

Rambles Around Lincoln County

(Several years ago the Glen-coe Women's Club undertook an ambitious project of compiling a history of Lincoln County. A number of interesting accounts of early days were written by old-time residents and sent to the club, but the history was not finished. Mrs. Helen L. May became custodian of the material and has kindly given the News permission to print some of the letters. The following is the first—Ed.)

NOGAL

(By Mrs. Stephen Powers)

There were sixty-five people living in Nogal when we went there in March 1892, and two grocery stores and two saloons. The post office and telegraph office were in the Placer Hotel. The mail came every day on the stage but it took a letter five days to reach us from Kentucky.

The food question was terrible. Not a sprig of any green thing raised in the town or around. Canned things were scarce too in those days—just corn and tomatoes and a little canned fruit. No apples, oranges, nor lemons. Gosh, I wonder we didn't all run into scurvy!

Potatoes were called "spuds" and "old-rod" and also "Mal Pais Trout." The standing joke of the town was what the cowboy said about the biscuits he baked and which were a flat failure: "They squatted to raise and baked on the squat!"

About once a month some one would butcher a cow and leave the carcass in a shed and you could go and cut off what you wanted and leave the money. Elver was the most expensive part because in the Nogal vernacular "you could chew that." Also a goat would be slaughtered once in so long.

There always seemed to be salt pork in the market and often I have tried it out for lard. We could get chickens and fry them, but once we caught our eating tarantulas and so we laid off eating chickens for a while.

Of course White Oaks had more of a variety and we would stock up when we went there. It was 12 miles away and you drove there if you had a rig. But never any green vegetables anywhere. I could not drink the alkali water at first and paid a neighbor ten cents a day for a five pound lard bucket of clean water until I heard their cistern had been dry for months and what we were getting was true alkali brew.

The soldiers passing through Nogal would camp at the corral of the Placer Hotel and Mrs. Brown would trade them home-made bread for brown sugar and oil.

There was a row once just before we got to Nogal between the cowboys and the soldiers from Fort Stanton. The cowboys heartily disliked the soldiers and they seem to have come out victorious in this little fight for they chased the soldiers into the Placer Hotel. The soldiers telegraphed to Fort Stanton for the commanding officer to bring help quick.

The Post was 20 miles away, so it took a long time. The cowboys were yelling and popping off their guns all night. No arrests were made.

One man was killed in Nogal while we were there and young Josh Powers, brother of Steve and son of Col. J. D. Powers, was present at the shooting. It was Jim Ellis' wedding day and early in the evening he was in the saloon and two men got to quarreling and a stray bullet hit Jim and killed him instantly.

There were no newspapers for newspapers to be had in Nogal. Captain Roberts had a position in one of the grocery stores and his niece—Lily—who lived with them married Mr. Hinkle who was afterwards governor. She was a beautiful brunette and so sweet! Then Jeannie Roberts came out to work in the grocery store. She was cute and handsome and married a Mr. Barber. They were so happy and had a little girl.

Mrs. Bullard was the only woman at the Fort Stanton post except wives of soldiers and servants. Mrs. O'Neill ran the official mess and post office. She was a brilliant woman and did all the important nursing for us. U. D. Powers III was born at Fort Stanton.

Steve (son of Col. Powers) says there were never more than three or four working in his American mine. The other mine was the Helen Ray. Steve at one time took out \$1280 in gold ore. If his father had sold it at this time he could have had his own price for it, but he voted Steve to take out \$50,000 worth of ore for him. There never was another penny out of it. A complete fizzle! The reports of the great strike spread and several young men came out from Damascus, Kentucky, Mine of Col. Powers, to make their fortunes. All they got out of it was the tip and a great blizzard.

