Otero Electric Coop. Granted Loan to Finance Expansion

A loan of \$1,297,000 has been granted the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., to finance the expansion of facilities to serve three counties.

Information that the loan had been approved was conveyed last Thursday in separate telegrams to Jay D. Lasater, manager, from New Mexico's congressional delegation in Washington.

The new funds will enable the cooperative to build 183 miles of distribution line, 21 miles of transmission line and make system improvements to serve 775 new members in Otero, Lincoln and Chaves counties.

The town of Carrizozo has an application pending with the Otero County Cooperative to supply the town with wholesale electric power.

Mr. Lasater informed the News that the loan will enable the company to start immediate work in three-phasing the present line from Otero into Carrizozo. This will give Carrizozo one source of power.

Funds are also now available to build a transmission line from Capitan to Carrizozo, bringing in power from another direction.

Mr. Lasater said the major part of the loan will be spent in Lincoln and Otero counties and that all of the new transmission line is to be in Lincoln county.

He stated that, although the work was planned a number of months ago, it will be started as soon as possible to conform with President Eisenhower's request that all necessary construction work get under way to stimulate employment locally and nationally.

Although some of the work will be started at once, Mr. Lasater said the major part of the work cannot be started until plans have been completed and approved by the board of trustees of the cooperative — about mid-summer.

Jack Hobson of Tularosa is president of the cooperative, J. B. Runyan, Lower Pecos, vice president; A. J. Vickers, Cloudcroft, secretary, and E. E. Mayfield, Cloudcroft, treasurer.

The directors are Charles Fuller and Milton Mable of Pecos, George Simeros of Arabela, Fred Pellman of Mesquero and W. A. Gage of Pinon.

The firm of Harris, Williams and Patterson of Amarillo are consulting engineers for the cooperative.

Veterinarian to Make Free TB Tests

County Agent Ralph Dunlap states that Dr. M. O. Nottingham, veterinarian, will be in Lincoln county next week to make free TB tests for dairymen and ranchers.

Dr. Nottingham will be in the Carrizozo area next Monday afternoon and in the morning on Wednesday.

He will be in the Hondo-Capitan-Ruidoso area the entire day Tuesday.

County Agent Dunlap advises that milk cows should be tested for TB once a year and that Dr. Nottingham would like to also make tests on range cattle while he is in the county.

Anyone wishing the services of Dr. Nottingham may contact Mr. Dunlap or leave the information at Horijo Trading Co.

Son of Pioneers Dies at T. or C.

Services for E. W. Henley were conducted Wednesday afternoon at Hillsboro, Interment following in the Hillsboro cemetery.

The French-Fitzgerald Mortuary in T. or C. was in charge of arrangements.

E. W. (Cap) Henley, 76, member of one of the earliest families to settle on the Bonito, died Monday morning shortly before noon at the Hot Springs hospital.

His death occurred following a stroke the day before.

Cap Henley was born in Roswell, the youngest son of the family of "Uncle Will" Henley. He worked on the Bonito pipeline from about 1918 to 1925.

The T. W. Henley family was the first to homestead on the Bonito, at Henley's Crossing, in 1880. Then his parents, Allen Henley and Lucy Henley, moved from Missouri, first to Roswell and later to the Bonito. They were followed by their sons Will Henley and Jim Henley.

Allen Henley and sons had a store, saloon and hotel in Nogal in the early days.

Among the survivors of Cap Henley are three sons, Mrs. Nellie Branum of Carrizozo is a cousin.

Floy Skinner of Nogal visited Cap Henley Saturday night at his home in Truth or Consequences. He was apparently in good health at the time and the two planned to take a drive Sunday out to Elephant Butte dam.

When Mr. Skinner called for him the following day, he found his friend had been taken by ambulance to the hospital.

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

By MRS. S. F. WELLS

I arrived in White Oaks in 1896, coming over on the stage from Carthage, a distance of 90 miles. The stage stopped at Indian Tank, known as the half-way house, to change horses. A Mr. Lalone (Mrs. Tinnon's father) was caretaker. The driver and I got down and Mr. Lalone served demt tassa. Then we drove to White Oaks, reaching there about 8 o'clock in the morning.

The miners were just having breakfast at Mrs. Brothers' hotel. I was glad to see a doll buggy and doll in Mrs. Brothers' bedroom. I said to myself, well they are past-civilized. They belonged to her daughter, Emma. Mrs. Brothers kept the hotel for years.

