There are some say people who should be mentioned regarding Captain and his churches. Some of the people are dead and some are alive among us.

Also a Mr. and Mrs. Milton Reed who ranched out in the Tucson a good many years ago and many others that I can't recall at the moment.

I overlooked a young man who was a bookkeeper with P. G. Peters for a time, I think about 1912. This young man was K. B. Glaxier. He was a natural leader among men, and a consecrated Christian.

I feel my mother, also an uncle, Rev. S. W. Lane of Floyd, N. M., deserves mention. Then I think around 1907, one Joseph Cummings moved to these parts.

Pruning around 20,000 apple trees in the Pflingsten orchards at Hondo is quite a chore any way you look at it, but a big assist is given the pruner by the use of machine tools.

THE BACK STAGE CAMPAIGN FORCES

Santa Fe, Feb. 12 — Who's backing this year's crop of candidates for governor? Joe Bursey, the state tourist bureau director for more than 20 years, has as his major supporters a trio of long experienced political figures:

John Miles, a former Democrat state chairman, governor, congressman, land commissioner presently operating a textbook depository.

Rex Meador of Torrance county, a former Democratic state chairman and a state tax commissioner officer in the Gov. John Simms administration, now in insurance and real estate.

Paul Huss, former Santa Fe mayor, Democratic state treasurer, and influential business figure in the Simms administration, now in the road oil business.

SIMMS' OLD CROWD RUNNING BURROUGHS

John Burroughs, Portales business man and legislator, is running with the backing of the "palace guard" crowd of the Simms administration.

Foremost among them is Harold "Fats" Leonard, Albuquerque truck dealer, who has a bunch of truckline operators in tow. Also up front is Jack Bealy, Albuquerque Demo chairman.

Trucker Robert Valdez of Santa Fe who was a corporation commissioner in the early 1940's has been traveling the state for the candidate and Dick Valdez, business manager at the mental hospital in Las Vegas under Simms, has been engaged as a companion for the candidate.

Seaborner Collins of Las Cruces, the former national commander of the American Legion has been recruited as "campaign crowd" but is not of the inner crowd.

Paul Case, Albuquerque business man and a sharp one in politics, appears to be the campaign strategist.

The Burroughs crowd reportedly has seeds of dough.

DICK BOKUM BACKS SEVEN-FOOT PICKETT

Seven-Foot Pickett the corporation commissioner is running under Impetus supplied by Dick Bokum, Santa Fe uranium operator and possibly Victor Salazar, Albuquerque business man and for a long time a prominent figure in state politics.

Salazar and Bokum supported Pickett against John Simms in the primary of 1936. Bokum has been active this year soliciting money for Pickett; Salazar hasn't shown himself this year to this writer's knowledge.

Pickett has been in a skid since siding with the telephoners in a rate increase, doesn't have the backers now that he had before the reversal of form.

BOB PETERSON LOOKS FOR HELP

Bob Peterson, the other one who said he is going to run, doesn't have any important backing that anyone around here knows about. He is teamed with Bob Stephens of Santa Fe who filed for governor in 1936 and attracted a few thousand votes which could have been responsible for Simms beating Pickett for the nomination for governor. Stephens got 6,000 votes and Simms won by about 2,000.

Peterson might be planning to make himself useful in the same way by drawing support away from Pickett. That, however, doesn't seem very important. (Continued on Back Page)

