## Capitan to Dedicate Its Smokey Bear Museum

Eight years ago, the little town of Capitan in south central New Mexico started a vigorous campaign to help prevent forest fires.

Every able-bodied adult in the little community of 600, had fought to stop the disastrous conflagration that destroyed 17,000 acres of valuable timber in the Capitan Mountains in 1950. This fire, started by one man's carelessness, not only deprived the small mill operators of timber, but ruined the land for future growth, destroyed the habitat for wildlife, and even killed many game animals.

A tiny black bear cub found clinging to a pine tree was rescued from the Capitan fire. His feet were badly burned and his chances for survival not encouraging. Mrs. Ross Flatley kept the bear in her ranch home the first night, then Game Warden Roy Bell flew the cub to a veterinarian in Santa Fe.

With careful attention and a diet of pabulum, milk and honey, the cub soon gained strength and spunk. Little Judy Bell and her puppy helped the bear forget the scars left by the fire, as they romped and played in the yard at Judy's home.

For several years, Americans had been interested in the U. S. Forest Service poster Smokey Bear. Now a live replica had been found to capture the heart of Americans, and really bring home the tragedy of a forest fire.

The little bear cub from Capitan, New Mexico was flown to the Nation's Capitol, by State Game Warden Homer Pletzen. The Chief of the U. S. Forest Service, Lyle Watts, presented the cub called Smokey, to the children of America, Smokey was placed in the National Zoo. Today, he is a large, beautiful, grown bear and receives more visitors than any other animal in the zoo. He is a cinnamon phase of the black bear.

Capitan determined not to let the Nation forget the reason for Smokey's urgent plea to help prevent forest fires. They built portals for the town proclaiming it "The Home of Smokey the Bear" and dedicated the portals with an all-day program in 1953, attended by people from many states. When tourists were confused by the belief that Smokey

had two homes, one in Washington and one in Capitan, the latter changed their title to read: "The Birthplace of Smokey Bear."

In May, 1953, Judy Bell went to Washington, D. C. to accept a gold Smokey Oscar from President Eisenhower. It was the first of its kind to be awarded. The inscription read, "To Capitan, New Mexico, Birthplace of Smokey Bear for Outstanding Support in Forest Fire Prevention by Association of State Foresters and U. S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, 1953."

But this did not mark an end to the efforts of the Village of Capitan. With volunteer funds and work, a log cabin museum was started to house the story of Smokey Bear told with murals, photographs, and exhibits. Land was donated right in the center of town, a concrete floor poured 18' by 22', pine logs cut and peated near the edge of the old burn.

An unusual amount of rainfall hampered the workers so that they will not have the museum completed by November 1, the date set for the dedication. But throughout the summer, tourists have been so interested in seeing just how a log cabin is built, the dedication program will have added attraction of men at work setting the logs in place. The cabin is to have a shake roof and native rock fireplace. A cornerstone in the fireplace will hold the name of all who helped in any way to build the museum. The Smokey Oscar will be placed in a niche above the mantel.

The dedication ceremony will take place at the museum at 11 a.m., November 1. Mayor Joe Rench will welcome the visitors, Rev. Charles Sparks will deliver the invocation, and Bill Holmes, president of the Capitan Smokey Bear Club, Inc., will give the dedication: "To the prevention of forest fires, conservation of natural resources, and the perpetuation of Capitan's claim as the birthplace of Smokey Bear."

Mrs. Ross Flatley is general chairman of all the activities of the day. The Capitan Woman's Club will serve a dinner in the school cafeteria, the proceeds to go toward the building of the museum. Each local organization will have a conservation exhibit in the school.

The program in the school auditorium at 2 p.m. will include musical numbers by the Capitan High School Band, Senior Chorus, Elementary School, Mrs. Fred Pfingston, Mrs. Fletcher Hall, and Miss Carol Bonnell. Everet Doman, supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest, will be Master of Ceremonies.

Speakers will be Mrs. E. N. Crossett, State Woman's Club President; Merle Tucker, director of the State Tourist Bureau, and William Huber, U. S. Forest Service, Washington, D. C. Special features of the program will be the introduction of the men who fought the fire in 1950; a chalk talk by Rudy Wendelin, the artist who not only does all the Smokey pictures for the Forest Service, but recently designed the Conservation postage stamp commemorating the 100th birthday anniversary of Theodore Roosevelt.

The stamp had a first day issuance at Tucson, Ariz., October 27. Mr. Wendelin and many of the members attending the annual American Forestry convention in Tucson will be in Capitan for the Smokey museum dedication.

