The pageant opens Friday evening, August 1, at 8 o'clock at the pageant grounds in Lincoln. Succeeding performances are at the same hour Saturday, August 2 and Sunday, Aug. 3. Sunday will also be "A Day in Old Lincoln," with introduction of old timers, parade at 2 p.m., old time dancing and other entertainment until 5 p.m.

Teenagers can dance to their favorite records, and adults will have a turn at western style dancing. A nominal charge of 25 cents for three dances will be made.

The noontime meal will be served from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., and the evening meal from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. Price of the ham dinner will be \$1.00. The Association will also serve coffee and soft drinks throughout the afternoon and evening.

Gov. Mechem to Dedicate Portrait

A portrait of Governor George Curry, recently acquired by the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, will be unveiled by Governor Edwin Mechem at a public ceremony at the Old Lincoln County Courthouse on Sunday, August 3rd, at 1:00 p.m. The portrait was painted in 1947 by the New Mexico artist, Sam Smith, just a few months before Curry's death. It was the Governor's wish that the portrait should some day hang in the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, because of his close association with it.

George Curry came to Lincoln County in October, 1879, from Dodge City, Kansas, a penniless boy of 19, just a few months after the more tragic events of the Lincoln County War. Billy the Kid was at large, and Governor Lew Wallace was seeking his surrender in an effort to quell the lawlessness that terrorized Lincoln County. Curry found a job as time-keeper on the vast Block Ranch on the north side of the Capitan Mountains. Later he became a clerk at the post trader's store at nearby Ft. Stanton; a job he left after a year when a case of "itching feet" took him to Raton where he became involved in the Maxwell Land Grant troubles.

After two years in Colfax County, where he had his first lesson in the rough game of New Mexico Territorial politics, Curry returned to his original job at Ft. Stanton and to a career of twenty years in Lincoln County politics in course of which he served consecutively as county clerk, assessor and sheriff, moving on to two terms in the Territorial Senate from the "absorbing" district of which Lincoln County was a part.

During his legislative service Curry was instrumental in securing passage of the act creating the New Mexico Military Institute at Roswell and establishing a record for constructive legislation that brought him into leadership in Territorial politics. When the Spanish-American War broke out, Curry was appointed Captain of New Mexico's troop K of Roosevelt's Rough Riders. His service in the brief Cuban campaign brought him into close contact with Theodore Roosevelt and led to a friendship which proved valuable to Curry, and through him, to New Mexico.

Following disbanding of the Rough Rider regiment, Curry was appointed sheriff of the new county of Otero, resigning that post to volunteer for service in the Philippine Islands where he spent eight years, advancing from second lieutenant in the New Mexico Voluntary Infantry to the governorship of three provinces. From the last of these administrative jobs, the governorship of Samar, President Roosevelt brought Curry home to become Governor of New Mexico, following Roosevelt's summary removal of Herbert J. Hagerman in 1907.

During his service in the Philippines, Curry won the confidence and friendship of William Howard Taft while Taft was governor-general of the Islands. Thus, as Governor of New Mexico, Curry was able to enlist the active support of both Roosevelt and Taft for admission of New Mexico to statehood.

Curry was elected to the House of Representatives in the first State election, and thereafter for more than thirty years was an active figure in New Mexico public life. In his declining years Curry was appointed State Historian by Governor John J. Dempsey, the position having been created for Curry in recognition of his lifetime of public service. Two years later he was made custodian of the Old Lincoln County Courthouse by Governor Mabry and began the work of collecting historical data which formed the nucleus for the establishment of a museum at the Old Courthouse.

George Curry's Memoirs will be published by the University of New Mexico Press in the late fall or early winter just ahead. The portrait by Sam Smith will appear as the frontispiece of the book which will be titled "George Curry, 1861-1947, an Autobiography".

Mr. Smith, now an associate professor of art at the University of New Mexico, is a well-known New Mexico artist. His work has appeared in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City; the Corcoran Gallery, Washington, D. C., and in numerous exhibits in New Mexico.

Joe Skeen Heads Farm Bureau Locals

Joe Skeen of Pecos was elected new chairman of the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau at the annual meeting in Lincoln Saturday, July 26.

Other officers elected were Clint Sultemeier, vice-chairman; Mrs. Joe Skeen, chairwoman; Mrs. Walton Wilson, secretary-treasurer; Board members: Edd Dowling and E. G. Bird, Jr. Holdover members of the board are Ernest Sultemeier, Sid Goodloe and Fred Pfingsten.

Registration began at 10 and free coffee and doughnuts were served by women of the Hondo local.

