Town Board Discuss Paving Financing

Meeting Tuesday night, the Carrizozo town trustees discussed paving financing with M. J. Barlow of Omaha, Neb. He represents the Bonding Company which handled the financing for Carrizozo's light and power revenue bonds.

Mr. Barlow said his company would be interested in handling the pavement bonds if issued. In other town board business it was voted to dispense with the present position of utilities manager, effective within 90 days.

Tabled a letter from former patrolman John Connell asking for reinstatement. Took no action on single bid submitted to purchase the town's locker plant equipment.

Approved two building permits: To Frutoso Osorio to add bathroom to dwelling on Aspen st.; to Vincent Reil for 2-apartment dwelling, lots 4 and 5, block 7, Boulevard addition.

Safety Program at Junior High School

Extended interest in the field of both traffic safety and magic has brought about a unique program called "Safety Magic."

The program, featuring Sgt. Carl S. Pike will be presented October 15, at 10 a.m. at the Junior High auditorium for the Junior and Senior High student body. The public is also invited.

Combining his talents and experience in magic and safety, Sgt. Pike, currently on leave from the Kent County Sheriff's Dept., Grand Rapids, Mich., is making a tour of the United States under the national sponsorship of the American Trucking Associations, Inc.

Prior to spending over 13 years as a police officer and police safety officer in Jackson, Mich., he was a professional magician on the stage. During this time, he acquired many of the feats of magic and sleight-of-hand which he uses to illustrate the basic rules of safety.

With abouts of "Safety First" from the audience, Sgt. Pike delights the group with such stunts as pouring quarts of water from an empty jar, making flags spring from his sleeves, and other acts, each of which demonstrates a particular type of safety activity.

He begins the program with a short talk about several of the accident cases on which he worked and then goes on to explain how the mishap could have been avoided and perhaps saved lives. The sergeant then performs a trick related to the situation.

Already he has appeared in 42 states before audiences totaling well over two million. His presentation has been endorsed by many colleges and organizations including the New York University Driver Education and Safety Institute and the Michigan Association of Insurance Agents.

Scouts to Distribute First Aid Handbook

Cooperating with the Office of Defense and Civilian Mobilization Carrizozo Boy Scouts will distribute the "Handbook for Emergencies" to all households.

Jets Voss, scoutmaster, announced this week that about 14 local Scouts will distribute the handbooks this Saturday. The copies will be delivered personally to residents.

The home emergency handbooks will be delivered by Forty Scouts over the nation. Forty million books will be placed in homes by three and a half million scouts.

This important handbook contains information on first aid, makeup of a home first aid kit, what to do if fire breaks out, how to act in hurricanes or tidal wave disasters, what to know about tornadoes, flood emergencies, air raid precautions, and data about fallout and evacuation.

The 24-page pamphlet is described as "A handbook for all home emergencies."

Schools Adopt 4-yr. Educational Goals

On Thursday, October 2, J. T. Clegg, Carrizozo schools superintendent, and Bill Hall, superintendent of Capitan schools, attended a meeting in Santa Fe along with most of the other superintendents of the state.

This meeting was called by the State Department of Education to study Public Law 85-864 and setting up the state program. Public Law 85-864 was signed by the President on September 2.

"It becomes necessary for the State Department of Education and the local school units to set up a program in keeping with the provisions of this law, so our local schools can get educational benefits as provided in the act," Supt. Clegg stated this week.

Public Law 864 which in content is an Educational Law, will be better known as the "National Defense Educational Act of 1958."

The purpose of this act is to strengthen the National defense and to encourage and assist in the expansion and improvement of educational programs to meet the critical national needs.

The law consists of ten points or titles. Each of these titles deals with a particular phase of education.

Title I—General provisions.

Title II—Loans to students in institutions of higher learning.

Title III—Financial assistance for strengthening science, mathematics, and modern foreign language instruction.

Title IV—National defense fellowship.

Title V—Guidance, counseling and testing; identification and encouragement of able students.

Title VI—Language development.

Title VII—Research and experimentation in more effective utilization of television, radio, motion pictures and related media for educational purposes.

Title VIII—Area vocational education programs.

Title IX—Science information services.

Title X—Miscellaneous provisions.



Mrs. Helen Castle, principal of the Desco school, was a Carrizozo caller.


Mr. and Mrs. Leo H. Rudiselle of White Oaks left for Santa Monica to make their future home.