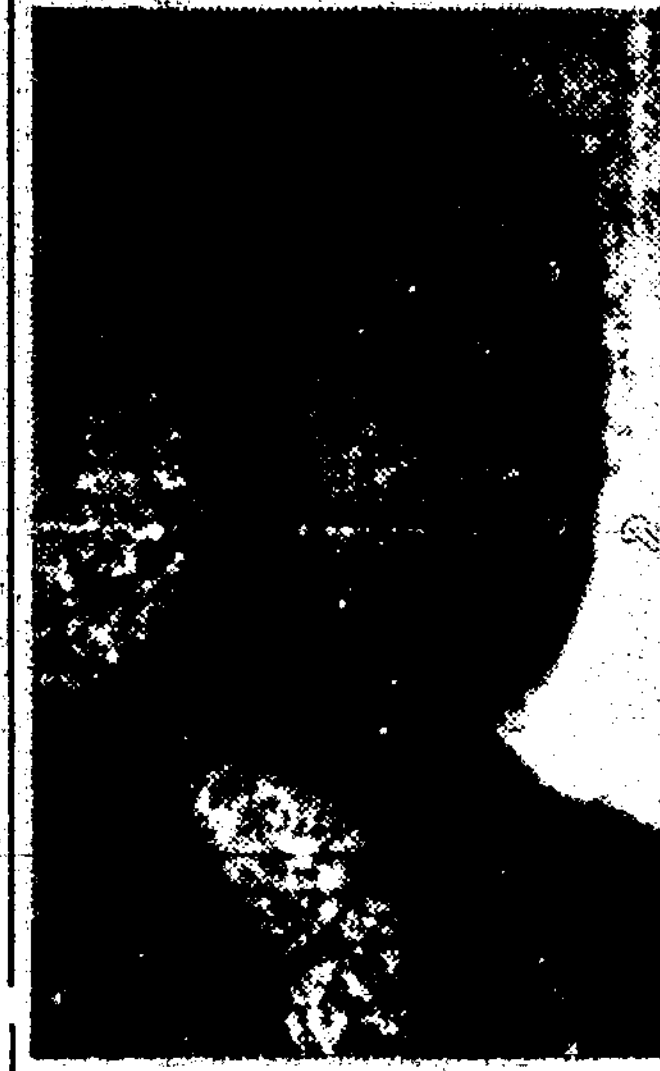

W. A. Hart Files for State Representative



W. A. HART Democratic Candidate for State Legislature

W. A. Hart of Ruidoso, who filed this week for State Representative on the Democratic ticket, installed the first public water system in Ruidoso and rebuilt the town's power system to operate 24 hours daily.

He sold the power plant to the Community Public Service and the Caprock Water Co. purchased his water system, later selling it to the town of Ruidoso.

Since that time Mr. Hart has been engaged in the retail mercantile business, contractor, real estate and electrical contracting.

He was born at Abernathy, Texas and received his education at Texas Tech. He is married and has three children, Mrs. Nancy Zerlett of Phoenix, another daughter, Marjorie Hart and a son, Jan.

He is a member of the Methodist church, the Lions Club; is president of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce; school board from 1944 to 1946, and chairman of the board of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital from 1952 to the present.

His hobbies are skiing, horseback riding, hunting and fishing.

In announcing his candidacy for State Representative Mr. Hart said he is "mindful of the responsibilities of the office and its importance to Lincoln County. I feel that I am qualified to hold such an office and that I am familiar with the problems of the county as they relate to state government."

Austin Wooten, Carrizozo businessman this week announced his candidacy for town trustee in the April 1 election.

Town Getting Help In Securing Access Road to Garbage Site

Frank Meador, representative of the State Land Office, was in Carrizozo recently to assist the town trustees in getting a suitable access road to the new garbage dump.

He said that in his opinion the best route to the dump would be out Highway 54, crossing the railway tracks opposite the dump.

Mr. Meador said he would confer with railway officials in El Paso regarding such a crossing and bring back an answer this Thursday.

Until access to the new dump is secured the town is continuing to use its old garbage disposal truck.

Capitan Plans for Log Cabin Museum

The second meeting of citizens of Capitan interested in promoting the town as the Home of Smokey the Bear was held at the City Hall on February 25. Mayor Don Murphy was asked to continue as chairman until a permanent organization is set up, and Dorothy Guck is set as secretary and treasurer.

Plans were discussed for building a log cabin to serve as a museum for Smokey and Capitan Mountain Wildlife displays. Hollis Cummins offered to donate the land for the structure, the Forest Service will furnish the logs, and it will be built with volunteer labor. The members of the Woman's Club will act as custodians as long as needed.

Definite steps will be taken in erecting the museum, building large porches, and constructing advertising signs after the group meets March 18 with Mr. Huber of the Washington office of the Forest Service and a member of the National Advertising Council. The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. in the City Hall.

REA Power Contract Awaits Final Approval

The town trustees have been notified that possibilities are good for REA acceptance of Carrizozo's request for wholesale power.