Charles Jones called the meeting to order and introduced the Rev. Charles Dawson of Fort Stanton who gave the invocation.

John Thomas, chairman of the Hondo local, gave a word of welcome with the response being given by Clint Sultemeier.

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Porter were introduced by the chairman. Mr. Porter replaces Wayne Powers in the State FALSB as regional organizational director.

He urged members to attend the commodity meetings in Albuquerque July 28, 29 and 30.

County candidates who were present were introduced by the chairman.

Ralph Dunlap urged stockmen to assist in getting ten percent of the cattle in Lincoln County tested for tuberculosis in order to remain a certified county.

Following a delicious barbecued lamb dinner served by ladies of the San Juan church, the reports of the secretary-treasurer were given, followed by talks by Betty Shreengost informing members of various insurance policies available to members of Farm Bureau, Bill Shreengost, labor manager, stated that contracts for Mexican Nationals had been extended from six weeks to a three month period.

The meeting adopted the following resolutions which will be taken to the state convention which will convene in Roswell November 19, 20 and 21.

Be it resolved the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau go on record as opposing State Department policies which permit unfair competition between foreign and domestic products.

Be it resolved the Lincoln County FALSB go on record as being in favor of a right to work bill.

Be it resolved we reaffirm our stand with past Farm Bureau policy in reference to game. Ref. No. 66 & 61 in 1957 policies and recommendations.

Be it resolved the Lincoln County FALSB favors a fair and continuous percentage of state and federal funds be allotted for agricultural research, study and development projects.

Be it resolved the Lincoln County FALSB wishes a study to be made regarding the re-zoning of the New Mexico school districts and equalization of school funds derived from direct charges.

The Lincoln County FALSB also desires a report be made from the New Mexico AEM name change committee of the N. M. FALSB.

Door prizes were won by George Stinson, Mrs. A. F. Smith, for whom Mrs. E. B. Page.

Work Starts on REA Substation

Work started this week on the Carrizozo substation which when completed will link the town with REA electric power.

Jay D. Lasater, manager of the Otero County Electric Cooperative, informed the News this week that it is planned to have the substation in readiness to install the transformers when they arrive. Delivery has been promised the second week in August.

The three-phase line has been completed from Oscura and a second source of power will come into Carrizozo from Capitan over a new line to be constructed.

Mr. Lasater states that plans and profiles for the Capitan-Carrizozo power line are being drawn by Morris, Williams and Patterson, consulting engineers, of Amarillo, Texas.

When this work is completed in about 45 days a contract will be let to build the power line, which will cost in the neighborhood of \$125,000.

The actual construction time of the line will take an estimated 60 to 90 days.

GOP Candidate for Congress Tours State

William A. Thompson, Republican candidate for U. S. Representative, was a visitor in Carrizozo Wednesday. He was accompanied by his wife, two children, Peggy and Tommy, and their horse Candy.

Candy is an educated horse, being able to tell his age (14 years), do simple arithmetic problems, shake hands, etc. Candy created quite a bit of interest in front of the NEWS office.

Town Filtration Plant Goes Into Service

Carrizozo's new filtration plant was to be in operation this Thursday afternoon. Contractor A. A. Brooks informed the News this week.

Ten thousand gallons of water were recirculated through the plant in a test Wednesday.

Water service in Carrizozo was interrupted a short time Monday when a T was placed in the town line to tie in with the filtration plant.

Mr. Brooks states that connections are now made with both well and Bonito water.

New Hondo Church Elects Officers

Following the initial worship service July 13 of the Hondo Community Church, officers were elected at an organizational meeting.

John Hamilton was elected chairman of the board of trustees with members B. G. Robinson and Mr. Henry. The latter will also serve as secretary-treasurer. Al Grenrod was elected Sunday School superintendent and Mrs. Grenrod Sunday School secretary.

Seventeen persons signed the Charter for the Church (see page 2). On July 27 Sunday School classes were organized.

Rev. Paul S. Van Dyke, pastor of the Bulldogs Methodist Church, will bring the message to the Hondo Church the first and third Sundays. Rev. C. Edward Ditterline, pastor of the Bulldogs Methodist Church, will preach the second and fourth Sundays. Sunday School will begin at 2 Sunday afternoons, with worship service beginning at 3.

Parents Should Check On School Children Immunization Records

Parents of children who are old enough to start to school for the first time this fall, should get out their immunization records and check to see if they have had everything that is required. It is a state law that your child be protected from diphtheria and smallpox before starting to school.

The State has not passed a law requiring that a child must have polio immunization, but we strongly urge that your child have at least 2 doses of the vaccine before school. Of course it is much safer if he has had all three doses.

