Many a person tailors his religion to fit the pattern of his prejudices.

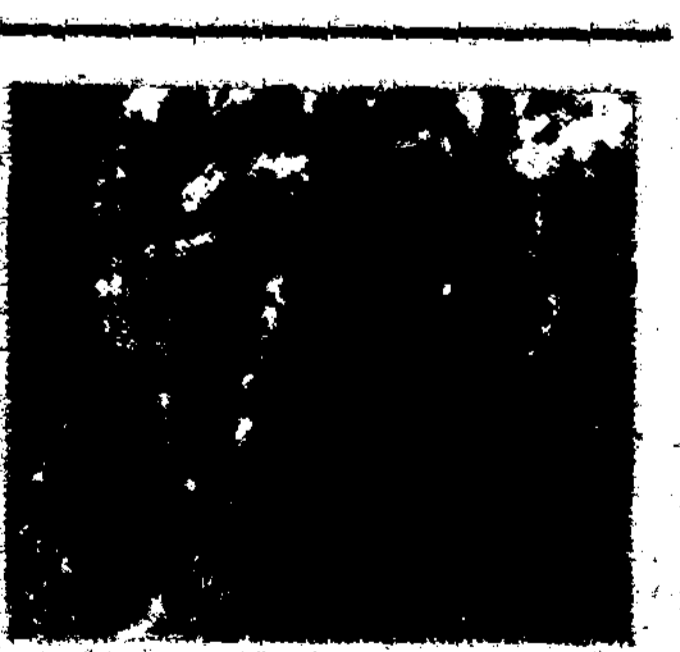

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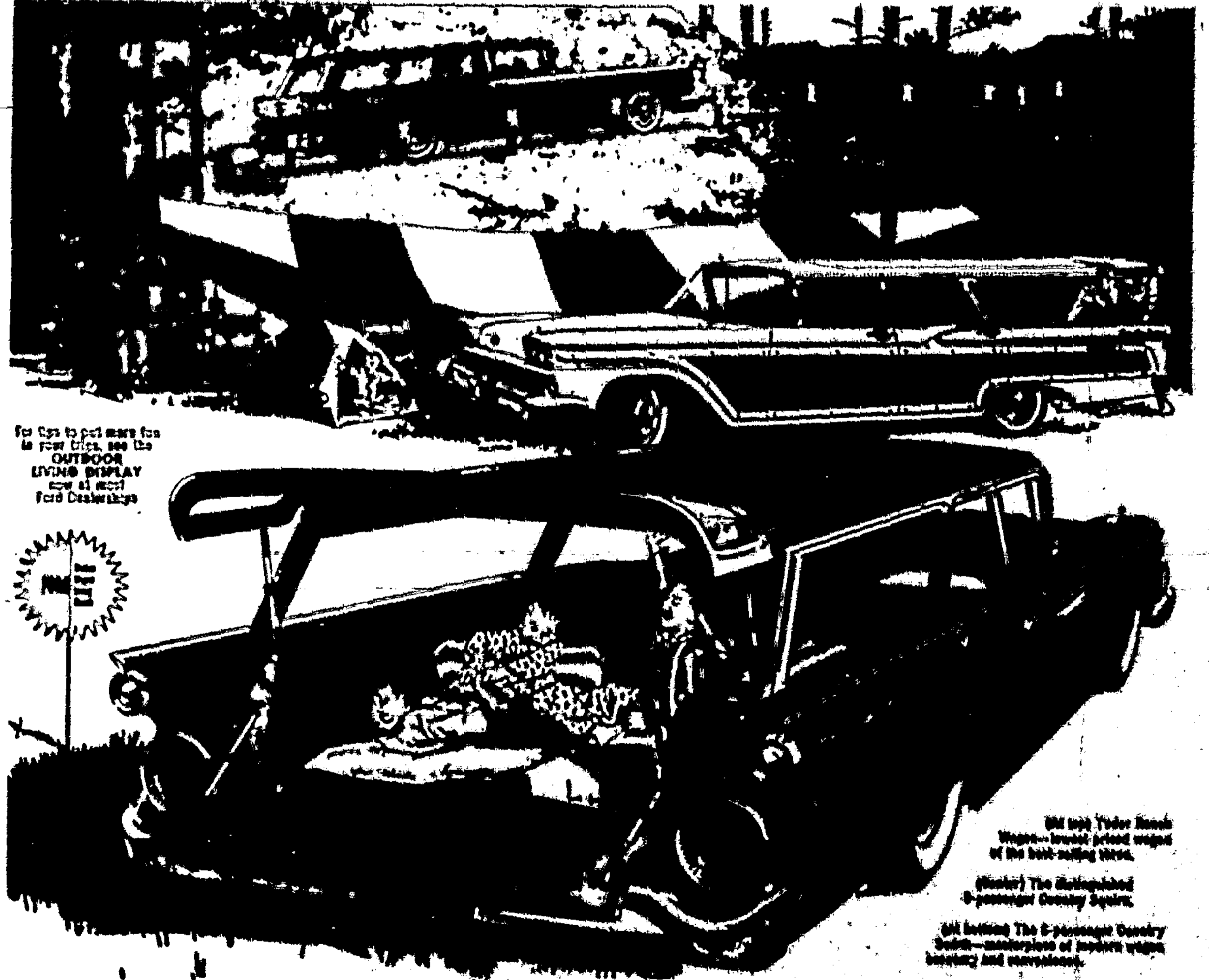

