## C. of C. Takes Action On Range Camps

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce is continuing its efforts to keep Red Canyon and Oscura Range Camps as operating parts of the Fort Bliss missile program. Following his meeting recently with Carrizozo businessmen, U. S. Senator Chavez has written Marvin H. Roberts, president of the Carrizozo C. of C., as follows: "On October 15, I wrote to Major General Sam C. Russell, Fort Bliss, requesting that he make an appointment with some of the people of your area to discuss the situation of the military installations at Red Canyon and Oscura. "I have also taken further action in that I have turned this matter over to my advisor on military affairs of the Appropriations Committee, who will follow up with the proper Army officials, and he will do everything in his power to see that there is a retention of these military facilities in your area." Mr. Roberts informed the News this week that a meeting is being arranged with General Russell at Fort Bliss to discuss the status of the two camps in this area. Letters have also been forwarded from the Chamber of Commerce to all members of New Mexico's congressional delegation asking their assistance in keeping the two installations operating on their present basis. Attention was called to their importance to the economy of Carrizozo where about 135 military and civilian families now make their homes, adding: "You are, no doubt, in possession of details concerning costs of these military installations and the expense of relocating same would be costly to taxpayers."

The controversy over the Carrizozo postmasterhip flared into the open the past few days, with petitions and counter-petitions being circulated regarding the appointment of a postmaster.

## New Businesses In Lincoln County

New York, Oct. 20—(Special to the News)—The spirit of individual enterprise is still flourishing in Lincoln County, judging by the rate at which new businesses have been springing up. Local residents, with the urge to be on their own, have raised the county's non-farm business population to a new high. The story is told in a joint report, just issued by the Department of Commerce and by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, based on tax reports, submitted by employers under the Old Age and Survivors Insurance Program for 1936. Many of the new ventures do not survive the difficult first five years, but enough do to justify the risk entailed. Lincoln County, by virtue of this net growth, has a total of 145 business enterprises in which there are one or more employees, the report shows. It marks a big increase over the 118 recorded three years earlier, when the same Federal agencies made their previous study. The gain, amounting to 22.9%, was greater than that attained generally in the United States, an average of 6.4%. It topped, also, the State of New Mexico gain, 12.5%. Small business is well-established in Lincoln County, the figures show. There are 143 firms, or 99% of the total, with less than 20 employees. They form the backbone of the business community. Their concentration is greater than in most parts of the State of New Mexico, where small business constitutes 82% of the number of going enterprises. It also amounts to 92% in the Mountain States. Of the local establishments, 107 employ from one to three people each, 25 have from four to seven and 11 from eight to nineteen. The remainder are larger concerns. Lincoln County's business firms provide gainful employment for 531 people, the report indicates. Only those subject to social security coverage are included in that total. Others are now being brought in through recent expansion of the coverage. Nationally, it appears, we are still a nation of small business people. Three out of every four firms have fewer than four employees and only 2% employ 30 or more.

## Gardenhire Rites Held in Capitan

Services were held last Saturday afternoon at the Capitan Methodist Church for Jefferson Thompson Gardenhire, 81, who died in Carrizozo October 15. Rev. Charles J. Sparks and Rev. J. M. Kerr officiated. Interment followed in the Angus cemetery. The Shaw Mortuary was in charge of arrangements. Casket bearers were Hugh Marr, Fletcher Hall, Lewis Cummins, Giles Ramey, Jim Howard and Sam Cox. The honorary bearers were Bob Ferris, John Lacy, Hunt Hobbs, D. S. Williams, Charlie Dean, Frank Morris, Charles Pepper, Lee Beall and Perry Sears. Jefferson T. Gardenhire was born September 22, 1857, in Minnerton, Lawrence County, Ark., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thompson V. Gardenhire. Upon his maturity he was married to Dora Lovelace and in 1916 the family moved from Hardeman county, Texas, to Lincoln County where he bought a ranch south of Capitan. They moved into Capitan ten years later and lived here until 1942 when Mr. and Mrs. Gardenhire moved to California. Five years later they returned to Tularosa. Mr. Gardenhire lost his wife in May, 1946, while she was in Arizona for her health. For the last ten years he has lived in Tularosa; also at times with his daughter, Mrs. Frances Shaw, at Fort Stanton.

