


Fort Stanton Greet Christmas with Nativity Scene and Gay Decorations



A Nativity scene, with live animals, is one of the outstanding features of Fort Stanton's celebration of Christmas.

A bright star shines, the carols of Christmas rise to the surrounding mountains, Santa pulls in his reindeer to wave a hand in greeting, as Old Fort Stanton prepares for its one-hundred-and-third anniversary of Christmas.

Established in 1855 as a military post, it is today New Mexico's modern and beautiful tuberculosis sanitarium. The patients, employees and staff invite you to visit this historic spot and share the beauty of this year's decoration.

A brilliant great star leads to the entrance of the hospital grounds. There gay Santas stand at each gate post with hands outstretched in welcome. The little gate house with its name in old-fashioned lettering, proudly wears a mammoth illuminated bow for this festive observance. A cut-out, life-size Santa with his sleigh and eight reindeer, climbs to the top of the power house.

Inside the gate, the four-foot star, steps over the nativity scene, where Mary, Joseph and a shepherd, in reverence, watch over the cradle of the Christ Child. A live donkey and two woolly sheep graze nearby as they did that first holy night in Bethlehem. "Silent Night," "Little Town of Bethlehem," and "Hark the Herald Angels Sing."

Fishing at Bonito Lake Discussed at Alamo Meeting

Setting the fishing season and other matters pertinent to Bonito Lake were discussed last Friday at a meeting in Alamogordo.

Present were Fred Thompson, director State Game Department; State Representative W. G. Bradley; Charlie Bird, conservation officer; Bert Pfingsten, Roy Owens of Alamogordo, conservation officer; Roy Barker, chief of fisheries; Richard Navarro, fisheries biologist; Duncan Campbell, president of the Otero County Wildlife Conservation Ass'n; Rolla Buck, Alamogordo city manager; Col. Bell and another officer from Holloman AFB, and several others.

The proposed dates for opening Bonito lake to fishing were June 1 through September 8—provided Bonito Lake is opened for fishing. It is said to depend principally on whether an arrangement can be made to pay for the cost of supervision.

City Manager stated that Alamogordo cannot police the lake without making a minimum charge for fishing privileges. He estimated the cost would be in the neighborhood of \$3500 for the 3-month period.

Repr. Bradley said at the meeting that he would sponsor legislation to permit the State Game Department to stock fish in municipally-owned reservoirs, even though a nominal charge is made for fishing.

The state's attorney general's office has ruled that under present law the State Game Department is prohibited from planting fish where a charge is made in addition to that for the regular fishing license.

Report Compiled on Bonito's Use

The number of visitors and fishermen at Bonito lake between June 1 and September 2, 1957, was compiled last spring by Mr. Buck and forwarded to the State Game Department. It showed:

Total cars	4,886
Total visitors	17,908
Total fishermen days	2,608
Fishing permits sold	1,300
Total revenue	\$3,748.36

The six communities from which the most cars came were: Roswell 777, El Paso 660, Alamogordo 440, Ruidoso 240, Carlsbad 150 and Carrizozo 140.

After receipt of Mr. Buck's survey, the State Game Department made the following memorandum on Bonito lake:

"Surface area 45 acres; suitability high; fishing pressure 1, but fish allotment should be cut in half, in that the lake would open only three months this year (1957). A total allotment would be 7,450 pounds, half would be 3,725 pounds, or about \$3,725 worth of trout."

MAY REMOVE ROUGH FISH FROM NOGAL LAKE

The removal of rough fish from Nogal lake was also discussed at the meeting.

Mr. Navarro stated that due to the present low water level in Nogal lake and to the fact that Alamogordo is not at present using water from Nogal lake, this winter would be a good time to clean out the rough fish.

Mr. Buck said that Alamogordo had no objection to such a plan but that formal approval would have to come from the city council.

Approval from the State Health Department would also have to be secured before the lake is rotenoned to kill the fish.

