Carrizozo Board Discusses Power With REA Officials

The Carrizozo town board of trustees met with REA officials Wednesday to continue discussion of the town's purchase of wholesale power from the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc.

Officials of the electric cooperative which already serves a large part of Lincoln County, were J. D. Lasater, manager; A. J. Vickers, secretary, and Hollis Harris consulting engineer.

Mr. Lasater told the Carrizozo mayor and trustees that most details had been worked out with REA authorities in Washington and that a standard utility contract would be drawn up between the REA and the town of Carrizozo.

The trustees agreed to permit the REA to build a small power substation on town property at the light plant. This station would deliver power to Carrizozo from a larger substation to be built near the city limits.

Power would be delivered here over a new transmission line from Capitan; also could come in over a line from Oscura.

It was brought out that the immediate benefit to Carrizozo from a contract with the REA would be an adequate source of power, without further investment. Its own plant would be kept on a standby basis.

Should the contract be approved by May 1, August was set as a likely date for delivery of REA power.

The REA officials suggested there be no immediate lowering of power rates to consumers, but rather a trial period of up to 12 months to establish a level of net operating income.

The first announced project of the new club is to buy hats for the band.

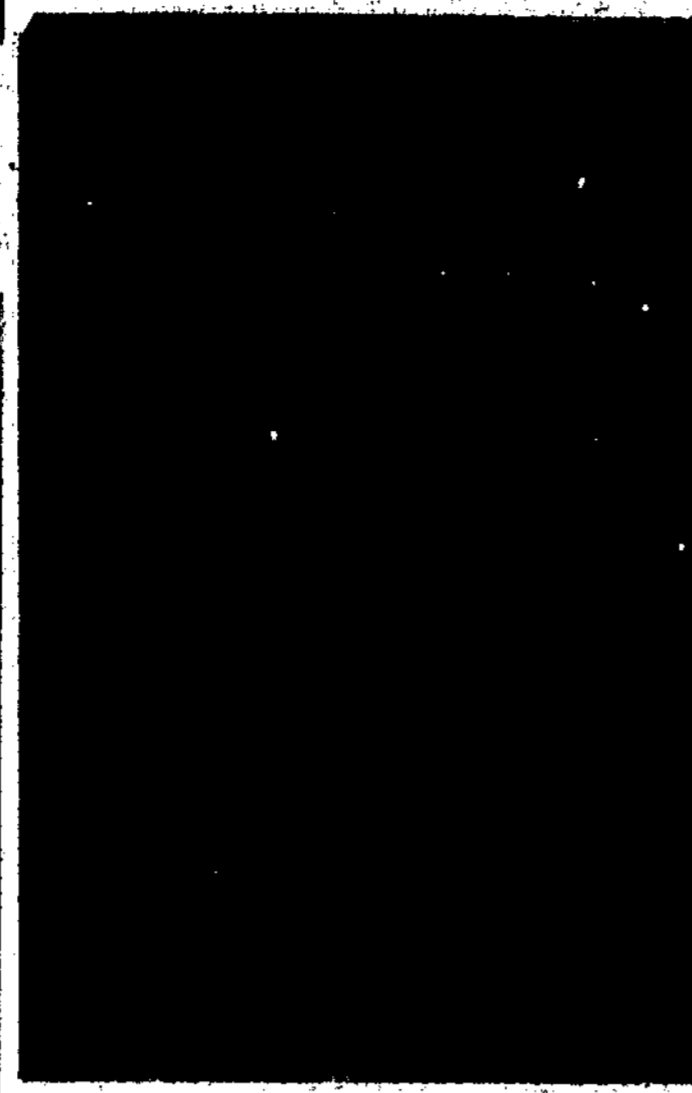
Approximately thirty parents attended Monday night's meeting. Jess Lara, band director, outlined plans for the band, which include marching at next fall's football games.

Fort Stanton Mar. 24 (Special) — The New Mexico Department of Public Health Certificate of Grade A for safe and sanitary food service has been presented to the Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital by Roland Perkins, Lincoln County Sanitarian.

The award presentation by Mr. Perkins to Mrs. Emma E. Howard, dietician of Fort Stanton, followed an unannounced tour of inspection by Mr. Perkins through the entire food preparation and serving facility of the hospital.

