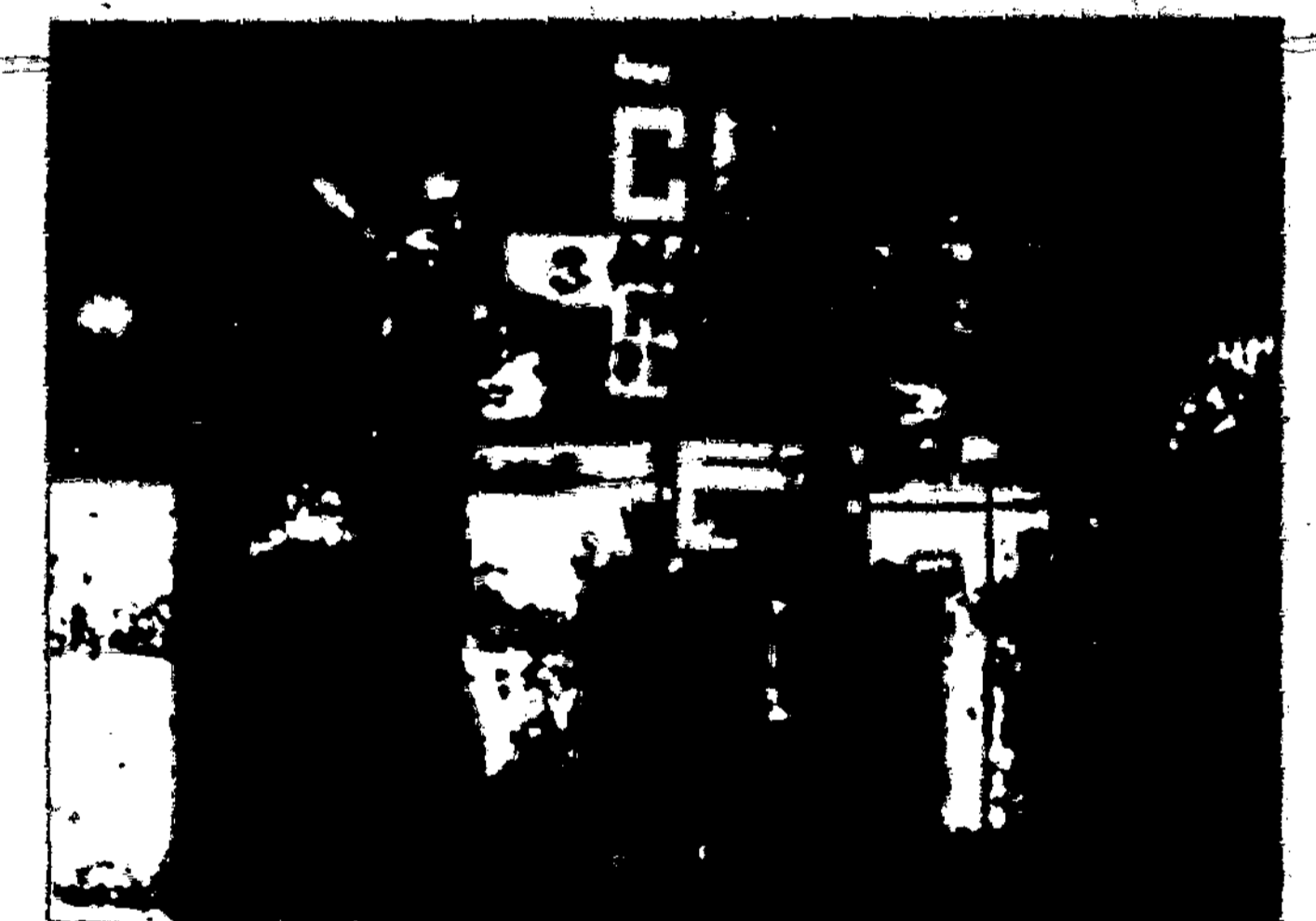

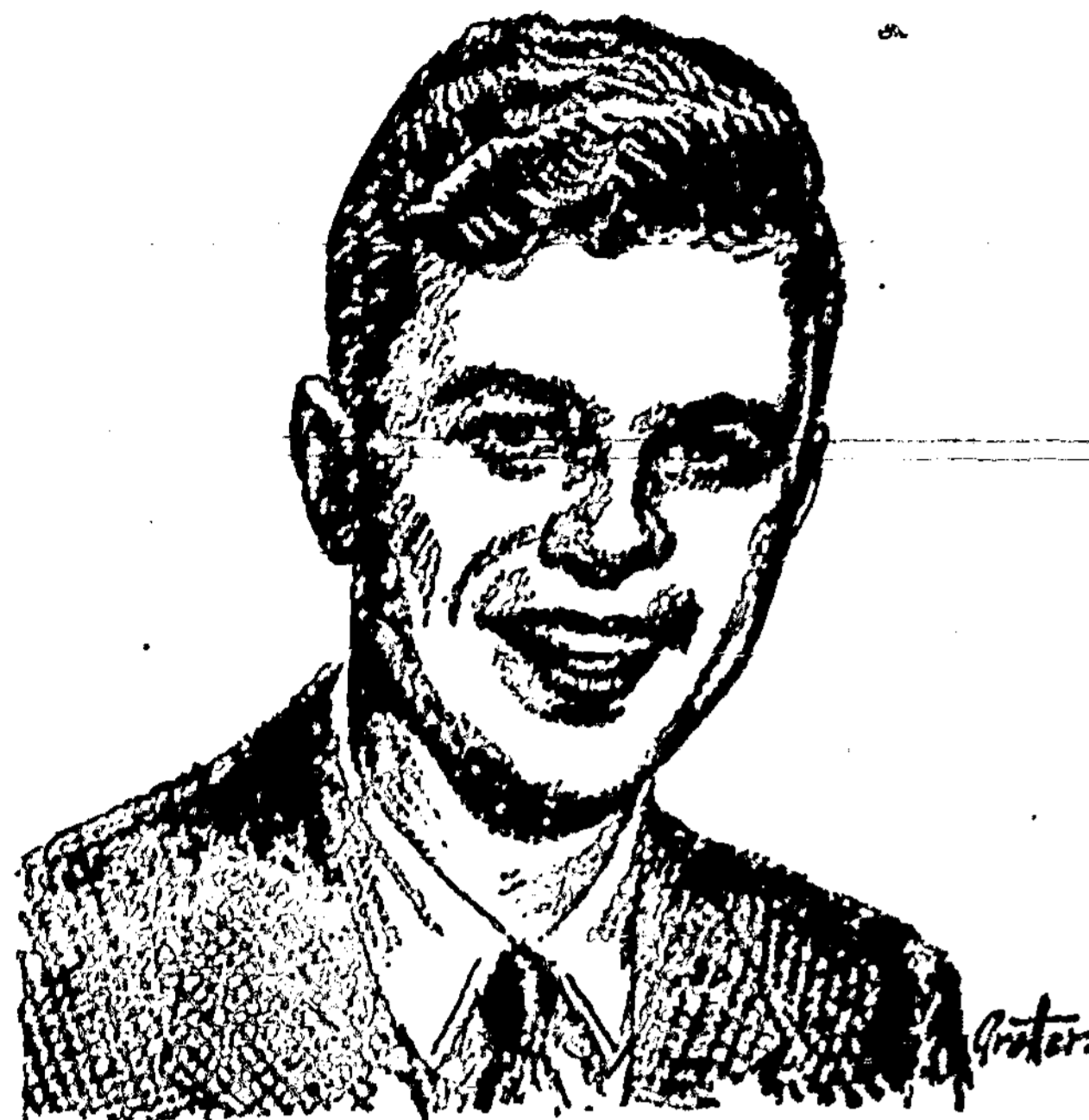

The county talent find contest will be held October 15 at the Carrizozo Woman's Club building at 7:30 p.m.

The winners will receive an expense paid trip to the state contest to be held at Roswell, during the annual State Farm Bureau convention Nov. 19-21.

The state contest will be held for two age groups—those up to 18 years of age and those from 18 to 28 years of age.

Included as suitable entertainment for the state and national talent find contest are: Vocals (solos, duets, quartets, etc.), instrumentals (solos, instrumental groups), folk dances, (original, native to state, etc.) novelties, (skits, impersonations).

The state winner from the 18 to 28 age group will be furnished an all-expense trip to the American Farm Bureau convention in Boston to represent New Mexico in the "Talent Find" contest of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Winning number will be limited to expenses for three people.

Qualifications for the state contest are:

Participants must make arrangements for their own accompanists, record players, or other equipment and will be asked to perform during and under the direction of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau at the convention.

2. One or a group of entertainers may participate in any given number. All information should be suitable for presentation on the convention program, and each act will be limited to five minutes and one number.

