worship, Coalinga did not. Neither did they have a school. But they had a dance hall and sometimes a roaming preacher would hold a service in the dance hall.

He started services, when in came the music and they began to set up for a dance, so the church people retired and the dance went on.

The earliest try at religious services that I know about was quite a long time before I came to Capitan.

They pioneered here in Capitan long before any of us now living were here, that I know, and perhaps their work opened the way for future churches.

Then there was another old soldier of the Cross. I can't forget him. I don't know where he came from, except that he was a Godly man and he carried all his worldly goods with him, wherever he went.

Sometimes he'd decide to preach at some home; other times he'd say it would be a schoolhouse somewhere. But regardless of where it was, people would gather and he'd preach.

DENNIS CHAVEZ ON POGO STICK

Santa Fe, Feb. 5.—Sen. Dennis Chavez is riding a political pogo stick.

He was down a year ago, looked ripe for enforced retirement with party wheels vowing to turn him out.

He was up in the fall without an opponent in sight or a critic who could command any attention.

Now he's up again—the chairman have turned silent, the unemployed ones are inclined to forgive, Walker's campaign is still on the ground, and the big ones who wanted to punish him for adding in the defeat of Democratic Gov. John Simms are talking compromise.

Many of those in the John Simms clique are not satisfied with Walker as a senatorial challenger.

Chavez is still not in the clear. He has accumulated his share of enemies and critics during 20 years in Washington and there is still resentment about his party bolt of 1956 but the opposition doesn't seem as serious as it was two months ago.

The bureau of revenue has come up with a study of truck taxes showing that the average results that came out of a survey made by the Legislative Finance Committee which was released a couple of weeks ago.

Two large out-of-state truck firms were shown to have paid \$110,400 taxes in 1954, before the enactment of the 1955 truck law, and \$34,800 in 1956.

One line had a tax cost of \$2.10 per 100 miles in 1954 and \$3 cents per 100 miles in 1956. The other was \$2.10 in 1954 and 60 cents in 1956. That doesn't count the gasoline tax.

Two large bus lines showed tax costs of \$1.50 per 100 miles in 1954 and 70 cents in 1956, and \$1.20 in 1954 and 70 cents in '56.

Not a "carrier" in the common sense of the word but still in the truck classification are pickups which have substantially higher license fees now than prior to the 1953 truck legislation.

On 22 models commonly sold in New Mexico the bureau study shows an average increase of a little more than 31% for license plates.

Many of the pickups are family cars used as much for passengers as for trucking.

Sheepmen Adopt Eagle Control Plan

Over 80 attended the Lincoln County Wool Growers meeting held in Carrizozo last Saturday at the Carrizozo Woman's Club building.

All officers of the wool growers were re-elected, as follows: Charles A. Jones, president; Joe Green, vice-president and Robert E. Corn, secretary-treasurer.

The item of major interest was a discussion led by Ralph Brown on eagle control. After considerable discussion, plans were made to have a \$5 membership fee, plus an additional \$15 for any ranch over 10 sections.

Edward Barker of the Fish & Wildlife Service reported on the coyote baits put out in this area.

Ivan Watson asked the group several questions in relation to sheep management. He noted that the sheep improvement program has changed the sheep in Lincoln County as well as other areas.

Soremouth vaccines have not been properly applied by some ranchers and the occurrence of soremouth at shipping time can cause the sheep to be quarantined.

During the panel discussion on the use of the squeeze machine for herd improvement, J. R. Stauder pointed out that in one study the visual selection was only 65% correct, whereas the squeeze machine could choose for clean wool with 100% accuracy.

Charles Fuller showed his records that he keeps on all his better sheep. He plans to use the squeeze machine on his better herds every year as some sheep hold their production longer than others.

It was pointed out when using an 8-drop shearing machine that to run the squeeze machine on an entire herd, it would require three helpers to keep up with the shearer.

Town Board Meeting Was a Brief One

The Carrizozo town board of trustees had one of the shortest meetings in several months Tuesday night at the town hall.

The meeting started at 7 and adjourned 45 minutes later to enable Town Clerk Johnson Stearns to attend an entertainment given for the Carrizozo school teachers.

Two building permits were approved: Roy Shafer, \$4,000, one-story residence; self contractor, To' Jas L. Wells, \$1500, for 3-room dwelling.

Mayor Wayne C. Withers said he anticipated no trouble in securing a right-of-way for an access road to the new town dump and that he hoped the town would be able to start using the new site next week.

Following the meeting, Mr. Stearns informed the news that several people had inquired if taxes would be raised to finance the new filtration plant.

There will be no increase in taxes, he said, "because the \$20,000 needed for the plant was raised by revenue bonds, to be paid for solely from revenue derived from the sale of water by the town."

He said the bonds, bearing 5% interest, are being handled by Quinn & Co., investment brokers, of Albuquerque.