In presenting the certificate, Mr. Perkins said that the Fort Stanton bakery and butcher shop were the cleanest he had seen in the entire state.

He also tested the hospital drinking water and pronounced it up to official standards.

Municipal Elections In County Tuesday

Withdrawal of W. L. Holmes from the race for councilman in Capitan, leaves three to be voted on for two four-year terms.

They are J. G. Otero, Joe Bert Cheney and Joseph P. Randle. Incumbent mayor D. O. Murphy is opposed by Joseph Rench. Carrizozo's mayor, Wayne C. Withers, is unopposed for re-election to his second term.

Candidates for councilman, four-year term, are incumbent A. T. Roberts, Austin Wooten and C. D. May.

John Mackey, incumbent, and Paulino Aldaz are opposing candidates for Carrizozo police magistrate.

Citizens of Ruidoso will vote on three ballots, one for town officials and two for sewer bonds.

Jack Hull is unopposed for mayor, as are Tom W. Jones Jr. and Bernard O. Rooney for councilmen, four-year terms and Wm. G. McCarty for councilman two-year term.

Harold M. Graham is unopposed for police judge.

Jack Shriver is unopposed for mayor at Green Tree. Also unopposed are candidates for council positions: Rev. O. L. Oldham and B. O. Harris, four-year terms and J. P. Bailey, two-year term.

In Corona, Mayor G. Cleve Brown is unopposed for re-election, as well as the two incumbent councilmen, Alex Jenkins, town marshal, has filed for re-election.

Year's Moisture at Corona 4.83 Inches

Carl Holmgren, Corona depot agent, reports that checking at the railroad station on the weather shows that in 18 days precipitation recorded there has been 2.76 inches of moisture (29 inches of snow).

With the rain in January and February totaling 2.07 inches the total for the year 1958 at Corona is 4.83 inches moisture, up to March 23.

The youth of each church are sharing in the program, along with the pastors.

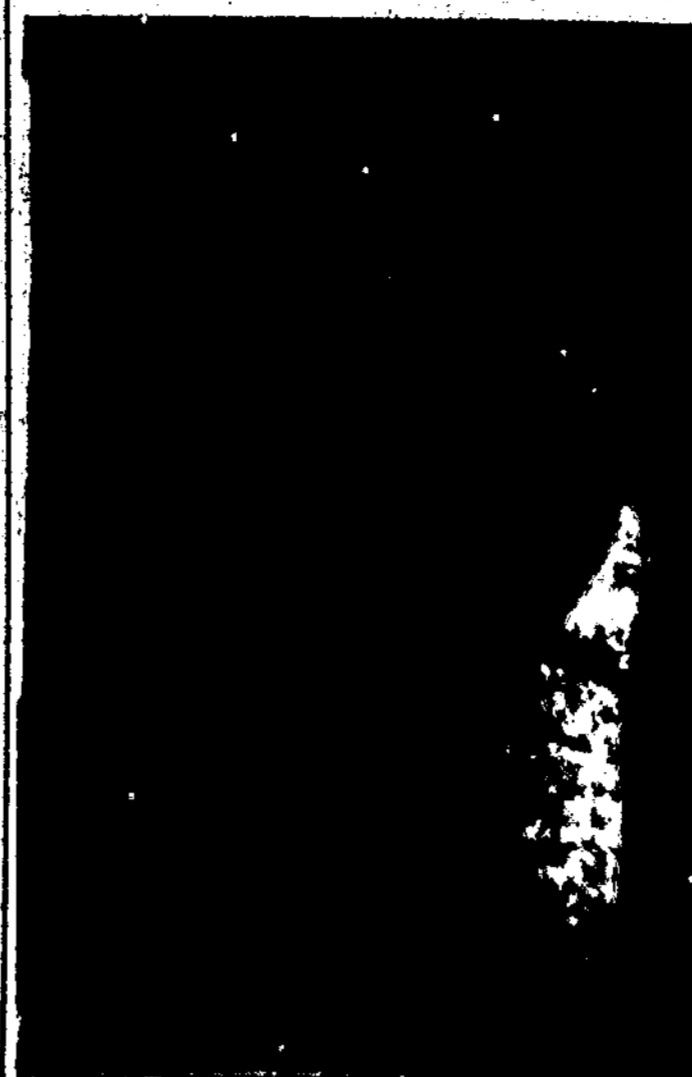
ROAD CREW TO RETURN LATER IN SPRING

Further Discussion In Capitan on Smokey Museum

Citizens of Capitan met on Thursday of last week with Wm. W. Huber, director of the cooperative forest fire prevention program.