## Plans Completed For Dedication of Smokey Museum

Plans have been completed for the dedication of the Smokey Bear Museum in Capitan, set for November 1. The last of the logs for the building which were cut by J. G. and H. C. Otero, are being hauled into Capitan by Frankie Silva, Daldimar Caravajal and Candellario Trujillo. A part of the dedication activities will be a demonstration of the process of building a log cabin by Charlie Pepper. The dedication ceremony will be at the museum at 11 a.m. on November 1, with Bill Holmes, president of the Smokey Bear Club, dedicating the structure to the prevention of forest fires, conservation of our natural resources, and the perpetuation of the claim of Capitan as the birthplace of Smokey. Each local organization has been asked to set up a conservation or education exhibit in the high school. A dinner will be served by the Woman's Club in the school cafeteria, with the proceeds going to the museum. A program will be held in the school auditorium, sponsored by the Capitan Woman's Club, under the chairman, Mrs. Rose Flatley. A special feature of the program will be a chalk talk by Rudy Wendelin of Washington, D. C., Smokey artist. Mr. Wendelin designed the conservation stamp which will have a First Day issuance in Tucson, Arizona, on October 27, commemorating the 100th birthday anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt. The 4 cent stamp is the first to ever be printed in three colors. Representatives of many state and federal offices have been issued invitations to the dedication, and Capitan hopes to see all the residents of Lincoln County on hand. It will be an event of interest to the whole family.

## Jicarillas Believed To Mother Great Sulfide Copper Lode

Last Sunday Mr. and Mrs. Andrew McBrayer, with his sister, Mrs. Hitchcock (formerly of Nogal) and C. R. Heath, local mill superintendent, visited Walter Hubbard at his mining property in Jicarilla. Mr. McBrayer and his sister were raised in Jicarilla, but Mrs. Hitchcock had not been back to the area for over 25 years and it brought back old memories. Later in the day Jackie Silvers and Mr. and Mrs. L. Y. Jackson and children and Todgie Straley from Ancho joined the party. Previously a 12-round blast had been fired in the deepest part of the Sally Mine workings, permitting ore sampling. All went through the workings of the upper adit and Messrs. Heath and Hubbard descended to examine and take samples so that all would have specimens of the copper sulfide ore to take home. In Carrizozo this week, Mr. Hubbard said: "The evidence presented bears out past contentions and correlates other data and convictions that Jicarilla does have a great lode of sulfide copper with supplementary values of gold, silver and perhaps selenium." In connection with the development of his property, Mr. Hubbard said that three factors have militated against profitable mining in this area. He enumerated them as: 1. The extremely hard quartz-monzonite, together with the need for depth. 2. Need for upgrading, or flotation concentration of the ore values, as both shipping and smelter charges are based largely on weight. 3. A third factor, vital to state and local development is good roads—both primary and secondary roads are important. "New Mexico," he added, "is richly endowed with mineral and other natural resources, but has been rated as one of the poorest states in the Union. There are over two billion dollars worth of mineral and natural resources in Lincoln County alone."

Robert Keller was reported wounded in action in France. Political announcements included those of Wayne Van

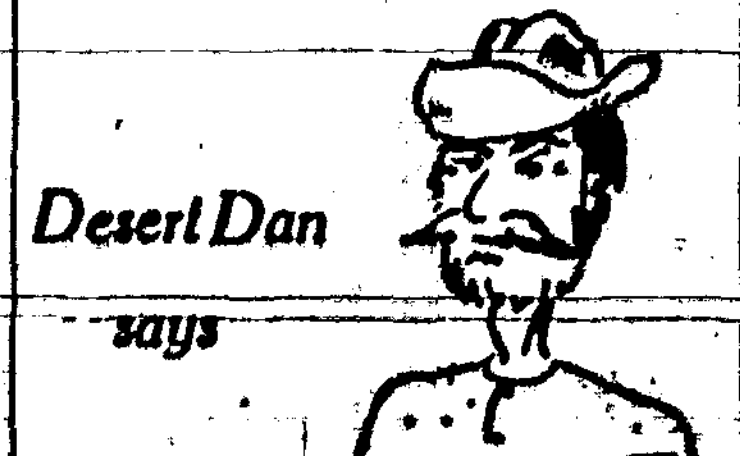
**Onesimo D. Maes in First Fleet Maneuvers**

San Diego, Calif. (FHTNC)—Onesimo D. Maes, quartermaster third class, USN, of Ruidoso Downs, on the staff of the Commander Cruiser Division One aboard the heavy cruiser USS Bremerton, took part in a First Fleet Striking Force exercise, nicknamed "Barnstorm," during Oct. 13-17 off the coast of Southern California.

"Blue" offensive forces were trained in launching carrier air attacks against a larger land mass. Opposing "Orange" defenders countered the attacks using submarines, aircraft and other modern weapons.

The exercise included training in the use of guided missiles—the surface to surface "Regulus I," surface to air Terriers and air to air "Sidewinders" and "Sparrows"—representing the operational missiles in the Navy today.

Operations such as "Barnstorm" serve to keep ships of the First Fleet in a high state of combat readiness preparatory to deployment of the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

## ALIBIS

A pastor in a Daytona Beach, Fla., church had a good idea. In a recent bulletin he ran a check list; across the top are the words, "I cannot attend church services because:" And then... "check please." Following are some reasons a person can check: "Too busy. Must go to the movies. Pleasure trip. Company. Have to go fishing. Disinterestedness. Radio and TV program. Need to rest." And then there is this instruction across the bottom: "Please tear off and mail to God."

