County's Assessed Valuation Increases About 1/2 Million \$

Three Lincoln county municipalities will have higher tax bills, for all purposes, this year compared to last year, while two incorporated towns will pay a lower rate.

The Hondo school district's tax bill this year will be less per \$100 assessed valuation—\$2.69 for 1958-59 compared to \$2.83 for the 1957-58 taxable year.

The county's assessed valuation for tax purposes increased \$469,925 over last year—

from \$14,192,140 to \$14,662,065. Three utility company tax declarations will add to the latter total, Marlan Schlarb, county assessor states.

State and county tax rates for the current tax year are less than last year in the amount of \$0.001172.

Santa Fe, Sept. 30—State School Superintendent Georgia Lusk has employed her brother, Charles Witt, as director of the surplus property agency in her department at \$300 a month.

It's a convenient arrangement with Mrs. Charles Witt also on Mrs. Lusk's payroll at \$400 in the free textbook division.

THERE'S A LAW AGAINST IT

There's a law against employing kinfolks but nobody gives it any mind.

An Act of 1923, 5-1-10 in the state compilation, says: "It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person elected or appointed to any public office or position under the laws of this state or by virtue of any ordinance of any municipality there-

of, to employ as clerk, deputy or assistant, in such office or position, whose compensation is to be paid out of public funds, any person related by consanguinity or affinity within the third degree to the person giving such employment, unless such employment shall first be approved by the officer, board, council or commission, whose duty it is to approve the bond of the person giving such employment:

"Provided that this act shall not apply where the compensation of such clerk, deputy or assistant shall be at the rate of \$300 or less a year, nor shall it apply to persons employed as teachers in the public schools."

NO BOND REQUIRED FOR SCHOOL CHIEF

The state superintendent of public instruction is not required to post a bond and therefore has no place to go for permission to put her family on the payroll.

There is some confusion about who is boss of the surplus property office Mrs. Lusk does the hiring and firing and the money for the office comes from her department but there is a possibility that the governor shares control of the agency.

If that should be cited as clearing Mrs. Lusk of nepotism in hiring her brother there is still the case of her sister-in-law who works in the textbook division of Mrs. Lusk's department.

POLITICIANS SNEER AT KINFOLKS LAW

The politicians have been sneering at the nepotism act ever since it went on the books, and the lawyers have been laboring the meaning of that "clerk, deputy or assistant" phrase in the law.

One attorney general held that a levelman in the highway department was neither clerk, deputy or assistant and could work for his dad.

Another AG opinion went like this: "Since a janitor is neither clerk, deputy or assistant to the employing authority, employment of the wife of one of the school board members by the board would not be prohibited by this section."

Farm Bureau to Have Foreign Trade Center

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 20—George J. Dietz, Chevy Chase, Maryland, director of international affairs for the American Farm Bureau Federation, has been named director of the farm organization's agricultural trade center to be established in Rotterdam, Netherlands.

The center, to be known officially as the Farm Bureau Foreign Trade Office, is expected to be in operation by late October, Charles B. Shuman, president of the nation's largest farm organization, said in announcing Mr. Dietz' appointment.

Announcement of Farm Bureau's plans to establish a trade center in Western Europe to promote and develop markets abroad for U. S. agricultural products was made last June 18.

Charge of Arson Follows Fire in Bar

Following a fire at midnight last Saturday at the Atomic Bar at Oscura, Wilbur Harris, colored, is being held in the Lincoln County Jail, charged with arson.

The bar was damaged by fire and smoke. A pool table and a music box were also damaged. Investigating officers report that waste rags were found on the floor of the men's rest room.

The Carrizozo Fire Department left for Oscura after a motorist noticed the smoke and turned in the alarm.

The bar is reported to have been closed for business several days prior to the fire.

Harris, who lives in Alamogordo, had been operating the bar. When arraigned in Justice of the Peace John Mackey's court, he entered a plea of not guilty to the above charge and requested a hearing. Date for the JP hearing has been set for 10 a.m., October 18.

Harris is being detained in lieu of \$3,000 bond.