Buick Abandoned On Highway 54

A 1954 Buick was wrecked and abandoned a half mile inside the Lincoln-Otero county line some time during the night of February 1.

State Patrolman James Clayton, who investigated, said he had received a report that the car was registered in the name of Wm. Jackson of Alamogordo.

Patrolman Clayton also checked a one-car accident Saturday night, one fourth mile east of Carrizozo on Highway 390.

The car, driven by Cora Boone, was damaged, but did not overturn when it went off the highway. Mrs. Boone was not injured.

She jumped free of the car as a freight car began to push it along the tracks. The station wagon was shoved 105 feet and was considerably damaged.

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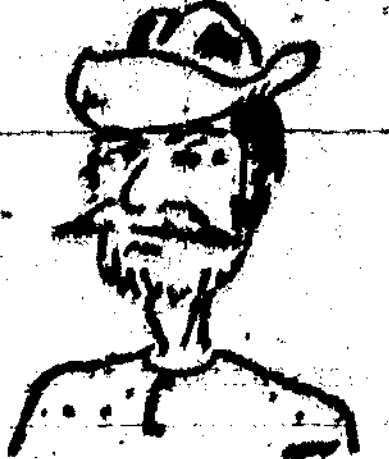

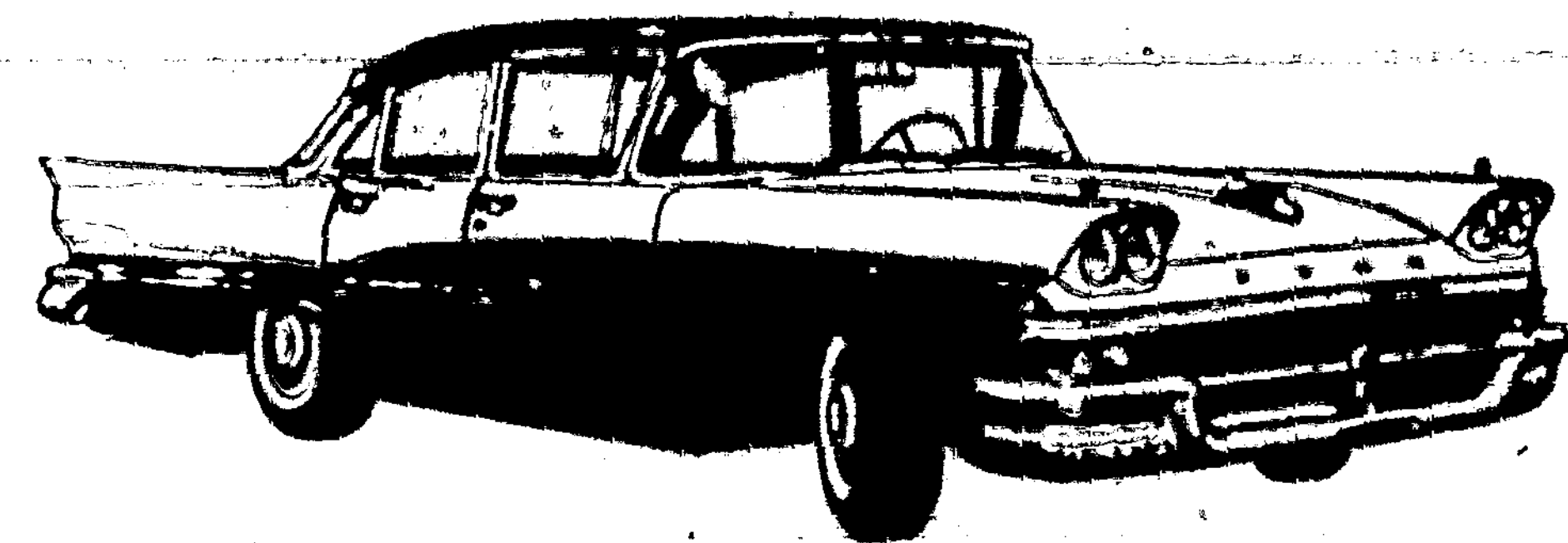

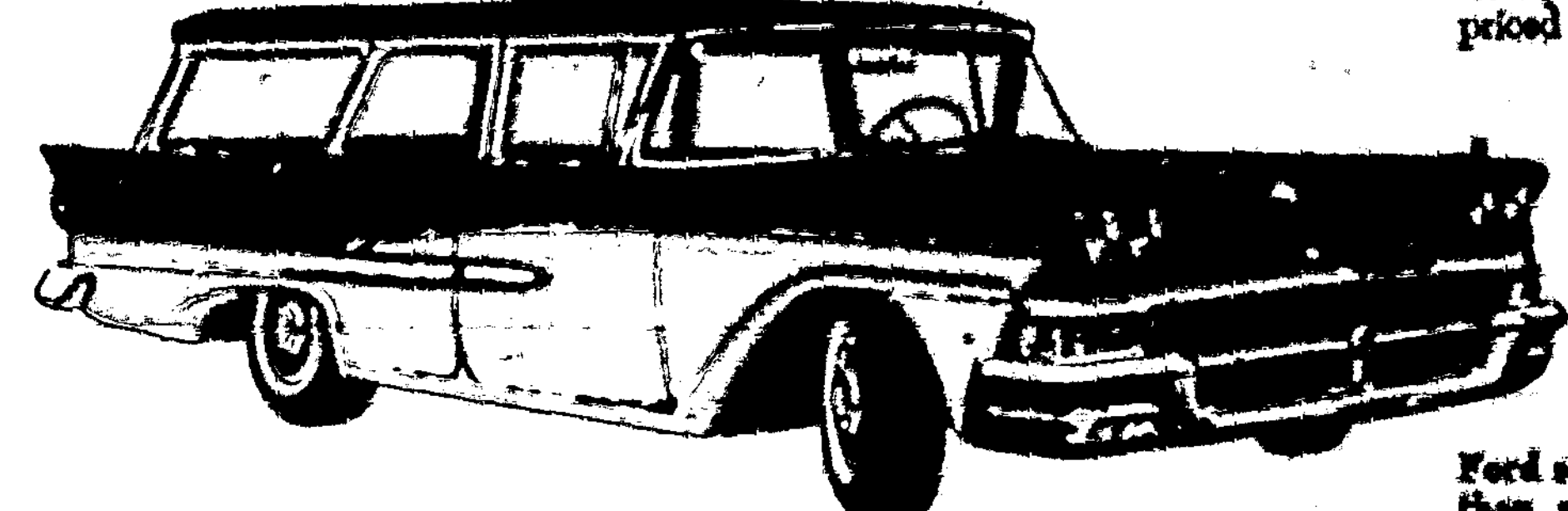

Orchard Mitecides Discussed at Meeting

"Know the Mites in Your Orchard" was the subject discussed by Gerald Nielsen at the White Mountain Fruit Growers meeting Monday night. After looking over several orchards Monday, Mr. Nielsen found that the red mite egg on the tree was the brown or clover mite. He stated that he had not found the European red-mite in New Mexico. Some of the other mites he mentioned were the blister mite and several species of two-spot mite. The species of the two-spot mite likely to be found in this area are common two-spot mite, McDaniel mite, Wilmette mite, and Canadian two-spot mite. He emphasized that each of the species of mites may require a different miticide to control and that what controls mites in California may not control it here. You should change chemicals from time to time. Mr. Nielsen pointed out, so that the mites will have less chance to build up resistance. Even the same organic phosphates, such as the organophosphates, should not be used throughout the season. A film entitled "Gateway to Health" on dental care was enjoyed by the group. Representatives from the Stauffer Chemical Co. and the Imperial Livestock Supply, insecticide dealers, were present at the meeting.

Decline in Cattle on Feed