The Capitan Boy Scouts, under the direction of Scoutmaster Paul Jones, will close the program with an original pageant, "The Rescue of Smokey Bear."

Invitations have been sent to many federal and state officials, and to all the people who are anxious to help Capitan with Smokey's campaign to prevent all man-caused forest fires.

The Cub Scouts met Tuesday at 7 p.m., in the Junior High School cafeteria, under the direction of Cubmaster Chaplain Tracy Early and his assistant, Clayton M. Thomas III.

Fourteen Cub Scouts were present, representing the two dens, which are now active in Cub Scouting. Each of the boys portrayed some of the leading historical characters who are often seen on TV.

Mrs. John McCollum and Mrs. Fred English are active den mothers and were present with the Cub Scouts; also a number of parents.

Awards were presented as follows: to Garry Armstrong Bear; Joe Moore, Bear and Gold and Silver Arrow; Mike Petty, Wolf; Hugh Hancock, Wolf and Gold Arrow.

The two den chiefs, Mike Voss and Wayne McDonald, were also present.

More den mothers are needed to further the work of Cub Scouting.

## New Mexico Fleeces Named Grand Champ Of Kansas City Show

A New Mexico fleece has been named grand champion of the wool show held in conjunction with the American Royal Live-stock Show in Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 17-25. J. E. Stauder, ex-tension wool marketing special-ist at New Mexico A&M has an-nounced.

The fleece, a 3-8's blood comb-ing, won first place in the com-mercial fleeces division before being named grand champion fleece of the show. It was en-tered by M. K. Vance, Yesso wool grower.

Six of the seven fleeces en-tered in the Kansas City show by New Mexico wool growers took top placings. One-half blood fleeces entered by John A. Cooper of Tinne and Litz McGee of Roswell took first and second placings respectively in Class VII of the territory division.

Fine-combing fleeces entered by J. B. Coates, Picocho, Sam Wil-liams, Artesia, and Norman Gross, Roswell, took first, second, and third places respectively in Class VI of the territory division. Professor P. E. Neale, animal husbandman at New Mexico A&M College, was judge of the Kansas City Wool Show.

New Mexico wool growers have won either the grand championship or the reserve grand championship in the show for the past five years, accord-ing to Stauder, Lela Smith, a 4-H'er of Roswell, showed the re-serve grand champion fleeces at the show in 1957; Watson and Calloway, Roswell, had the grand champion and J. P. Mc-Knight, Picocho, the reserve grand champion fleeces in the 1958 show. The show attracts more than 200 fleece entries each year.

## NEXT TUESDAY IS ELECTION DAY

New Mexico voters go to the polls November 4 to select a United States senator, two congressmen and a full slate of constitutional amendments (state and county officials).

Also to be voted on are five adopted by the State Legislature. On the Lincoln County ballot is a levy of three-fourths of one mill to aid the operation of the two county hospitals.

Voting booths in the county's 24 precincts open at 8 and close at 7 p.m.

The county clerk's office will remain open Tuesday night until ballots are received from all precincts.

A registration count by the Lincoln county clerk's office on October 13, 1958, shows a total of 4050 qualified voters, with a party division of 1528 Republi-cans, 2308 Democrats and 214 Independents.

## WILL HARRISON'S Inside the Capital

### Harrison's Poll Gives Edge to Gov. Mechem

SANTA FE, Oct. 30 — A sam-pling of voters preference for gov-ernor in 21 of the state's 32 coun-ties with population of 83 per-cent of the voter registration showed favor for Republican Gov. Ed Mechem over his Demo-cratic opponent, John Burroughs of Portales.

The poll left many important questions unanswered:

An area with 17 per cent of the state vote was not sampled:

Most of the sampling was made Oct. 11, the rest taken in the ensuing two weeks leaving a period of from 23 to 9 days for people to change their minds;

Some samples were woefully small and not safe for any heavy betting but they have been in-cluded along with the bigger ones;

Two check-up and catch-teams of two people each made hur-ried samplings in seven com-munities under catch-as-catch-can conditions.

### ED IN TROUBLE AT HOUSE RACE

The poll indicated some con-ditions that will be startling if borne out in actual voting (but not nearly as startling as they would have been had you not had the privilege of looking into this magic ball):

Gov. Mechem seems to be in trouble for sure in his home county of Dona Ana which he carried by 1,000 last time, 2,200 in 1952 and 2,300 in 1950. It looks like he will do well to scratch out by a few hundred this time if he wins the county at all.