SP to Cut 4 Hours off L.A.-Tucumcari Run

Southern Pacific announced recently that it will soon revise the schedule of its trains 39 and 40, cutting more than four hours from their runs between Los Angeles and Tucumcari. The changes will go into effect October 26.

Primarily mail and express trains, Nos. 39 and 40, which now take over 32 hours to make the trip, will cut their time to less than 28 hours, F. E. (Gene) Whiteher, SP's general freight and passenger agent, said in Phoenix.


The expedited schedules will be made possible by a new system of coordinated rail and truck movement which will not only cut the time of the trains, but will speed mail and express delivery to the towns along their route, Whiteher stated.

The trains will stop at major points along the way and simply drop off mail and express cars rather than wait while the cars are unloaded. Then trucks will take over the job, shuttling the mail and express to smaller communities in the area.

"New Mexico, Nucleus of the Southwest" is the title of a new brochure published by the New Mexico Economic Development Commission. Charts and maps give a composite picture of the state's growth which "in 1957 again outstripped the nation. The state's economic base expanded as a result of population gains (up 6%), total personal income (up 13%), and per capita income (up 7%) over 1956" . . . The state's present population is 891,300 and the predicted 1965 population 1,253,000. A chart shows the New Mexico population change from 1950 to 1957. Fifteen counties in the state showed a net loss in population and 17 showed gains, San Juan county leading with a gain of 179.9% (51,200) and followed by Otero county, with a 130.1% gain to 34,300. Lincoln county with a 1957 population of 5,000 gained 8% during the 1950-1957 period.

The brochure which is being mailed to business executives over America, concludes with the invitation: "Place yourself and your industry in the nucleus of the vital southwest—New Mexico. Come and see why New Mexico is a favorable location for business expansion, and why it is a land of dynamic growth and perennial prosperity. The people of New Mexico welcome you."

State Dept. of Agriculture
 Las Cruces, New Mexico

"Dear Mr. Rierson:

"I am in receipt of your letter of Sept. 15, stating that you have the information from the County Commissioners of Lincoln Co. that I am no longer a permanent resident of Lincoln county.

"While personal business matters have required much of my time outside the state for several months past, I have in no sense deserted the state or to the best of my knowledge neglected this or any public service with which I am now connected or render a service of any sort.

"It is indicated in your letter that the commissioners have requested that some person other than myself be appointed who could be more active than I have been, and in this connection I wish to inform you, that no one with any connection with a federal service, in this instance, The Bureau of Land Management, could be more active or more directly interested in land administration than I have been and am yet at this time.

"It is however suggested that any dissatisfaction which the commissioners feel is chargeable against my inactivity or lack of interest in the matter at hand should be referred to the Bureau of Land Management at Roswell New Mexico.

"Hoping you may be reassured of my continued residence and full cooperation and thanking you for the opportunity to correct a mistaken impression of which I have been unaware.

The danger they face in such strategy is the big dip in voting in Little Texas in the off-year elections when the country is not electing a president. The six counties of the area produced only 37,000 votes for governor in 1954 when John Slinms was going for governor against Republican Alvin Stockton, giving the Democrat a margin of 10,200. In the 1956 presidential year the voting in the counties zoomed to 55,000. A light turnout such as in the last off-year election would make it very difficult to accumulate the margin of 12,000 or more which the Democrat, John Burroughs, seems to need from the area in his run for governor.

JP HELPS POLICE PAY FOR PROBE

The famous state police investigation of gambling and suspected prostitution in Las Vegas last December was financed in part by money advanced the police investigators, Bob Miller and Arnold Payne, by Las Cruces Peace Justice Bob Kooztz, according to records in the state police office here. Kooztz is the JP who was criticized so much early this summer for allegedly monopolizing state police business in earning more than \$20,000 a year in fees. The officers were on the carpet for borrowing from the JP, a circumstance that contributed to a half-year delay in the officers being reimbursed for some \$530 they spent in the investigation. Payne, seven years on the force, seems to be on the way out. He's presently under investigation for physical disability and possible kinship with Capt. Pen Winston. The law prohibits relatives working on the police force.
