## DEMOCRATS CAPTURE FIVE OFFICES IN TUESDAY'S COUNTY BALLOTING

As a result of Tuesday's election the Democrats captured the majority of Lincoln county's courthouse offices for the first time in a number of years.

Out of a total of 4050 registered voters, 2654 cast ballots, or 66 per cent of all eligible voters. The Democrats re-elected a sheriff and county commissioner and won other contests for commissioner, treasurer and probate judge.

The county showed a Democratic trend in its voting, along with other parts of New Mexico which elected a solid slate of Democrats for state offices and the entire congressional ticket. All returns are unofficial.

Ince Hust, Republican, incumbent county clerk, was returned to office by a margin of 231 votes over Maude F. Eshom.

W. G. Bradley, Republican incumbent State Representative, won over W. A. Hart, 1393 to 1196.

Other Republicans won uncontested races — Clint Sultermeyer, county commissioner, district 3, and Marian Schlarb, treasurer. Sheriff S. M. Ortiz polled the most votes of any candidate in either party in his bid for reelection. His total was 1591, against 1000 for Republican Fred Montes.

Democrat candidate for county treasurer, Lewis Cummins, polled 1379 votes in gaining victory over George J. Limacher's 1130.

Tennis B. Smoot won over Republican Paul Ortiz, 1428 to 1065.

The contest for governor was not settled until Wednesday and the winning margin of Democrat John Burroughs was narrow. The Associated Press tally, with practically all of the state's precincts reporting unofficially gave Burroughs 103,218 to 101,054 for incumbent Ed Mcchem.

Justices of the peace elected in the county were Leo A. Jolner, Pct. 2, with 140 to 104 for Proceso Salcido, Republican; S. E. Grelsen, Pct. 9; Alton Gray, D, Pct. 10, 162, W. S. Campbell, R, 98.

Elected unopposed for constable were Alex J. Jenkins, Pct. 13; J. Fay Hootley, Pct. 24; Antonio L. Beltran, justice of peace Pct. 14, and Harold M. Graham, Justice of the peace Pct. 15.

In the state contests, U. S. Senator Dennis Chavez led all Democrats in voter preference. His county total was 1862 over Forrest S. Atchley, his Republican opponent's 905.

**HOSPITAL LEVY APPROVED**

County voters approved the levy for maintaining the Lincoln County hospital by a majority of more than two to one—792 for and 367 against.

**COUNTY OFFICERS' TERM AMENDMENT VOTED DOWN**

Voter disapproval was registered against only one of the constitutional amendments, No. 5, providing for terms for elected county officers of 4 years, was voted down 563 to 622.

**HOSPITAL WING TO BE DEDICATED SATURDAY**

A 30-bed wing at the New Mexico State Sanitarium at Fort Stanton is to be dedicated Saturday. It is expected that around eighty visitors from out of the county will be present, including physicians from Colorado.

### State Farm Bureau to Convene in Roswell

New Mexico's largest agricultural organization will hold its 38th annual convention Nov. 21-22 at Roswell.

About 400 voting delegates, and as many more non-voting delegates representing 9,400 members from 27 county Farm Bureaus across the state will convene at the Nickson Hotel to hear speakers of national and statewide reputation and to consider scores of resolutions on the leading agricultural issues on the state and national level.

The "right-to-work" issue, the proposed change in the name of New Mexico AEM, a new dairy law for the state, and the wheat surplus are among the topical issues that may come before the convention.

Highlighting this year's convocation will be a Talent Find contest for New Mexico's rural youth, with winners from county contests throughout the state competing for prizes.

### PTA Sponsoring Pancake Breakfast

The Carrizozo PTA is sponsoring a pancake breakfast Nov. 22-23 at the Yucca Grill.

The breakfast will be served between the hours of 7 and 11 on both mornings — Saturday and Sunday.

All tickets for the breakfast will be sold in advance by the PTA.

The breakfast menu will be 4 slices of bacon, three large hotcakes and coffee. The price for adults will be \$1; children under 12, 75 cents.

All of Carrizozo is invited to have breakfast at the Yucca Grill and help make it a successful event for the PTA.

Bidding was spirited and prices were said to have averaged out well in the Nickels Building and Hardware auction sale last week end.