In this business of offering trivial excuses for absences from important matters, there is nothing new under the sun. Jesus knew it. He told us all about it in a parable. He was discussing the Kingdom of God, and He compared it to a man who was giving a banquet. Now in the Orient, a feast is a joyous, festive occasion—not a mere supper, and not a stiff formal dinner. Jesus was always saying that religion was like that... that it was not dull, drab-formal affair that some people picture it to be.

The man who was giving the feast sent a servant out to give personal invitations, but everywhere the man went he got an excuse. The first excuse was, "Pray, I must be excused, because I have bought a piece of property and must go and look at it. I've got a new lot upon which I am going to build a house one day. I am not going to work on it or do anything like that, I am just going out and look at it; that's why I can't come." Property does have a strange fascination doesn't it? Whenever we buy even a fifty-foot lot, to say nothing of a farm, we go out and look at it. There is nothing there, we don't do anything; we just ride by and look at it, maybe once or twice or three times a week when it is new. It is a very popular Sunday pastime, isn't it? "I have bought me a piece of land and I must go and look at it."

The second excuse Jesus told about was, "I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I've got to prove them." The man was not going to work the oxen; he was just going to try them out, to "prove" them a little. We don't have oxen today, but we do have power lawn mowers and automobiles and cameras and TV sets and all sort of things that we don't work with; we just look them over just to see that they are all right. We know what he meant.

The third one came up with a good excuse. He said, "I have married me a wife. Therefore, obviously, I cannot come." I am married — it's the home situation!

I have heard that one, too, with all the variations that marriages make possible. "We haven't been married very long." "We have a baby." "We are building a new home." "My wife's folks were here for the week end..." There is nothing new under the sun, in excuses.

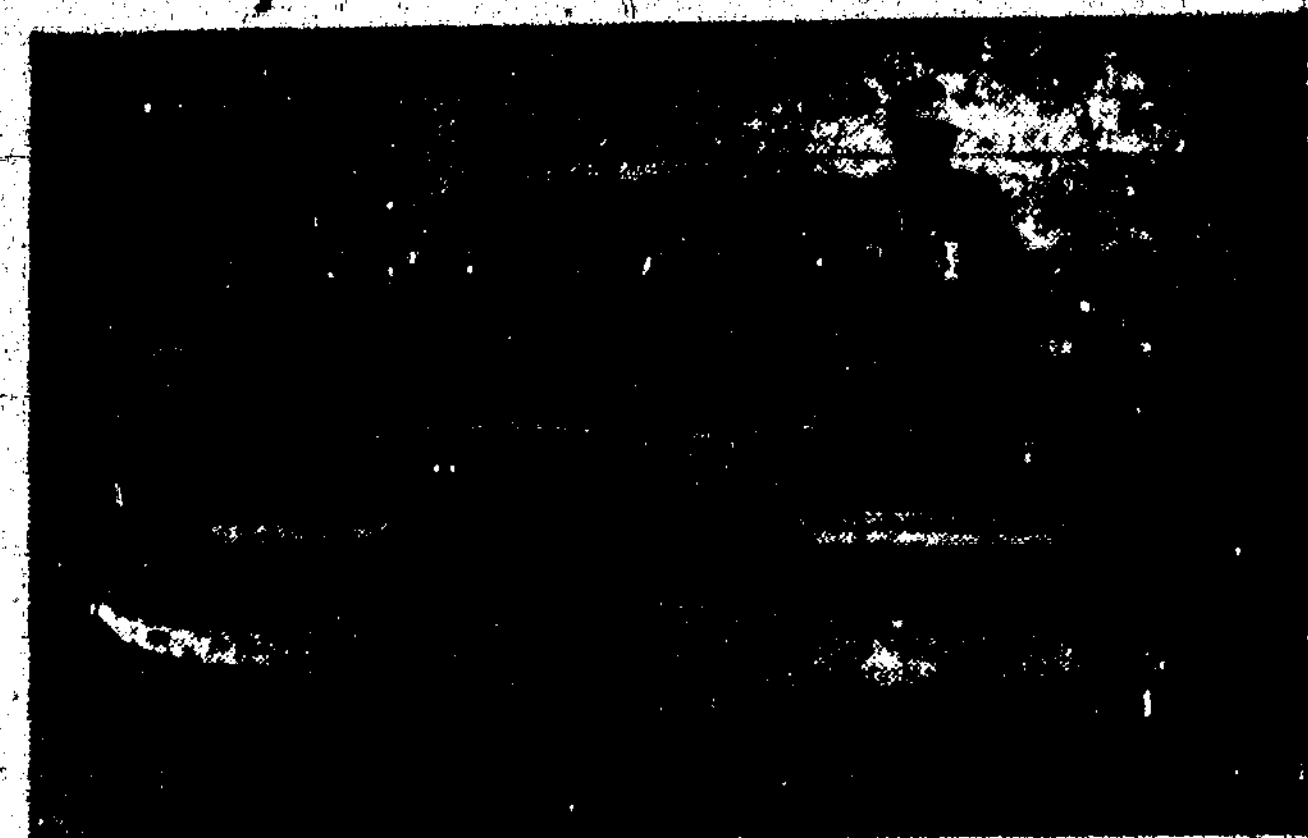
I know that there are some who feel that they have deeper, more serious reasons. But when they don't go to church, it is usually to say that they are giving up prayer, that they are shutting out of their lives all the love and mercy of God, and they are drifting away from Him. They may even feel that the excuses are serious enough to justify it!

