**Schedule of Mails for
Carrizozo Postoffice**

Mabel Vigil, Carrizozo acting postmaster, has given the News for publication a complete schedule of mail service for Carrizozo. She states that it has recently come to her attention that "there is considerable misunderstanding and misinterpretation of the recent mail changes which went into effect on September 28, 1958."

"Most of the patrons," she adds, "have the idea that the trains no longer carry mail and that it is impossible to know what the mail schedules are at the present time. The following information as to the new schedules should help patrons realize that this new change, instead of hindering the mail service into Carrizozo, has actually improved mail service in and out of this community, as it has provided the same previous service for first class mail, and additional mail service as the PMT trucks hauling parcel post also carry first class mail in addition to parcel post."

The mail schedules are:

**Choir to Present
"Messiah" Excerpts**

Rev. Homer Reid, pastor of Trinity Methodist Church in Carrizozo, announces that plans are being made to have the church choir present excerpts from the "Messiah" this Christmas and Stainer's Crucifixion for Easter. Rev. Reid states that the choir is doing well, with an average attendance of 16, however, he adds: "We can use some good voices in addition to what we have."

"I would like to have a bass who can do the solo part in the Crucifixion (I'll teach them the part if they don't know it.) Altos and sopranos are needed, too, for parts in the Messiah. It is not necessary to be a Methodist to sing in the choir."

Choir rehearsals are for one hour each Tuesday night from 7:30 to 8:30. Highlight of Evangelism Week at the Trinity Methodist church were the voices of the Junior Choir, 25 young voices, singing under the direction of Beasle Hodgkin.

First class mail going to Trains 3 and 4 leaves the postoffice to the depot at 11:30 a.m. daily, with the exceptions that Train 4 does not carry mail on Sunday and Train 3 does not carry mail on Monday.

First class mail going to Trains 39 and 40 leaves the postoffice at 5 p.m., to the depot daily.

The above schedules are the same as before.

In addition to this service, Tucumcari and El Paso CF truck service is as follows:

Truck No. 11A leaves Tucumcari at 11:30 p.m., with parcel post and first class mail for all points between. Arrives in Carrizozo at 4:25 a.m., and at the end of the route, El Paso, at 9:50 a.m.

Truck No. 12A, leaves El Paso at 11 p.m., with parcel post and first class mail for all points between. Arrives in Carrizozo at 3:40 a.m., and at the end of the route, Tucumcari, at 11:30 a.m.

Truck No. 14A, leaves El Paso at 9 a.m., with parcel post and first class mail for all points between. Arrives in Carrizozo, the end of the route, at 1:25 p.m.

Truck No. 13A, leaves Carrizozo at 5 p.m., with parcel post, all air mail, first class mail for Tularosa, Three Rivers, Newman, Oro Grande, El Paso, Roswell, Carlsbad, states West, and points between El Paso and Ft. Worth, and points between El Paso and New Orleans; and a Tucumcari and El Paso Truck 40 pouch via El Paso, with mail for Ancho, Corona, Duran, Vaughn, Albuquerque, Santa Rosa, Newkirk and Montoya, Tucumcari and all states East.

"All-mail" Mrs. Vigil states, "placed in the drop before 5 p.m. leaves this office at that time and gives Carrizozo excellent mail service in keeping with the motto of the Postal Service, 'Move Today's Mail Today in a Businesslike Way.'"

She asks any who have questions about mail service to take them to the postmaster.

A Ruidoso resident reported a temperature reading of 12 below last Thursday morning.

The Carrizozo Class of 1938 presented the Athletic Association a cash gift of \$19.

40 Years Ago

(From the files of the Carrizozo News, Nov. 15, 1918)

The message was flashed on Monday morning that an Armistice had been signed November 11, ending the war with Germany.

Carrizozo celebrated the war's end with a monster street parade, followed by patriotic singing and speeches at the Methodist Church.

The News printed a chronological review of events during World War from 1914 to 1918.

E. L. Moulton, county commissioner, first district, was a Carrizozo visitor; also M. C. Porter of the Porter Mercantile Co.

The First National Bank in its condensed statement, showed deposits of \$171,639.

Memorial services were held in Carrizozo for the county's deceased and wounded soldiers Henry Lutz, Harvey Hughes, Richard Morgan and Gladney White.

A committee to nominate new officers for the Red Cross was composed of J. E. French, Mrs. S. C. Gray, Mrs. D. S. Elliott, M. B. Paden and Mrs. H. S. Fairbank.

NEW MEXICO BRIEFS

The first atomic explosion in history took place in New Mexico early on the morning of July 16, 1945. Site of the explosion was the desert of the Tularosa Basin, southwest of Carrizozo.

Archaeologists in New Mexico have discovered sashes woven out of dog fur by prehistoric Indians. The dog was the Indians' only domesticated animal until they were introduced to sheep and horses by the 16th Century Spanish colonists.


The children were presented a small prayer book by St. Mary's Altar Society and a rosary from Father Dennis.