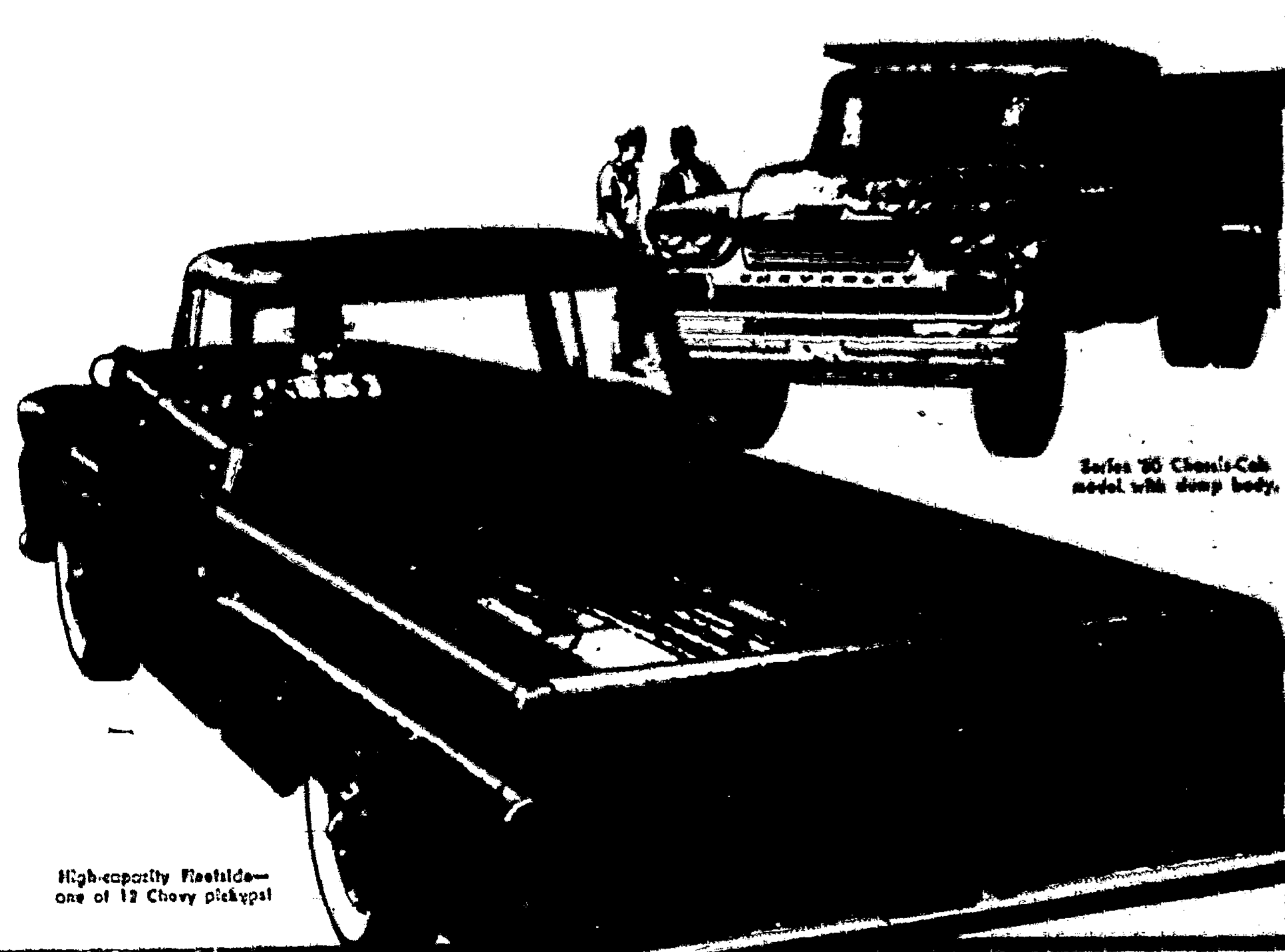

Less Harsh Legislation Improving Position of Nation's Railways

Legislation enacted in behalf of the transportation industry, by the National Congress this year should prove beneficial and arrest or even reverse some undesirable trends, Ernest Marsh, president Santa Fe Railway, told West Coast shippers in Los Angeles recently.

Addressing the Pacific Coast shippers advisory board in the Statler Hotel, Marsh conceded that such legislation will not produce an "overnight cure" of all the railroad industry's difficulties, but is a step in the right direction.

Marsh also cited Senate Resolution 303, designed to produce a study of several important phases of national transportation policy, as reflecting need for further consideration of competitive conditions under existing law.

A major achievement of the 85th Congress was repeal of the federal excise tax of 3% on freight transportation, Marsh said, benefiting the entire economy as well as all for-hire carriers. It is of special importance to Pacific Coast shippers, he pointed out.

Adverse legislation imposing further burdens on the railroads to the extent of harming or nullifying progress already made by beneficial legislation is also a major concern of the industry, Marsh said.

As an example, he referred to a proposed amendment to the railroad retirement and unemployment insurance acts, passed by the Senate but which failed in the House just prior to adjournment of Congress.

"By these amendments Congress would have more than nullified any help the railroads might hope to realize from the constructive measures adopted in the Transportation Act of 1958," Marsh said.

He pointed out that the proposed amendment would have resulted in a staggering increase in the railroads' payroll taxes, which are already far greater than taxes for similar purposes on other businesses.
