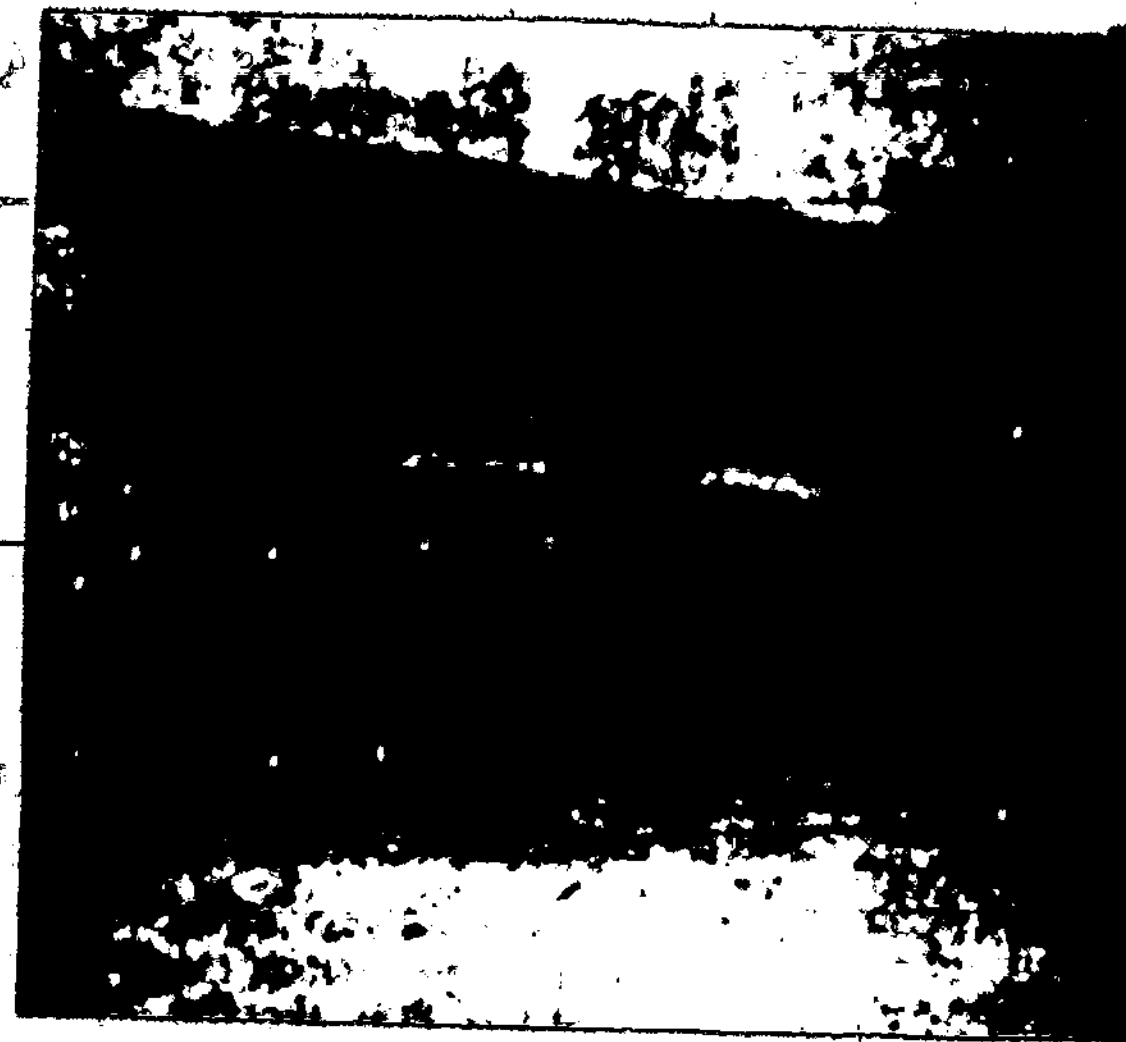

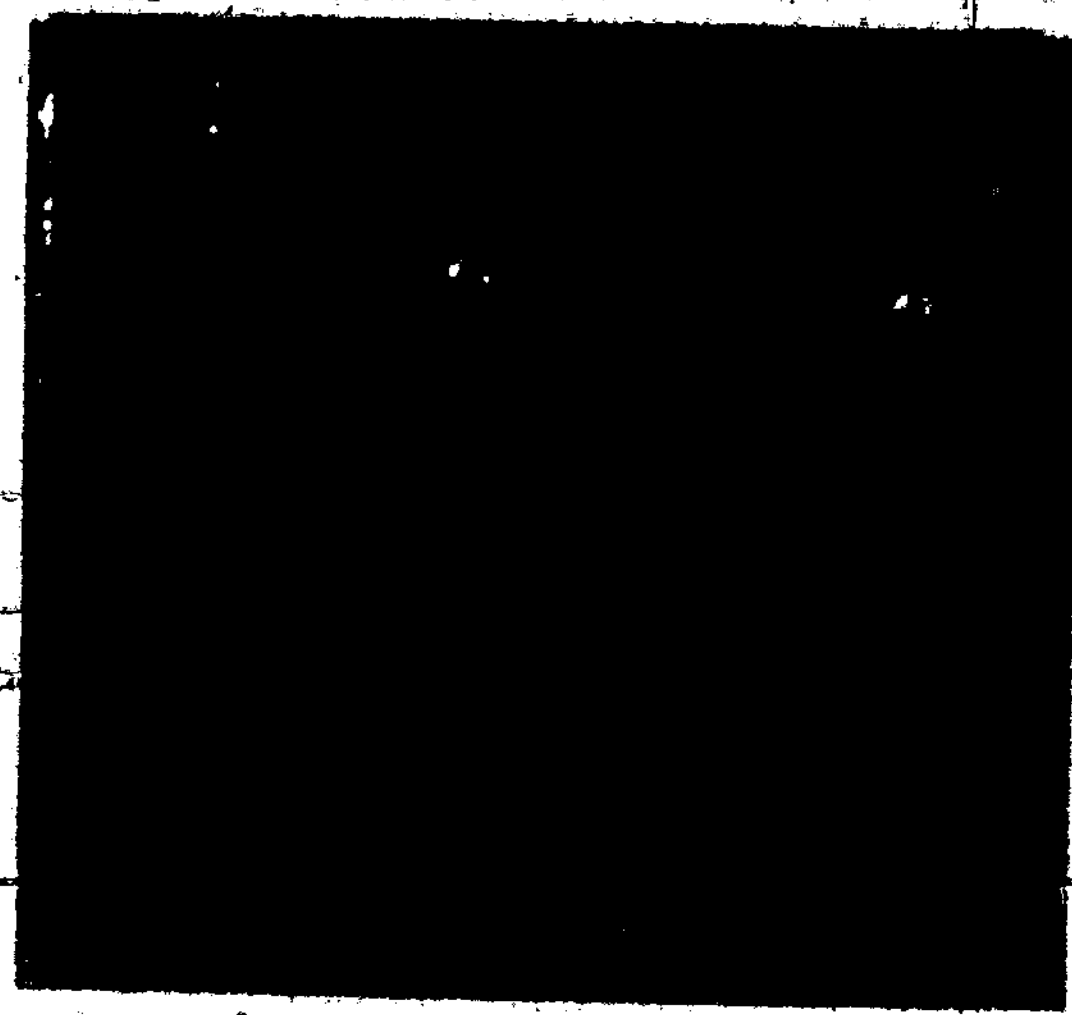
Vapor Barrier being Installed by Mr. Sidwell