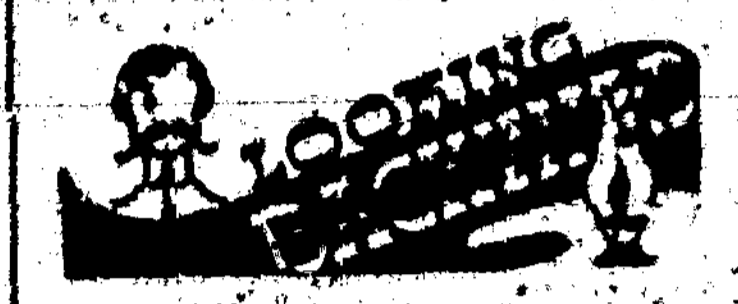

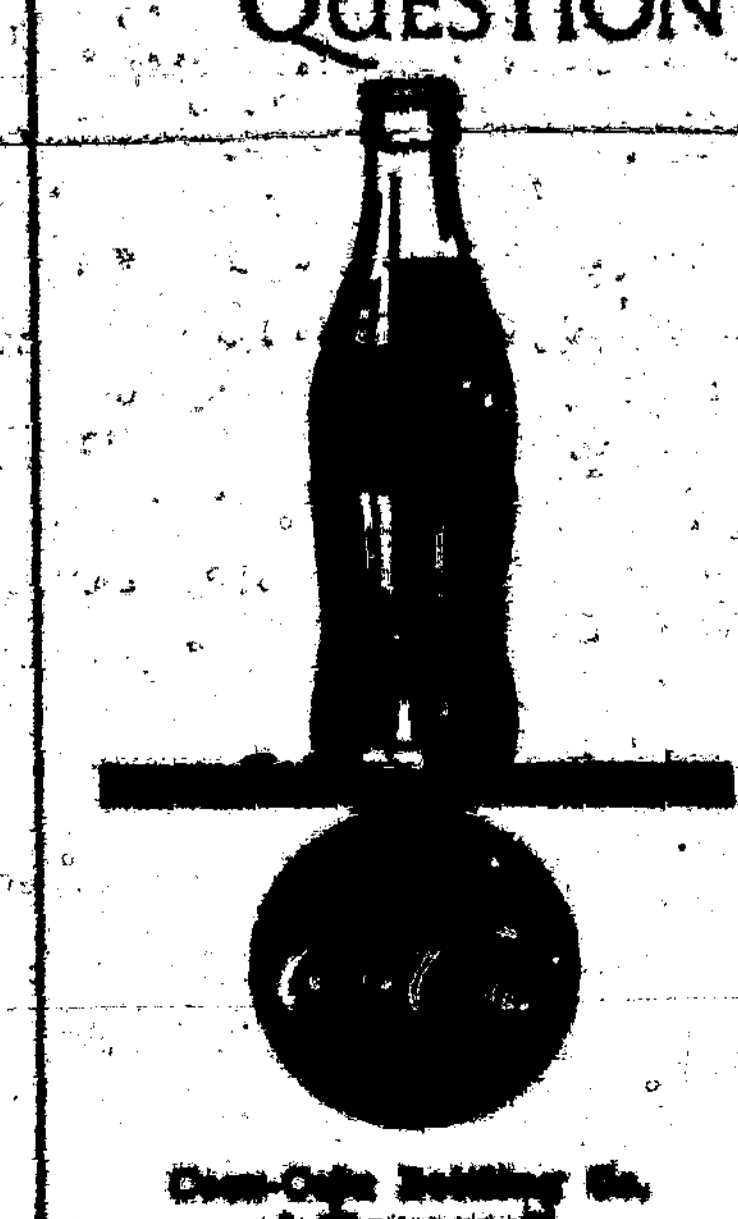
Senator J. V. Tully was in Carrizozo from his home in Glencoe. William Potts was awarded a medal for his bravery by the French Government.

