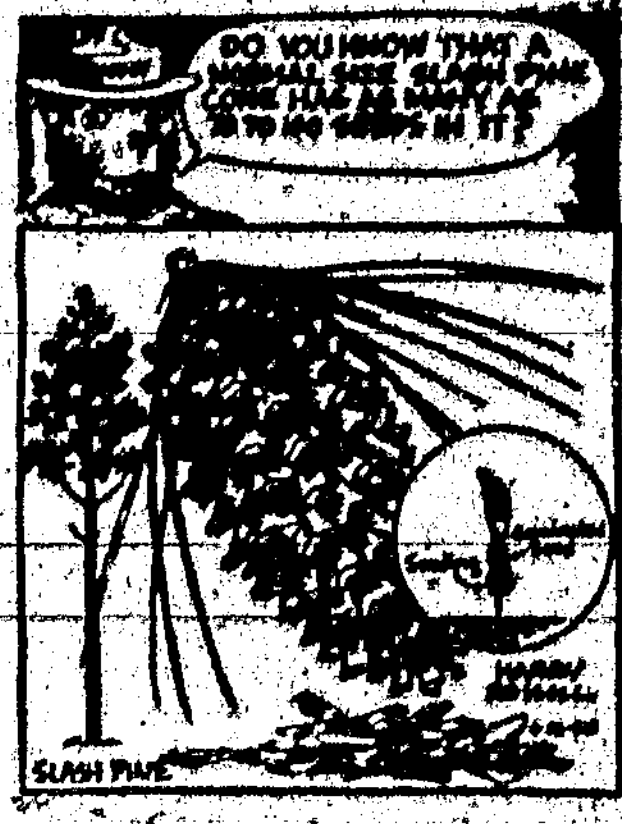
and non-prescription drugs (at the best they're a waste of money, at worst downright dangerous), she will lose that ten pounds slowly and gradually.
