

Ranblin' Around Lincoln County

(The News is included in the Wheeler Museum of Reindeer and Caribou for the year of Vol. 1, issue No. 9 of the Capitan Mirror, published Thursday, July 5, 1950. The copy of the paper was addressed to subscriber H. M. Channing, its publisher, who Lightfoot and Williams and this issue featured an article on Billy the Kid. The story was said to have had popular acceptance at the time. It follows.)

EARLY DAYS IN LINCOLN COUNTY

After the Kid's escape a messenger was sent post haste for Sheriff Garrett at White Oaks. It is said that tears came in Garrett's eyes when he learned of the terrible fate of his two favorite deputies, and he at once started for Lincoln.

Nothing was seen or heard of the Kid for some time after his escape. Garrett had looked for him in all his former haunts, but could find no traces of him. About the first of July, 1881, Garrett became of the opinion that the Kid must be up in the Ft. Sumner country and he resolved to go there and look for him.

Garrett took as his companions and deputies, John Poe of Roswell and a Mr. McKinney. They arrived near Ft. Sumner on July 14, and Garrett sent Poe who was not known to the Kid, up to the town to see if he could learn anything of the Kid's whereabouts. The Kid was infatuated with a woman in Ft. Sumner and Garrett was of the opinion that he was around there. Poe came back to the camp, a short distance out of town, and told Garrett that he could hear nothing of the Kid.

Garrett felt pretty sure that Pete Maxwell, then living in Ft. Sumner might know something of the Kid's whereabouts, so he resolved to go up and see Maxwell. Garrett, Poe and McKinney arrived at Ft. Sumner just at dusk on the evening of July 15. Riding along the outskirts of town, when near Maxwell's house, they saw two men standing talking across an adobe wall. Garrett at once recognized the one on the outside of the wall as the Kid and the other as Pete Maxwell. The moon was shining brightly overhead and the two men could be seen plainly.

Garrett and his men waited for a short time, when the Kid went away in the direction of a Mexican adobe house and Maxwell walked up through the yard into his own house.

Garrett resolved to go in and see Maxwell and find out where the Kid was hiding. He went into Maxwell's house to see him, leaving Poe and McKinney just outside of the door in the hallway. Maxwell told Garrett that the Kid was being fed by a Mexican woman near by and was sleeping with him (Maxwell) and that he would be there as soon as he got his supper.

While Garrett and Maxwell were talking, a slim, feminine looking figure appeared in the door of the hallway. "That's him now," whispered Maxwell to Garrett. Two or three steps more, and the Kid was in the doorway of the room where Maxwell and Garrett were sitting on the bed talking. The Kid had seen Poe and McKinney in the hall and they recognized him as a Mexican and they spoke to him in Spanish. The Kid returned the salutations in Spanish. As the Kid stepped into the door of Maxwell's room he said: "Who is that out there, Pete?" (referring to Poe and McKinney). Just then the Kid noticed that there was someone sitting on the bed with Maxwell and he started to step backwards, drawing his gun at the same time. Garrett arose from the bed, and quickly drawing his revolver, fired. The shot hit the Kid square in the heart and he fell lifeless to the floor. Garrett fired a second shot but it passed over the Kid's head embedding itself in the door.

After the Kid was killed it was learned that he had started for some meat for his supper and on his way had gone by Maxwell's house.

William Hoxey, better known as "Billy the Kid" was killed on the evening of July 15, 1881. He was 22 years old at the time of his death and his record as "a killer" has but few equals. He is known to have killed 22 men and no one knows how many more he killed that have been credited to others.

In many ways, Billy the Kid was not devoid of honor and kindness. A number of stories are told of his good deeds of charity and willingness to take advantage of his associates when they were not armed.

Nogal Lake Yields Variety of Fish

3-lb. Bass Was "Last of Mexicans"

Charley Bird, district conservation officer, reports good results from last Saturday's treatment of Nogal lake for the removal of rough fish.

He gives the approximate poundage of fish removed as:

- 1500 pounds of carp—average weight, 3 1/2 pounds. 3500 pounds of ring perch—average length 3 inches. About 150 pounds of chub minnows.