### Bid Awarded for Salado Structure

A. T. Pflingsten, chairman of Upper Hondo SCD, announced this week that a contract to construct a flood water retarding structure across Salado creek, east of Capitan, has been awarded to Armstrong and Armstrong Construction Co. of Roswell.

The contract for \$202,202.50, which was awarded by the Washington office of the Soil Conservation Service, calls for construction to begin during the early part of November.

This flood retarding structure is the largest of several planned for installation on the watersheds of the Rio Hondo and Ruidoso, under the Upper Hondo pilot watershed protection project, instituted several years ago. Completion of the Salado structure will mark the half way point in the planned program.

The flood retarding dam will be approximately 88 feet in height, earth fill, with a retarding basin of about 4,500 acre feet of water at maximum capacity.

Flood waters will be discharged in an orderly manner through a 4' x 4 1/2' concrete box through the base of the structure. In July of 1957 a flow of approximately 3,000 second feet of water was recorded flowing in the Bonito near Hondo, as a result of heavy rain originating on the drainage above the site of the proposed Salado retard structure.

The spillway will greatly reduce this flow, lengthen its period of flow and prevent bank cutting and overflow of valuable farm lands along the Bonito and Hondo valleys below.

Fred Bradford of Capitan who attended the Smokey Museum ceremonies last Saturday, remarked that he was the first ranger in the Sacramento mountain area, after taking an examination in 1907. He worked as a ranger for two years.

Albuquerque was represented at the dedication by both TV and newspaper representatives. Miss Danna Kuslanovich took pictures and made notes for a story in the Journal. Jim De Silva's movies were presented Monday night on the KOB-TV news. Jim's wife is a niece of Fletcher Hall. The two men had never met and Jim tried unsuccessfully before the afternoon program started to find Fletcher. (He must have been at the ranch.)

Among other out-of-county dedication visitors were Mrs. Ellen Sellars of 212 W. Manhattan, Santa Fe, accompanied by her brother Jim Cavanaugh, also of Santa Fe, and Mrs. H. E. Marr of Tularosa. Mr. Cavanaugh was stationed at Fort Stanton in administration for a number of years.

Fred Thompson, director of the State Game Commission, told Rep. W. G. Bradley Saturday that the commission would be glad to work with members of the legislature in formulating a law that would permit charging a small fee for fishing in publicly owned dams or reservoirs. The attorney general's office has ruled that the state cannot stock waters where a fee is charged in addition to a fishing license.

Such a law, if passed, would permit fees to be charged to pay for supervision at publicly-owned lakes such as Bonito, where water is stored for domestic consumption only. It would solve a problem also for the city of Alton, similar to that at Bonito.

The News welcomes Miss Pam Reid and her column "Teensters Union No. 1" which will take the place of Mary (Ginger) Nickels' "Tween Us Teeners." Mrs. Linda Lambert, sister of GOP National Committeeman Albert Mitchell, and Mrs. Murray, state Republican chairwoman, attended a meeting at Republican headquarters in Carrizozo last Friday evening. While they were inside the building a short in the ignition system burned out the wiring on their car. Emergency repairs were made that evening at the Shafer Motor Co. and the two women went on to Vaughn.

### Name Pick Warden Capitan Celebrates Police Magistrate Museum Dedication

At their meeting Wednesday night the Carrizozo town board of trustees appointed Robert E. (Pick) Warden police magistrate succeeding Clarence E. Shaw who resigned due to business reasons. Mr. Shaw was at the meeting to swear in the new magistrate.

In other town business a business occupation license was granted Cowan Oil Co. for its Oldtimers Service Station; estimated gross business to Dec. 1, \$5,000 or less.

The town bought \$525 worth of material, mainly plumbing pipe, racks, fitting and wrenches, at the Nickels store auction. Estimated value of the material was \$1200.

A resolution from the Chamber of Commerce was read, requesting to the town board to give careful attention to installing modern street lighting on Highway 54 and 12th street. The lighting, it was stated would "further the welfare and safety of the town."

Two bids were opened on the town's request for bids on a new dump truck. The bid of the Lincoln County Motor Inc. on a 1959 Ford truck was \$4119.49; that of the City Garage on a Chevrolet 1959 truck, \$4129.40. After a lengthy discussion on equipment such as tires and heater, it was voted to order the Chevrolet truck.

### Capitan Celebrates Museum Dedication

The Smokey Bear Museum at Capitan was dedicated Saturday beginning with a formal dedication in the morning and concluding with an afternoon program in the high school.