There was a very nice Sunday School and the town hall was used for everything—for Sunday School, dances, political meetings and the public school. There were two weekly papers, "The Golden Era" and "The Leader." The editors, Major Caffery of the Leader and Rev. Slight of the Golden Era, kept the townpeople in hot water all the time, that is until the town began to decline.

There were three saloons and they were almost always doing a thriving business. Yes, and one cafe, run by John Chinaman, Ah Oau. When he came to White Oaks from San Francisco in 1880 there were about twenty houses. He lived to be 110 years old. He would bake cakes and set them outside at night for the spirits to get, but the people around town got the cakes.

In 1889 the Congregational church was built, of rocks, as were most of the business buildings, taken from the hills around White Oaks. There was a glass mill on the road to our place, and a small powderhouse, used to store all the powder that was used on the mines and roads, etc. Men who knew about powder said there was so much powder that, had it gone off, it would have blown White Oaks to bits.

Also, east of White Oaks, was a brick kiln. Many of the nice buildings were built from these bricks—the school house and the lovely home of Mr. Hoyle. The Parker coal mines were about two miles east of our place. They used big wagons, lined with metal, and had from six to eight, mules to haul these big wagons up the hills. When coming off the mountain, the wheels had to be tied.

There were five gold mines producing quantities of gold; in fact, White Oaks was a prosperous town. There were stage holdups and robberies. One bandit stole gold from the stage-coach, slipped away, then came around by another route and held it up again.

Another time a gold brick was placed in an old wooden clock. All the inner parts of the clock had been removed and the gold brick placed within. The bandits, of course, knew the gold brick was to be shipped. How they knew, no one knows, but the stage was held up and ransacked from one end to the other, but no gold brick did they find. When Mr. Canine heard about the holdup he rushed to

the scene and found the gold brick.

Another time a tenderfoot, wearing a Stetson hat, was on the stage. The bandit wanted the Stetson so he knocked the dude down and took his hat.

Years later, a lady from the east leased the gold mines. She had to buy water from us, and of course she saw the water just running down the canyon, so she had the audacity to say to me, "Why, that is just running to waste! You should let me have it for nothing." She paid a goodly price for it. She didn't stay in White Oaks long.

Cancer Crusade Starts Saturday

The official "Kick-Off" date for the Cancer Crusade in Lincoln county will be Saturday, April 19.

The purpose of this fund raising campaign of the American Cancer Society is to "Save Human Lives." It is estimated that if present rates continue, cancer will strike one in four Americans.

Cancer is the number two killer of men, women and children. It is estimated that if present rates continue, 40,000,000 Americans now living will develop cancer.

More children from 3 to 15 years of age die of cancer than from any other disease. Radiation and surgery, used together or individually, will cure many cancers if treatment is started in time. Last year approximately 150,000 men, women and children were saved from dying of cancer by early detection and prompt treatment.

Formed in 1913, the American Cancer Society is the only volunteer agency of laymen, doctors and scientists which supports a comprehensive program of education, service to the cancer patient, and research for the control of cancer. The Society is composed of 60 chartered Divisions covering the entire United States and Alaska.

Through district, county, city and community organizations, divisions translate the Society's program into action. Financial support of the American Cancer Society is obtained from the public through the annual campaign in April which has been set aside as Cancer control month by act of Congress and proclamation of the President of the United States.

Of the dollars contributed, 25% goes to a nationally administered research program; 60% is retained by the division and used for education and service to patients; 12% underwrites the national program of public and professional education, service, fund raising and administration; and 3% is devoted to medical grants and clinical fellowships awarded to medical and scientific organizations.

Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Crusade Chairman of Lincoln County (except for Ruidoso) emphasizes that the annual campaign of the American Cancer Society provides everyone an opportunity to do something concrete about cancer . . . to strike back at a disease that threatens us all.

"Upon what you donate this spring" she says "will depend next year's programs of research, education and service. The more you give, the stronger the attack on cancer. Please give generously!"



Organization support is no sure route to victory but candidates love to have it. How well the organized politicians can deliver will be on record after the May 13 voting.

Bursay seemed to be making up in popular sentiment what he was not getting from the organized Democrats. Members of the big state central committee who gathered here last week reported growing favor for Bursay among the ordinary voters in several parts of the state.