If you do not have a record, you should see your family physician or Health Department and secure one before the first day of school. You will be asked to produce a birth certificate and immunization record when your child is enrolled. Family physicians and Health Departments are advising that all babies be given the combined immunization which includes protection against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus, followed by boosters as your doctor recommends.

If your 6 year old child has not had a booster sometime within the year of 1957, then he should have one before school starts. We do not have a reported polio case in this area and about one-half of our child population has been immunized, so we feel safe in urging you to give your child his smallpox vaccination at least one month before school opens.

Your family physician stands ready to help you protect your child any day. The County Health Office will be open for clinic work August 4, 5, and 6. If your child has been immunized through the facilities of the Lincoln County Health Department, you may go to the office in the County Courthouse and receive a copy of the record any week day between now and school time.

Loot Recovered After Break-in

After loot had been recovered, hidden beneath the floor of a barracks at Red Canyon Camp, three GI's were taken into custody by local officers. Two were charged with breaking and entering the Ben Franklin store in Carrizozo and a third charged with being an accessory after the fact.

Sheriff S. M. Ortiz stated that footprints and fingerprints led to the arrest of the three. The rear window of the store was broken and various items of merchandise taken. Arrested were Allen Shaw, Kenneth Grubbs and Earl Crook.

Shaw and Grubbs entered pleas of guilty to breaking and entering in district court Wednesday and were sentenced by Judge W. T. Scoggin to not less than 1 year nor more than 3 years in the state penitentiary. The case against Earl Crook was set for August 5.

Other district court action. In case State of New Mexico vs. Salvador Morales Jr., charged with permitting himself to be sold alcoholic liquor while a minor, he entered a plea of guilty. Judge Scoggin sentenced him to 60 days in the county jail and followed this action by suspending the sentence.

State vs. Otto Prehm, charged with possession and sale of fireworks. Plea of guilty entered. Assessed \$200 costs in lieu of \$200 fine.

In juvenile court Norman Flow of Globe, Ariz., forfeited bond in amount of \$25 on a speeding charge. A bench warrant for his arrest was issued.

Two cases against juveniles, charged with fighting at Lincoln, were dismissed.

Judge Scoggin will convene district court August 5.

Sheriff S. M. Ortiz said Wednesday that two juveniles, Joseph Bergdorf and Byron Eldridge, charged with forgery, were to be picked up that day.

The City Garage was broken into at 8 p.m. Friday and two juvenile subjects, age 14 to 15, have been apprehended. A window on the west side of the garage was broken, officers say, also the glass was broken out of the office door. \$35 in dimes was stolen.

Homeer Blea is awaiting arraignment in district court on a charge of forging a check at San Patricio last Thursday, the sheriff's office states.

40 Years Ago

Fifteen couples gathered at the French home for a farewell party for Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Kimbrell who were to leave soon for Douglas, Ariz.

James Parker of Orogrande stated he was prepared to furnish up to 1200 tons of iron ore daily to the New Mexico Iron and Steel Corp.'s smelter.

Kelley & Son gave silver medals for Junior marksmanship to Johnnie Cole who scored 200; Howard Hall 204 and Daton Heron 197.

The Lincoln county examining board went into the country to interview several men under the "work or fight" campaign.

Henry Lutz and L. E. Schaeffer were seriously injured when their car overturned on the road 25 miles west of Roswell.

Mayor Campbell was on a month's vacation to St. Wayne, Wisconsin.

A. C. Ladd arrived from Albuquerque to become foreman at the News plant.

C. A. Snow left for New Orleans to enter the Naval service. Harry Comrey returned from an outing on the Ruidoso.

Organize New Hondo Church

On July 13, 1933 the first service of the newly proposed community church in Hondo was held with Dr. Paul S. Van Dyke, minister of the Ruidoso Presbyterian Church, leading the worship; and Rev. C. Edward Ditterline, minister of the Ruidoso Methodist Church, bringing the sermon.

Following the services, an organizational meeting was held with the church adopting their charter which reads as follows:

"Declaration of Purpose—Organization of the Community Church in Hondo, N. M.

"Whereas; Believing in the Lord Jesus Christ as God's only Son and as our divine Saviour;

"Accepting the Apostle's Creed as our basis of doctrinal belief;

"Accepting the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as our supreme rule of faith and conduct;

"Desiring to form a fellowship of believers for the purpose of the worship of God in the liberty of the Christian conscience, instruction in the Word of God, fellow as fellow Christians, and to serve our community as a church;

"We the undersigned do hereby form the Community Church of Hondo, N. M.