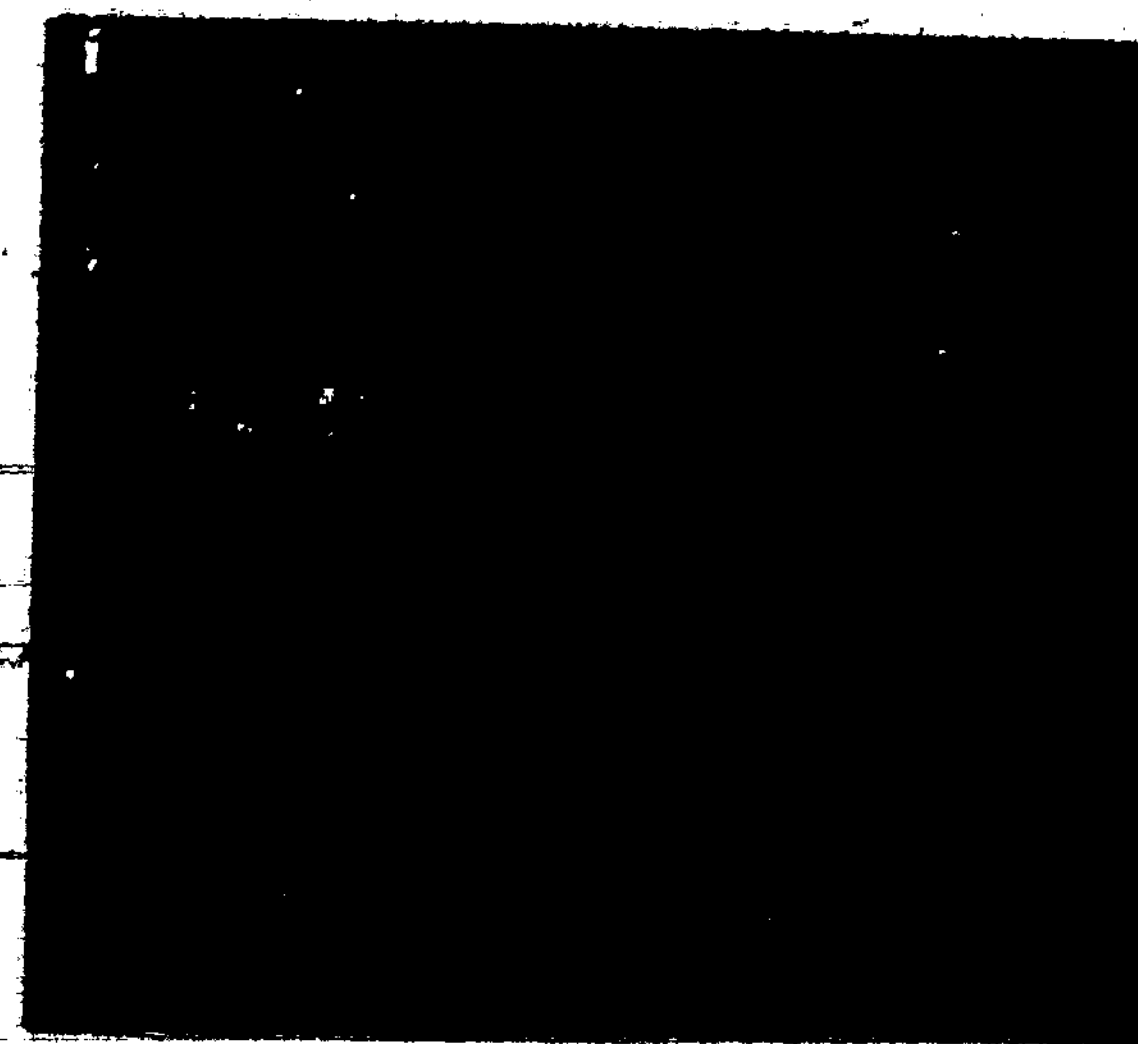
Holes Through Outside Wall are for Blowing in the Insulation

## Gold Medalion home on exhibit is all-electric

### FEATURES EXPLAINED

The Gold Medalion home that G. B. Sidwell has constructed (see notice of open house opposite) is frame type construction. All wall studs, ceiling joists, rafters and floor sills are set on 16" centers.

