HEAVY FIREWORKS IN THREE-WAY RACE Santa Fe, Dec. 16 (Delayed)—The rumblings of Lt. Gov. Ed Mead going for governor with the backing of Sen. Dennis Chavez and Joe Bursey's avowed determination to stay in the race forecast one of the roughest primary elections the state has ever known.

BURROUGHS LOSES SOME STRONG SPOTS When Burroughs was nominated for governor last year he carried eight of the nine counties with predominant Spanish-American population, counties in which Senator Chavez has his greatest influence.

DANGEROUS ALBUQUERQUE And the governor stands to be plagued in Albuquerque where he broke even with Joe Bursey in 1958 but could lose by thousands in 1960.

ORGANIZED LABOR FAVORS BURSEY Bursey's main stake in such a race would probably be the organized labor vote. The unionists would almost certainly pick him over Mead and Burroughs.

MEAD ELIGIBLE FOR TWO YEARS Mead's interest in the race is unusual in that he would be permitted but one two-year term if elected. His one term as lieutenant governor allows him only two more years in a state executive office without laying out two years.

MONTOYA CRITICISED BUT NOT OPOSTED There is a steady growl of criticism going here against U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya but not a sign of a primary opponent so far.

EVERYBODY BUT MOM ON STATE PAYROLL The bureau of revenue employment the other day of J. Benito Vigil of Texas made a count of seven payroll places for the family. Already on the payroll were three sons, two daughters and one of the daughter's husband.

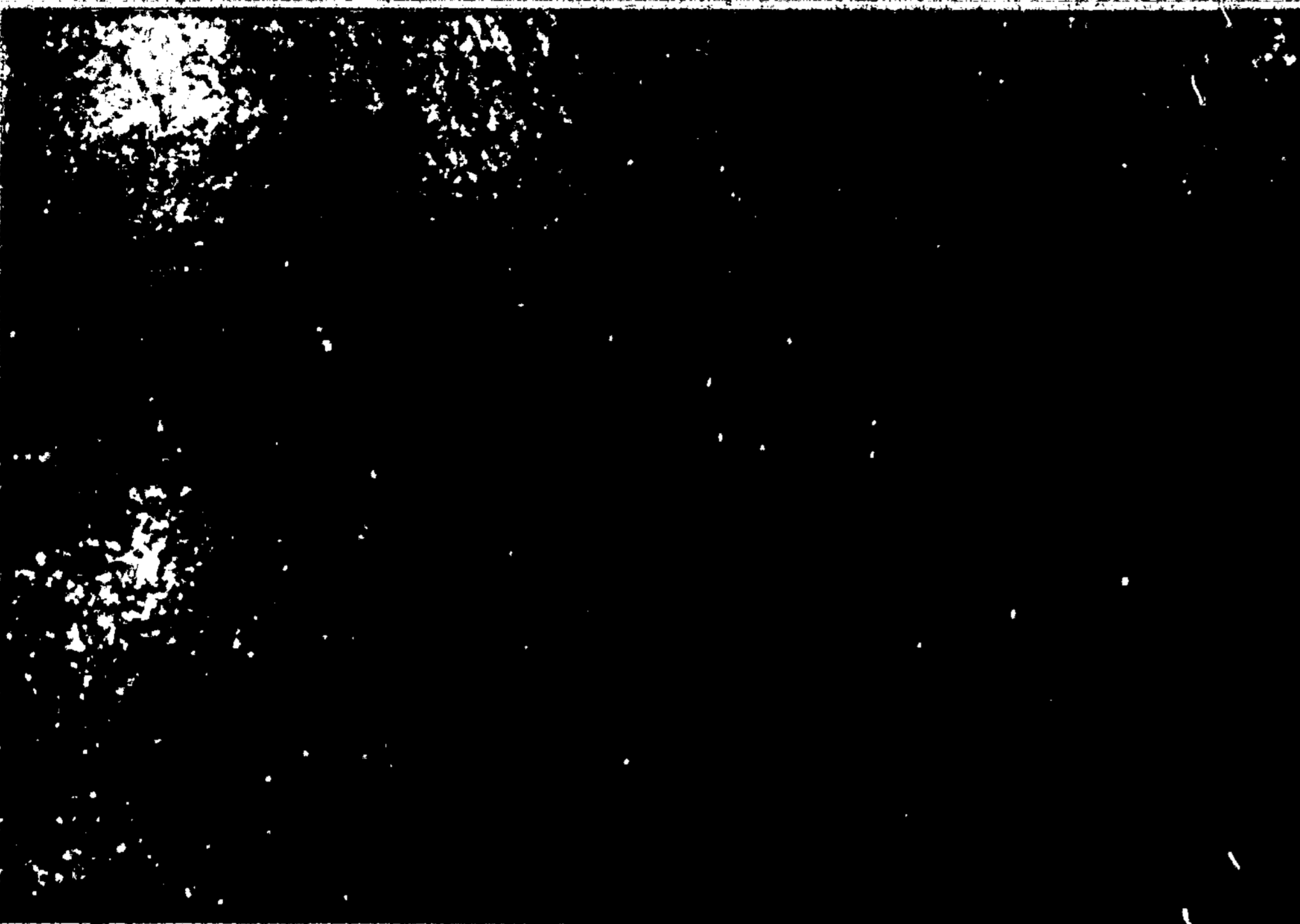
PICKETT, BLOCK VETO APODACA Commissioners Block and Pickett have agreed to over-ride insurance Superintendent Ralph Apodaca on his order increasing automobile insurance rates throughout the state with the exception of Albuquerque. It will be the first time of record that the commission has vetoed an act of the respected insurance commissioner. They take the position that the rate of the state is assumed to stay as low as those in Albuquerque.