The Democrat Burroughs is getting who-are-you reception in the vital Curry and Quay regarded as his home area along with Roosevelt county. Quay looks like it will be seriously shy of the 1500 anticipated by Demo-cratic planners, and Curry, like Dona Ana with Mechem, looks like it will do well to give neigh-bor Burroughs anything.

The Republican Mechem was favored, with one exception, in every Spanish-American com-munity and neighborhood sam-pled—Socorro, the exception.

The widely reported death and burial of brother Burroughs in Los Alamos and Otero counties hadn't come off when we checked. He was still breathing well in both areas although one of the pollsters at Los Alamos said she thought the poll might be wrong.

### 18 NEWSPAPERS HELP WITH POLL

The poll was set up by 18 newspapers in 18 communities. It was taken in popular markets on Saturdays Oct. 11 and 18 by pollsters offering shoppers "secret ballots" with the names of Bur-roughs and Mechem for gov-ernor. The pollsters carried plenty of pencils and boxes with slots for depositing the secret ballots.

In no instance were boxes and ballots left for volunteer voters and the pollsters were told to be-ware of people who seemed too anxious to vote.

The same system produced ac-curate forecasts in 1952, '54 and '56.

**Baptists Convene Next Week in Alamogordo**

Baptists of New Mexico, 76,000 in number, will hold their 47th Annual Session with the First Baptist Church, Alamogordo, Nov. 3-6, 1958. The convention will focus special attention upon proposed plans of enlargement for 1959 with particular emphasis upon a Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade, South of Highway 60, March 15-29; and North of Highway 60, April 12-26.

The Alamogordo General Convention session, opening at the close of election night, and after messengers have had opportunity of voting before their departure, is expected to enlist an attendance of fully 1,000 representatives from the churches. Messenger representation is based upon one from every organization, an additional number from each 25 local church membership.