It was a perfect Fall day and a fair sized crowd attended both programs including citizens of the county, Forest Service and Game Department officials, State Women's club officials, and representatives of Smokey's "official family."

Special guests from Washington: Fred Thompson, director of State Game Department; Fred the Forest Service, and Rudy Weydelin, Smokey artist. From Santa Fe — Merle Tucker, director of the State Tourist Bureau; Fred Thompson, director of State Game Department; Fred Patton and Speed Simmons of the Game Department, and Ray Bell, State forester.

From Albuquerque — Forest Service officials A. G. Brennels, Tom Anderson, Ruth Bush Jones, Stat Jenkins and J. Morgan Smith.

Woman's Club officials Mrs. E. N. Crossett and Anthony, state president of Women's Clubs; Mrs. M. R. Baumgartner, fourth district president of Alamogordo, and Mrs. Smoot of Albuquerque.

The Capitan Fire Department siren at 11 in the morning signaled the start of the dedication program, followed by Taps by the Boy Scouts and the Star Spangled Banner by the Capitan High School Band.

In his invocation, Rev. Charles Sparks reminded the dedication visitors of their American heritage and urged all to work together to build the best community possible.

Mayor Joe Rench welcomed all to the dedication and Bill Holmes made the formal dedication.

Fred Miller, on behalf of Supt. of Schools Bill Hall, invited all to the noon meal at the school cafeteria, prepared through the cooperation of Capitan organizations and served by the Capitan Woman's Club.

Everett Doman, supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest, was master of ceremonies at the afternoon program began at 2 o'clock in the high school auditorium. He reviewed the history of the Capitan Smokey Museum, starting with building the Smokey Bear portals in 1953 "not to let the nation forget the story of the Capitan forest fire." He mentioned several who have taken an active part in the organization and work of the Smokey Bear Club, including Bill Holmes, its president; Joe Rench, Capitan mayor; Hollis Cummins, who donated the land for the museum; Pearl Soderback, fund drive leader; Dorothy Guck, club secretary; Mrs. Ross Flatley, who adopted the cub bear (Smokey) when it was picked up in the forest, badly burned; Charlie Pepper, for his work on the building; and finally the help given by the neighboring towns of Ruidoso, Roswell and Carrizozo.

Stating that the Capitan Woman's Club did most of the work on the portals and planned the dedication, Mr. Doman introduced Mrs. Bill Hall, who in turn presented state and local women's club members, including Mrs. Paul L. Cienfuegos of the Mesquero Club.

In her talk Mrs. Crossett said that conservation had always been an important sphere of women's club's activities.