SOY MANY JOBS FOR G. Y. FALLS G. Y. Falls, the new corporation commissioner, is going to be a busy man getting his share of funds on the commission payroll.

Corona digging out from banks of drifted snow; Graders completing work of clearing county roads

By MRS. A. E. MULKEY CORONA—This town, which was one of the hardest hit of all places by last week's snowstorm, has an estimated population of 580 people, but the population has had a big influx recently by the moving in of workers for the Houston Pipe Line construction project.

Located between Carrizozo and Vaughn in the northern part of Lincoln County and only a mile from the Torrance county line, Corona is surrounded by low hills and sheep and cattle ranches.

Snow started falling early Monday, Dec. 14, and continued all day Tuesday and Wednesday. High winds blew the snow into four to ten feet drifts.

At one point the snow was piled ten feet across the Lon road east of the railroad tracks, and shovels were used to remove part of the snow before the road grader could get through.

On Monday, Dec. 21, an Army plane dropped feed on the A-C-Hester ranch to feed about a hundred sheep. Army trucks were also used to haul feed to cattle and sheep in the Cedarvale area.

Many ranchers are still snowed in this week at the foot of the Gallegos mountains, but some were able to break through and get to town for food supplies.

One rancher took a day and a half, with help, to get out to the highway.

OPERATION HAYLIFT DROPS FEED TO LIVESTOCK An operation haylift by planes of the CAP was reported in the Corona area this week, dropping feed to several cattle and sheep ranches in area.

A county road grader came to the rescue of a surveying party in the Jicarillas Monday of this week.

Sheriff S. M. Ortiz stated that when the storm broke last week a small surveying party took refuge in a shack 1 1/2 miles south of the old Jicarilla store.

They were snowed in for seven days and had run out of food when the county grader, with Kenneth Lacy and Leroy McKnight broke trail to the shack so that the men and equipment could get out.

The area had 18 inches of snow and it had drifted some.

The county road crews have been on the job 24 hours a day since the big snow. Tuesday they were clearing the Lon and Pine Lodge roads.

PINE LODGE ISOLATED FOR SEVERAL DAYS Hubert Hatch, who carries the mail from Captain to Pine Lodge, was snowed-in at the resort for eight days. He finally walked six miles to State Road 49 and was brought into Captain by a rancher.