Tourists from All Parts of World Visit Old Courthouse

A total of 23,409 tourists visited the two State Museums in the town of Lincoln, New Mexico, during the first nine months of 1958. Of this number, 20,223 saw the historic exhibits at the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, and 3,186 visited the Old Tunstall Store, another frontier landmark in the town of Lincoln. The latter was opened to the public as a museum, by the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission in March of this year.

The register of visitors at these sites shows all parts of the world represented. There were visitors from the U. S. Territories, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, and from the neighboring countries, Canada and Mexico, South America was represented by tourists from Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Columbia and Venezuela. Tourists also came from England, Scotland, Ireland, Norway, Denmark, Belgium, France, Germany, Switzerland, Spain and Austria; and from far-away Ceylon, Australia and the Philippine Islands.

Heaviest traffic of tourists occurred during the months of June, July and August, when a total of 17,699 people were registered.

FARM NEWS

Control Cattle Lice By Spray Program

Spray your cattle this fall to protect them from the irritating attacks of cattle lice. Lice are usually present in small numbers on all heads of cattle during the summer, but winter is the time when they cause the most damage.

Even if you sprayed your cattle or had self-treating devices available to them for horntly control, you should still give your animals a thorough spraying before winter sets in. Sprays for lice should be applied with much more care and thoroughness than fly control sprays. Backrubbers help to keep lice in check and are a good supplement to a fall spray, but a thorough fall clean-up spray is a must for 100% control.

Be sure your sprayer is in good working condition. The spray must penetrate the animal's hair to be effective. At least 200 to 300 pounds pressure is necessary to do a good job. Check your spray gun, nozzle, pump, and hoses before you bring your cattle in for spraying. It's better to spend a little money on repairs before you start spraying than to break down in the middle of the job.

If your sprayer is equipped with a paddle-type agitator, then wettable powder or emulsifiable formulations can be used. If your sprayer doesn't have an agitator, use the liquid or emulsifiable insecticide formulations. No matter what formulation you use, read the label and make sure it's a product that can be used on livestock.

Ask your county agent for a copy of Circular 283, "Guide for Insecticide Dilutions," to help you figure the amount of concentrate to use to get a spray that contains the right percent of insecticide.

Protect your cattle from lice this winter with a good spray this fall.

State College, N. M. — Enrollment at New Mexico A&M College has increased 12% over the fall semester a year ago, final enrollment figures indicated this week.

The college has an on-campus enrollment of 2,667 students in its five schools. Final enrollment for the 1957 fall semester was 2,330 on campus.

Book Review: FITZGERALD AND THE BEST IN MAN

People somehow have a special, lopsided knack for noticing material success of others. Weekly magazines usually carry stories about men who have made fortunes through persistence and distribution of products people deemed essential to their happiness. A man with clear vision who allies his future with business is considered wise, while a man with clear vision who is keen on gardening or painting or writing is one some people consider foolish; it's not practical is one phrase that will be said; no future is another.

But while it should be recognized that the man who raises things from the soil experiences as much satisfaction as the man who buys shares cheaply and watches them rise, the salient point to remember is that any man is happiest doing things he enjoys.

It is a man's recognition of the things he is capable of enjoying that gives an air of purpose to his efforts. Things that bring personal happiness are in the foresight of all men—when they start through life. What happens along the way, during a man's pursuit of his goal is what makes the story.

Thoroughness of what makes the story shows in the intensity of his writing, which is why good writing contains substance of truth.

There have been few writers in the literature of this century whose thoroughness of perception matches that of F. Scott Fitzgerald; the thing he perceived most rapidly in each man was first what that person required for the achievement of happiness and second what he did to realize it. Quite likely Fitzgerald was so directly con-

LEGAL NOTICE

Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the General Election, November 4, 1938, in the State of New Mexico—

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 1 TWENTY-THIRD LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 2 INTRODUCED BY: SENATORS T. E. LUSK, HORACE DE VARGAS AND G. E. MELODY

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 7, SECTION 1 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW ABSENTEE VOTING.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 7, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Every citizen of the United States, who is over the age of twenty-one years, and has resided in New Mexico twelve months, in the county ninety days, and in the precinct in which he offers to vote thirty days, next preceding the election, except idiots, insane persons, persons convicted of a felonious or infamous crime unless restored to political rights, shall be qualified to vote at all elections for public officers. The legislature may enact laws providing for absentee voting by qualified electors. All school elections shall be held at different times from other elections.