The siding is celotex with plaster and the inside walls are sheetrock, finished with texture. The floors are all hardwood on a 3/4" sub-floor. The roof is of galvanized metal with sheathing under the metal.

The walls have 4" of balsam wool insulation, blown in under 15 pounds pressure. The ceiling has 6" of the balsam wool insulation blown into it. The floors have 2" of rockwool batts.

All the rafters, walls and floors are protected with a .004 polyethylene vapor barrier just under the sheetrock to keep moisture from inside the house penetrating the insulation and also to cut down infiltration from outside wind velocities.

The heating equipment is baseboard-type, except for the bathroom, kitchen and utility. It is built by the Electromode Heating Mfg. Co.

The bathroom, kitchen and utility rooms have electric forced air wall heaters. Each room in the house is controlled by individual thermostats, making it possible to have a different temperature in the rooms.

### SIDWELL'S DESIGN HOME

The Electromode baseboard heaters are 64" long and are 1200 watts each. They may be used separately or joined together as many times as necessary. The house was designed by Mr. and Mrs. Sidwell and the heating, insulation and electric appliances were designed by the Otero County Electric Cooperative.

All of the appliances are Hotpoint in customline color. The heat loss calculation calls for 12,500 watts of electric heating and the annual consumption was guaranteed not to exceed a certain amount. This calculation was based on Otero County Electric Cooperative space heating rate.

"When you build a home such as Mr. Sidwell has," an official of the Otero Electric Cooperative informed the News, "you will have a better home and more comfort at no extra cost. We invite you to talk to Mr. Sidwell or the Otero County Electric Cooperative and see how you too may enjoy all this comfort and saving you are now missing."

"The design on this home costs no more than any other design that is not suitable for electric heat. Also, electric heat is just as cheap in this home as other types of fuels available in this area."

## Battle lines form in "Cranberry War"

According to a news story in "CropLife," a weekly newspaper for the farm chemical manufacturer, formulator and dealer, "the linking of cancer to slight residue on cranberries is seen as ridiculous."

The article goes on to say: "The cranberry war, precipitated by the Nov. 9 statement by Arthur S. Flemming, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, that some of the 1959 cranberry crop contained residues of aminotriazole weed killer, has involved not only the cranberry industry and government agencies, but the agricultural chemical industry as well."

"Spokesman for the two producers of aminotriazole, American Cyanamid Co., New York, and Archer Products, Inc., Ambler, Pa., indicate that the cranberry war is a complete exaggeration of facts and the hysteria caused by the Food and Drug position has reached an almost ludicrous point."

"A spokesman for American Cyanamid Co. told CropLife in a telephone interview that the maximum amount of herbicide residue found in any cranberry sample was 1 part per million as compared to the 100 parts per million fed to rats over a long period of time before any sign of malignancy was noted. In order for an average adult to get the dose administered to the rat, he would have to eat 25,000 pounds of cranberries a day for the rest of his life."

"The spokesman continued by reminding that the average per capita consumption of cranberries in the U. S. is 3 lb. a year, according to the USDA statistician. This would amount to something like 0008 lb. a day, on the average."

"This whole furore has been caused by misuses of the product; by somebody not following directions on the label. . . disregard of directions has obviously resulted in some residue on some berries. . . but it is not a health hazard."

## Big preparations for 25th Sun Carnival

El Paso, Texas—This far West Texas border city is going all-out this year with its annual mid-winter Sun Carnival in celebration of the event's 25th anniversary.

The largest line-up of sporting, social and special activities in the Sun Carnival's long history has been arranged by officials in recognition of the silver celebration, much to the delight of El Pasoans and the thousands of visitors who flock to town for the week-long affair.