Rotenone is not injurious or toxic to human being or to animals.


Charlie Bird states that if final decision is made to proceed with cleaning out rough fish in Nogal lake and when details are completed, the job will be probably be undertaken in January.

The fish so treated are edible, he states, and the public will be notified of the date and those who wish to do so can gather up the fish.


COUNTY LEGISLATORS AT SANTA FE MEETING

Jan. 5 Closing Date for Grazing Applications
 The Las Cruces District Grazing Office, of the Bureau of Land Management has announced that January 5, 1959, is the closing date for filing Grazing Applications at their office for the season, March 1, 1959 through February 29, 1960, which is provided for in the Federal Range Code for Grazing Districts.

This closing date applies to the Border Grazing District No. 3 and the Tularosa Grazing District No. 4.

Federal Range allottees within these districts that do not hold a permit are required to make an application if they intend to make any use of the Federal Range allotted to them.

Those users who hold permits will be billed for the full numbers and season shown on their Ten Year Grazing Permit, unless they file an application for a change in use prior to the above closing date for receiving applications.

A survey of the New Mexico mineral industry is available from the U. S. Department of the Interior, Bureau of Mines, 224 New Customhouse, Denver 2, Colorado.

State Highway Dept. Issues Booklet on Access Driveways

The State Highway Department has just issued a revision of its regulations covering the design and construction of driveways on non-conforming access highways. Chief Highway Engineer L. D. Wilson said in Santa Fe last week.

In booklet form, the new regulations are a revision of the rules that have been in force throughout the State since 1933. The effective date of the new regulations was December 3.

Under New Mexico law, the State Highway Commission is charged with determining all policies relating to the design of state highways and public roads. As the highway, street, or road includes the entire width of the right of way, the approach to private property is an essential design feature that comes under the jurisdiction of Highway Commission regulations.

The new booklet issues a reminder that property owners must obtain a driveway permit from the State Highway Department "before any work shall be undertaken within the limits of a state highway right of way," either rural or urban.

Wilson noted that application forms for these permits can be obtained from any district highway office or from the Maintenance Division of the State Highway Department in Santa Fe. The district highway offices are located in Albuquerque, Deming, Las Vegas, Roswell and Santa Fe.





BLAZER'S MILL

How many times have you driven by a broken shell of adobe to U. S. 70 near the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation for a week end or day of summer or winter sport?

On any of those trips have you stopped to read about these remains of the old Blazer Mill, setting for one of the first battles of the Lincoln County War in which Billy the Kid figured so prominently?

About eight years ago the walls, which were dangerously cracked, were knocked down to their present condition as a safety precaution for picnickers or sightseers in the area.

Originally a sawmill from which lumber was purchased for repair of buildings at Ft. Davis and Ft. Bliss, Texas, and Ft. Selden and Ft. Stanton, N. M., it was obtained by Dr. J. H. Blazer in exchange for a freighting outfit.

The mill, which was in operation before 1840, was converted. A. N. Blazer, son of the doctor, invented a water wheel which supplied power. It was unique and did not require repairing after 15 years of steady operation. By 1917 the mill was the largest in what is now Otero county.

A. N. Blazer, who even imported a few carloads of wheat each year to keep the mill in year round operation, witnessed the Lincoln War shooting which took place on April 5, 1878. He was a boy of eight.

State Game Dept. News

The San Andres-Organ special deer season was rated very good, with 1380 hunters taking 499 deer, a 36 per cent hunter success.

Waterfowl hunting is good to fair in the Rio Grande valley from Socorro to Las Cruces, best near head of Elephant Butte and Caballo reservoirs. Decoys and retrievers assure the best results.

Quail season ended with few hunters afield. Shooting was good and the birds were very wild. Feed and cover were excellent. A good carry-over remains for next year's brood stock.

FISHING REPORT

Southeast Area: Catfish good on the Pecos between Lakes McMillan and Avalon. Crappie good on Lake McMillan. Trout good on Alamogordo Reservoir with spinners and salmon eggs. Alamogordo Reservoir good on crapple too, late afternoons and at night.