The legislature shall have the power to require the registration of the qualified electors as a requisite for voting, and shall regulate the manner, time and places of voting. The legislature shall enact such laws as will secure the secrecy of the ballot, the purity of elections and guard against the abuse of elective franchise. Not more than two members of the board of registration and not more than two judges of election shall belong to the same political party at the time of their appointment."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 2 TWENTY-THIRD LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 3 INTRODUCED BY: SENATOR EARL E. HARTLEY

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO CREATE A STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC EDUCATION; AMENDING ARTICLE 12, SECTION 6 TO PROVIDE FOR AN ELECTED STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION WITH POWER TO APPOINT A SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, AND ARTICLE 8, SECTION 1 TO DELETE THE REFERENCE TO AN ELECTED SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"A. There is hereby created a "state department of public education" and a "state board of education." The state board of education shall determine public school policy and vocational educational policy and shall have control, management and direction of all public schools, pursuant to authority and powers provided by law. The board shall appoint a qualified, experienced educational administrator to be known as the superintendent of public instruction, who shall, subject to the policies established by the board, direct the operation of the state department of public education.

B. The members of the state board of education shall be elected at the general election next following the adoption of this amendment. One member shall be elected from each of the present ten judicial districts. The initial board shall determine by lot from its membership three members to serve terms of two years and three members to serve terms of four years. The remaining of the initial board shall serve terms of six years. Thereafter, as the terms of the initial board members expire,

their replacements shall be elected from the same districts for terms of six years.

If additional judicial districts are created the legislature may provide by law for the election by the people of a board of not less than seven members nor more than ten members from board of education districts, created by the legislature.

The governor shall fill vacancies in the board by appointment of a resident from the district in which the vacancy occurs. Appointments shall be made within sixty days after the vacancy occurs. The appointed member shall serve until the next general election, at which time a member shall be elected to complete the original unexpired term.

C. Board members shall be residents of the district they represent. Change of residence of a board member to a place outside the district from which he was elected shall automatically terminate the term of that member. The board members may be removed in the manner in which the legislature may provide by law."

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for the term of two years beginning on the first day of January next after their election.

Such officers shall, after having served two consecutive terms be ineligible to hold any state office for two years thereafter. The officers of the executive department except the lieutenant governor, shall during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government."

Section 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose and the effective date of the constitutional amendment proposed by this resolution shall be January 1, 1939; provided that the board members elected hereunder shall be elected at the general election next following the adoption of the constitutional amendment proposed by this resolution.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 3 TWENTY-THIRD LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 12 INTRODUCED BY: SENATOR JACK DANGLADE

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO PERMITTING GREATER DIVERSITY IN THE PRUDENT INVESTMENT OF THE STATE PERMANENT FUNDS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing or other securities. All losses from such interest bearing notes or securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state.

In making investments, the state investment officer, under the supervision of the state investment council, shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which businessmen of ordinary prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income as well as the probable safety of their capital; provided, not more than twenty-five percent of the permanent school fund or other permanent fund, shall be invested at any given time in corporate stocks and bonds nor shall more

than ten percent of the voting stock of a corporation be held; and provided further, stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to those stocks of businesses incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for ten consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which are listed upon a national stock exchange."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for the purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 32 of the state constitution to read:

"Section 32.—No obligation or liability of any person, association or corporation held or owned by or owing to the state, or any municipal corporation therein, shall ever be exchanged, transferred, remitted, released, postponed, or in any way diminished by the legislature, nor shall any such obligation or liability be extinguished except by the payment thereof into the proper treasury, or by proper proceeding in court. Provided that the obligations created by Special Session Laws 1935, Chapter 5 running to the state or any of its agencies, remaining unpaid on the effective date of this amendment are void."

give more of himself to his work. Between his desire to protect his sick wife and to produce good writing, Fitzgerald was held by conflict; thus the compulsive drinking. From 1920, when Fitzgerald's first novel was brought out, until he died in late 1940, he was always concerned with the plight of the good man who struggled to attain a worthy goal in life.