About 200 pounds of rainbow trout—average weight slightly under a half pound. The trout were thin, due to the fact that, according to Mr. Bird, the rough fish were eating most of the lake's natural food. The rough fish, on the other hand, were fat.

Around two hundred people were at the lake at one time in the afternoon, shortly after 12 o'clock. Most of them secured fish.

Plans are to restock the lake after a period of six weeks, with stocking to be rainbow fingerlings. Keeping-size trout will be planted shortly afterwards, Mr. Bird says.

Nogal lake is open for fishing the year around. The average depth of the lake is from five to six feet, with the deepest part 11 1/2 feet. Treatment of Nogal lake was also the occasion for "Operation Cleanup." One and a half pickup loads of cans and rubbish were removed from around the lake.

The only unscheduled incident of the afternoon was when Malcolm Petree, reaching for a rope, lost his balance and fell into water waist deep. He reported it was "very cold."

Inside the Capital

PRISON REBUFFS POLITICAL RAID Santa Fe, Jan. 27.—An effort to turn the state penitentiary back to the political spoils system has been snuffed down by the prison board and prison administration.

Santa Fe County Democratic Chairman Johnny Vigil who attempted to bring prison employees under his political organization was told in no uncertain terms to stay off the premises by Board Member Ray Montgomery of Santa Fe, a Democrat, and prison bulletin boards were posted with a notice assuring all the institution's 204 employees that they were protected from arbitrary dismissal by the personnel merit system act of 1955.

Vigil had attempted to set up the jobs on a political endorsement system such as operated in the troubled past of the institution.

SAYS ALL UNTRUE AND DAMAGING The notice posted by Warden Theo Woodruff said in part: "Recently there have been recurrent rumors of many changes to come in the institutional personnel, all of which have been determined to be definitely incorrect and damaging."

"This situation has been thoroughly checked and I can assure all employees that the rumors that have been bandied about are untrue and that all are secure in their positions until charges have been brought against them, under the merit system, proving them to be unworthy of their jobs."

NEW BOARD, WARDEN HAVE FINAL WORD

Although the merit system operation seemed secured by the prison authorities' reaction to the Vigil raid the final answer won't be known until the new prison board is appointed and a new warden selected to replace Woodruff who leaves in March.

The prison has just completed the quietest and most orderly two-year period of operation that local people remember.

CHAIRMAN SAYS TAOS PUNISHED

J. B. Martinez, Demo chairman of Taos and one of the few northern county chairmen who doesn't have a public job, has charged that the Democrats of his county are being denied places in the bureau of revenue because of the Taos county vote for Sen. Dennis Chavez and against Johnny Walker, the bureau of revenue commissioner, in the Democratic primary last spring.

Writing as Spanish editor of El Cepusculo, Taos weekly newspaper, Martinez said that Walker had an "upset stomach" and could not meet with a Taos delegation at Santa Fe, and that job-seekers from the Costillo and Amalia precincts, the best in the county for Demo John Burroughs for governor, could not get an audience with the commissioner.

He said the people of Taos have always supported Senator Chavez and the Democratic state administration should not attempt to break their allegiance to the Democratic senator.

BURROUGHS PICKS LABOR OUTSIDERS

Governor Burroughs who had trouble with the AFL-CIO organization in his election run has brought in labor people from outside the big group.

Don Coppock of Las Vegas, the new state labor commissioner, is a member of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, an organization which operates outside AFL-CIO.

John LaNear of Albuquerque, a new member of the labor and industrial commission, is an officer of the Teamsters Union which has been suspended from AFL-CIO.

Vincent Bocerra of Silver City who is going on a small job in the bureau of revenue is a recent president of the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers Union at Silver City, the only labor organization that endorsed Burroughs. The union is outside AFL-CIO because of charges made half a dozen years ago of corrupt influence in the organization.

Magazine Describes Work at Holloman in Missile Development

When man jumps off into outer space he will owe much of his equipment, safety and knowledge to Holloman Missile Development Center in southern New Mexico, according to an article in the February issue of New Mexico Magazine.