**MEXICO TODAY**

It was a pleasant 10-to-15-minute visit that meeting with Jose Cardinal Carabi Rivera when I was ushered into his inner chamber at the huge tabernacle fronting Plaza Libertad in downtown Guadalajara. With limited Spanish vocabulary, and the English expression of the Mexican church head only a shade better, we managed to make ourselves understood and this writer was impressed with the candor and joviality of the cardinal, the first ever named in this nation which is predominately Catholic.

What was intended to lay the groundwork for a meeting with his holiness was a letter written a few weeks before, asking for an appointment at his convenience. But time brought no reply; so inquiry was made of business men who are prominent in church work and assurance was given that it would be no difficult task to see the cardinal at any time after his return from a tour of the nation, visiting the churches in every state after his return from Rome where he sat with the college of cardinals.

At the office of the secretary in the rear of the cathedral, the caller is escorted by a robed aid to the reception room which is lined on one side with a row of chairs filled with callers, each waiting his turn to enter for interview. In the waiting row were those of every strata, some garbed in the latest styles and fashions and others with tattered and patched garments, heads adorned with shawls and sombreros.

The more affluent class presented visiting cards to the door attendant and those of the lower class merely gave their names which were jotted down on the waiting list. There was no "crashing the door" by those of the affluent class, but each was given his or her turn for audience with the cardinal. Nor was there any time limit as it was observed that certain of the callers remained more than a half hour while others were inside but a few minutes.

Down on Avenida Chapultepec this writer came in contact with an author from Connecticut who told that he had been more than four months in seeking audience with Cardinal Rivera, but his appeal had been erring, as was the case of this writer. He had written a request. Placed on the tight track, he lost no time in getting to the office of the secretary.

The cardinal is an affable one to meet; his charming smile, good nature and jest during his 47 years in the priesthood has brought friends in all classes throughout the nation. In telling that we were from New Mexico, he immediately responded with the statement that on the following day there was to be confirmation of three young priests who had received their training at Montezuma College, which is located up Gallinas Canyon only a few miles from Las Vegas, in New Mexico.

Sensing that the church head was extremely busy and with limited time, thanks were given as prelude to leaving, but wishing himself, he listened to an adjoining room and brought out miniature silver medals with raised likeness of the Pope on one side and the Virgin of Guadalupe on the other. One of these was given to each of his callers from Ketados Unidos. It was a fine gesture for one who has long been classed with the wayward, an act which will be cherished throughout a lifetime.

Opposes Naming State Park After Mexican Bandit Chief

It is my sincere hope that the New Mexico State Park Commission will be exceedingly slow about the establishment of a state park near Columbus dedicated to Mexico's most notorious bandit, Pancho Villa.

I remain in strong objection to the naming of this planned park the "Pancho Villa State Park."

It was March 10, 1916, when Pancho Villa and his group raided Columbus, New Mexico.

In this same raid, there was killed Charles B. Miller of Tularosa, who had served as territorial engineer.

It should be recalled that the New Mexico National Guard was called out and the U. S. troops under General John J. Pershing went after the raiders and some of the Villa men were captured.

I am sure that the good people of Chihuahua as well as the good people of Mexico do not appreciate those bandits who murdered U. S. soldiers and U. S. citizens at Columbus.

It is my hope that the Park Commission will consider this matter very, very carefully, and somehow defer any formal action until a new State Legislature takes a further look at it.