Mr. Huber had flown from Los Angeles to Alamogordo and drove to Capitan with Everett Doman for a few hours before returning to Washington via Albuquerque.

In his talk he explained the forest fire prevention program being carried out by Foote, Cone & Belding, Inc., an advertising agency of Los Angeles, for the Advertising Council, Inc., which has been in operation 17 years.

A national campaign is now under way to build a home for Smokey the Bear in the Washington Zoo. The expense is to be met by donations and from royalties from Smokey products sold commercially.

Because of the possible confusion of Smokey having two "homes," — one in Washington and one in Capitan—Mr. Huber suggested that Capitan be known as the "birthplace" or "original home" of Smokey.

He enthusiastically agreed with all plans Capitan has made to interest the public in visiting Smokey's birthplace.

He asked that a letter be written outlining the plans and sent to the Washington office of the U. S. Forest Service for official approval.

ADVERTISING REGULATED

Since 1952, Mr. Huber pointed out, a Congressional law regulates the use of Smokey Bear for advertising purposes. All reproductions of Smokey must also be drawn according to Forest Service standards, but Capitan was assured that their plans would meet approval.

Mr. Huber said that the Forest Service would build three-dimensional photographic exhibits of Smokey's story for the proposed museum and he suggested that two crotch light signs sent to the state, might be available for use in Capitan.

He left two toy Smokey teddy bears, suggesting they be given as prizes in a contest to help advertise Capitan.

Leo Robinson, secretary of the State Park and Forest Department, believes the group might obtain help in securing signs from the state departments, and described the procedure of applying for such help through the Tourist Bureau, Museum and the Highway Department.

When Bill Holmes offered a tract of land for a public park, Mr. Robinson asked the group to notify the State Highway Department and learn what assistance might be available.

HOW SMOKEY "FLEW" EAST

Mrs. Ruth Jones and S. Dilea of Albuquerque furnished the group with much information on details of putting the Smokey advertising to work for Capitan.

Ray Bell, State forester, and former Game Department official, showed his picture and scrapbook of Smokey's life in his home in Santa Fe and added a bit of little known information about Smokey's flight to Washington the summer of '50.

None of the commercial airlines cared to transport a bear as a first class passenger. Mr. Frank Hines of Hobbs offered his personal Piper Cub plane and flew Smokey to Washington at his own expense.

Mrs. Mary Turney, State president of Women's Clubs, attended the meeting, telling how, through the efforts of the Capitan Woman's Club and the State Federation, a Smokey postal stamp is to be issued next October.

