Hunting Fatality Near Corona

Thirty minutes after the deer season opened last Saturday, young hunter from Albuquerque Was dead near Corona.

He was Arthur Shell, 30, who was struck by a bullet on the Hodge ranch, 9 miles southeast

According to Sheriff S. M. Ortiz who investigated a 30.06 butlet from another hunter's gun went through a 3% inch tree limb and struck Shell who was squatting behind the tree.

The bullet struck his cheek bone, severed his spinsi cord and lodged in the back of his head, causing instant death.

Sheriff Ortiz states that it is thought the bullet came from the gun of Albert Angel of Albuquerque who shot at and missed a deer between the two hunters. They were in separate parties. Angel stated he was unaware of the accident until he ran