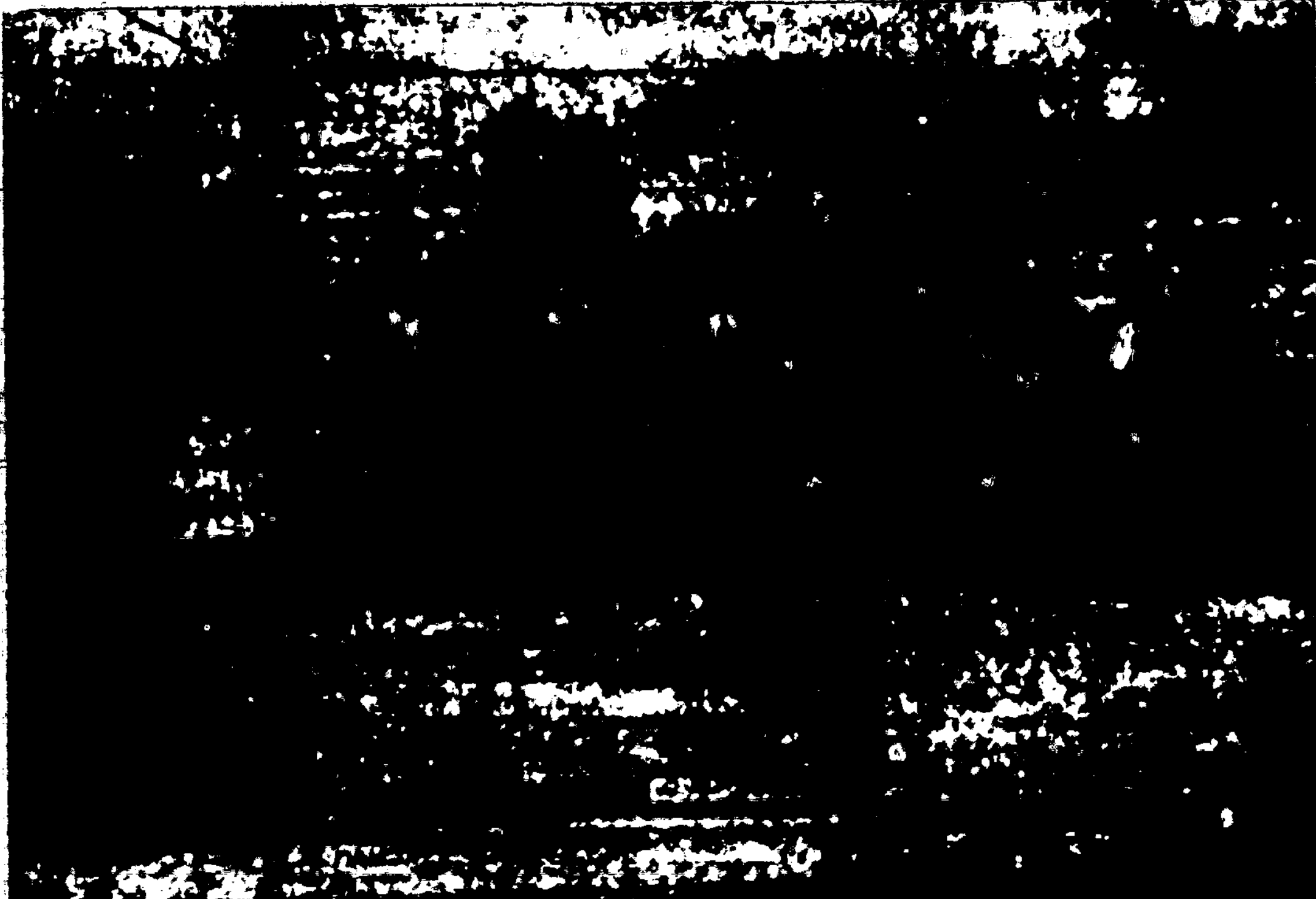

Forest Service officials and their families who attended the dedication and program.

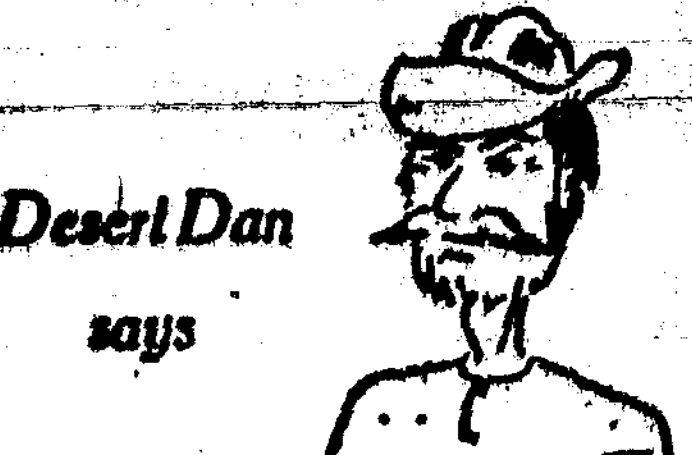

**20 Years Ago**  
(From the files of the Lincoln County News, Nov. 4, 1928)

A silver fox farm was started on the Pat Garrett farm near Bonito dam.

S. W. Hais of La Luz was a Carrizozo visitor; also E. H. Hendricks of Jicarilla, C. H. Peters of Ancho and A. L. Hulbert of Lincoln.

A light snow fell on the mountains.

A large political ad in the News urged: "Keep these three together; John J. Dempsey for congressman; Franklin D. Roosevelt for president and John E. Miles for governor." Election day was Nov. 8.

A Republican rally was held at the school house in Ancho.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Dale, Mrs. John Dale and Miss Oleta Drake of Ancho went to El Paso where the Fred Dales purchased a new Willys car.

The Carrizozo Businessmen's Club at their regular meeting adopted resolutions commending several citizens for completing "new, artistic and utilitarian buildings: Messrs. Fulmer and Wright of the Lincoln County Utility Co., R. A. Walker of the Lyric Theatre, Mrs. M. M. Ward, owner of the new Standard Service station, and M. U. Finley.