Jay Lassiter, manager of the Otero County Electric Cooperative, and Jack Hobson, director, met with REA officials in Washington February 23.

Pending final approval in Washington, a contract and rate schedule for wholesale power will be sent by Mr. Lassiter to Carrizozo within ten days.

The Otero Cooperative has requested an REA loan to build a transmission line to Carrizozo from Capitan, a substation, and re-phasing the line from Oscura to Carrizozo.

County Road Planning Committee Votes Not to Change Priorities as Set Up

The Lincoln County Road Planning Committee, meeting Tuesday in the courtroom in Carrizozo voted not to change the order of road priorities as previously set up by the committee.

This vote followed a disclosure by B. L. Smith of the State Highway Department that the allotment from Corona toward Lon was the next priority but that it would not be carried out unless right-of-way was secured. He also added that no improvement could be done on the road as long as the two right angle turns were in it.

Mr. Smith also suggested that another allotment be set up after the present allotment for the Corona-Lon road.

Mr. Smith's suggestions were by telephone from Alamogordo. Because of poor visibility his plane was unable to land at Carrizozo and he phoned from Alamogordo after the road planning committee had started its meeting.

The meeting was opened by Archie Perkins, chairman. Following roll call of delegates the next order of business was to elect new officers.

John Cooper was elected chairman by acclamation, as was George W. Shanks, vice chairman. Mr. Cooper took the chair for the rest of the meeting.

In his telephone conversation with County Agent Ralph Dunlap and relayed to the meeting, Mr. Smith said that no Federal aid secondary money would be available until July 1, 1958 and that at that time about \$200,000 would be available to Lincoln county for the 1959-1960 fiscal years.

Mr. Smith also stated on the phone that the Angus to 380 (Highway 37) is scheduled for improvement, largely with state funds, in the near future under the arterial road construction work. Although no survey has been made of this route there would be about 15 miles of highway, which would cost about \$35,000 a mile. He said it was possible that some of the Federal aid secondary money might be used on this highway so that it all could be let in one contract, effecting a saving.

Difficulty Over Right of Way Was News to Commissioners

News that the State Highway Department was encountering right-of-way difficulties on the Corona-Lon road brought a reply from the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners that they had not been contacted regarding securing right-of-way.

All three county commissioners were present at the road planning committee meeting.

Carrizozo Mayor Files; Three Seek Town Council Posts

The filing petitions of six citizens for municipal offices in Carrizozo were read at Tuesday night's meeting of the town board of trustees. They were:

For Mayor—Wayne C. Withers. For Town Trustees—A. T. Roberts, C. D. May and Austin Wooten.

For Police Magistrate — John Mackey and Paulino Aldaz. Citizens may file for municipal office through March 14.

In other town business the trustees approved a location for an indoor range for the Lincoln County Rifle and Pistol Club.

On behalf of the club Darrell Hawks, vice president, said that the range for pistols and small caliber rifles would be in the basement of the old mortuary, opposite the railway tracks. It is an adobe building with a basement lined with rock.

Mr. Hawks said the range would be installed with adequate safeguards according to specifications of the National Rifle Association.

The trustees agreed to dig a ditch and install sewer pipe on city property leading to the Albert Scharf apartment building, the property owner to furnish the materials.

The trustees discussed investing \$19,000 of reserve light and power funds in U. S. government short term bonds; also \$2,000 meter deposit funds in government Series F bonds.

Attending the meeting were Mayor W. C. Withers, trustees R. L. Sherrill, Leandro Vega, A. T. Roberts and E. Z. Manire; also Johnson Stearns, town clerk; Lloyd Topfitt, utilities manager; and John Connell, patrolman.

Devils Canyon Road Put On Secondary Aid System

The committee members discussed the status of the Devils Canyon road, a subject that has been before the committee in previous meetings. It was brought out that this road (214) from U. S. 70 northward toward Fort Stanton is on the state maintenance system for a distance of approximately 5 miles.

The rest of the road into Fort Stanton is not on the state maintenance system.

The committee voted to include the Devils Canyon road on the Federal aid secondary system and to set it up on the priority list following the other priorities.

The committee voted to include the entire State Highway 43 (Pine Lodge road) from Capitan to the county line east on the Federal aid secondary system.