Fitzgerald's third novel "The Great Gatsby" (Scribner's 1925) was about a man named Jay Gatsby who came from obscure origins in Minnesota and who became a Long Island millionaire thru bootlegging and bond swindling. Gatsby did these things because he was haunted by a vision that was his idealization of love, personified by a weak-willed girl named Daisy Buchanan. And Gatsby struggled against almost impossible odds to rise high-enough to win her. For a brief time, he enjoyed achieving his final success, then

was destroyed by the very people he sought to stimulate. The irony of Jay Gatsby was that while he did many bad things and succeeded, he paid with his life—but in the name of love, which is why Scott Fitzgerald called Gatsby great.

After the success of the Gatsby novel, Fitzgerald's personal life deteriorated. He was abroad with his family when his wife collapsed and psychiatrists said she was schizophrenic. All the pressures bore in upon him and it led to the man's credit that he held so ever before, he was concerned with the plight of the good man but attaining a worthy goal. In life was replaced by the more direct problem of simple survival.

The result of Fitzgerald's great test with his wife was a good-sized, beautifully-written novel called "Tender is the Night," published by Scribner's in 1934. The book is not only Fitzgerald's greatest work but also one of the very greatest novels of our time. This fact was not quite so apparent in 1934, when the book was first published, because construction of the plot line detracted from the important part

of the story. But Fitzgerald later revised the book and in 1966, this version was brought out. Now everything is in proper perspective; the form and content of a true masterpiece can be recognized.

The hero was a psychiatrist named Dr. Dick Diver who falls in love with and marries his schizophrenic patient, Nicole Arden. In the course of their life together, she goes on living, sometimes a human being, sometimes a vegetable; either way, life is for her no trial.

But Dick Diver, that brilliant brain doctor who knew so much and gave so much, is destroyed. He is destroyed by her love and his, her money, her friends, her relatives, their cumulative stupidity.

It is almost like one of Henry James' stories where two people are divinely happy before marriage and then one member of the partnership withers away to nothing while the other grows more robust. But the difference between the Jamesian technique and Fitzgerald's is that in James' stories the destruction is due to vague, mysterious causes, while in "Tender is the Night," the destruction is spelled out completely and that is what makes the book valuable.

No other author has described so thoroughly the destruction of that all-important thing the intellect through exposure to upper middle-class stupidity.

While Fitzgerald presented the world with a modern object lesson in the story of Dick Diver's life, it may be seen that Fitzgerald relied on his own experiences for the material of "Tender is the Night." He was Dick Diver and the attack on Diver's intellect was in reality an attack on his own; the destruction was his, too.

The yarn was repeated in good humor, and in fact there has been very little malice or bitterness evident on any score against Burroughs who has kept his campaign on a clean and intelligent level as campaigns are usually judged.

The remark about supporting the party over the candidates was merely a statement of what the Burroughs managers seem to have in mind for a successful day November 4.

The lack of noise, the lack of advertising and the moderation followed by the campaigners all support an early forecast in this space that the Burroughs mentors would gamble on a light vote favoring their man.

IF THOSE DEMOS WOULD ONLY VOTE

Here's how it is with the parties: Democrats, at the last count made by State Secretary Natalie Buck in April, had 229,000 registered. Republicans counted 85,000 and there were 18,000 registered with neither party.

The Democratic preponderance is such that the Burroughs strategists apparently figure the party has enough regulars who always vote and vote straight to carry a small election.

After three unhappy experiences with zip, roaring campaigns against the Republican Machine they seem to have decided against awakening the dogs this time.

Supporting this plan is the Democratic trend that has been showing itself all over the country, a situation that favors the party's candidates if diverting considerations are kept out.

STRATEGY HAS NACIFINE PERIL

The danger in this plan lies in the possibility that the voters will mark for the familiar name of the incumbent rather than the unknown challenger.

The campaign has been so quiet that even the loquacious editors haven't been saying anything about it. The Albuquerque Journal which in past campaign years has run a Monday column of political editorials from other papers hasn't found enough this time to fill the space on any Monday.

LOYALTY WEAK ON BOTH SIDES

What talk there is in this campaign is mostly from Republicans causing Mechem and Democrats undercutting Burroughs. Republicans might find some solace in that situation there being 219,000 Democrats to get sore at Burroughs and only 98,000 Republicans to vote against Mechem.

If there is anyone with enough interest in this campaign to bet there is only one point on which a wager could be placed with confidence:

The number voting November 4 is going to be far below the 200,000 of the last election.