Even though fat steers were selling at 50 cents to \$1 a cwt. lower than a year ago, there was more confidence in the future of the livestock market structure than for several months.

**40 Years Ago**  
(From the files of the Carrizozo News, Nov. 8, 1918)

Unofficial election reports in New Mexico showed the re-election of Senator A. B. Fall and the Republican state ticket by majorities ranging from 750 to 1200. In Lincoln county commissioners reported elected were W. H. Sevier, R. Earl R. Moulton, R. and E. H. Taylor, D; probate judge, George Kimbrell, D; county clerk, George C. Clements, D; sheriff, X. A. Duran, R; assessor, Frank R. Miller, D; treasurer, A. J. Rolland, R.

It was erroneously reported that an armistice had been signed between the Allied powers and the German and Austrian governments. It was stated that an armistice had only been discussed, but it was believed that peace was near.

J. McSmith was in Carrizozo from the Claunch ranch. Mack was hardly recognizable at first, but after he had his beard trimmed and that Edward VII's appearance returned, everyone knew him.

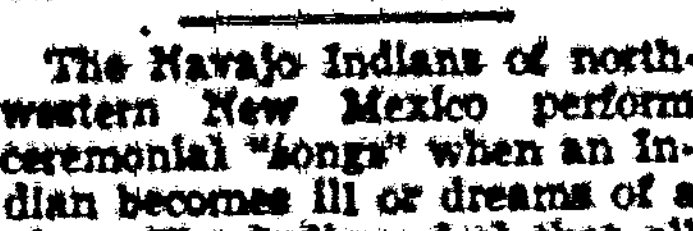
James Morris of Red Lake was a Carrizozo visitor.

## Federal Business Aid May Become Available

Financial aid for small business may be available in New Mexico as result of the passage of the Small Business Investment Act of 1958. The Economic Development Commission, which is interested in promoting New Mexico industries as it is encouraging out-of-state industries to locate in New Mexico, is anticipating the application of the provisions of this act in the state. The Act specifically provides for federal aid in setting up state-chartered private small business investment companies to provide equity capital and long term loan funds for small business concerns. Loans may be made to individual firms for 20 years in amounts not to exceed 20% of the combined surplus and capital of the small business investment company making the loan. Since the Act calls for an initial investment of \$300,000 in setting up such investment companies, the probable limit on individual loans will be over \$60,000. The Small Business Administration may provide up to \$150,000 in the initial capitalization to stimulate