Heading the list of myriad social events will be the famed coronation ball scheduled on December 29. The coronation ceremonies for the Sun Carnival Queen have traditionally been carried out with ancient courtly splendor amidst artistic settings designed and executed by the city's finest art creators. Following the coronation ceremonies, the queen, her court and spectators will be entertained prior to the commencement of the ball — by famed singer, Vaughan Monroe.

The queen's court is composed of 40 princesses and 10 dutchesses and their escorts. The princesses come from communities from throughout the Southwest.

Probably the highlight of the Sun Carnival is the New Year's Day parade which has come to be recognized as second to none in splendor and production. The parade is annually viewed by some 150,000 spectators lining the four-mile route.

This year the parade will feature 30 major floats — based on the theme, "Holidays Around the World" — together with hundreds of marching units and lesser floats.

The Sun Bowl football game, scheduled on December 31, will match colorful and high-scoring teams of New Mexico State University and North Texas State. New Mexico State boasts several individual stars, each high national statistical ratings in Charley Johnson, Bob Galtera, and Purvis Atkins. North Texas State, on the other hand, was one of the nation's few unbeaten major eleven until

edged by Tulsa toward the end of the season.

Other special events scheduled throughout the week will include an art exhibit, a bowling tournament, a bullfight in the neighboring city of Juarez, Mexico, a tennis tournament, a baton twirling contest, a Sheriff's Posse breakfast for visiting teams, a Rancho breakfast open to the public, a two-night jamboree for visiting

bands, a symphony concert with special guest artist, a polo match, a New Year's Eve dance sponsored by the Elks Club and open to the general public, a pistol tournament, and a street dance.

Sun Carnival officials have also scheduled several nights of lavish fireworks displays to be set off from the slopes of the Franklin Mountains which jut into the middle of the city.

**Don't kill house plants with too much kindness**

More house plants are killed by overwatering or improper fertilizing than by neglect. Too much water makes roots rot and fertilizer applied too generously burns them.

Here are some pointers for keeping house plants in good shape during the winter. Give plants just enough water to keep them moist, but not wet. Plants in sunny windows, near radiators or in hot, dry rooms may have to be watered daily. Foliage plants in planters or in dim corners of the room may need water only once a week.

Plants in plastic pots or ceramic containers need special watering care. Soil in such containers will not dry out nearly as quickly as in a clay pot, nor can the water drain out as readily.

Stick a toothpick into the soil. If it comes out clean, the plants are ready for water.

Why not try "double potting" to keep plants from drying out in a warm room? Put the plant in its clay pot into a container 2 or 3 inches larger in diameter.

Put pebbles in the bottom for drainage and fill the space between the pots with peat moss. Water the soil in the pot just enough to keep it moist and moisten the moss occasionally.

House plants will need very little fertilizer between now and early March. Short days and low intensity slow down growth during the winter.

**Permit required to cut Christmas trees in Lincoln National Forest**

"Pine pine and juniper Christmas trees are being sold on the Lincoln National Forest," reported Everett B. Doman, forest supervisor of Alamogordo. He added that only limited quantities of Douglas fir and white fir are available due to the scarcity of these more desirable trees.

Mr. Doman said that the Apache Indian Reservation at Mesalero will again have a selection of trees for the Christmas trade.

Special areas are going to be set aside for those individuals and families interested in making an outing of cutting their own Christmas trees.

During the three week ends preceding Christmas, Forest officers will be stationed at the junction of High Roll road with State Highway 83 to facilitate issuance of permits for Christmas trees.

At least two or three thousand people are expected to be in the area for trees, according to Ranger Hal Reynolds of Cloudcroft.

Dr. Doman suggested that inquiries be directed to forest rangers at Captain, Cloudcroft, Mayhill and Ruidoso for information concerning Christmas trees.

Individuals interested in obtaining Christmas trees are warned to obtain their permits at the ranger stations before cutting any trees. These permits are one dollar each. Forest officers, it is stated, will be on patrol to check for trees being illegally cut. Last year two violators who had cut several hundred trees without paying for them were taken before the local justice, fined, and lost their trees in addition. Individuals cutting family trees without a permit are also subject to prosecution, according to the news release from the Forest Service.

