Elbert Collier was brought in to the Paden Hospital for an appendicitis operation. Dr. Paden and Dr. Lucas performed the surgery.

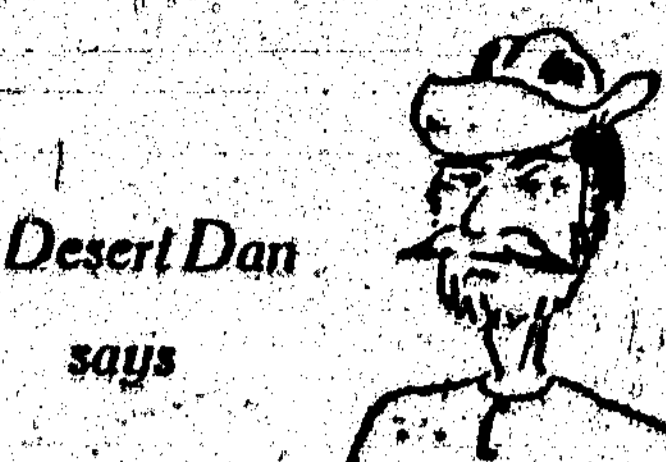
Dr. J. Odd Hamilton came up from Tularosa to practice dentistry in Carrizozo for two weeks.

To achieve the dean's list, a student must be enrolled for 12 or more semester hours and must have a grade point average of 3.2 or better out of a possible four points.

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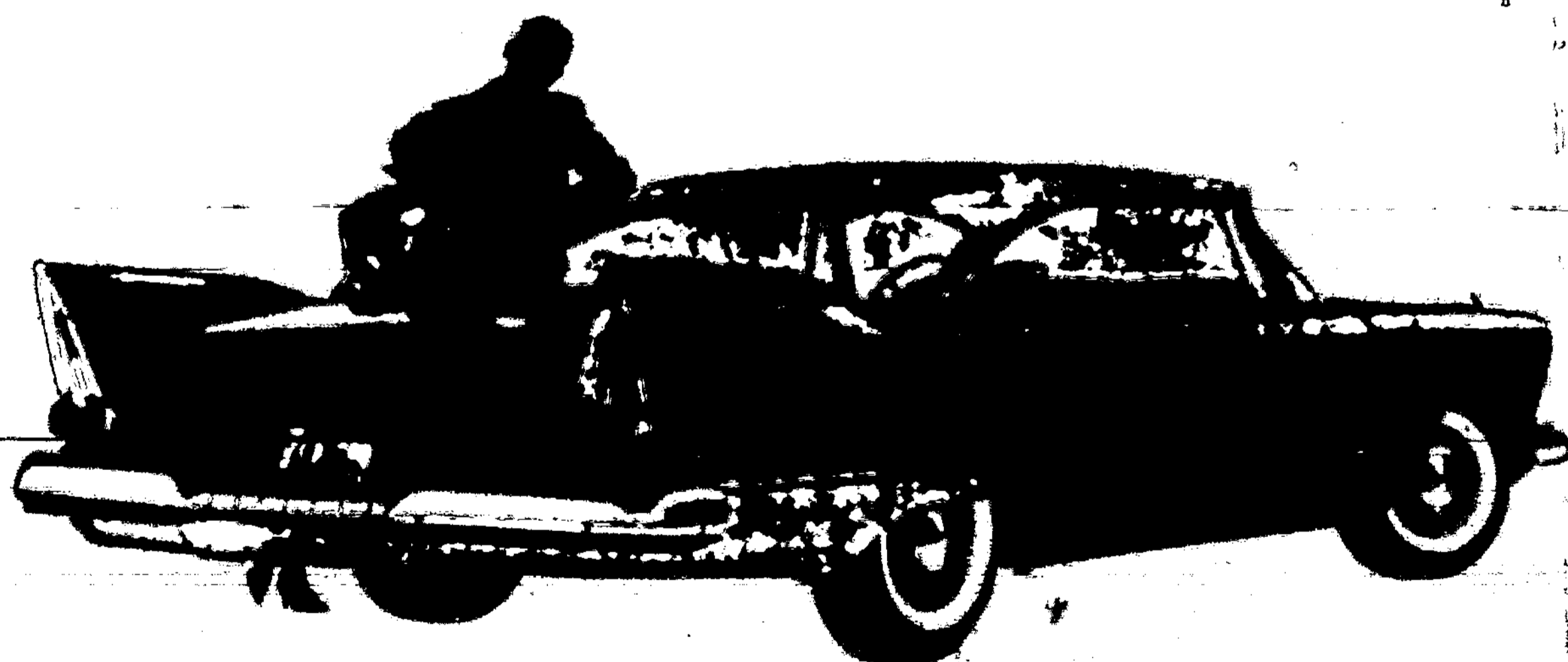

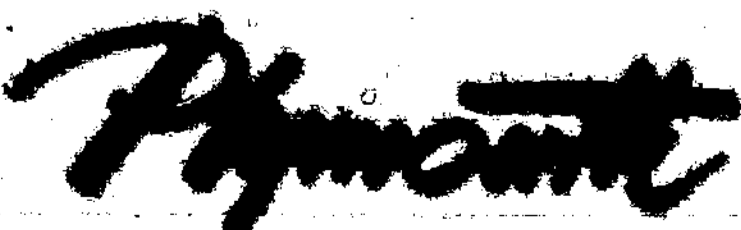


We have purchased a frame for our FHA Chapter certificate and have our gold year seals mounted on the certificate in the frame which is now hanging in the Home Ec Room.