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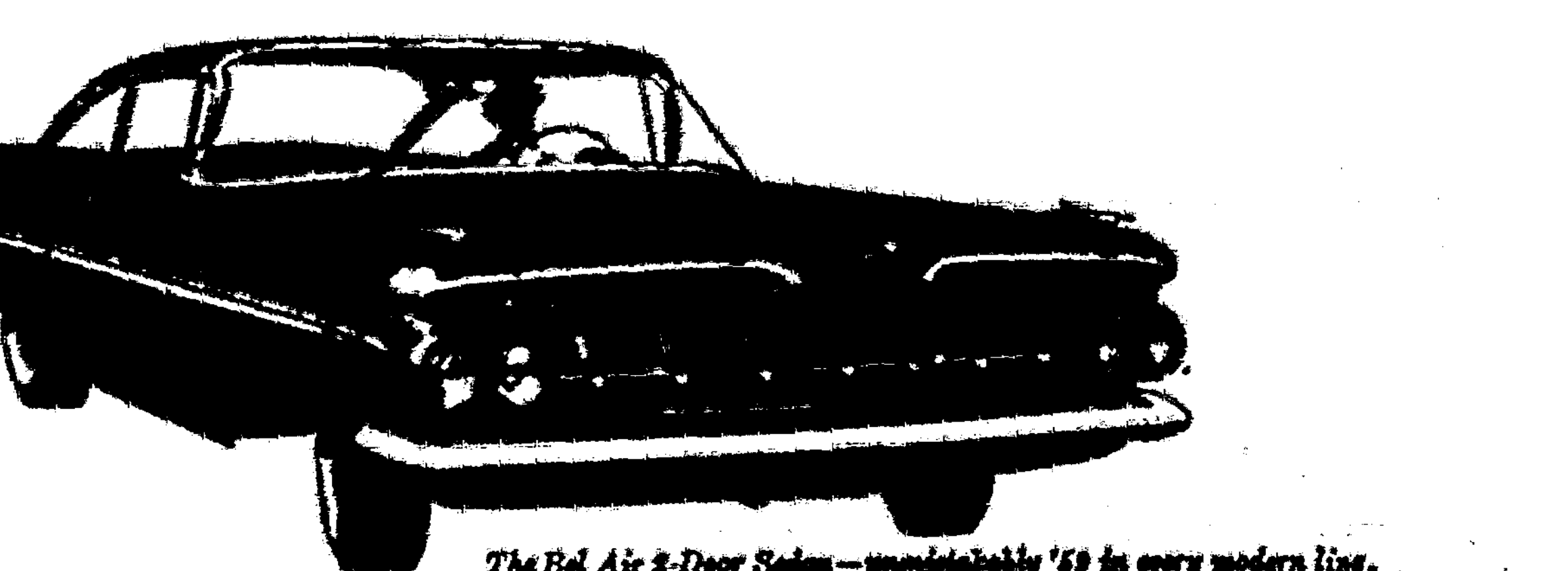

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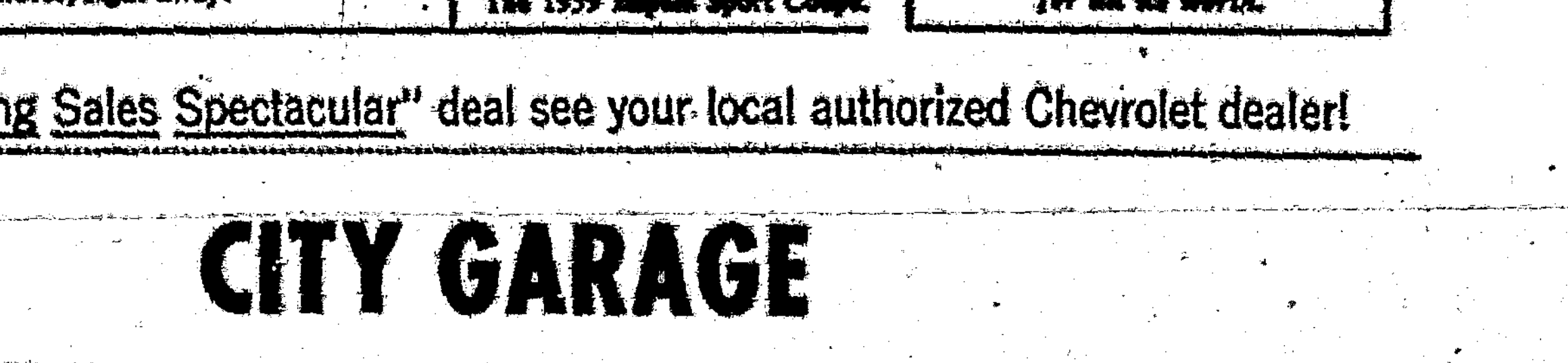
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