Let's face the issue squarely—the real reason a person doesn't go to church or doesn't support the church is because he doesn't think there is a need for church. This is obvious because we always manage to find time for the things we feel are really necessary. We find a way to do whatever we feel is important. If we are conscious of a need in our life we search to the ends of the earth to find some satisfaction for that need; and when we don't believe a thing is important, any excuse is good enough.

There is an Oriental fable to the point. It is about a man who said to his neighbor, "I would like to borrow your rope." The neighbor answered, "I am sorry, but I am using my rope. I am tying up a heap of sand." And the man said to his neighbor, "you can't tie up sand with a rope." "Oh yes," said the neighbor, "you can do almost anything with a rope if you don't want to lend it." Nearly any excuse is good enough when we don't want to do it!

Next week I'd like to tell you just why I think we need the church. I'd like to tell you what the church can do for you and what it is doing today for you, your town, your country and for the world!

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 7, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW ABSENTEE VOTING.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 7, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Every citizen of the United States, who is over the age of twenty-one years, and has resided in New Mexico twelve months, in the county ninety days, and in the precinct in which he offers to vote thirty days, next preceding the election, except idiots, insane persons, persons convicted of a felonious or infamous crime unless restored to political rights, shall be qualified to vote at all elections for public officers. The legislature may enact laws providing for absentee voting by qualified electors. All school elections shall be held at different times from other elections.

The legislature shall have the power to require the registration of the qualified electors as a requisite for voting, and shall regulate the manner, time and places of voting. The legislature shall enact such laws as will secure the secrecy of the ballot, the purity of elections and guard against the abuse of elective franchise. Not more than two members of the board of registration and not more than two judges of election shall belong to the same political party at the time of their appointment.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION**

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO CREATE A STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC EDUCATION; AMENDING ARTICLE 12, SECTION 6 TO PROVIDE FOR AN ELECTED STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION WITH POWER TO APPOINT A SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, AND ARTICLE 5, SECTION 1 TO DELETE THE REFERENCE TO AN ELECTED SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. There is hereby created a "state department of public education" and a "state board of education." The state board of education shall determine public school policy and vocational educational policy and shall have control, management and direction of all public schools, pursuant to authority and powers provided by law. The board shall appoint a qualified, experienced educational administrator to be known as the superintendent of public instruction, who shall, subject to the policies established by the board, direct the operation of the state department of public education.

B. The members of the state board of education shall be elected at the general election next following the adoption of this amendment. One member shall be elected from each of the present ten judicial districts. The initial board shall determine by lot from its membership three members to serve terms of two years and three members to

serve terms of four years. The remaining of the initial board shall serve terms of six years. Thereafter, as the terms of the initial board members expire, their replacements shall be elected from the same districts for terms of six years.

If additional judicial districts are created the legislature may provide by law for the election by the people of a board of not less than seven members nor more than ten members from board of education districts, created by the legislature.

The governor shall fill vacancies in this board by appointment of a resident from the district in which the vacancy occurs. Appointments shall be made within sixty days after the vacancy occurs. The appointed member shall serve until the next general election, at which time a member shall be elected to complete the original unexpired term.

C. Board members shall be residents of the district they represent. Change of residence of a board member to a place outside the district from which he was elected shall automatically terminate the term of that member. The board members may be removed in the manner in which the legislature may provide by law.

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for the term of two years beginning on the first day of January next after their election.

Such officers shall, after having served two consecutive terms be ineligible to hold any state office for two years thereafter.

The officers of the executive department except the lieutenant governor, shall during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government."

Section 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO PERMITTING GREATER DIVERSITY IN THE PRUDENT INVESTMENT OF THE STATE PERMANENT FUNDS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing or other securities. All losses from such interest bearing notes or securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state.

In making investments, the state investment officer, under the supervision of the state investment council, shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which businessmen of ordinary prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income as well as the probable safety of their capital; provided, not more than twenty-five percent of the per-

manent school fund or other permanent fund, shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks and bonds not shall more than ten percent of the voting stock of a corporation be held; and provided further, stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to those stocks of businesses incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which are listed upon a national stock exchange."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

Provided that the obligations created by Special Session Laws 1955, Chapter 5 running to the state or any of its agencies, remaining unpaid on the effective date of this amendment are void."