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## NMSU bulletin deals with marketing apples

University Park, N. M. — Research is needed to develop a less expensive package for apples to increase purchases from packing sheds, says a bulletin, "Marketing New Mexico Apples," published by the Agricultural Experiment Station of New Mexico State University.

Many buyers want high-quality graded and inspected apples, but they do not want to pay for an expensive package, Carl E. Hall, associate agricultural economist says. He points out that some consumers prefer to buy apples pre-packaged in plastic bags because they can be handled easily and the fruit can be seen by the buyers.

The bulletin covers apple marketing in San Juan, Lincoln and Otero counties. These counties were selected, Hall said, "because they seemed to have more difficulty in selling their apples and because of their increasing importance in the state's apple industry."

Ways to increase local consumption are suggested. Over the years, Hall said, New Mexico housewives have complained that they could not buy New Mexico apples from their grocery stores, sometimes even in the harvest period. This means, the economist continued, that New Mexico apple growers through their farm organizations will want to work with local grocery-men to expand the home market. Advertising as "locally grown" also increases sales.

Hall also notes that New Mexico growers have not exhausted the possibilities of processing apples into cider, applesauce and other canned items for local sale. Apple-baking contests are another means of increasing sales locally.

Bulletin 442 describes marketing methods, including packing sheds, roadside stands, trucks and contracting, costs and prices. It may be obtained by writing to the Department of Information, Box 757, New Mexico State University, University Park, N. M., or at county agents' offices.