Attending the meeting were members Charles A. Jones and alternate William Edgar, Encino-Capitan; George W. Shanks, Lon; John Cooper, Arabela; W. A. Hart and alternate Geo. Dingwall, Angus-Ruidoso; Guy Dabney, Nogal; E. Archie Perkins, Carrizozo; and alternate Corbin Heister, Corona; Joe E. Skeen, Pecos-Tinley; Pat Murphy and alternate J. D. Buntun, White Oaks, and Frank English and Kelley Stephenson, Oscura.

Others present were Commissioners Sgt. Reese and Sultemeyer, Kenneth Noaker, Max Fenix, R. G. Bird, and Fred Swetnam and Mr. Calloway from the Forest Service.

Mr. Swetnam said there were 233 miles of forest road system within the Lincoln National Forest, of which 272 miles are in Lincoln county. The county, he said, helps maintain part of the 272 miles.

In 1956 the Forest Service spent \$24,500 in maintenance work on its roads and one road patrol crew operates the year around. He said the maintenance crew would spend two months in Lincoln county this spring.

Telephone Rate Hearings Come to End in Carrizozo

Hearings by the State Corporation Commission on proposed telephone rate increases in several New Mexico communities were concluded in Carrizozo last Friday.

A sudden end to the controversy between the commission members over the rate increase came when Commissioners Block and Pickett voted that the hearings end and that the rate increase be granted. Commissioner James F. Lamb dissented, stating he would reserve the right to issue an opinion later, outlining his stand.

The Mountain States Telephone Company some time ago announced its intention to raise rates in Socorro, Carrizozo, Clovis, Texico and Portales to bring them in line with other exchanges in the state. Phone rates are established by group ratings and these in turn are based on number of telephones in service.

The telephone company contended that the above communities should be placed in higher group ratings because of the number of phones in service. Carrizozo, with 467 phones as of January 1953, moved into Group II and Socorro into Group III.

While the order had not been written early this week, it is understood that the effective date for the 25 cent per month rate increase for all classes of residence telephone service in Carrizozo will go into effect beginning with the next bill. All bills in Carrizozo are issued as of the 28th of the month.

Four citizens attended the hearing in Carrizozo. J. H. Fulmer and Mrs. J. P. Turner said they felt the telephone company was justified in placing Carrizozo in a higher rate classification, due to the improved service and efficiency of the telephone staff.

FEW PROTESTS There was complete lack of public interest in the Socorro hearing and elsewhere only two protests were made against the rate increases. The hearings were billed as major attractions because of their political implications.

In his opening statement, Chairman Lamb said the hearings had been called to give the phone subscribers a chance to express their views and that the commission would determine the reasonableness and lawfulness of the rate increase.

Harry L. Bigbee, Santa Fe attorney, presented the telephone company's arguments. The current level of the company's earnings he said is 5.38%, against a level on the high side of 5.01% in the three preceding years.

"Since 1956," he said, "the company has spent \$5,000,000 in New Mexico, or \$4 for every dollar earned, after taxes. We must keep our earnings up in order to attract investors." He said \$13,000,000 was budgeted for expenditure in New Mexico this year.

Mr. Bigbee said he felt the phone company had been dealt with "harshly" in the past by the corporation commission, adding that "the company is proud that it has been able to do what it has on the going level of earnings."

Chairman Lamb asked Mr. Bigbee if the phone company could not effect further economies in operation and maintain a fair earning rate without increase of rates. The attorney replied that the company had improved its operating efficiency but that increased wages and costs of materials made it necessary for the phone company to raise its rates in communities presently below scheduled rates.

Telephone company officials attending the hearing were Earl Loutham, vice president and general manager, of Albuquerque; E. J. Graham, state commercial manager, of Albuquerque; M. D. Smith, general rate engineer of Denver; Lloyd B. Dodds, public relations manager of Albuquerque; Russell Edging, Carrizozo manager, and Mr. Bigbee.

The State Corporation Commission was represented by Messrs. Lamb, Pickett and Block; Albert Whittaker and Joseph Burr, assistant attorney generals, and Charles C. Boatwright, director of rates.