**Book Review:**

**OUR WORLD AND MR. JONES**

That spring, 1951, was an uncertain season; the roaring cold winds which swept from the Oregon Mountains started as teeth-grinding sandstorms and ended in our training battery at Fort Bliss as thoughtfully gentle rain. Some days the skies were clear but then the blue was taut, clouds thin and ragged. It wasn't winter, wasn't summer; just in between.

A few weeks remained in our training cycle and as overseas assignment drew closer, the tension of distracted youth asserted itself. The occasionally cheery faces in our barracks went grim; men shouted in their sleep.

others went AWOL to Juárez and returned during in the small hours; repeating familiar phrases: the food was horrible, the officers pathetic, the sandstorms maddening — in these circumstances we welcomed anything, even a book, that would reinforce our conviction that the Army was a masterplan devised by geniuses and carried out by a lot of hopeless idiots.

And while browsing one Saturday afternoon in an El Paso bookshop, such a story turned up. It was a large novel covered in a dustjacket of olive drab engraved with an Army bugle.

The book became part of our experience and was titled "From Here to Eternity" (Scribner's) by James Jones. We cherished the book's hero Robert E. Lee Prewitt because although he was uncertain and brooding he became when the spirit moved him, a dedicated Don Quixote and jostled with the soulless windmills of cold Army regimentation. Prewitt was for a living definition of justice; the Army was for System. Prewitt was for human integrity and the Army wouldn't budge; it was for system; it didn't care.

Existence of conflict is an important element in a successful novel and without reservation we were on Prewitt's side.

The book was a stunning piece of work; even if you agreed with James Jones' outlook chances were you finished the book in a rage of frustration — an indication of the writer's effectiveness.

In Prewitt, Jones projected the relentless hunger of an adolescent searching for realization of himself. Over and over again there is displayed in the story the feeling that the achievement of love equated with peace of mind amounts to adulthood. Prewitt groped to find what he needed and began to realize what life is all about when he came face to face with aspects of his nature that would have to be surmounted:

"There were times when Prewitt felt a special quality in himself, a strange unpleasant quality that seemed to force everyone he touched into making drastic decisions about their own lives."

As a literary creation, Prewitt would diminish if all the symbolized were the anxious young people of our time. He stands for the idealistic lost youth of all time who never stop battling the rockbound social indifference they encounter. Yet for all his passionate self-belief, Prewitt experienced fear:

"Only in the bad spells did life frighten him with its unbelievable cruelty, its inconceivable injustice, its incredible pointlessness."

The atmosphere of Army life set down on paper is recognizable to such an extent that things which really happened seem, in retrospect like figments of imagination. The physical elements that comprise Jones' first published novel remain impressive. But the really durable element in "From Here to Eternity" is its emotion.

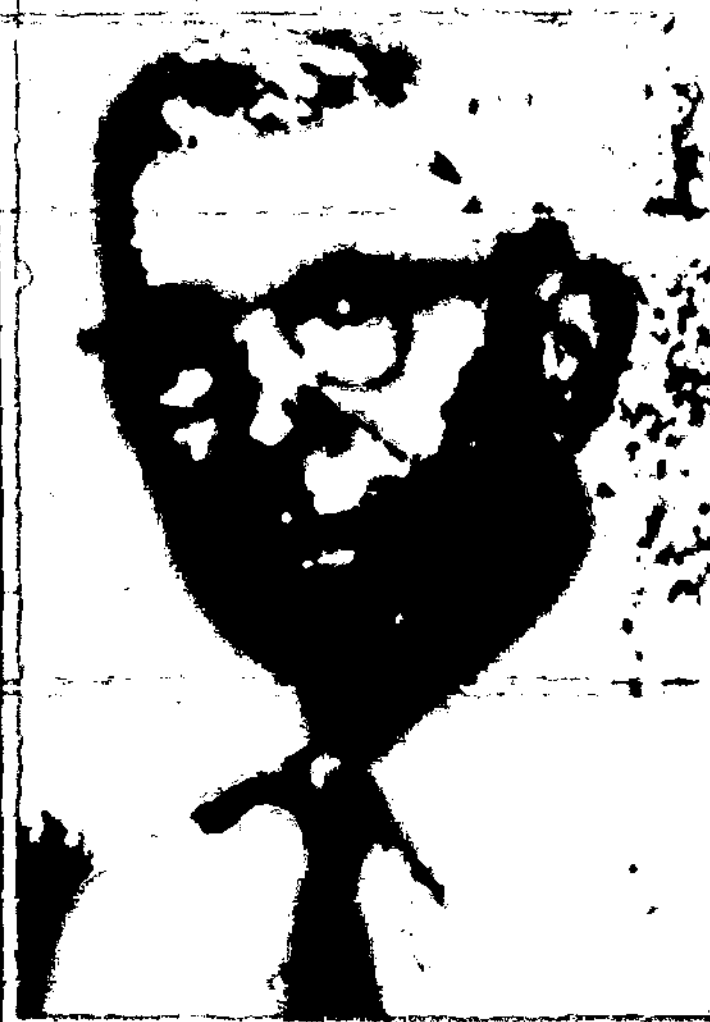

Santa Fe, Oct. 20—The statehouse was closed Monday, October 13.