In the article, "Springboard to Space," Steve Lowell credits the Holloman laboratory with not only producing test tools for future space travel, but the experts to explore the techniques of space travel.

Lowell lists, among essential preliminaries to leaving the earth several balloon ascensions to the fringe of outer space, rocket sled experiments to learn the effects of ultra-rapid acceleration and deceleration on humans and flying jets at the speed of sound to study problems of weightlessness outside the earth's gravitational pull.

The article describes the million-dollar-a-mile track where a 2,000-pound sled traveled at four times the speed of sound to test missiles under free flight conditions, and the proposed \$8 million dollar solar furnace at the Sacramento mountains which will test the effects of heat on materials with temperatures up to 8,000 degrees Fahrenheit.

Labor Seeks Higher Benefits

Organized labor in an offer to give up jury trials of workmen's compensation cases is asking in return higher benefits for injured workmen while generally are about double the present amounts. Total and permanent disability, or death, benefit would rise from \$18,500 to \$24,750 maximum. The increase is greater in other categories such as loss of an arm would rise from a maximum of \$5,200 to \$6,950.

MEXICO TODAY

Return of the newly-named cardinal, Jose Cardinal Garibi Rivera, from the church session in Rome was the occasion for a gala reception in his home town of Guadalajara. Intense popularity of the erstwhile archbishop, coupled with the fact that he is the first cardinal ever to be named in the history of Mexico, made the return celebration an outstanding affair.

In a nation which is almost 98% Catholic, nothing contributing to welfare of the church is overlooked, but into church life has come a bit of government regulation, this since the revolution of some years ago.

Old residents here tell of the practice of former years when much of the church collection went to the church head in Rome, but now it must be used inside Mexico and periodical checks and audits of the books are made by a department of the state. To this day, Mexico and the Vatican have no diplomatic relations and priests and nuns are legally forbidden to wear their habits in public, although authorities nowadays think the law a bit too extreme to enforce. Regardless of this, the peasants and masses of the poor remained firmly Catholic and the Basilica of the Virgin of Guadalupe is the most popular Catholic shrine in Latin America.

Traffic movement in the larger cities is a revelation to the visitor from Estados Unidos and they marvel at the very low accident rate on the streets of Guadalajara, a city of more than 500,000 population.

Figures show that motor vehicle accidents here number less than one-tenth of the number recorded in Albuquerque. Of course, the automobile down here is not so prevalent as in American cities, but one sees a great number of the latest model Cadillacs, Lincolns, Chrysler New Yorkers and other popular makes. But about nine out of 10 are of the vintage of years ago.

OLD AUTOS NEVER DIE

Interesting it is that any sort of automobile never wears out down here, this manifest by the number of 1922-30 models still chugging along. There is usually a way of making repairs, this from the fact that a motor car is a prized possession. Practically no teenager is the owner of a car and fortunate indeed is the lad who can hoard the few pesos to become the owner of a bicycle.

Surprising to the traveler from the states is the absence of wrecked car lots which abound on the outskirts of every hamlet, town and city in the states. Automotive units, wrecked beyond repair in some bad accident, are used in their entirety for some other useful purpose. Undamaged engine parts, those of the transmission and differential soon go into cars needing fenders and bodies are cut up and fashioned into beautiful flower pots and kitchen utensils and damaged frames go to make up reinforcements in concrete park and plaza benches.

PARKING METERS OUT

Traveling extensively through Mexico on five trips to the southern republic, this writer is yet to see a parking meter in any city or town. Mexicans are amazed at the tax craze in Estados Unidos which has been carried to parking the family coche. As one Mexican aptly expressed himself, "In your country you people who pay the tax really pay the bill for construction, then tax yourselves for use of the street improvements."

American tourists here, numbering well into thousands and many who come from various states to spend the winter, voice vehement peevish over the handling of mail. For instance, air mail from a southern California city requires 13 days before being delivered here during the Christmas rush, this while ordinary mail from a greater distance reaches here in a week or less.