The number of cattle and calves on feed for market in New Mexico on January 1 is estimated at 25,000 head according to the New Mexico Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is 32% less than the 37,000 head on feed a year earlier and 17% less than the 1952-53 average of 30,000 head.

Local Educators Speak At Hondo PTA

The regular meeting of the Hondo Valley PTA was highlighted by three talks given by administrators and a member of the high school faculty.

Superintendent Montes led off with a discussion of the academic responsibilities of the high school, stating that the Hondo High School meets the academic requirements set forth by the State Board of Education.

Stressing the importance of the home, the school, and the individual himself in attaining success, he placed heavy emphasis on the latter by showing in a scale drawing the increasing necessity of self-discipline as the student advances into high school and college.

Other matters touched upon were testing, homework, and the essay type of examination, all representing salient parts of the local high school program.

Robert McCrady, of the Science and English Departments, spoke on his philosophy of education, bringing to his audience ideas accumulated from a broad background of educational experience which includes nine years as county superintendent in El Paso County, Texas, and two years' experience as director of instruction in the Waxahachie, Texas, public schools.

Enriched by a wide knowledge of philosophy, Mr. McCrady's talk showed how the teaching profession has reached a position not only precarious, but also a position that is most strategic.

Tracing the source of this to the confluence of two streams pouring forth seven million students into the high schools of our country, Mr. McCrady gave a realistic picture of the dilemma created by those who seek true knowledge and those who want a better way of life.

In concluding, he summed up his philosophy of education by saying that it was profoundly important to educate all students sufficiently to enable them to take responsible places in a democratic society.

Winding up the talks, Principal John Hamilton showed the value and place of extra-curricular activities in the life of high school students.

He explained how the old school placed all the emphasis on mental development to the exclusion of the physical and in-