That date doesn't mean anything but it came after Sunday, Oct. 12, which was Flag Day or Columbus Day or something and one for no work. Coming on Sunday as it did the no-work day had to be put over until Monday.

The next capitol holiday is Nov. 11, a Tuesday with no delays involved. Others of the 10 statehouse holidays are the Lincoln and Washington anniversaries, Memorial day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year.

The ten holidays go along with three-week annual vacations for statehouse employes.

**AP PREDICTS MECHAM AGAIN**

The Associated Press boys in New Mexico have guessed that Democrat Dennis Chavez will be re-elected to the Senate and Republican Ed Mecham will be sent back for a fourth term as governor.

The prediction was published in a recent national political story.

His last two elections, 1952 and 1954, were on the same ballot with the land-sliding Eisenhower. He won in '52 by 28,000, Mecham by 18,000. In 1954 it was like by 40,000, Mecham by 11,000. No like this time.

His first election, 1950, was preceded by a party wrecking Democratic primary fight for nomination for governor between John Miles and David Chavez, the brother of the senator. The 1952 and '54 elections also caught the Democrats seriously divided. The Democratic split is also present this time but not so wide as before.

Republicans had a fair party organization and plenty of money in the earlier Mecham runs. They don't have either this time.

There was a lien law issue burning against the Democrats in 1950 which swept the entire north for the Republicans. It isn't present this time.

All this adds up to a heavier handicap than Mecham ever carried before.

**CHILL PICKER A BAD WORD?**

A reference made by this writer the other day to New Mexico "rabbit twist" and "chill pickers" brought on complaints that I was using bad words. There was particular resentment to "chill pickers."

Some people are mighty thin skinned. You can't turn on the radio without that character from Tennessee referring to a whole audience as "pea pickers." A pea picker is a lot worse than a chill picker.

Some tender-feet hadn't heard of rabbit twist. Rabbit twisting was very serious business for homesteaders, particularly depression period homesteaders. It was done by chasing a rabbit into a hole, inserting a piece of barbed wire, twisting until it caught in the rabbit's hide, and dragging the creature out for the stew pot. No costly 22 shells wasted this way.

**SCHOOLERS IN BID FOR INDEPENDENCE**

The New Mexico Education Assn. is going for a deal to remove the schools from ordinary governmental controls and from the influence of any but professional school people. The plan was exposed when a legislative handbook prepared by NMEA for its members working in the program and "not for general distribution" fell into the hands of the press.

The plan would take away from the governor the long-established authority to appoint a school auditor and put all school money affairs in an agency set up by the board of education; it would give school people the right to make purchases up to \$500 without bids or price quotations of any kind; it would forbid ordinary citizens from membership on county school budget commissions and give the places to school board members only; it would authorize 5-year contracts for superintendents and other school brass putting them beyond replacement by new boards of education; it would authorize consolidation of school districts without consent of the districts involved as presently required.

An elaborate procedure for courting legislators is defined in the political action manual with stress on activities in the "locals." That trade union term refers to the school unit teacher organizations.

Anything the NMEA tries to do is serious. The organization has some 10,000 members paying \$15-a-year dues. Some of the members are unwilling captives but they pay up and are afraid to resist.

**Gran Quivira National Monument Established 49 Years on Nov. 2**

The 49th anniversary of the establishment of Gran Quivira National Monument will be observed Sunday, Nov. 2.

The National Monument contains the ruins of a large Indian pueblo village which was founded about 1300, and two early mission churches. The Spaniards first visited Gran Quivira in 1596, and the Franciscan Missionaries began to christianize the Indians early in the 17th century.

In 1629 the first church was built and given the name, "San Isidro." About 15 years later a larger mission, "San Buenaventura," was constructed. Both of these massive stone churches have been abandoned for nearly 300 years.

This Indian village, and other neighboring villages were abandoned about 1675, because of drought and raids by the Apache Indians. The ruins were rediscovered in 1835 by Benjamin Wilson.

On November 1, 1909 the area was made a National Monument by Presidential proclamation. Factors which may have influenced the President in making the area a National Monument were the rapid deterioration of the ruins at the hands of vandals, the historical importance of the large mission, its size as compared to others, and the fact that the ruins contain two early mission churches.

Gran Quivira National Monument is open all year and is located in the center of New Mexico, 25 miles south of Mountainair, and 55 miles north of Carrizozo, on State Highway 10. Admission is free.

**New Pontiac Sales Called 'Unprecedented'**

Nation-wide acceptance of the new 1959 Pontiac was evidenced last week as Pontiac dealers reported sales and confirmed orders of over 20,500 cars during the first three days of sales, according to S. E. Knudsen, general manager of Pontiac Motor Division.