New Mexico Chronicle

The Christmas season of 1810 found a young lieutenant of the Army in Santa Fe. He was Jeremy F. Gilmer and his assignment was to supervise the construction of Fort Marcy.

What went on in Santa Fe at Christmas time more than a century ago was recorded by Gilmer in the following letter addressed to a friend in Washington, D. C., and dated December 27, 1846:

"On tomorrow our friend, Mr. Albert leaves Santa Fe for Washington, and has kindly offered to carry our letters home — I will write a short one for your perusal and entrust it to his care.

"Christmas is over—the winter nearly half gone, and here we remain with but little prospect of a change before next spring—Christmas day with us was clear, quiet and beautiful and we managed to pass it in a very pleasant manner.

"Our Mesa," composed of Capt. Weightman, Licita, Dyer, Walker and your humble servant gave a small dinner party which passed off well, and the evening was spent in little groups playing whist, ucre, etc. On last evening, his Excellency, Gov. Bent, gave a handsome entertainment, at which a larger portion of the officers in New Mexico were present. The affair was gotten up in very good style for Santa Fe, and good humor, wit and song prevailed throughout the company.

"We have had considerable excitement among us for some eight or ten days past in consequence of the discovery of a conspiracy among some of the influential Spaniards to cut our throats and repossess themselves of this country. Their plot was pretty well matured and a day appointed for its execution—the military leaders and civil-officers selected — when their intentions were discovered.

"Seven or eight of the persons implicated have been arrested, and scouting parties have been sent in search of others who have thus far escaped. Those who are now in limbo will be tried in a few days—most probably before a military court, and it is more than likely that some of them will be executed.

Fire hits thorium mill at Capitan

An estimated \$50,000 in equipment was destroyed by fire shortly after midnight last Friday at the mill of the New Mexico Thorium Corporation in Capitan.

Fire of undetermined origin swept the mill, newly completed, and which was scheduled to start production after the first of the year.

The ore bin nearby was scorched and slightly damaged, according to reports.

The night watchman checked the building at 10 o'clock Friday. It was said the building had had no fire for heating purposes for seven hours before the blaze.

The loss was partly covered by insurance.

Lee Downey is general manager of the corporation. It is said plans are being made to rebuild the mill.

Long holiday for county offices

The district court office in Carrizozo will be closed four days over the holidays, starting with Thursday, Dec. 24.

Income tax time comes early for farmers

Income tax time comes early for farmers. With returns due January 15 or February 15, farmers are already gathering information and making final plans for a year-end inventory.

A farmer may file his return and pay the tax by February 15. His tax obligation would be completed for the year. He might file an estimate by January 15 and pay the estimated amount of tax at that time. Then he must complete a regular return and pay any additional tax by April 15. Most farmers seem to prefer to do the whole job at once. They'll be making their returns before February 15, 1960.

