Three out-of-town judges will be named to judge the outdoor displays. It is planned to have the Carrizozo street decorations in place on or before Dec. 15.

San Diego, Calif. (PHN)—Thomas J. Longley, machinist's mate second class, USN, son of Millard O. Longley of Carrizozo, aboard the USS Platte, is taking part in a Fleet Fleet Sticking Force Exercise, nicknamed "Barnstorm," during Oct. 13-17, off the coast of Southern California.

"Blue" offensive forces will train in launching carrier air attacks against a large land mass. Opposing "Orange" defenders will counter the attacks using submarines, aircraft and other modern weapons.

The exercises will include training in the use of guided missiles—the surface to surface "Regulus I," surface to air "Terrier" and air to air "Sidewinders" and "Sparrows"—representing the operational missiles in the Navy today.

The civil docket was called at 1:30 p.m., October 13.

In court October 14, Judge Scoggin granted a divorce in the case Alice Halladay, plaintiff, vs. Rondell Halladay, def. The custody of two minor children was awarded plaintiff.

In the case State vs. LaMarr Bailey, charged with grand larceny, a plea of not guilty was entered. Jury trial set for January 19.

In case State vs. Earl Crook, charged with accessory after the fact, the charge was dismissed and a substitute charge entered of petty larceny, to which a plea of guilty was made. Given 90 day deferred sentence and put on probation for that period. Assessed probation costs of \$300.

State vs. Frutoso Herrera, charged with assault with deadly weapon, the court appointed Justice of the Peace Alton Gray to conduct preliminary hearing.

State vs. Bonnie Montez, charged with breaking and entering, Judge appointed Justice of the Peace John Mackey to conduct preliminary hearing.

State vs. Ronald and Jimmy Stewart, charged with assault and battery. Case continued.

Judge Scoggin will reconvene district court October 23.

Claunch Services For Frank Maxwell

Funeral services were held Tuesday, Oct. 14, at the Claunch Presbyterian Church for Frank Maxwell, 72, who died early Sunday morning, Oct. 14, in Santa Fe.

Rev. Wm. Lytle, pastor of the Corona Presbyterian Church officiated at the church services and Carrizozo Lodge No. 41, A. F. & A. M., was in charge of the graveside service at the Claunch cemetery. Mr. Maxwell was a life member of the lodge.

He was born July 22, 1886, at Traer, Iowa. His family lived on a farm in Tappa County, Iowa, near the town of Traer.

In 1908 Mr. Maxwell came to New Mexico as a sheep inspector for the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It was in 1913 that he homesteaded in Claunch and he had made his home there since that time.

On April 7, 1912, he and Mary Warden were united in marriage. To this union were born two children, Warden McDowell Maxwell and Mary Frances Maxwell. Mrs. Maxwell died April 23, 1924.

On September 23, 1925, Frank Maxwell was married to Sarah Ratzliff and to them were born four children, one of whom, Alma Mae, died in infancy.



(From the files of the Lincoln County News, Oct. 14, 1938)

Smoky Wilson's Tub Zula Orchestra was to play for a dance at the grand opening of the Yuucca Cocktail Parlor.

The Carrizosa Fire Department made a gallant run to Nogal but was not able to save the Nogal Mercantile Company building. The 51-year old structure and adjoining buildings were destroyed by fire.

Arrangements were being made at Tularosa for the wedding of movie star Jane Clayton to Russell Hayden, also a moving picture actor.

The New York Yankees won the World Series from the Chicago Cubs in four straight games, the final one with a score of 3 to 2.

T. A. Spencer returned from San Antonio, Texas, where he visited his son, Lieut. Spencer Jr., who was taking a course in aeronautics at Randolph Field.

Mmes. R. E. Lemon, Ben S. Burns and Vance Smith attended an Eastern Star entertainment in Tularosa.

Senator Louise Coe was a delegate to the State Federation of Women's Clubs meeting in Silver City.

Joseph W. LaBino, feature writer, described Adolf Hitler as "the greatest mystery of our modern times—a man who feels within himself a god-like mandate to guide Germany's destiny."

40 Years Ago

(From the files of the Carrizosa News, October 18, 1918)

Will Bourne, who was born in Lincoln county, was killed in action in France, as was the brother-in-law of Frank Gurney while serving with a unit from Texas.

Two servicemen were victims of influenza, Pedro Analla at Camp Pike and Gladney White at Fort Bliss.

President Wilson, in a stiff note to Germany, said the United States would not consider proposals for peace while submarines of the German government were "engaged in sinking passenger ships at sea."

R. L. Young accepted the Democratic party nomination for judge of the Third Judicial District.

G. W. Bennett, a Civil War veteran, returned to Youngtown, Ohio, after spending a year at Parsons.

John Wright was supervising the transfer of a large boiler from White Oaks to the American Mine.

Hugh Combs returned to White Oaks to work at the power plant. I. A. Harry Dixon, with the Army Engineers in France, sent home the chorus of an engineers' song, which runs along some twenty odd verses. The chorus was:

He's a rambling bum
From Company E
An Army engineer;
He's gone to France
To shoot the pants
From off the German rear.
When he gets home
From Germany
A story you shall hear
That it doesn't pay
To get in the way
Of an Army Engineer.





Second, it will permit greater efficiency within the department through development of continuity of administration, free from the necessity for political campaigning every two years. Third, it will give the voters of New Mexico greater representation on the local level, with each judicial district electing its own member of the State Board of Education. So, Mr. Ortiz reminds that, for better state school administration, passage of Amendment No. 2 is a must. So vote yes on Amendment No. 2 in the November 4th general election.