Knudsen termed the early customer response "unprecedented in our history" as nationwide reports by Pontiac dealers listed 2,561 on-the-spot sales and over 18,000 orders by hand. "Customer reaction to our new line substantiates confidence that 1959 will be a year of opportunity for Pontiac," Knudsen said. "Customer orders were 250% more than a year ago even though dealer stocks were limited by the strike. Dealers report enthusiastic acceptance of Pontiac styling and great interest in Pontiac's revolutionary Wide Track."

**Portales Writer Pays Tribute to D. L. Jackson**

(Reprinted from "By The Way" in Portales News Tribune, Oct. 18 issue.)

One of New Mexico's distinguished citizens is visiting in Portales this week—Dave Jackson, a man whose life has spanned the 60 years of the ghost mining town of White Oaks in Lincoln county.

He is here visiting the Frank Kells, and renewing acquaintances with other former residents of the White Oak community of a half century ago.

Frank Kells' father was a miner in the Homestake mine during the time that Dave Jackson and two other men were trying to revive it after it had been closed by the corporation who owned it.

He arrived at White Oaks one year after the mysterious slaying of Col. Fountain on the desert near Alamogordo, and of course some time after Billy the Kid's escapades. But he knows intimately many of those who figured in the Lincoln County War. Many of them are now buried in the White Oaks cemetery which he now tends faithfully.

The remarkable thing about Mr. Jackson is that at the age of 88 he has such a vivid memory, and such zest for living.

"Surely goodness and mercy have followed me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord," he says humbly, for he is a devout man who tempered the wide-open mining town with Christian love and charity.

He says that he was born in Collins county, Texas, and wandered to El Paso as a young man where he heard of a community in New Mexico that was 100 miles from the nearest railroad. He decided to investigate, and took a stage to the remote town of White Oaks, then the largest town in Lincoln county. There wasn't an Alamogordo, or Carrizozo then, and Lincoln, to the east, and Three Rivers to the south, were the nearest communities.

He got a job in the mill, and soon thereafter was accepted as a responsible citizen, for he was placed on the election board, and served on that board from 1898 until three years ago when his health forced him to spend the winter in El Paso with one of the daughters of his former partner.

He has so many friends of the old days that he says that he finds it difficult now to spend any time at all at his home in White Oaks. There he loves to visit with tourists who find the remote trails leading into the crumbling old town. "They come to me as strangers, and leave as friends," he says.

His wife passed away in 1954, and his old friends don't like the idea of his living alone there any more, but he smiles and says: "I love those hills."

In these days of racial tension, it is cheering to know a man like Dave Jackson. For Dave Jackson is a Negro, and as fine a man as we have ever known.