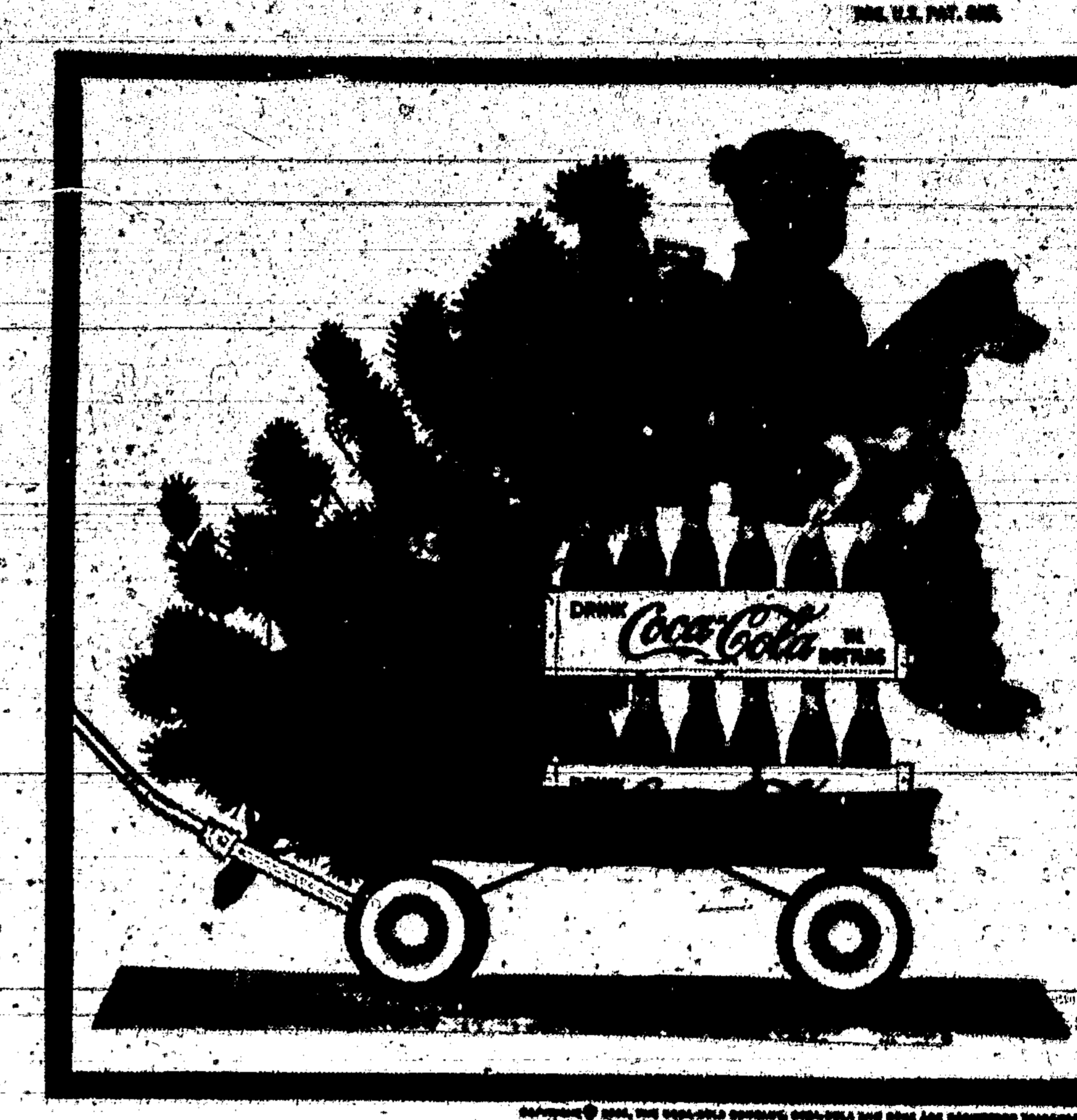

## Weather held down deer kill in Oscuras

Extremely cold and windy weather marked this year's Oscura special deer hunt. Hunter success averaged 26.1% which is slightly better than last year, according to Southwest Area Supervisor Marion Embrey.

Final figures on the hunt were 1,019 hunters who checked out with 268 deer. Of the deer taken 130 were bucks, 43 were does, and 95 were fawns. The large number

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of fawns is a definite indication of fawn survival increase. Embrey said.

Success of the Oscura hunt was due largely to White Sands Missile Range officials who made the hunt possible by permitting hunters to enter the military reservation.

Their courtesy and cooperation was appreciated by the hunters and Game Department officers alike, Embrey stated.

## BIRD HUNTING

Southwest Area—Quail hunting is very good in the lower elevations. Duck hunting in the Rio Grande Valley is fair to good. Bird hunting in the Gila Valley is good. Thirty-three hunters with 23 pheasants were checked in this area last week.

Southwest Area—Pheasant hunting is poor. Very few hunters with few birds in the Pecos Valley. Quail hunting was excellent in the Ft. Sumner last week, with a few pheasant reported taken. Field checks by Game Department officers last week showed 40 hunters with 30 pheasants.

## HUNTER CASUALTIES

Three men have been killed in hunting accidents, and one man died of a heart attack while hunting during the 1959 big game season.

No final figures are available on the number of hunter casualties that have resulted from "quick-draw artists" shooting themselves or others, or hunters shot or killed while varmint hunting.

Game Department Director Fred A. Thompson cautions all hunters to observe hunting safety rules, and adds that "there is no exception to the rules of safety."

## REGULAR TROUT FISHING SEASON CROUG NOV. 30

The Department of Game and

Fish wishes to remind fishermen that the 1959 regular trout season closed on Monday, Nov. 30.

Many fine fishing waters are still open, however, and Fisheries Division Chief Roy Barker urges fishermen to check the current fishing regulations for listings of these waters.

## WATERFOWL SEASON SHOOTING HOURS

"Shooting hours for waterfowl seasons begin at sunrise and not before." This warning comes from Larry Merovka of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Most of the big game season one-half hour before sunrise, and hunting hours have been set for some waterfowl hunters have run into trouble because of this difference. A check of the regulations will give exact sunrise and sunset hours.
