**Law Requires Licenses Under Motor Vehicle Sales Finance Act**

F. F. Weddington, State Bank Examiner, said this week that only 88 sales finance company licenses have been issued under the new Motor Vehicle Sales Finance Act which became effective June 12. Mr. Weddington pointed out that under the new law every individual or company purchasing or holding retail installment contracts on motor vehicles must be licensed as a Sales Finance Company. A fine of up to \$500 is provided for failure to comply.

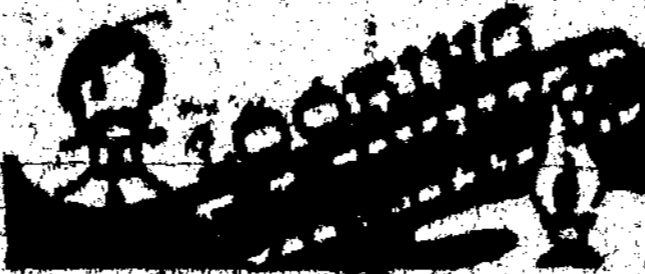
The law requires a detailed statement of the transaction, including a full disclosure of all charges, giving the amounts and purposes. Further, the law sets out maximum interest rates which may be charged on installment contracts, provides for refunds and refinancing, defines the term "motor vehicle" and the classes of motor vehicles, and provides penalties, including forfeiture of the finance charges, for violations of these provisions.

In an effort to reach all those who may be affected by the penalties of the law, the Banking Department has been mailing copies of the law to dealers, finance companies and banks at their names and addresses have been obtained. Approximately 500 copies have been mailed to date. However, ignorance of the law will not excuse violations of the law.

Mr. Weddington also suggested that those people planning to purchase a motor vehicle on the installment plan should know their rights under the new law.

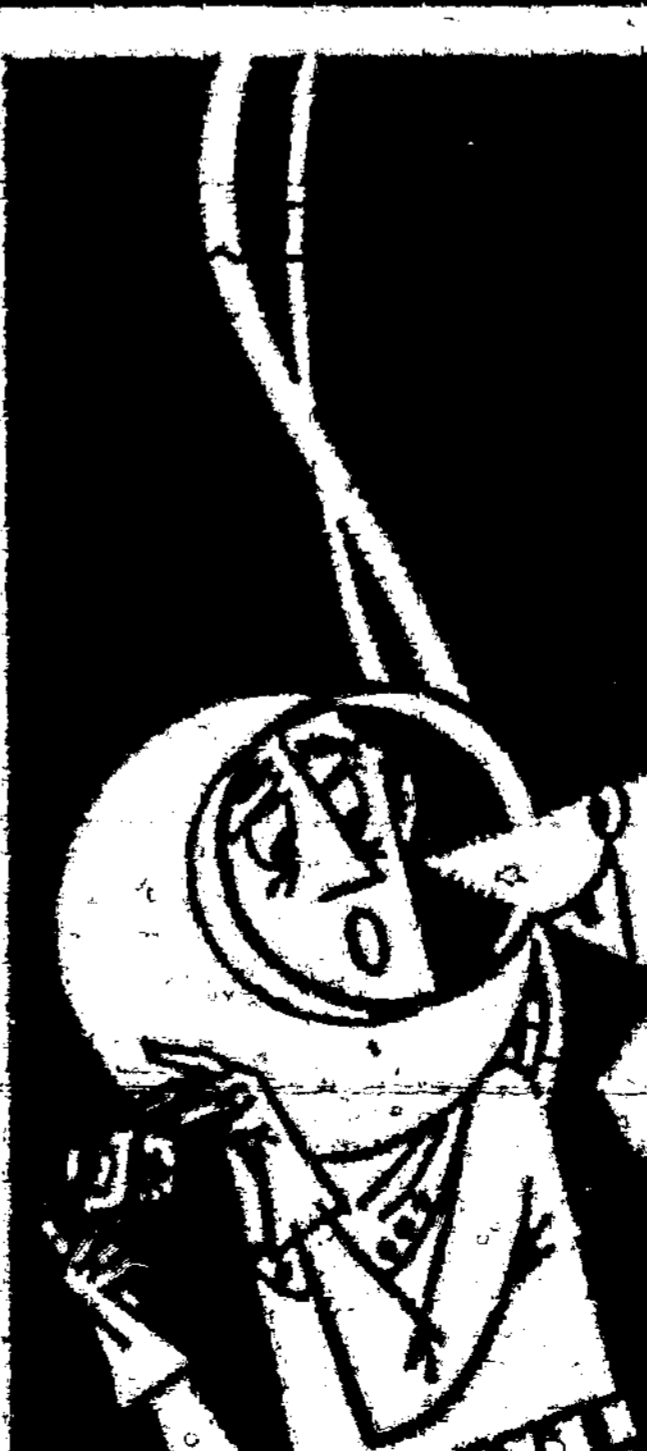