Sometime during mid-afternoon the Americans rush from their apartments at sound of the mailman's whistle, a distinct tone to set him apart from the "ahue shine, the vegetable vendor and the strawberry peddler. The tourist goes through the two boxes strapped onto the rear of the mailman's bicycle to learn if anything has come through for them that day. Uncommon to most Americans, the bike-mounted mailman returns to the post office after completing only one-half of his scheduled route. He's too tired to go any further.

Aside from the huge, golden domed cathedral in the center plaza of Guadalajara, Guadalajara has no fewer than 87 other Catholic churches scattered throughout the city and masses which start at 8 a.m. continue at half-hour periods until noon. Lots of churches you will say, but there's a comparatively small town some miles south of here which has no less than 265 churches, one for every day in the year.

Carrizozo High School is one of 45 New Mexico schools sending representatives to the 15th annual New Mexico Music Educators' Association All-State Music Clinic, to be held on the University of New Mexico campus January 29-31.

Angie Grubb, flute, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. W. D. Grubb and Richard Carbajal, band instructor will leave January 29 for the clinic.

About 800 high school musicians will make up the clinic orchestra, band, and chorus for their concert, to be held Friday, Jan. 30.

Instructing the clinic's chorus will be Robert Sage, Temple University choral director and former Eastern New Mexico University faculty member. Dr. Van Boegeraven, dean of the school of music at New York University, will instruct the band; and Henry Sopkin, conductor and musical director of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, will be in charge of the orchestra.

Era of Prosperity Opens for Navajos

Washington, Jan. 5—The Navajos, who form the largest Indian tribe in the United States, are staking out a new way of life on their arid, starkly scenic reservation.

Backed by income from rich oil and uranium deposits, their tribal council is cooperating with the Government to promote education, better health, irrigation projects and industrial development.

The reservation's drought-plagued ranges—stretching from Arizona into Utah and New Mexico—are still no paradise. But the tribe has come a long way since its shattering defeat by westward-driving Americans in the 1860's.

Life Story Traced
In the December National Geographic Magazine an article entitled "Better Days for the Navajos" traced the long story of these Indians.

Most scholars think the Navajos' remote ancestors straggled over the Bering Sea bridge from Asia, hunted for generations in the Yukon, then gradually drifted to the Southwest, says the author, Jack Breed.

The people—as they called themselves—were cultivating patches of corn and beans when the Spaniards first came to their land in the 16th century. They lived in primitive forked-stick hogans and were yet to become weavers and silversmiths. They had never seen a horse.

With their horses, sheep, and cattle, the Spaniards soon changed the aborigines' way of life. The more settled Pueblo Indians were subjugated. The Navajos withdrew to outlying canyons. Both took enthusiastically to the new horseback and grazing economy.

In 1680, when the Spaniards severely repressed a Pueblo revolt, many Pueblo sought refuge among the Navajos. With the added numbers, new skills, and livestock loot, the people became formidable raiders.

Conflict was inevitable with the expansion of the United States into Indian territory at the end of the Mexican War. It ended in the Navajos' unconditional surrender. In 1864, the survivors took the "Long Walk"—a 300-mile march to Fort-Summer in the far reaches of New Mexico.

New Yield from Barron Land
The modern Navajo saga began in 1869, when the tribe was escorted "back home" to a 3,500,000-acre reservation. The area has since grown to 15,000,000 acres, but the land cannot sustain even its present 75,000 people.

Hope for the future, therefore, lies in occupations other than pastoral. Already industries have penetrated the reservation with jobs and royalties in their wake. Mr. Breed points out. Income from uranium and vanadium mines brought more than \$1,000,000 last year. And that was small, he adds, compared to \$30,453,525 received from oil and natural gas.

In 1923 the Navajos set up a tribal council primarily to approve an oil and gas lease. Today the council serves as the tribal parliament, assisted by the United States Bureau of Indian Affairs.

From the common fund come projects of benefit to all. Among them are tourist motels, a low-cost housing project, a coal mine, and the Arts and Crafts Guild, based on the famous rug and silverwork industries.