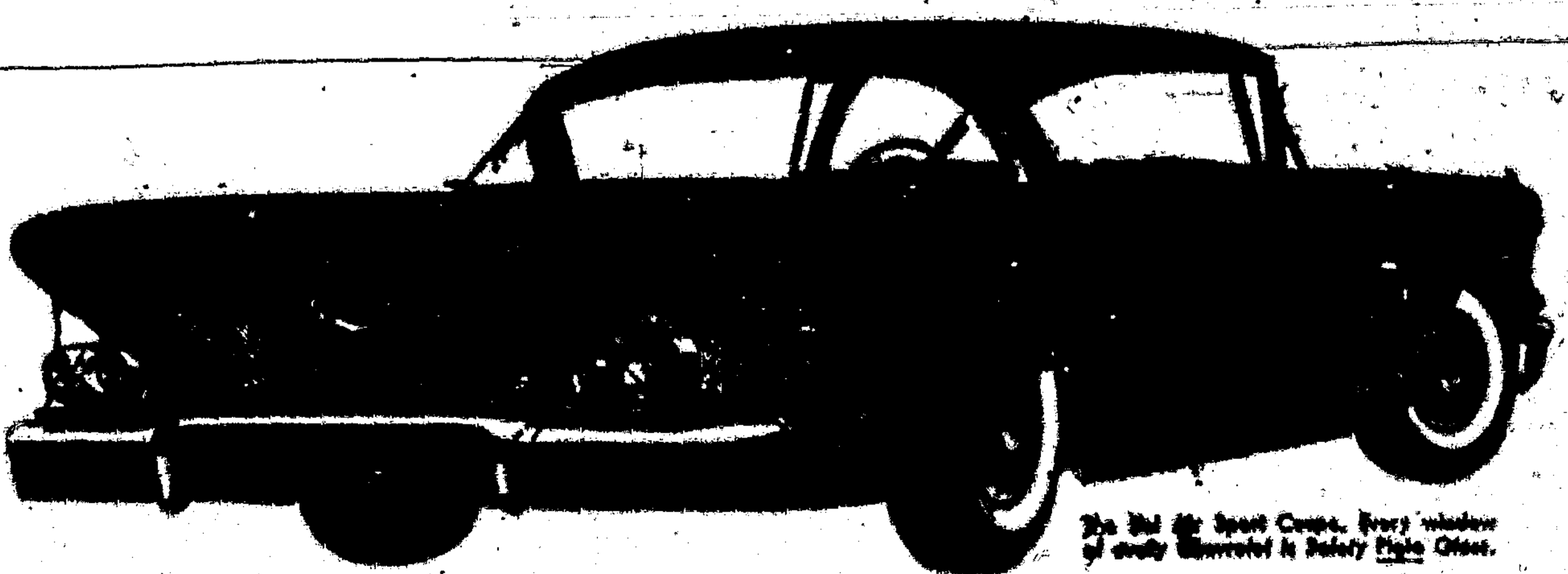
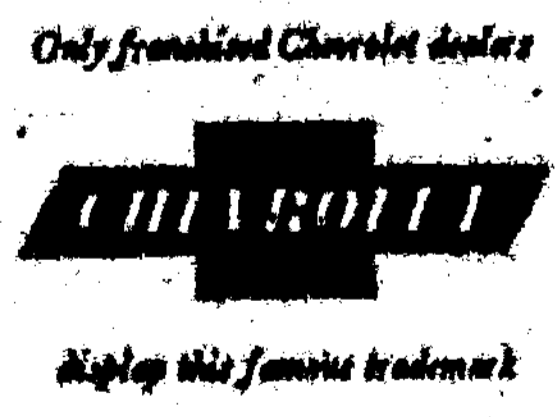

FOLKLORE CORNER

THE STRIPPED-DOWN MODEL-T RACES

In 1920 and 1921 when Las Cruces had more events and fewer organizations, the top attraction on July 4 was the stripped-down Model-T races. It was a hazardous 60-mile race. One mechanic was killed and several other participants were injured in the years that the races were held.

The men who started the event were Alec Hood, Jimmie Smith and Bob Walters.

The first year only stock cars were used. The second year, when 13 cars were entered, a few of them were "hopped up." The cars were equipped with two bucket seats, one for the driver and the other for the mechanic. On a left-hand turn—no turns were taken slowly—the mechanic would lean over back of the driver to throw his weight with the turn.

The drivers drew numbers for the positions, and started from Barker's place north of Mesilla Park at 30-second intervals. No lapsed time was figured in the race.

