Carrizozo Now on REA Power Line; Plant Engines Are on Standby Basis

Another chapter in Carrizozo's electric power service began Tuesday afternoon when a switch was thrown, delivering REA power to the town.

Mayor Wayne Withers threw the switch connecting the new Otero County Electric Cooperative sub-station with the municipal plant which now becomes a distribution point to distribute power instead of generating power.

The electric generators are now on a standby basis after supplying the town with power for 21 years.

It was in 1937 that J. H. Fulmer and John E. Wright built the power house and installed a Fairbanks-Morse diesel engine to generate electricity. Two more engines were later added.

In July 1942 the town of Carrizozo purchased the system from Messrs. Fulmer and Wright. In recent years two new diesel engines have been added to the plant.

Electric power was first brought to Carrizozo from White Oaks by D. L. Jackson and associates. Three steam engines there also generated power for the mines.

Messrs. Wright and Fulmer purchased the White Oaks power plant in 1915. The engines were put out of commission by a fire in 1934 and were later scrapped. A new Chuse 250 KW steam engine was installed to take care of the power needs, then principally in Carrizozo.

When the power plant was set up in Carrizozo, the Chuse engine was sold to run the Harris sawmill in Green Tree. It has since gone through two fires.

On October 31, 1895, she was married to Wm. Morgan Reilly.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Will Ed Harris of Carrizozo, Mrs. T. A. Spencer Sr. of Ruidoso Downs and Mrs. Z. L. Baclawski of Albuquerque; a grandson, Robert W. Allen and a granddaughter, Barbara Jeanne Brannum.

Help to Answer Grand Theft Charge

The Lincoln County's sheriff's office informed the News Tuesday that Juan Peyton was to be picked up and charged with grand theft.

By Sides of Tularosa has been arrested and charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. Arraigned in justice of the peace court, Sides pleaded not guilty. He has been released on \$500 bond and hearing set for district court September 13.

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

The story of the old Angus V 4 V Ranch, the Cree, Wm T. Kirby and the First Cattle Queen of New Mexico (as told to me by Mrs. Agnes Cree herself.)

"Sebe" Gray was Garrett's foreman, and brother-in-law, and Lute Jennings was the ranch cook. She said "Sebe" was too young for a big outfit, so they had to have some big rough and ready guy. Rufus Russell came along about that time, and they put him in charge, and paid him \$75 a month, and hired him for a year at a time. Then they began to buy cattle and water.

They bought all of the Ruidoso from Greentree to the Indian Reservation, a quarter mile wide and eight miles long, (except the Wingfield Ranch) and most all the springs for miles around. About 1902 they leased about one-half of the Mesalero Indian Reservation, and fenced their part. Fount Miller was her foreman at that time.

I never knew Mr. Cree Sr. He died a few years after they came over. Then Kirby and Jimmie Jr. took charge. When Mrs. Cree saw what a mess the boys were making of it, she took over and tried to make it pay.

It seemed the boys couldn't get along with the foreman. Rufus Russell beat up on Kirby and ran him off and told him he would kill him if he came back. So he went to Fort Stanton and got some soldiers to come back to the ranch to protect him. Then Mrs. Cree paid Russell for his interest he had in the company.

Jimmie got along very well for a while, then he had trouble with Russell, and he fired him, but Russell wouldn't quit because he was working by the year. So she had to give him a whole year's pay. After that, they had several real nice boys men who ran the outfit for several years, like Pat Burleson, Harry Edmondson, Fount Miller, and George J. Upchurch.

But one of her foremen turned out to be a real scoundrel. After she put him in charge she found out he couldn't read or write. He just could write his own name, but that was all. He couldn't read at all. She sent off and got some books and put in most of the winter teaching him to read and write.

About this time, there was an old man moved into these mountains, and he and his boys were butchering V cattle and peddling the meat in the nearby towns. Someone told Mrs. Cree what was going on, and she asked her foreman about it, and he said he had heard that, but didn't want to say anything to her until he could catch the rustlers. She called in her book-keeper and general manager. He said he hadn't heard it, but would look into it, and let her know what was going on.

A few days later the book-keeper came in and told her that her foreman had written a letter and told the gang the officers were on their trail, and for them to get up and leave " pronto."

She said, "I don't believe it." He said, "I can prove it."

She said, "You get that letter and give it to me, and if he has written a letter like that, I will give you a dollar for every word that is in it."

He pulled a letter or note from his pocket and said, "Here it is."

When she unfolded it, she almost fainted, for she recognized the handwriting at a glance. She read it over and over. Then she said, "I just can't believe it. But that letter is proof."

She buried her face in her hands for quite a while. Oh, it must have been a real shock. Her best friend, who had been so close to her for a year or more. Here she was, an old lady, and you might say, all alone. All her people were across the ocean. Not even a woman friend, except her cook. Some time later, when she told me about all this, I just wondered.

I guess she must have been pretty cold blooded. She had disinherited two of her children, and wouldn't speak to them when she met them on the street in Edinborough, Scotland, nor let them come to her home to see her. She told me that too. So I guess it wasn't very hard for her to tell an old cowboy where to head in.

She told Mr. Hudspeth to tell the boss to come to her office, and she said, "You come with him in case..." She didn't say what, but only "in case." I don't believe she was afraid, because she wasn't afraid of anything much.

When they came in, she said, "Don't sit down, it won't take long to attend to my business. Here is your check in full and your time."

She showed him the letter, but didn't give it to him.

He said, "Where did you get (Continued on Back Page)

Kennecott Corporation Pays \$1 a Share

New York, N. Y.—At the meeting of the board of directors of Kennecott Copper Corporation held August 15, a cash distribution of \$1 per share was declared payable on September 22, to stockholders of record at the close of business on August 28.

Approximately 100 men will be recalled at the Chino Mines Division of Kennecott Copper Corporation here and in Santa Rita when the division increases its work week from five to six days early in September, W. H. Goodrich, Chino general manager, said this week.

Extension of the operating work week will increase copper tonnage from 26,000 tons per month to 29,000 tons in the Western Mining Division. The company early in August increased tonnage from 26,000 to 26,100 when it extended the work week from four to five days.





that letter?" She said, "That is my bible. Now you pack your things and leave this ranch as fast as you can, and get off and stay off."

"Now," she said, "Mr. Huff, speth, you stay with him and see that he only takes what he longs to him."

He left right straight then, saddled his horse, and went in his sister's ranch in the Capitan Mountains. I don't think Mrs. Cree saw him any more, but soon after that, he married and settled down in that country, and stayed there until he died.

The next man to take over was Fount Miller, a stalwart Texan who had come from Baton, N. M., to Lincoln County. He had already been working for her when his appointment came. He was an honest and efficient man.

Mrs. Cree thought a lot of Miller. During his three or four years he did more to consolidate the ranch than any of the other foremen. The men all respected him and he them.

As soon as Mrs. Cree was able to leave the western half of the Mesalero Apache Reservation, she put an average four-wire fence around their part, which they had leased for pasture. This was quite an undertaking, lasting more than a year, with a good crew.

When the job was finished, Mrs. Cree gave George J. Upchurch a \$50 gold watch and a \$50 saddle, the like of which would cost \$500 today — a top saddle horse. What good was a saddle without a horse, and now why own a horse without some cattle? So she gave him his choice of a down fine calves.

After the pasture was fenced, Fount Miller did a remarkable job of rounding up all V Basin cattle. They were scattered over the country, even as far as Pecos, near Roswell.