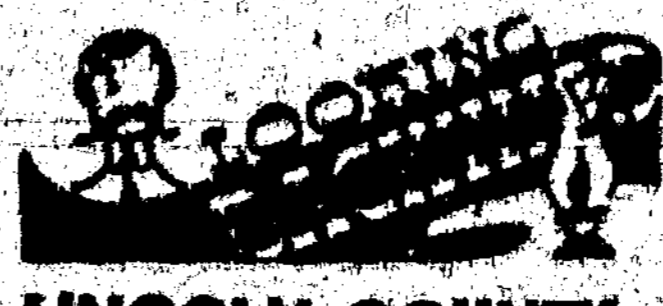

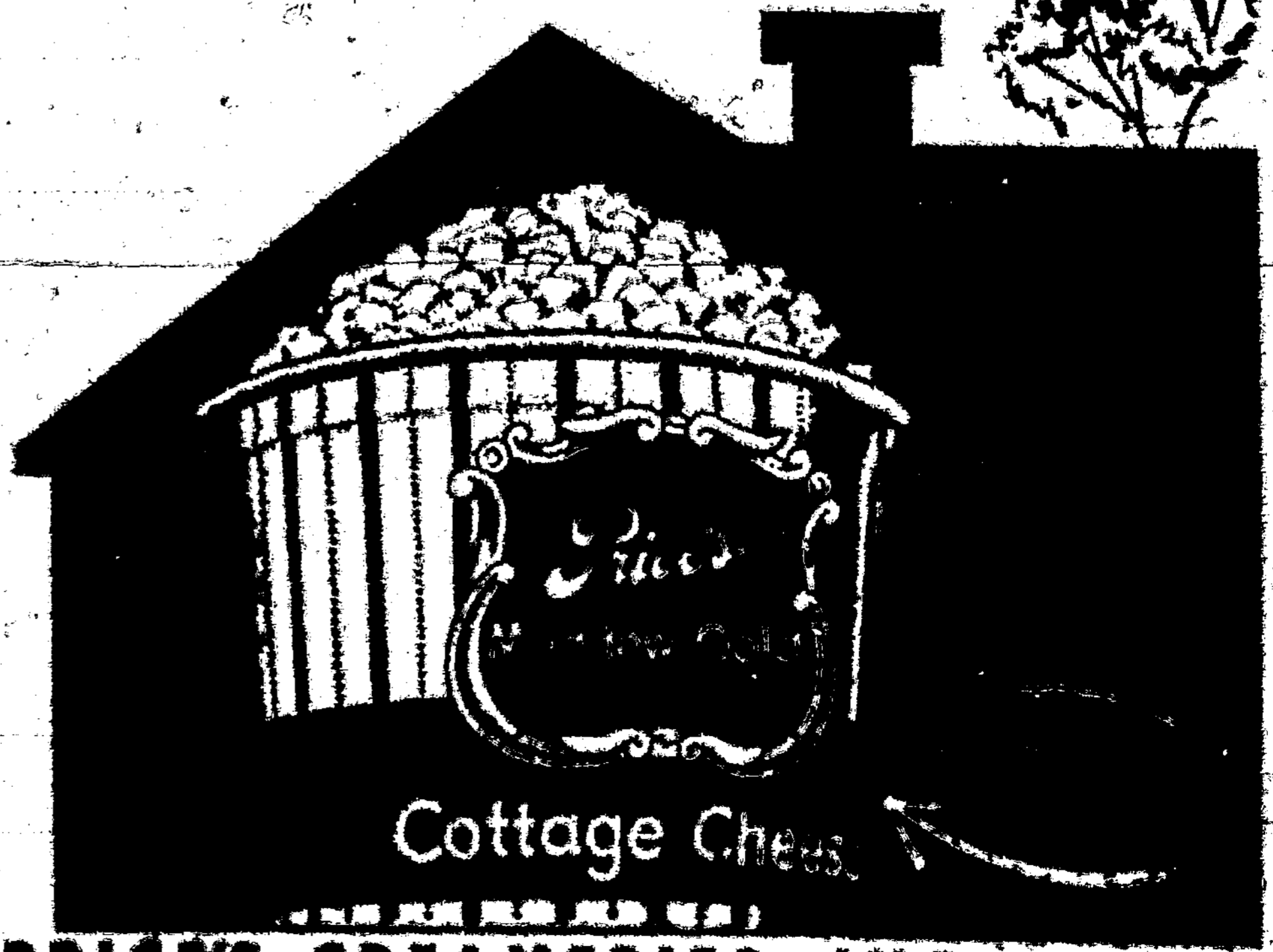

KEEP TREE SEEDLINGS MOIST BEFORE PLANTING

Tree seedlings must be kept moist from the time they leave the nursery until they are planted, County Agent Ralph R. Dunlap reminds those who have ordered trees to be delivered in time for spring planting this year.

A good root system is essential to successful planting and, unless care is taken, roots dry out very rapidly and are injured.

Mr. Dunlap advises those new foresters to water seedlings immediately when they arrive from the nursery and to plant them as soon as possible. Stored in a cool place and kept moist, they will remain in good condition for several days.

The county agent will give advice about the best method for planting trees and may also advise where tree planting machinery can be rented.
