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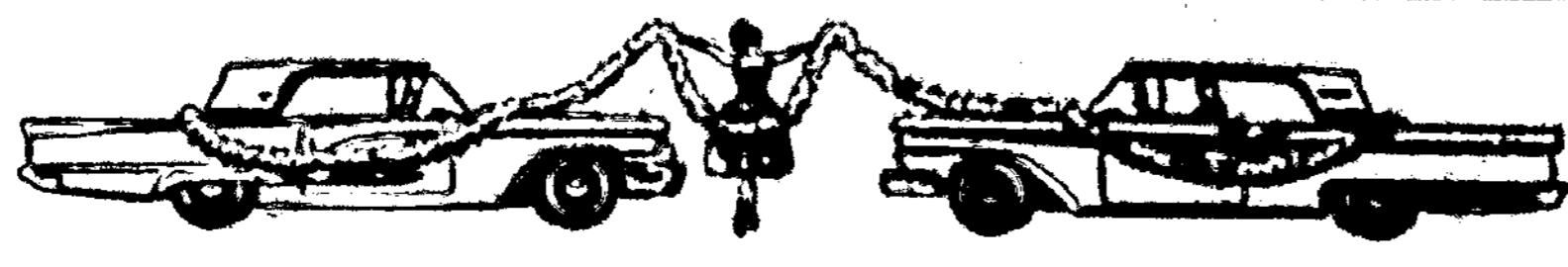
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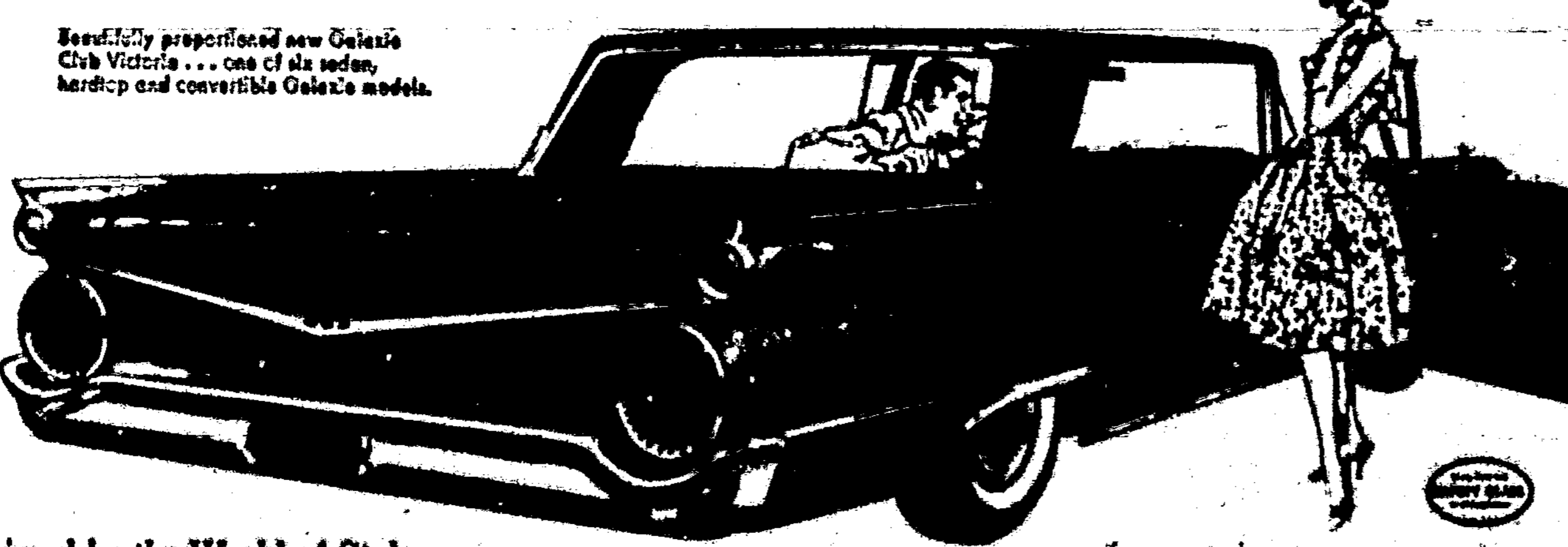