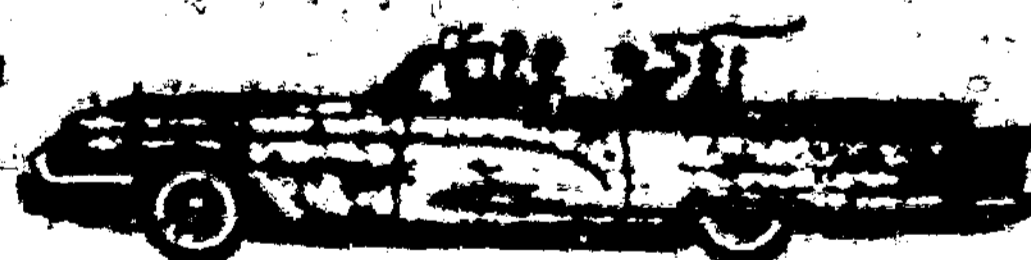

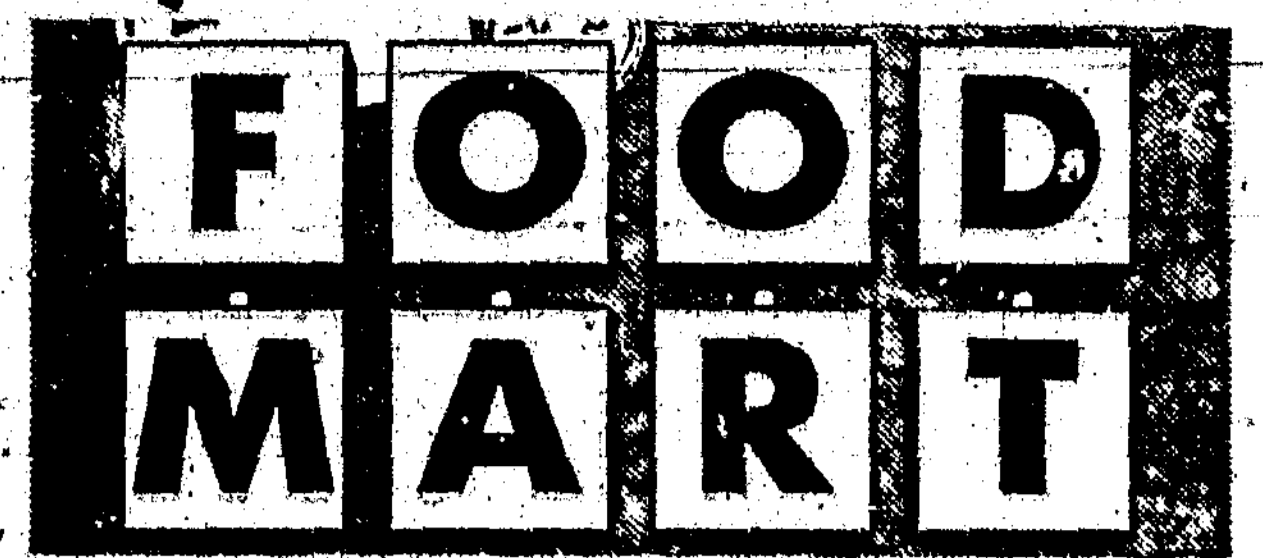

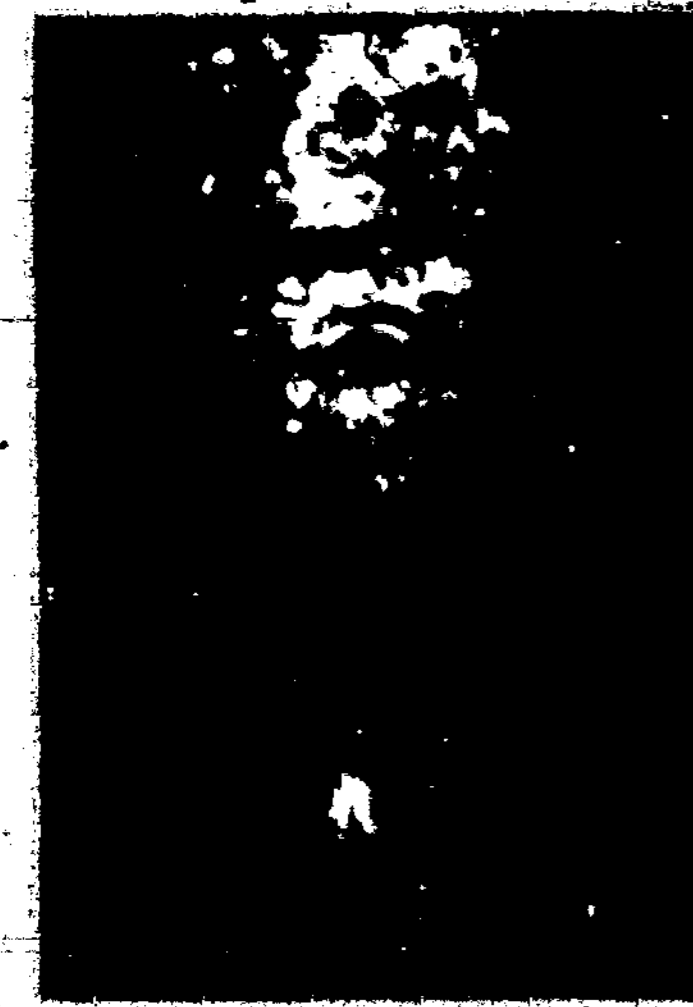

# Election Proclamation

NOW THEREFORE, We, the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, New Mexico, pursuant to the provisions of the law and the authority vested in us, in session at Carrizozo, said County and State, on this the 17th day of October, A. D. 1958, do hereby Proclaim and give Public Notice of a General Election to be held in each of the precincts and election districts of said County, on Tuesday, November 4, A. D. 1958, between the hours of eight o'clock A.M. and seven o'clock P. M. of said day. The purpose of said Election is to elect persons to the various offices hereinafter named. At the same time the electors of said County shall be given the opportunity to vote on Constitutional Amendments, numbered 1 to 5 inclusive, as the same have been certified to the County Clerk, and to vote on the question of a special levy of three-fourths of one mill outside the twenty mill Constitutional limitation, to be used to operate and maintain the Lincoln County Hospitals for the years 1959 and 1960. Proceeds of said levy to be divided equally between the County Hospitals.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 7, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW ABSENTEE VOTING.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 7, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Every citizen of the United States, who is over the age of twenty-one years and has resided in New Mexico twelve months in the county in which he desires to vote thirty days next preceding the election,

sons, persons convicted of a felonious or infamous crime unless restored to political rights, shall be qualified to vote at all elections for public officers. The Legislature may enact laws providing for absentee voting by qualified electors. All school elections shall be held at different times from other elections.