Racers made the first left turn in crossing the tracks on the road to Mesilla. They then raced south on what is State Road 28 and turned east on a road leading back to Mesilla Park. It was about six miles around the course, and 10 laps were run.

The biggest thrill of the race, Hood said, was "sailing" over the 10-foot-wide bridge near Mesilla. In approaching the bridge at a speed of 48 to 50 miles an hour, a driver eased over to the left side of the road, hit the bridge square, took to

the air and landed on the right side of the road.

During one of the races, a driver going over the bridge made the mistake of trying to steer while in the air. His car hit the ground with the front wheels turned to the left, and he took off from the highway. He stopped his car just as it ramed into the doorway of an adobe house and knocked the Model-T's radiator loose.

The best vantage point for the race seemed to be the highway north to El Paseo Road, which was lined with cars on both sides.

In one of the races Hood knocked a wheel off on the second lap. The road had been watered to keep the dust down. He hit the wet stretch too fast for the turn, skidded sideways and a wheel struck the railroad tracks. The skidding against the tracks knocked the rim off with the tire and bent the steel spokes.

Hood walked along the line of spectators' cars until he saw a 30x3 tire. He jacked up the car, removed the tire and went back to his damaged racer. Two spectators lifted up Hood's car while

Mr. Brazeal, the time man in Hood's garage and his mechanic in the race, and the driver put on the good tire. Despite the eight minutes lost, Hood came in third in the race.

The man killed in the 1921 race was Mr. Butler, the mechanic riding with Bob Walters. The mechanic was killed on the road in front of the house where Hood now lives, west of Mesilla Park. There was a rise and a slight curve at that point like those on the road to Dona Ana. One of the racing cars had stopped on the other side of the rise to get water, and Walters and Butler did not see it in time. Walters' racer hit the rear wheel of the other car. The Walters car flipped and rolled on Butler. The mechanic might have been thrown clean and his life saved, had he not made himself too secure in the bucket seat. He had looped a strap around his wrist and tied it to the car.

After Butler's death, the July 4 racing event was discontinued on the approval of the drivers and public.

The Dolly Varden trout, a brightly colored, delicious variety that abounds in the mountain streams of New Mexico, was named after a character in Charles Dickens' novel "Barnaby Rudge." In the novel, Dolly Varden was a beautiful girl who always dressed in brilliant colors.

Nine Counties Report TB Increase Cases

Though Lincoln County had no new reported cases or resident deaths from TB during 1957, tuberculosis, contrary to popular belief, is not melting away in New Mexico.

Robert Utzinger, executive director of the New Mexico Tuberculosis Association, says that nine New Mexico counties reported an increase in their TB case load in 1957. A total of 628 TB cases were reported during the year, and deaths totaled 99. These counties had increased number of cases during last year (the first figure is the number of cases and the second in parentheses is the increase over 1956): Bernalillo, 162 (32); Chaves 19 (5); Doña Ana 3 (3); Hidalgo 7 (4); Luna 0 (0); Quay 5 (1); Sandoval 31 (5); San Juan 101 (49); and Taos 51 (29).