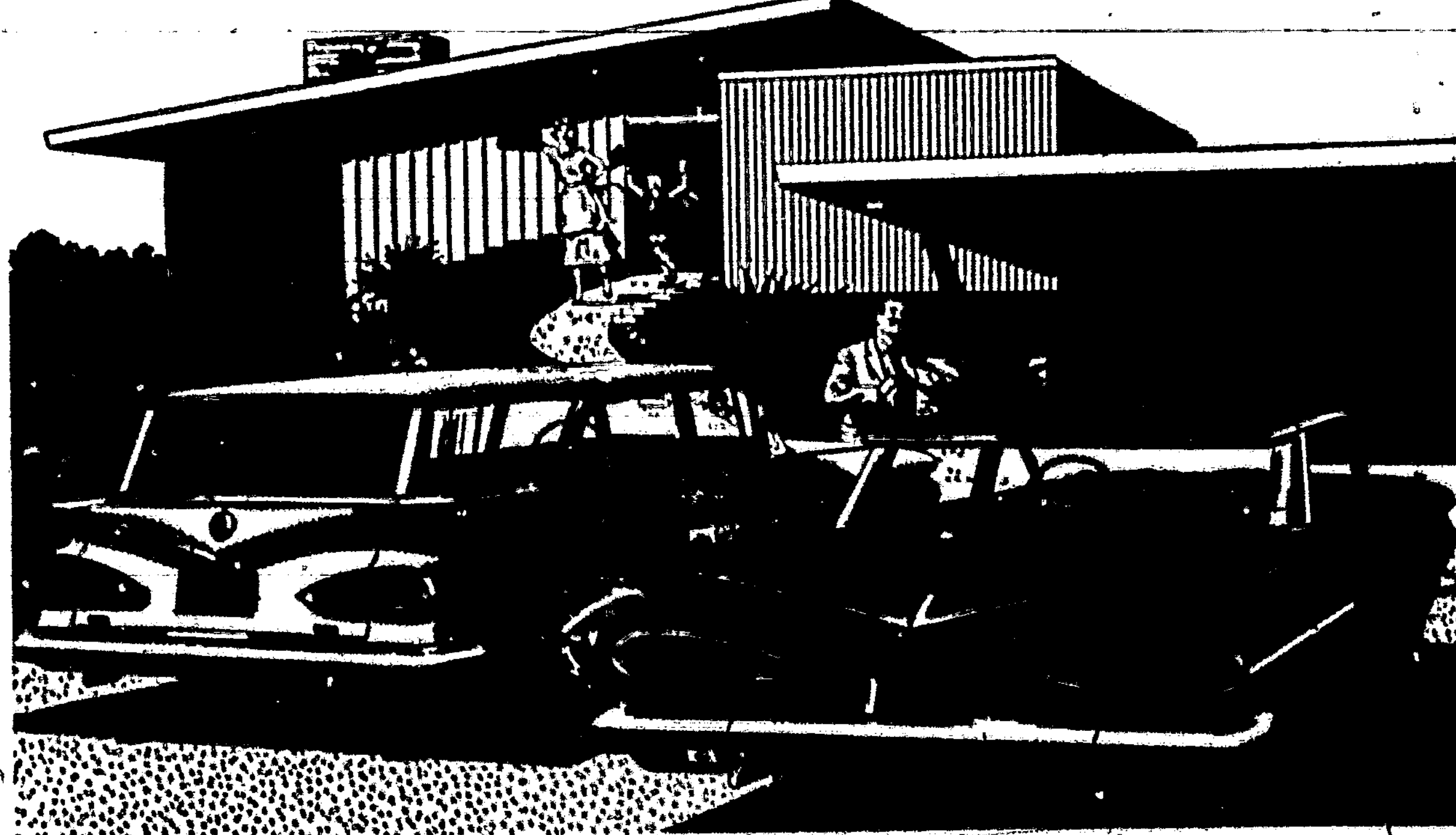

**SAN ANDRES-ORGAN HUNT TABULATED**

were due possibly to mineral lack  
in the diet, according to Biologist

## More Info Needed on N. M. Place Names

One hundred New Mexico place names have no places to which they can be attached, and the New Mexico Folklore Society wants to provide some.