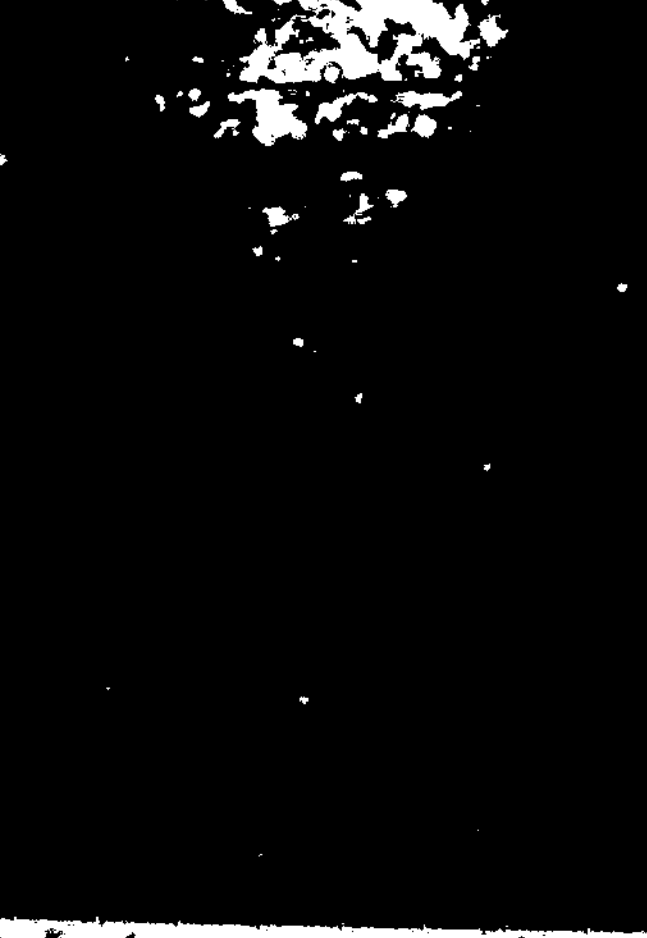

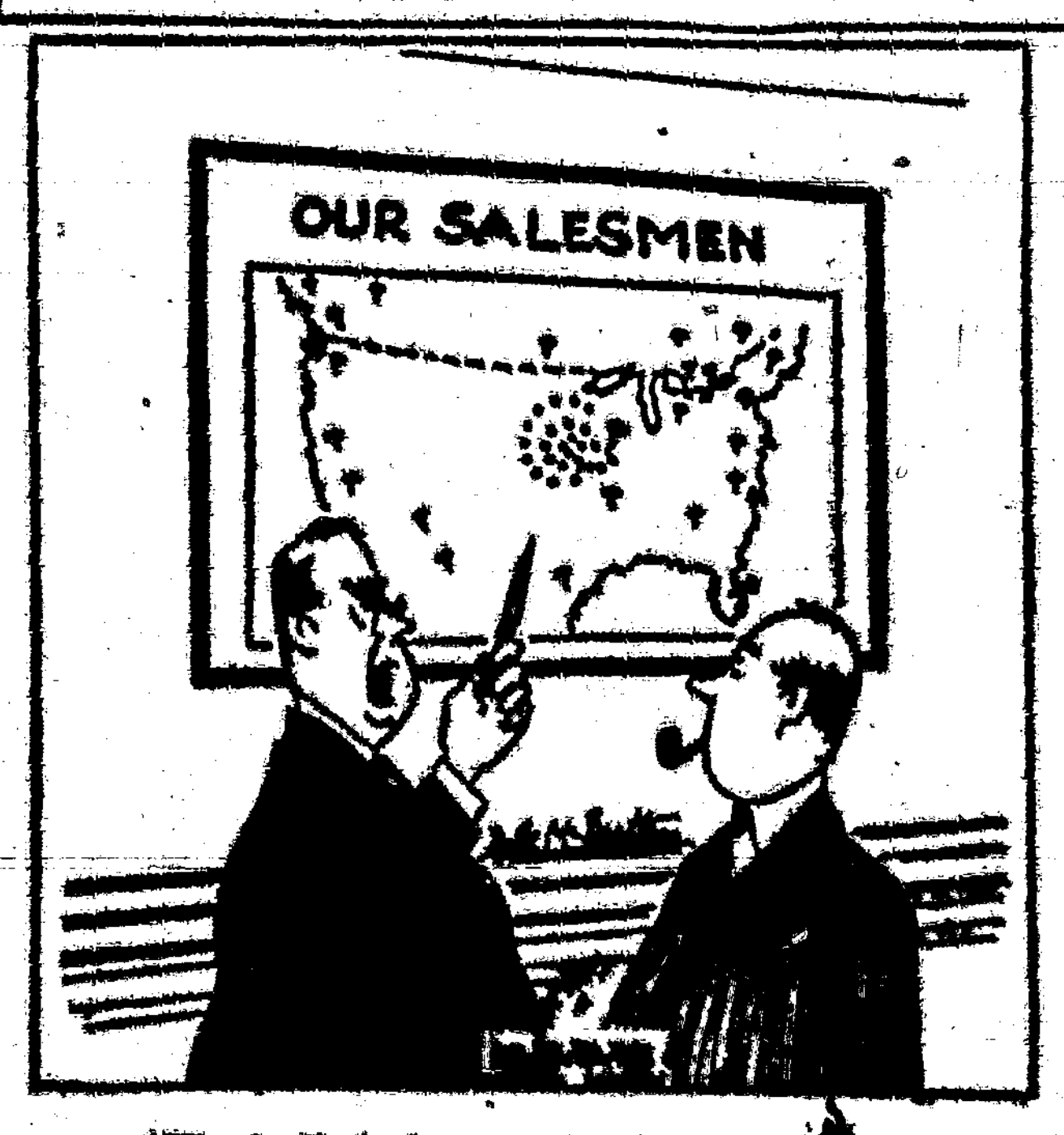

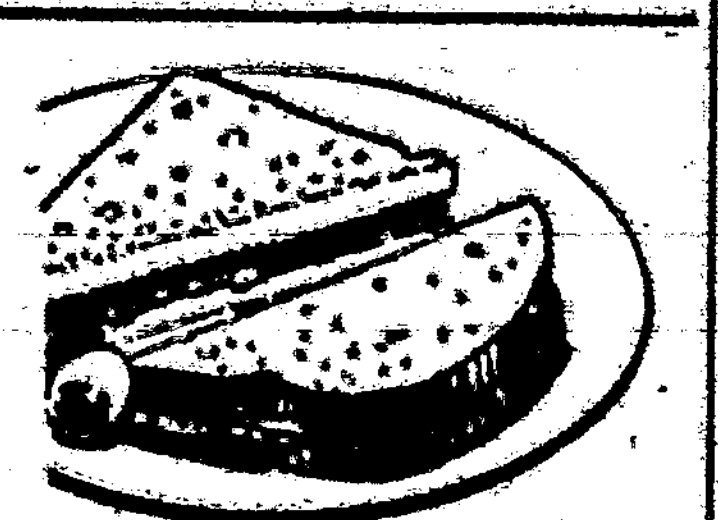