The Legislature shall have the power to require the registration of the qualified electors as a requisite for voting; and shall regulate the manner, time and places of voting. The Legislature shall enact such laws as will secure the secrecy of the ballot, the purity of elections; and guard against the abuse of elective franchise. Not more than two members of the board of registration and not more than two judges of election shall belong to the same political party at the time of their appointment."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO CREATE A STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC EDUCATION; AMENDING ARTICLE 12, SECTION 6 TO PROVIDE FOR AN ELECTED STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION WITH POWER TO APPOINT A SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, AND ARTICLE 5, SECTION 1 TO DELETE THE REFERENCE TO AN ELECTED SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. There is hereby created a state department of public education" and a "state board of education" shall determine public school policy and vocational educational policy and shall have control, management and direction of all public schools, pursuant to authority and powers provided by law. The board shall appoint a qualified, experienced educational administrator to be known as the superintendent of public instruction, who shall, subject to the policies established by the board, direct the operation of the state department of public education.

B. The members of the state board of education shall be elected at the general election next following the adoption of this amendment. One member shall be elected from each of the present ten judicial districts. The initial board shall determine by lot from its membership three members to serve terms of two years and three members to serve terms of four years. The remaining of the initial board shall serve terms of six years. Thereafter, as the terms of the initial board members expire, their replacements shall be elected from the same districts for terms of six years.

If additional judicial districts are created the legislature may provide by law for the election by the people of a board of not less than seven members nor more than ten members from board of education districts, created by the legislature.

The governor shall fill vacancies in the board by appointment of a resident from the district in which the vacancy occurs. Appointments shall be made within sixty days after the vacancy occurs. The appointed member shall serve until the next general election at which time a member shall be elected to complete the original unexpired term.

C. Board members shall be residents of the district they represent. Change of residence of a board member to a place outside the district from which he was elected shall automatically terminate the term of that member. The board members may be removed in the manner in which the legislature may provide by law.

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

ant governor, shall during their term of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government."

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing or other securities. All losses from such interest bearing notes or securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state.

In making investments, the state investment officer, under the supervision of the state investment council, shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which businessmen of ordinary prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income as well as the probable safety of their capital; provided, not more than twenty-five percent of the permanent school fund or other permanent fund shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks and bonds nor shall more than ten percent of the voting stock of a corporation be held; and provided further, stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to those stocks of businesses incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which are listed upon a national stock exchange."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