Southwest Area: Very little fishing. Trout good on Rio Grande between Elephant Butte and Caballo and in the Del Rio drainage

canal near Las Cruces. Spinners, worms, salmon eggs and shrimp best baits. Bear Canyon Reservoir good to fair on bass and sunfish; a few cat on bait.

INSPECT WATERSHED PROJECT
The proposed Tramperos Creek watershed project was inspected last week by the Soil Conservation District Conservationist and Fish and Wildlife Service and the Game Department personnel.

The site, southwest of Clayton is being tested for feasibility of erecting dams. The Game Department hopes to participate in developing impounded waters for fishing and waterfowl.

Under a Federal Aid project the Department contribution would be in the nature of supplying riprap to make the dam safe for permanent storage of water.

BROWN TROUT EGGS COMING
A first shipment of 450,000 brown trout eggs has been received by the Game Department, of a total order for 1,250,000 from outside sources. Another shipment of 250,000 is due. Brood fish at Parkview Hatchery have produced 100,000.

The eggs will be hatched at Pecos, Red River, Seven Springs and Parkview hatcheries. When the

fry are about a month old they will be planted. Some of the streams to receive the plants are the Pecos, Rio Grande, Chama, San Juan, Animas, Rio Pueblo, Cimarron, Mora, Ruidoso, Jemez and the Red River.

GIVE SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS WITH NEW GUNS

Are you giving your boy a gun for Christmas? "If so," warns Director Thompson of the Department of Game and Fish, "give him the know-how for safe enjoyment of the cherished gun."

Thompson urges parents to give gun-safety instruction if they are qualified, or to put the new gun owner in touch with someone who is qualified. Gun safety is taught in some of the public schools and in some Scout troops. Conservation officers can inform you of other local facilities for obtaining gun safety instruction.

It is the responsibility of parents, says Thompson, to see that the gun doesn't "backfire" into a family tragedy. Copies of the Ten Commandments of Safety are being distributed to sporting goods stores to include with every gun purchased. Additional copies are available at all offices of the Game Department.

Many New Mexicans Celebrate Holiday of The Twelfth Night

Santa Fe.—Twelve days after most Americans have put away the thoughts and trappings of Christmas, many people in New Mexico are celebrating the ancient holiday of Old Christmas, or Twelfth Night.

January 6—the Feast of the Epiphany—celebrates the arrival of the Three Wise Men in Bethlehem. Still an important holiday in many parts of Europe, Twelfth Night was first observed in New Mexico by 16th Century Spanish colonists. Today, the tradition is carried on by the Spanish-speaking descendants of the Conquistadores, and by many of New Mexico's Pueblo Indians.

The Pueblo Indians live in 18 adobe villages, many of which predate the Spanish conquest. They were Christianized by Franciscan friars who accompanied the Spanish conquerors, but have retained much of their traditional Indian religion over the centuries. For them, Twelfth Night is a day of giving, as Christmas is to most Americans, and also the official beginning of the New Year.

At many of New Mexico's Indian pueblos, ceremonial dances are performed on January 6, and a festival atmosphere pervades the village. Many Indian families prepare feasts for visiting friends, big meals of stews, corn, tortillas, home-made bread and chile — all traditional Pueblo fare.

New pueblo governors are also

installed in office on January 6. According to various customs, the pueblo governors are either elected by popular vote the preceding autumn, or are selected in secret meeting by the caciques, or religious leaders of the pueblos.

When they take office, the new governors receive their historic canes of authority. In the early days of Spanish rule in New Mexico, Pueblo leaders were presented with silver-headed canes, signifying their authority over the people of their pueblo. After New Mexico became an American territory, President Abraham Lincoln presented the Pueblo governors with similar canes, made of ebony.