Navajo funds established a training center for farmers who will work irrigated lands. The funds help the needy, and provide clothing and supplies for pupils in reservation and near-by public schools. They support scholarships for students to go on to institutions of higher learning across the nation.

In the National Geographic Society's book on the Indians of the Americas, W. Langdon Kuhn, painter and student of tribesmen, tells this story:

At a Navajo fire dance he once met a blanket-wearing Navajo girdling with turquoise earrings and silver-buttoned moccasins. The Indian narrated on the victor's Connecticut home plate, and showed considerable knowledge of the state.

"How come?" asked Mr. Kuhn. "I went to Yale," smiled the Navajo.

THE COUNTY AGENT REPORTING . . .

Last week I was at J. P. McKnight's and watched him and John Cooper make pellets with the new pellet machine. They plan to make pellets to feed all of their lambs.

The machine makes a good-looking pellet out of some poor hay—a 65% hay cube pellet.

Pruning is the main activity in the orchards these days. John Thomas has a new electric pruning saw which he likes very well.

Bert Pfingsten was using a pneumatic pruner and said that he had to prune 200 trees a day to get through in time.

In a recent article in tree response to fertilizer it was noted that 50 well-fertilized trees would produce as much as 381 unfertilized trees.

How would you like to increase your income from your trees 7 1/2 times by just adding 1 pound of nitrogen and 1 pound of actual phosphorus per tree?

Seedlings Available For Farm Plantings

About 700,000 seedling trees will be made available to farmers and ranchers in New Mexico, Colorado, and Arizona for windbreak, shelterbelt and reforestation plantings.

The offering includes 11 broad-leaved species. They are green ash, caragana, cottonwood, American elm, Chinese elm, hackberry, honey locust, Russian apricot, Russian olive, native plum and golden willow.

The four evergreen species include Colorado blue spruce, Douglas fir, Austrian pine and ponderosa pine.

The seedlings are now being stockpiled at the new Colorado State Forest Service Nursery at Fort Collins, Colo., and will be distributed by Colorado State University. Shipments, scheduled to begin on March 2 to New Mexico, Southern Colorado and Arizona, will be timed so they will arrive at best planting dates.

Orders are now being accepted. Application blanks are available at offices at county agricultural agents in New Mexico, Colorado, and Arizona.

Charles L. Terrell, state forester at CSU, advises early orders to avoid disappointments. He predicts a heavy demand for planting stock, as indicated by orders already received. Once the supply of certain species is exhausted, there is little assurance of getting additional seedlings.

Roswell Editor Speaks At Hondo PTA Meeting

Speaking on the subject of what Chaves county and Roswell are doing in the way of civil defense, Al Stubbs, editor of the Roswell Daily Record, and director of the Chaves County Civil Defense, outlined in brief the progress that his city is making in that area.

Mr. Stubbs stressed the importance of well-organized civil defense, not only for man-made disasters, but for natural catastrophes as well.

Since Walker Air Force Base is a unit of the Strategic Air Command, it would be a target area. Also White Sands and Los Alamos would be considered in the same category.

Since the real problem is that of radio-active fallout, and the fallout depends on the direction of the wind, part of Roswell's civil defense is set up to keep the people informed, via radio, of wind directions. The defense organization has also blood-typed all junior and senior high school students and equipped with identification tags.