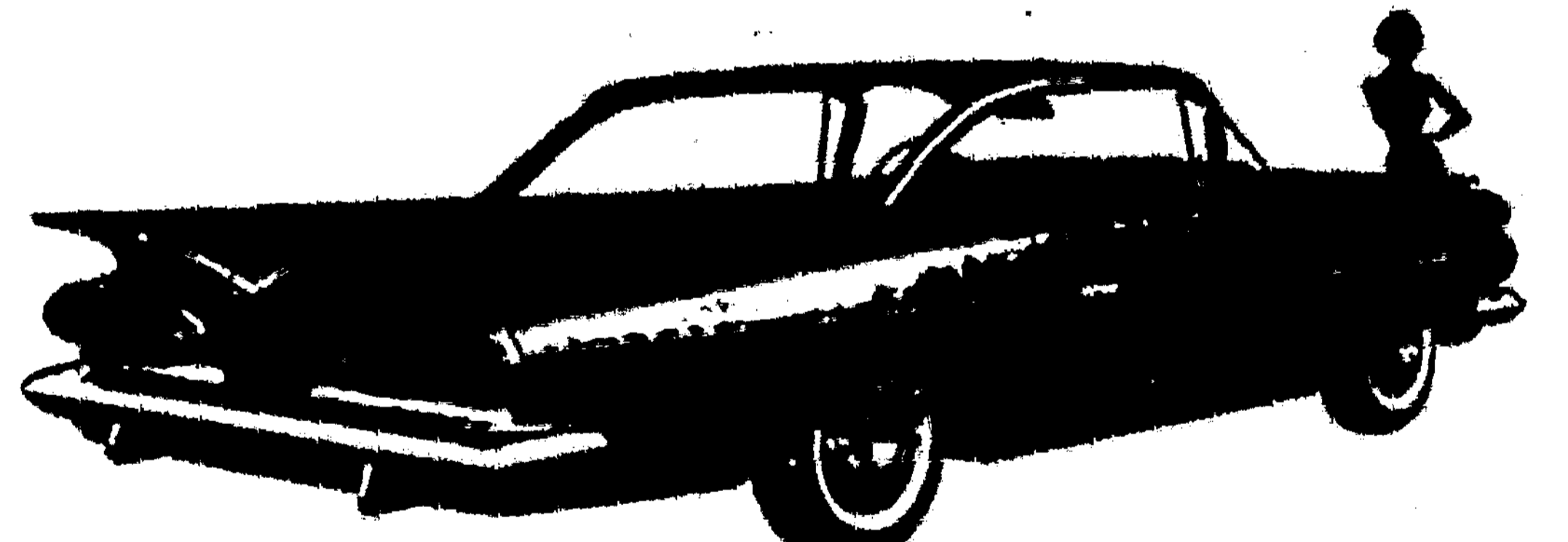

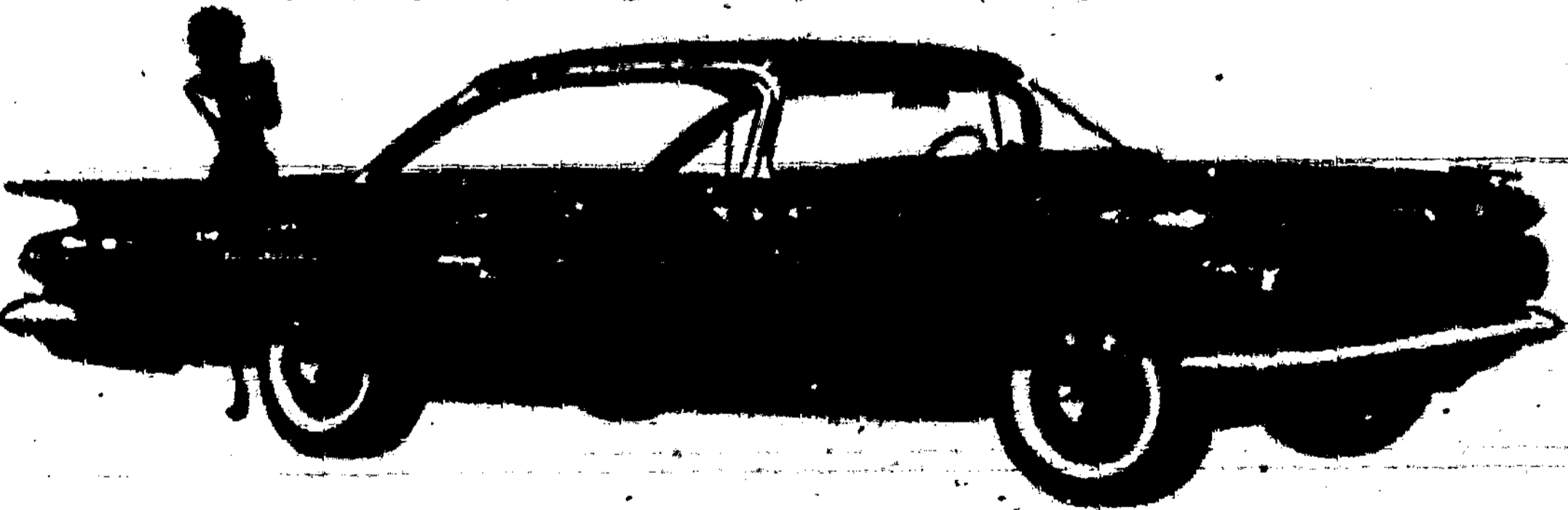

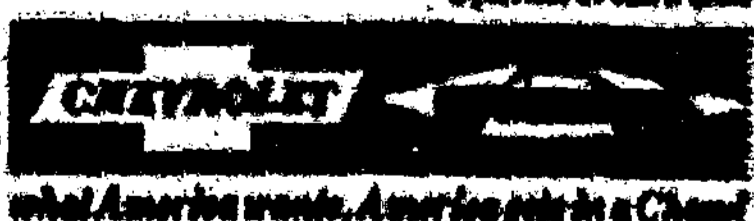