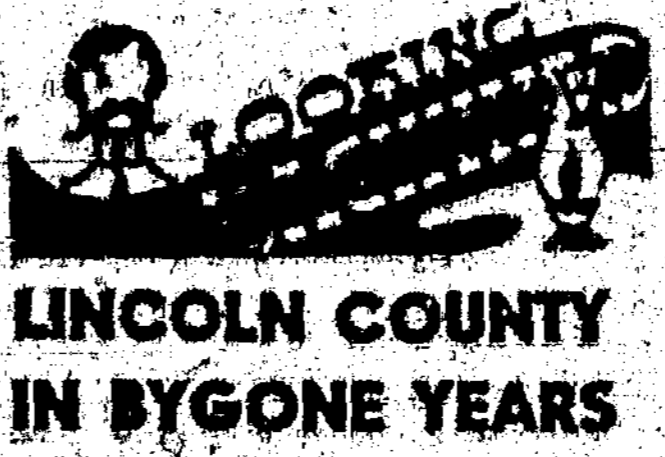

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"CULTURE; DEVELOPMENT through education and training." Just a few decades ago, the word culture evoked in the popular mind only an image of Mrs. Upstage, peering disdainfully through her lorgnette. Loan Rates Announced For Oats, Barley, Rye And Grain Sorghums

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced that price supports for 1953-crop oats, barley, rye and grain sorghums will be at levels reflecting 70% of February parity prices as announced January 31, 1953. Supports for the 1957 crops of these four grains were also at 70% of parity. The national average dollars-and-cents supports for 1958 are:

Oats—61 cents per bushel for Grade No. 3.
Barley—93 cents per bushel for Grade No. 2 or better (except mixed barley).
Rye—\$1.10 per bushel for Grade No. 2 or better, or No. 3 on test weight only.

Grain Sorghums—\$1.53 per hundredweight for Grade No. 2 or better (except mixed).

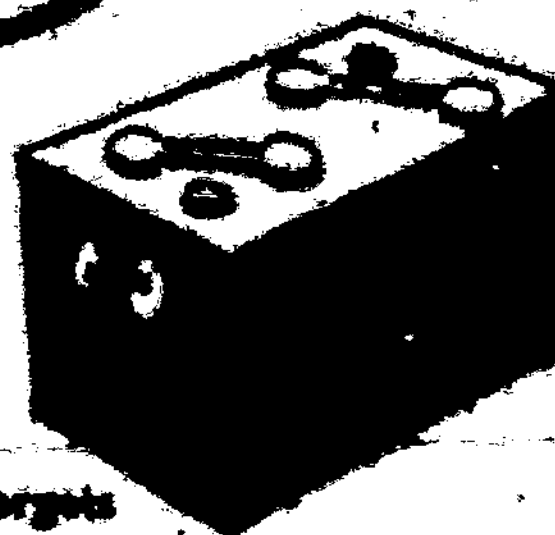

Guess those congressmen are more important than you say, realize.

REPUBLICANS GIVE UP EASY

Republicans looked like they were taking a dive without being clipped in all that trouble they had in getting up a state ticket.

The high collapse of the party came while Republicans held the governor's office, elective courthouse jobs in 18 of the 32 counties, 51 of the 98 seats in the legislature and a flock of federal jobs from the Republican Administration.

The give-up attitude developed 18 months after New Mexico voters gave the Republican president a tremendous 40,000 margin and the Republican candidate for governor a lead of 11,200.

The despondency was all the stranger in consideration of the Republican trend in Albuquerque which accounts for a fourth of the state. All 10 of the city's legislators are Republican and the courthouse is full of them.

BLAME GOVERNOR FOR PARTY DROP

Gov. Ed Mechem is at the bottom of much of the trouble. Republicans from all over accuse him of non-cooperation and a lack of interest in the party.

He didn't help the situation by stubbornly refusing to say if even he would take a place on the ticket at the time others were trying to recruit candidates for the ballot.

Mechem's recognition of some Democratic elements in jobs and other patronage and his refusal to go along with some Republican leaders has perhaps strengthened him personally while breeding despondency in the party.

One prominent Republican who has retired to an onlooker role said that he and others were prepared to launch an intensive Republican reorganization effort after Mechem leaves office. They couldn't do it as long as he is in, he said.

Tucker Strained

Democratic State Chairman Ernie Tucker is having a rough battle for another term as mayor of Roswell. It's against Bert Ballard, the one he beat last time. Ballard is also a Demo.

Some of Tucker's pals have been charging that money from the \$40,000 Republican Lincoln day dinner is being used against him in the campaign.
