School Man Completed Summer Science Course

Nacogdoches, Tex. — Frank C. Wagner, Carrizozo high school chemistry teacher, recently completed a training program that S. F. Austin State College sponsored under a grant from the federal government.

Mr. Wagner was one of 55 public school mathematics and science teachers who received free training, board, room, and transportation under the program designed to help solve the national shortage of trained scientists.

These reports to the State Health Department brought a warning from Dr. Milton Zisce, director of the Division of Chronic Disease Control, that parents should act swiftly if a baby shows signs of choking.

"Pick the baby up by the heels and strike it on the back, forcibly enough to dislodge the food particle that is causing the distress," he said. "The danger increases if the baby is placed on its back in the crib."

In other Jicarilla news, A. H. Norton killed a large cat and Mr. McBrayer left for White Oaks to work at the coal mine.

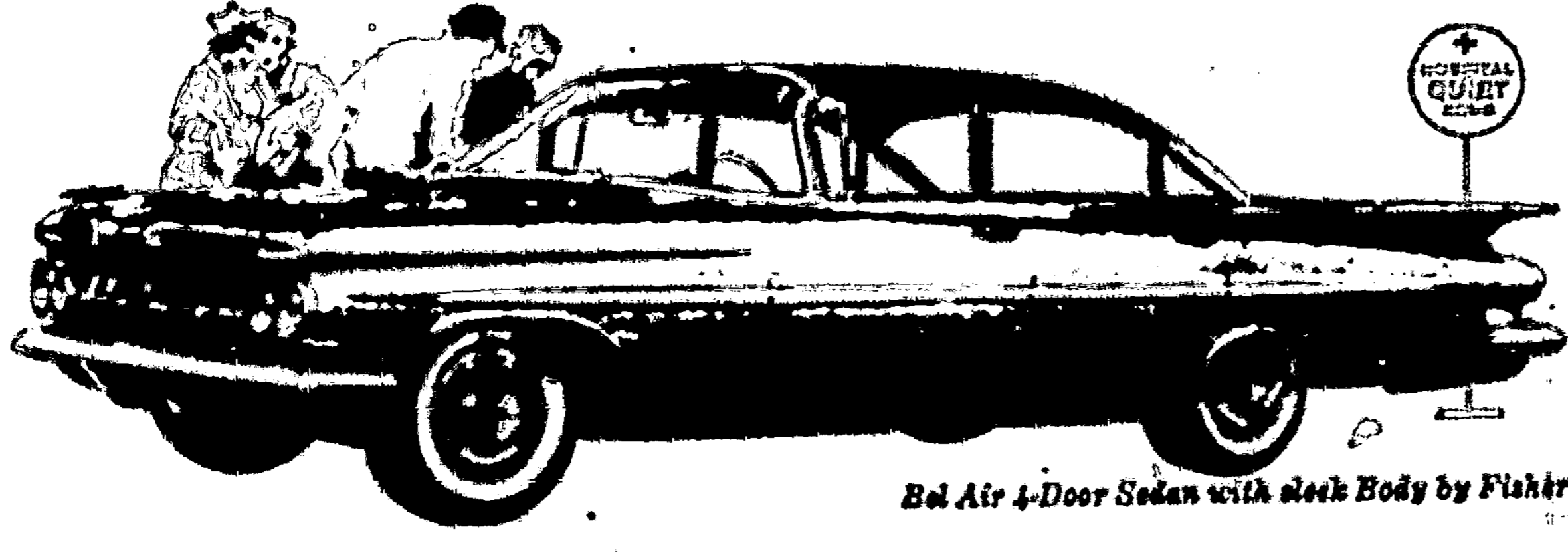
C. D. Mayer of White Oaks purchased a new Ford car from Dr. T. W. Watson at Carrizozo.

CHICKEN FILET OF SOLE*

4 filets of sole
 2 egg yolks
 2 tablespoons butter
 2 tablespoons cream
 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
 1/2 cup flour
 1/2 cup water

4 tablespoons ground beef
 1/2 cup water
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1/2 cup lemon juice
 1/2 cup salt
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup oil
 1/2 cup vinegar
 1/2 cup lemon juice
 1/2 cup salt
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup oil

Buy thick filets and cut each one in half crosswise. Wash and dry. Beat together the egg yolks, butter, 5 tablespoons cream, and the salt. Dip the fish in this mixture and then in the bread crumbs mixture. Fry in hot oil. Drain on paper towels.

Heat the oil to 350° and fry the filets in it, without breading, until browned on both sides. Keep the fish hot while preparing the remaining ingredients with the water and transfer to a sautépan with oil, vinegar, lemon juice, sugar, salt, and pepper. Boil for 5 minutes. Taste for seasoning. Serve 2-3.

SOME TIPS FOR EXHIBITING VEGETABLES AT THE FAIR

It will soon be time to exhibit vegetables in your county and state fairs. Your exhibits must not only have top quality — they must also show it.

Here are a few tips for exhibiting vegetables for exhibition:

Beans and peas should be in the pod without removing the small stem at the end of each pod.

Cabbage and lettuce should have two or three outside wrapper leaves around the head.

Carrots and other root vegetables should be topped 1 1/2 to 2 inches above the crown. Trim tap roots of beets and turnips so they are 1 1/2 inches long.

Onions should not be peeled too much. A dry outer skin should remain.

Sweet corn should be exhibited in the husks. Remove only the outer husk and trim the shank short.

Tomatoes should be uniform in size and degree of ripeness. The stems should be removed.

Vegetables for exhibit should be uniform in size, high in quality, clean and free of defects. Potatoes and root crops should be washed lightly, don't scrub.

Check the fair premium list carefully to see that you have the proper number of samples.