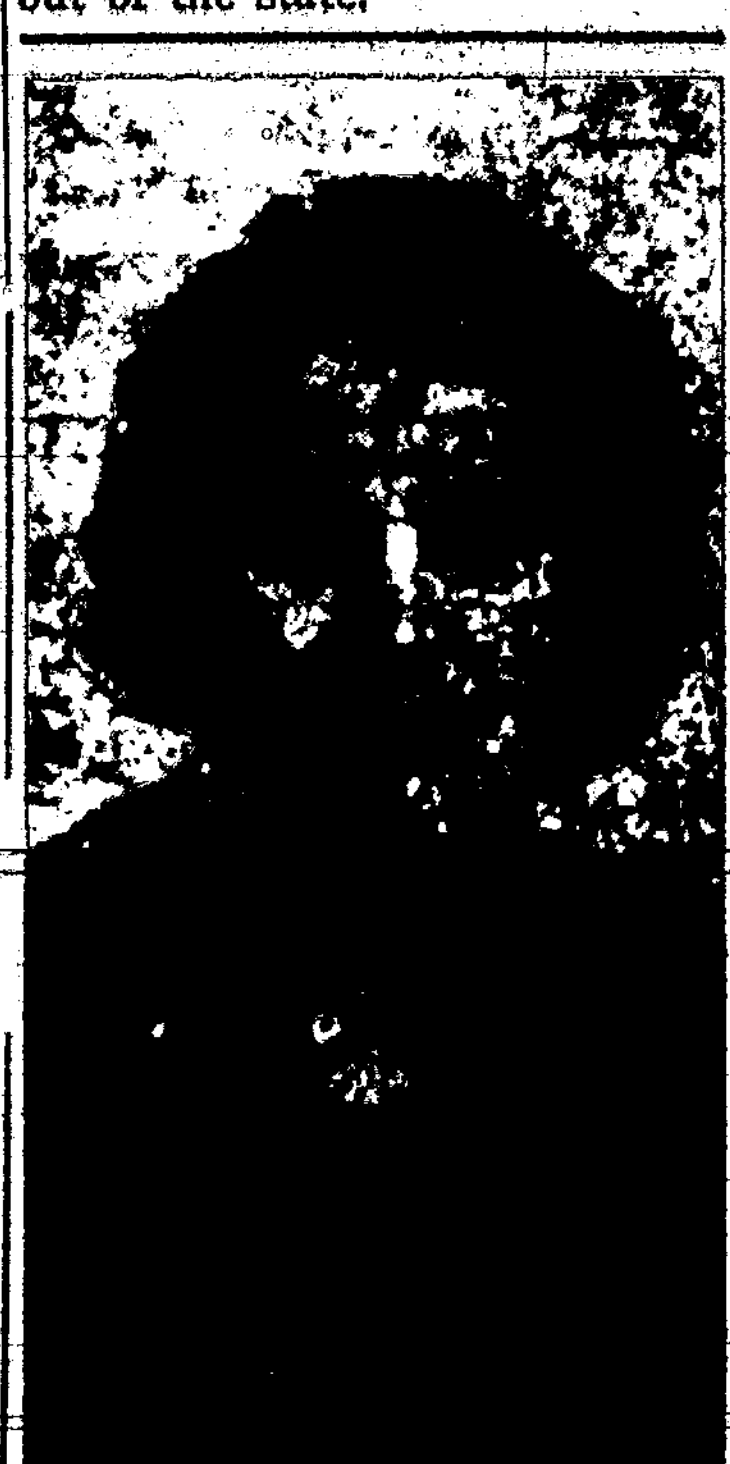

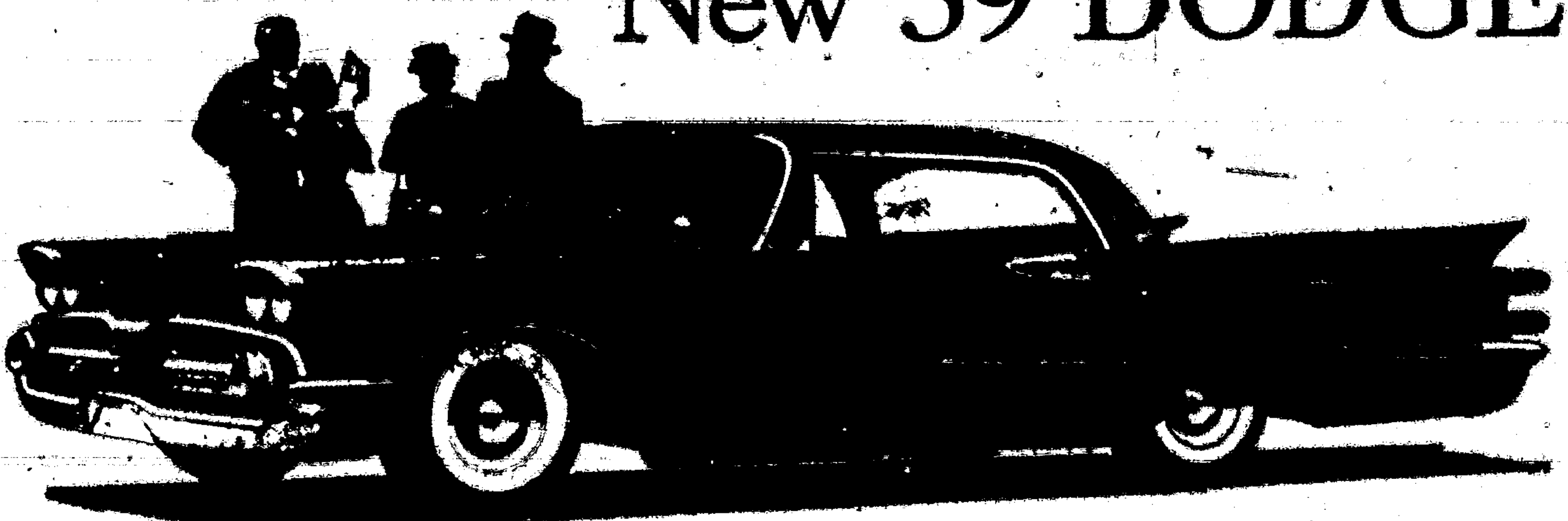

In 1923 a very important meeting was held at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago. Attending this meeting were ten of the world's most successful men. At least, men who had found the secret of "making money." Twenty-five years later, let's see where these men were:

The president of the largest independent steel company, Charles Schwab, died a bankrupt and lived on borrowed money for five years before his death.

The president of the greatest utility company, Samuel Insull, died a fugitive from justice and penniless in a foreign land.