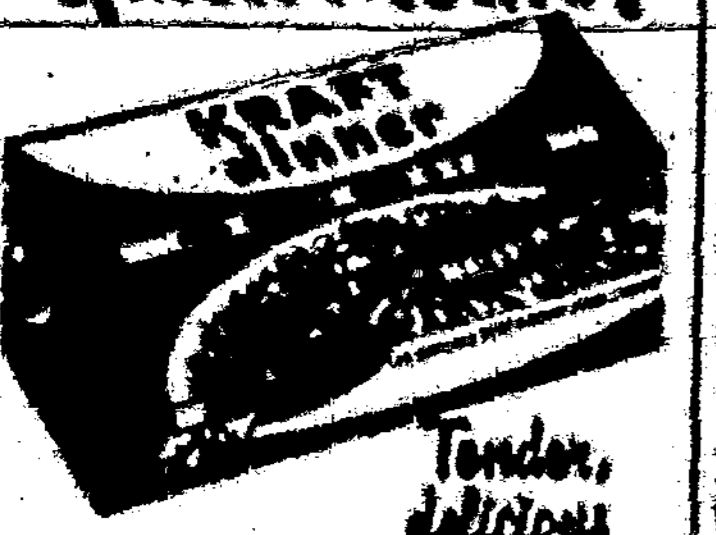

Farm and Ranch

Horticulturist Visits Valley Orchards

I visited several orchards in the Honcho Valley last week with W. J. Willbank, extension horticulturist. Of major interest among the growers was fertilizers and mole control.

George Limacher was using his roto-tiller to mulch around the base of his trees and reduce the over-wintering insect population. He has already applied 5 lbs. of a 16-20-0 fertilizer to all of his orchard and plans to apply potato to part of it.

Mr. Willbank advised him to use his "polybor" — a form of boron — in his sprayer instead of putting it on the ground. By doing this, the tree would have greater use of the boron this year. He also mentioned that urea at 5 lbs. per 100 gallons could be used as a fertilizer in the spray tank.

While visiting another part of the Limacher orchard, several stunted and dying trees were noted. It was suggested that 4-5 postholes be dug around the tree and the holes filled with manure and commercial fertilizer mixture.

Bert Pfingsten is planning to apply varying rates of nitrogen, phosphates and potash. He plans to use check plots to see if the fertilizers are doing him any good.

Bar Pavey and Kenneth Noe are thinking of gutting in a small acreage of onions. Mr. Willbank recommended the use of yellow and white sweet Spanish onions planted at 5 lbs. per acre on 40 inch beds during the first week of March. Harvest would be expected around the middle of August.

Plans were made to apply some deer repellent trial plots on the Bonnell, Coe and Pfingsten orchards.

Range, Feedlot Report For Western Area

On my recent trip to Denver I came upon several market reports. Of special interest is the range and feedlot report for the Western area. Would a summary of the report, such as the one that follows, be of interest to you?

Reported out of Amarillo area were around 300 head of choice 300-325 lb. short yearling stock calves sold for March delivery at \$26; choice mixed steer and heifer calves weighing 300 lbs. at \$27; around 4000 good stock cows 2-3 years old, sold at \$200-\$210 per pair.

A stable contract of Western slope Colorado sold for fall delivery at \$32, supposed to have 70% fat at delivery.

California lamb wool selling was reported at 48-50 cents per lb.; Montana wool sorted at \$1.25, 1.25 per lb. of single clean wool, \$1.15-1.20 for single half-blood

THE SENATORS ARE MODEST

New Mexico's senators, Dennis Chavez and Clint Anderson, who have been so helpful in the past in telling the people who should be governor have been strangely silent this time. Chavez who has his own election to think about may be afraid to take sides; Anderson may be waiting for a favorite to develop.

There has been evidence, however, that Anderson would like to bring his protégé, Ralph Trigg of Albuquerque, into the race. At first this was considered likely only in the high improbable circumstance of Burroughs and Buncy pulling out in Trigg's favor. That was thought to be necessary because of Pickett's prominence in the race and the assumption that he would benefit from a big field.

Pickett is not so fastidious now and Trigg seems closer to getting in than at any time since he started talking about running.

LABOR MOVING TOWARD SURVEY

The organized labor crowd has been muttering dissatisfaction with the candidate registration. They wouldn't support the Republican, Gov. Ed McEachern, and don't like the choice in the Democratic list. This has led to talk among the unions of bringing out a candidate of their own but it doesn't seem likely that they will at this late hour.

The labor leaders will make their choice known in March. Already they've told that they don't want Burroughs and don't want Pickett. That leaves Buncy as their man unless others get in the race.

LIGHT INTEREST FAVORS MEECHAM

The governor-runners haven't stirred much excitement. Opinion among capital observers at this point favors another term for McEachern unless new interest and enthusiasm develops among the Democrats.