"We declare that this church is not to interfere or obstruct in any way our association and membership in any of the several denominations to which we belong but rather to strengthen those ties by giving us in our own community a better opportunity for a church life.

"In the name of God, Amen." Seventeen people signed the charter on this date.

Services will be held each Sunday with Sunday School beginning at 2 p. m., and the order of worship at 3. The public is invited and urged to come.

Aircraft employed at Kingsville include P-51 Mustangs, P-47 Thunderbolts, F4U Corsairs, and the Grumman S2F Tracker, a carrier type anti-submarine plane.

May Retain Business And Still Be Eligible For Old-Age Benefits

A person doesn't have to quit working completely or sell his business to become eligible for Old-Age Insurance benefits under the Social Security Act, according to J. Hassler Strickland, manager, Roswell, Social Security Administration.

The law requires that deductions be made from benefits of eligible persons if their earnings from work or a business are over \$1200 in a year. However, even though earnings are over \$1200, the worker or self-employed person would be eligible for one of more monthly payments if the earnings were not more than \$2080 per year.

Mr. Strickland explained further that it is also possible for a beneficiary to receive payments when earnings are over \$2,000; no checks are stopped for any months in which earnings are \$90 or less, or the beneficiary is 72 years of age or older, or the beneficiary did not work regularly at his own business.