The president of the largest gas company, Howard Hopson, is now insane.

The greatest wheat speculator, Arthur Cutten, died abroad, insolvent.

The president of the New York Stock Exchange, Richard Whitney, was recently released from Sing Sing penitentiary.

The greatest "bear" on Wall Street, Jesse Livermore, died a suicide.

The head of the greatest monopoly Ivan Krueger, died, a suicide.

The president of the Bank of International Settlements, Leon Fraser, died a suicide.

George Eastman, founder of Eastman Kodak Co., died a suicide.

You are probably wondering why I quote these rather startling facts in an article entitled "Alibis"; but if you'll remember last week I told you that the reason a person didn't do something is because there was no sense of need. All the trivial excuses for neglecting the church, for not attending and for being absent when the work of the church has to be done don't mean a thing! If we felt a need for the church and for Christianity in our lives we'd have no need for excuses — we'd be there, right in the midst of it!

Certainly the men listed above were busy men and probably had little time for the church or for the simple teachings of Jesus! Oh, I imagine they tossed the church a few thousand now and then as they would toss a dime to a beggar; but I can't imagine any one of them trying to live like a Christian and trying to learn more about Jesus. They didn't feel any need for it in their lives! And yet the one thing that could have prevented the failure that finally struck them all was the Christianity that they didn't feel they needed.

Most of us are very conscious of the need for making money. This is something that is a "must." In order to have the necessities of life we must work and for six days out of the week we devote the greater portion of our time to that end; but because of this very necessity; the demands of the body, of the physical mechanism that is ours we often forget there is also a spiritual body and one that must be