Ceremonial dances presented at the pueblos on Twelfth Night vary from village to village. Most frequently, the Indians perform "animal dances," in which the dancers dress as Buffalo, Eagles or Deer. These colorful dances are a form of prayer for strength, success or good hunting. Sometimes the Pueblo people perform dances they have borrowed from the Plains Indians to the east, such as the exciting Comanche dance, or the athletic War and Hoop dances.

MEXICO TODAY

BY KARL GUTHMANN

Taking over the Presidency of Mexico only a few days ago, Lopez Mateos now has a cabinet of distinguished lieutenants, each with a background of years of service in government which has the confidence of those in all walks of life. The new President, a lawyer and diplomat, is one who came up the hard way, working his way through school and forging ahead by his own initiative and fair dealing with the masses.

His campaign pledge of a minimum wage of 25 pesos (\$2 for an 8-hour day) won the confidence of the masses with the result that he carried every state in the Republic in the general election with the exception of San Luis Potosi.

That there must come a higher wage for the worker is the belief of the tourists, those who contact those in the lower brackets and learn that the customary wage for the store clerk, table waiter and others in the white collar class is 10 pesos (50 cents) a day. Many in the catering establishments are paid no wage at all, but subsist on tips alone. Carpenters, bricklayers and others of the skilled crafts earn from \$5 to \$7 a week while office secretaries and school teachers receive from \$35 to \$40 monthly, depending on ability.

Promotion of manufacturing industry is another aim of the new president, this being a move to employ much of the excess manpower of the country. Presently, aside from building in the cities and agricultural pursuits in rural areas, Mexico has little employment, hence outside capital is being wooed to establish industries here.

came in contact with a young American engineer who had flown in from Detroit by the American Can Company to lay the groundwork for a plant which is to produce tin containers and employ several hundred men. Throughout the years cans have been shipped in from the USA, but high labor costs in that country has brought the necessity of manufacturing at home. At a nearby glass plant, manufacturing Coca Cola bottles, it was found that altho silica (white sand) comes from the home state of Jalisco, the large amounts of soda ash and arsenic required now come from Germany, replacing the supply originally gotten from the United States and now made prohibitive on account of mounting labor costs. All popular brands of tires made in the state are now produced here with Mexican labor and cost to the consumer is quite lower than in the United States. Too, Coca Cola, Pepsi Cola, 7-Up and Canada Dry are big sellers here, all produced in their own plants. Contrary to general belief, Mexicans are not drinkers of hard liquors, but during siesta hour (from 2 to 4 p.m. each day) when all popular places of business close for the rest hour, groups from offices and stores can be seen in the lunch rooms and drinking places quietly sipping on some soft drink or possibly coffee or Nescafe. At no table can be seen a member of the fair sex puffing on a tag, a la Americano; there is no loud talk or heated argument such as is found in towns of any size throughout the United States.

Revelation is Lake Chapala today to one who visited here just a year ago. This body of water, located 32 miles from Guadalajara, is normally 70 miles in length and 10 miles at its widest point, but for the last seven years has been gradually shrinking in size until the resort hotels and entertainment spots which were originally at the waters edge were finally almost a mile inland.

On a December Sunday of last year when this writer visited the resort town of Chapala was the occasion of a pilgrimage and trek of some 50 thousand farmers, Indians, Natives and those in all walks of life who gathered there before an improvised altar in mid-street to unite in prayer for the coming of water to fill the lake, the source of livelihood of those numerous truck farmers in shore areas, hundreds of others earn a living of nightly mending the long nets to drag out tons of "pesado blanco," a silver-white herring which fetches like lemon sole. Strangely enough, now only a few months after the united street prayer, Lake Chapala is filled again and daily there is water riding, boating and resort frolic, this aside from contentment in the hearts of those who very life depends on the goodness of Lake Chapala.

Long a land of no middle class (there's a top and a bottom) Mexico is on the road to an economic revamping—that's the belief of the commanner, those who look to newly inaugurated Lopez Mateos for salvation.