Filo Sedillo's effort to overturn the party machinery for selection of a congressional candidate for the Dempsey place showed the old Simms crowd still in control of the party.

Charles Spann of Albuquerque, a "palace guard" in the Simms administration and chairman of Albuquerque Democrats during the period, led the floor fight in the central committee meeting here last week that defeated the Sedillo movement.

William Salmon of Mora who was high in the Simms crowd but broke with them later, accused the Spann group of trying to suppress discussion of the Sedillo proposals and added: "Those are the tactics that defeated John Simms in 1936.

"The methods of these Burroughs people," he said, referring to the Simms group that is now behind Burroughs, "have driven me into the Bursay camp."

Here's how it was after the central committee meeting: Sedillo, Demo chairman of Valencia, had attempted to throw out the executive committee of ten which has the legal authority to name the party's candidate for the congressional place, and replace it with another larger committee.

Defeat of the proposals left the old committee in control with members selected by John Simms and with quite a number of the members subject to guidance by the group that is pushing Burroughs for governor.

Voting on the issue split along racial lines more than on the Simms and anti-Simms line.

Algebra Aptitude Tests to be Given

J. T. Clegg, supt. elect of the Carrizozo schools states that an algebra aptitude test will be given early in May to all present Eighth-Grade students in the Junior high school and Santa Rita elementary school.

The test is a part of the preparation for the spring pre-registration program for the new Freshman class.

"The recent emphasis on the selection and training of young men and women in the mathematics and science fields in connection with present world conditions," Mr. Clegg says, "makes apparent the real need for critical guidance instruments in these areas.

"Not everyone is interested in mathematics, although some mathematical training for all may be highly desirable; and furthermore, not everyone is equipped with the qualities which make for successful work in this field.

"The importance of finding and training individuals to think rapidly and accurately in mathematical terms today is so great that we educators cannot afford to guess.

"In the past, teachers' judgments plus results from group tests of mental ability have been widely used as a basis for the selection and guidance of students in mathematics.

"In some fields, tests of general ability have proven to be very useful, but for some reason success in mathematics does not seem to be highly correlated with general intelligence as has commonly been supposed. Recent research has made it very clear there is a real need for accurate and objective aptitude tests in high school mathematics courses."

Elementary Schools Plan for May Day

The Carrizozo elementary and junior high school are planning a May Day program, according to J. T. Clegg, elementary principal.

The program will be presented in the high school gym for the parents and local citizens, on the evening of May 1 at 7:30 p.m.

Each one is extended a cordial invitation to be present and enjoy the May Day festivities. The program will vary to some degree from previous May Day programs. Physical activities and physical exercises will be stressed in most of the numbers.

Mr. Clegg states it is the objective of the planning committee and the teachers to have from 200 to 225 pupils participating in the May Day program. The presentation of the colors, pledge of allegiance to the flag and the Maypole dance are among the many numbers to be presented.

Benefit concerts were held in the church, with lovely singing by a quartet composed of Mr. and Mrs. John Leighner, Mrs. Frank Carpenter and Mrs. William Watson. The music was piano, organ, flute, violin and bass violin. Admission was fifty cents.

There was a good library in the church and Christmas entertainments, a wonderful program, and always old Santa; a large fir tree reaching to the ceiling, and the largest doll was always placed on high—all the little girls wondering who would get that doll. The women would make sacks for candy and nuts, and old Santa would see that each child got a sack of candy, an orange and apple. Most gifts were home-made and greatly appreciated.

We drove from the ranch one Christmas eve to the entertainment. When we came out after it was over, it had snowed quite a bit. When we all got into the buggy to go home, we thought something was strange. Well, there was some of the older boys had changed the back wheels to the front, and front wheels to the back (the back wheels being intact, it was strange) but it didn't take long to remedy the situation.

Another time at Christmas, the time we got half way home the snow was so deep we had to leave the buggy the walk home. The children always hung their stockings around the fireplace for old Santa to fill.

We had a big money bank at the Sunday School for birthdays. Everyone who had a birthday had to put as many pennies in the bank as the person was old. I always tried to buy a good book for each of my children for their birthday.

For reading we had the Saturday Evening Post, the Youth's Companion, Saturday Blade, the Chicago Ledger, St. Louis Democrat and Kansas City Star, published at that time. The school house was built in 1894 by the Gunn Brothers. We had the very best teachers and it was one of the finest schools in New Mexico.