The Society needs information giving a geographical location for these place names, whose "places" for the most part, no longer exist. The information is needed so the places can be included in the forthcoming Dictionary of New Mexico Place Names.

Anyone with information concerning the whereabouts of the following places is asked to contact Dr. T. M. Pearce, of the University of New Mexico, editor of the publication.

Lincoln County has four "dislocated" places—Carolita, Rivalis, Murray, and Ramirez. Another four—Balanzuela, Contradero, Towanda, and Victor—are said to have once existed in Socorro County.

## Three Changes Helpful To Farmers in Filing Income Tax Returns

Farmers have three major changes to deal with this winter in filing federal income tax returns. In most cases, the changes will be a help.

The first one is in depreciation for machinery and equipment. For new or used farm personal property which you bought after January 1, 1958, you can write off 20% of the cost as first-year depreciation. And this is in addition to the regular depreciation on the balance.

Take an example. Suppose you bought a \$2,000 baler last January, with an expected life of 10 years. The 20% depreciation for 1958 is \$400. Then from the remainder (\$1,600), less salvage value (\$200), take 10%. This will be \$140. Add this to the \$400 and your total allowed deduction is \$540. Under the old "straight line" system of other years, the 1958 depreciation deduction for this machine would have been \$180.

But remember: the new system will make the deduction smaller in coming years, so it won't make too much difference in the long run. It could, however, help a farmer who needs the added deduction in a year of high income.

The second change is in net operating losses. They may now be carried back three years, instead of just two, to offset past profits. And losses not fully offset in the three past years can still be carried forward.

Third, there's a change that may favor farm family corporations. Corporations with less than 10 stockholders and only one class of stock may choose to be taxed as partnerships. Then each shareholder reports his share of the corporation's taxable income. This eliminates double taxation—a tax first on corporate earnings and again on dividends. Shareholders making this choice need to do so during the first month of the tax year.

## New Cash Prizes for Winners at New Mexico Science Fair

Socorro—Awards to winners in the 1959 New Mexico Science Fair next April will total at least \$1000 as the result of two new cash prizes, Dr. Burrell Wood, Jr., state fair director, has announced.

This is in addition to the top prizes of expense-paid trips to the National Science Fair at Hartford, Conn., next May for two top winners and a five-day cruise at sea for one boy as the guest of the Navy.

The seventh annual state science exposition will be held April 11 in the Research Building on the campus of New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology under the co-sponsorship of NMIIT and the Albuquerque Journal.

The new awards are \$50 each from the New Mexico Pharmaceutical Assn. and the New Mexico Heart Assn. The state drugists will give \$50 for the best exhibit in biology or chemistry dealing with drugs. The Heart Assn. will present \$30 to the student exhibiting the best senior biology exhibit and \$20 to the best biology display in the junior exhibit.

The New Mexico Medical Assn. will present a \$500 scholarship to the top exhibitor in the field of biology or medicine. Many county medical societies give awards in local fairs.

The Albuquerque-Los Alamos section of the Institute of Radio Engineers has increased its scholarship award to \$300 for the best exhibit in the radio or electronics field. This is \$100 more than in previous years.

Dr. John Harty, former director of the fair, and Mrs. Harty, will present \$100 to the winners in the New Mexico Talent Search, which is held in conjunction with the Fair.

The Grolier Society will give a 10-volume set of science books for the best junior science exhibit.

The Navy has announced that, for the second straight year, it will select an outstanding student exhibitor for a cruise at sea next fall aboard a Navy warship. The winner must be a male sophomore or junior.

The Albuquerque Journal will send the top exhibitor in both the senior biological and physical science divisions to the National Science Fair in Hartford May 6-9.