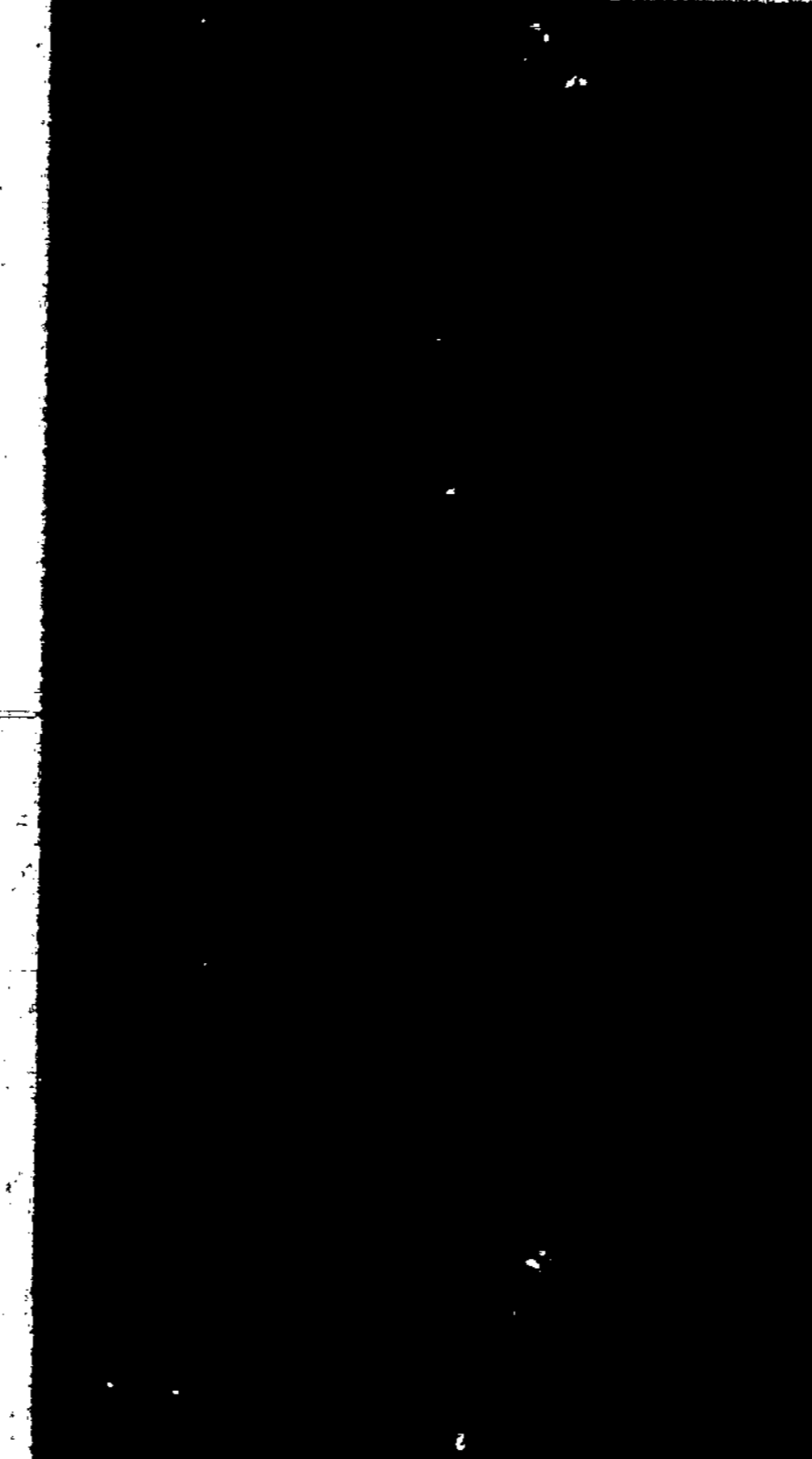

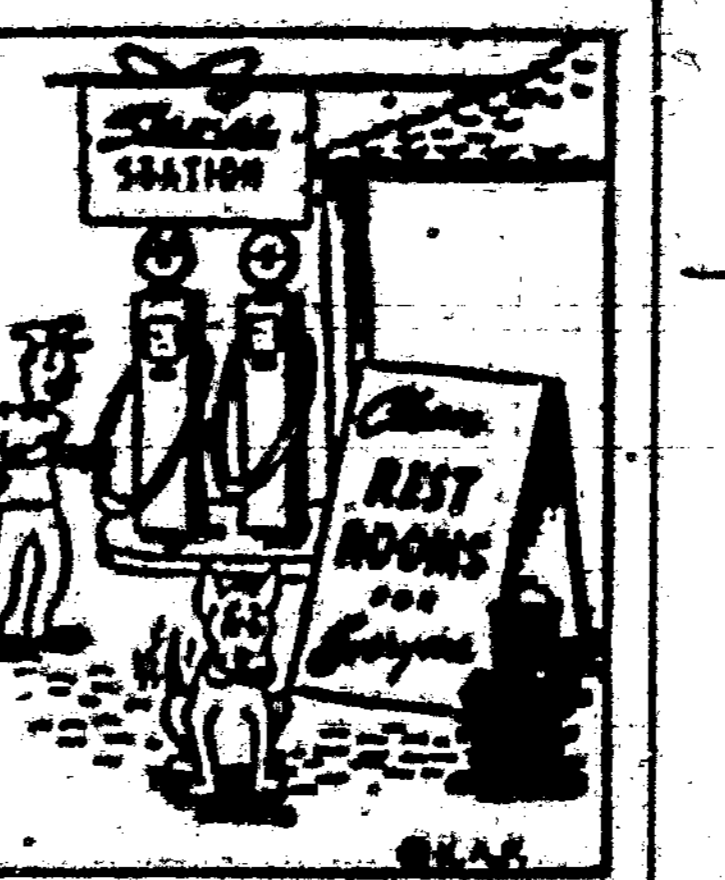

## "Wilderness" Bill set aside for wilderness preserves.

"This bill would be generally harmful to the New Mexico economy" McAllister said. "If too large an area were put into such preserves income to local communities and to the state would be materially reduced. Locking up our natural resources in this way would retard future economic progress in New Mexico."

"As an agricultural organization, the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau is, of course, primarily interested in continuing the present policy of grazing on public domain of any type."

## Taxpayers' Ass'n. Endorses Three of Five Amendments

No. 3 to permit 25 per cent of the state's permanent fund in common stock is a carefully worked out plan to bring in more revenue for the public schools and institutions and at the same time hedge against inflation. Most of the large trust funds in the country are handled in this manner.

No. 4 will forgive the liens put on property of recipients of public assistance during the period in which the lien law was in effect. Since the lien law has been repealed it seems unfair to penalize the people who happened to be on the welfare rolls during the year the lien law was on the books.

No. 5 would provide for the election of county officials for a term of four years instead of the present two year term and would allow them to succeed themselves as long as the public wished to keep them in office. At the present time a county official spends his first two years in office running for re-election. If he is re-elected for the next two years, knowing that he cannot succeed himself, he actually has little incentive to really do a good job in office. If he has a four year term he will have time to get his teeth into the job and knowing that he can succeed himself will give him an incentive to do as good a job as he possibly can.