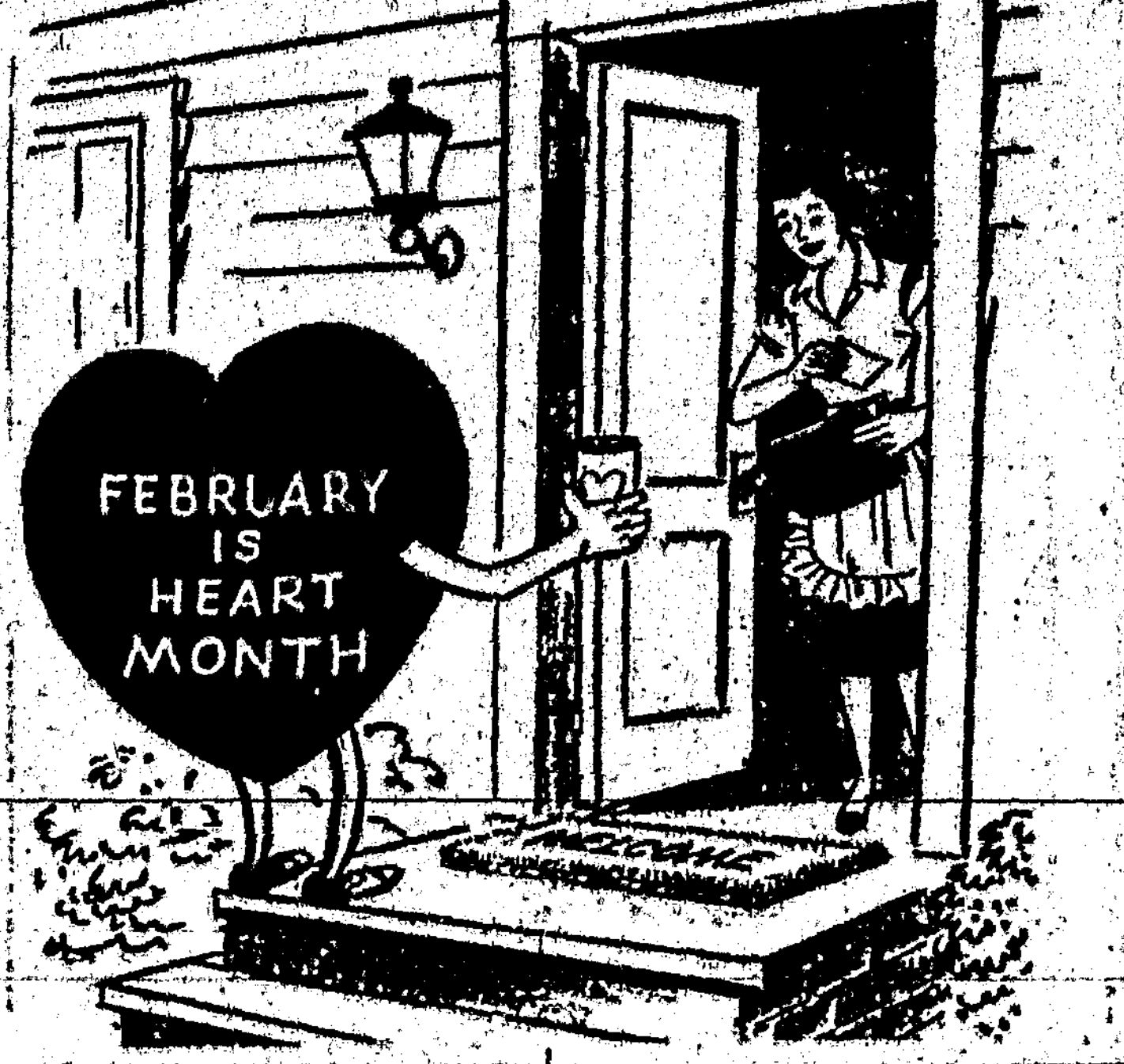

A little boy about eight or nine years old was standing there listening to the conversation. He started talking about giants—especially about a fifty-foot woman he'd seen in the picture show.

I asked him if he'd ever heard about Goliath. To me, this is one of the most thrilling stories told; but the name didn't "ring a bell" with the boy so I asked him:

"Don't you remember who killed Goliath, in the Bible?"

He still didn't "register" so I told him, "Why it was David, remember?"

His face lit up with recognition and for a minute I thought I'd "struck gold" but I was doomed to disappointment.

"Davy Crockett" he yelled.

His mother didn't seem embarrassed about it although she corrected him quickly enough. I asked her where she'd heard the story and she became just a little indignant with me. She said, "Why everybody knows that story! I've known it all my life, I bet I learned that in primary class!"

This story is rather funny, isn't it? It would be much funnier if the mother in question saw to it that her little son came to Church School and had a chance to learn something about the Bible.