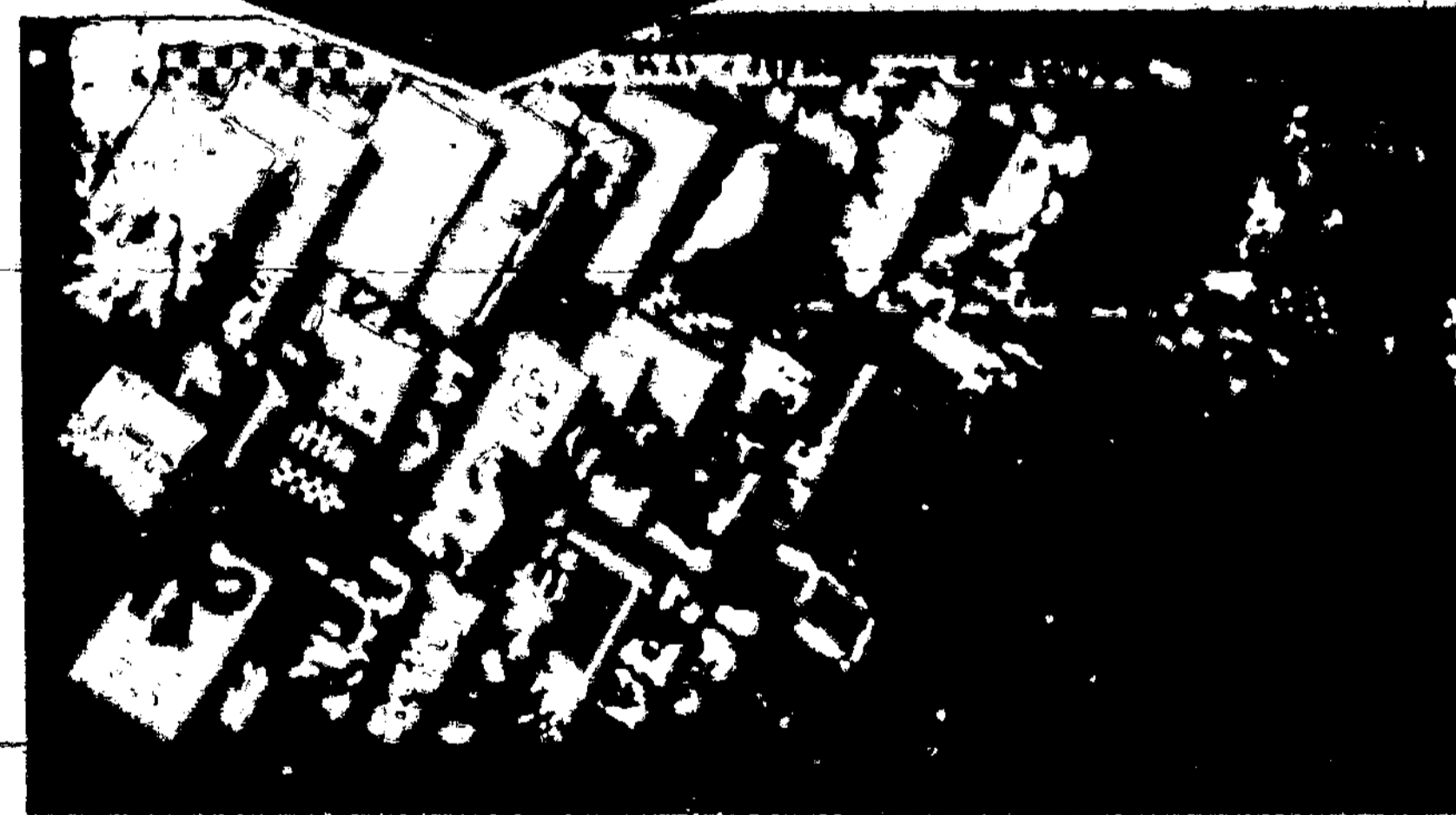

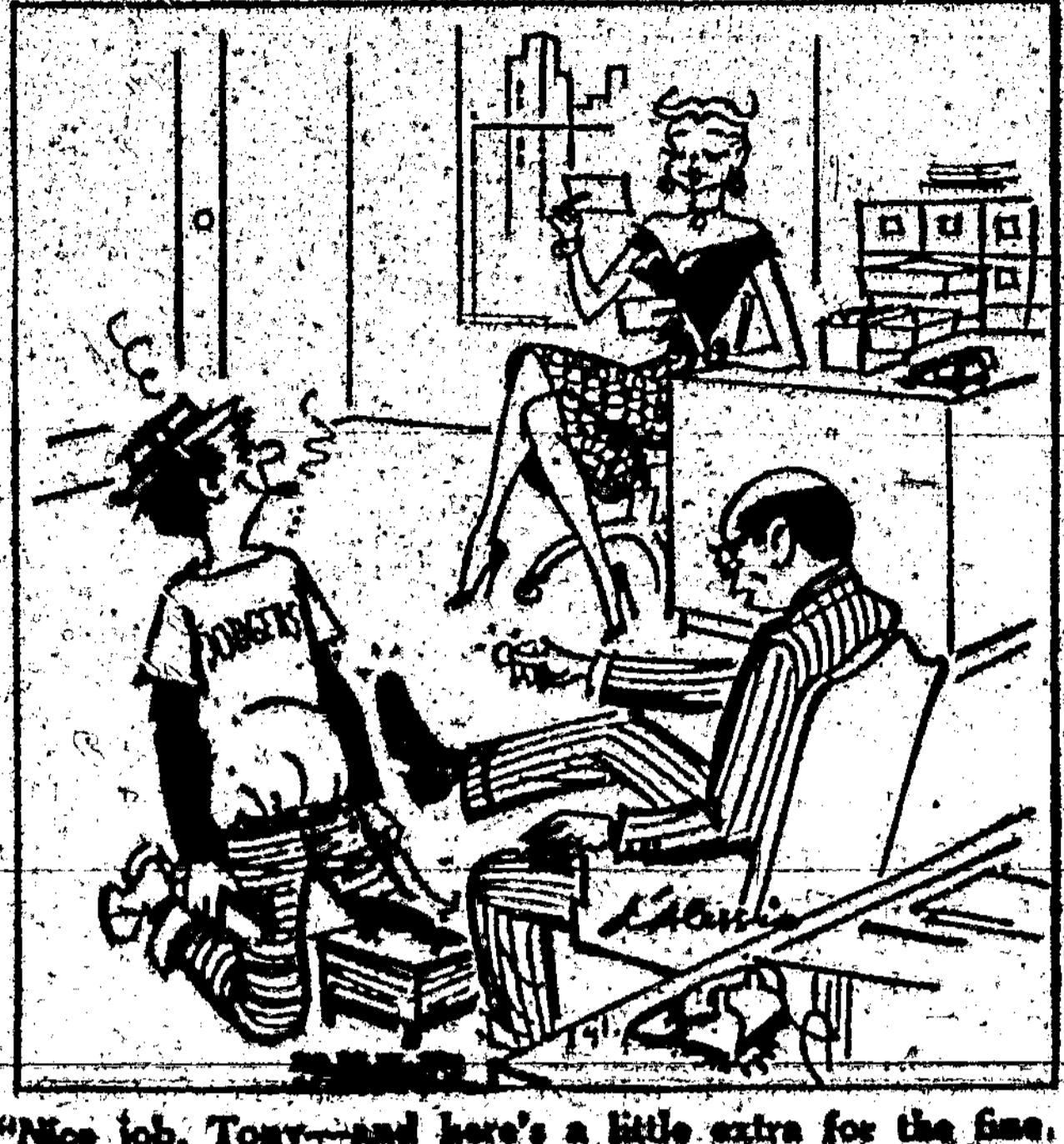