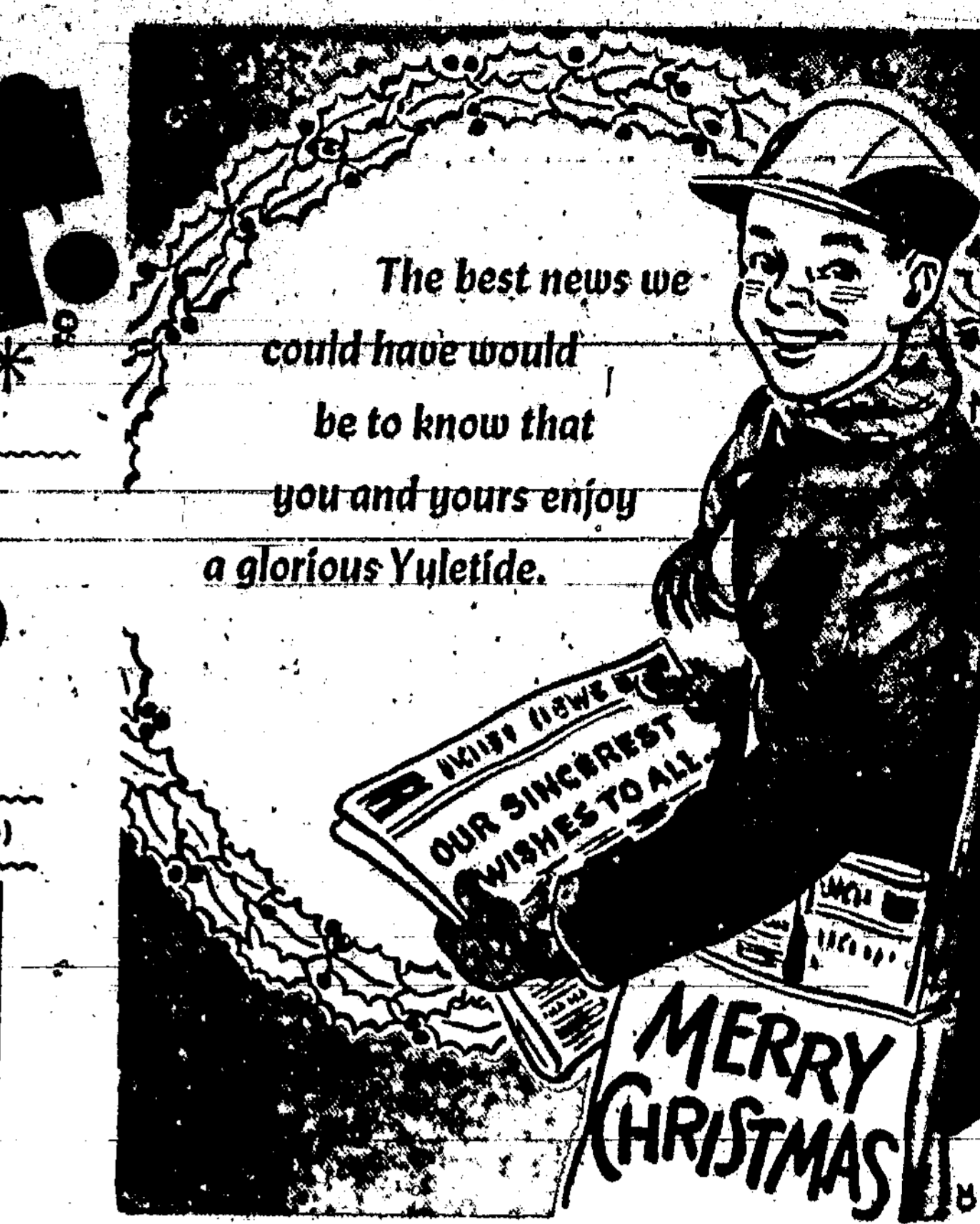
To help farmers, the Internal Revenue Service has prepared a Farmer's Tax Guide. Most farmers who are on their county agent's mailing list will get a copy. If you need one, write your county extension office. There are many changes in income tax requirements for farmers this year. However, the new edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide has a few added items and some clearer explanations.

One change is the increase in self-employment tax. For the 1959 tax year the rate is 3 1/2%. This is higher than for 1958 and it will go up another step for the 1960 year.

Here are a few things made clearer in this year's guide: the additional first year depreciation that became effective last year; the difference between pasture income and pasture rental and the way to report each; how to report income from farm partnerships; and what constitutes a partnership; and the way to calculate and report sales of timber from the farm.

"We are all waiting with much anxiety for news from Washington. The question of war and peace is one of much importance to us and we would be much gratified in knowing the probability. I will expect to hear information from you on this subject and others.

"We are put to much inconvenience here for the want of money, particularly small change to purchase articles necessary for use at table, etc. The Paymaster can pay in nothing but checks which are of little use to us in our current expenditures. Capt. Murphy, of Missouri, was sent to St. Louis in the early part of October for the purpose of bringing funds to pay the troops and for the Quartermaster's Department. When he will be able to return is doubtful, but we are expecting him daily. With his arrival, I hope to hear many things from you.

Returned to face bad check charge

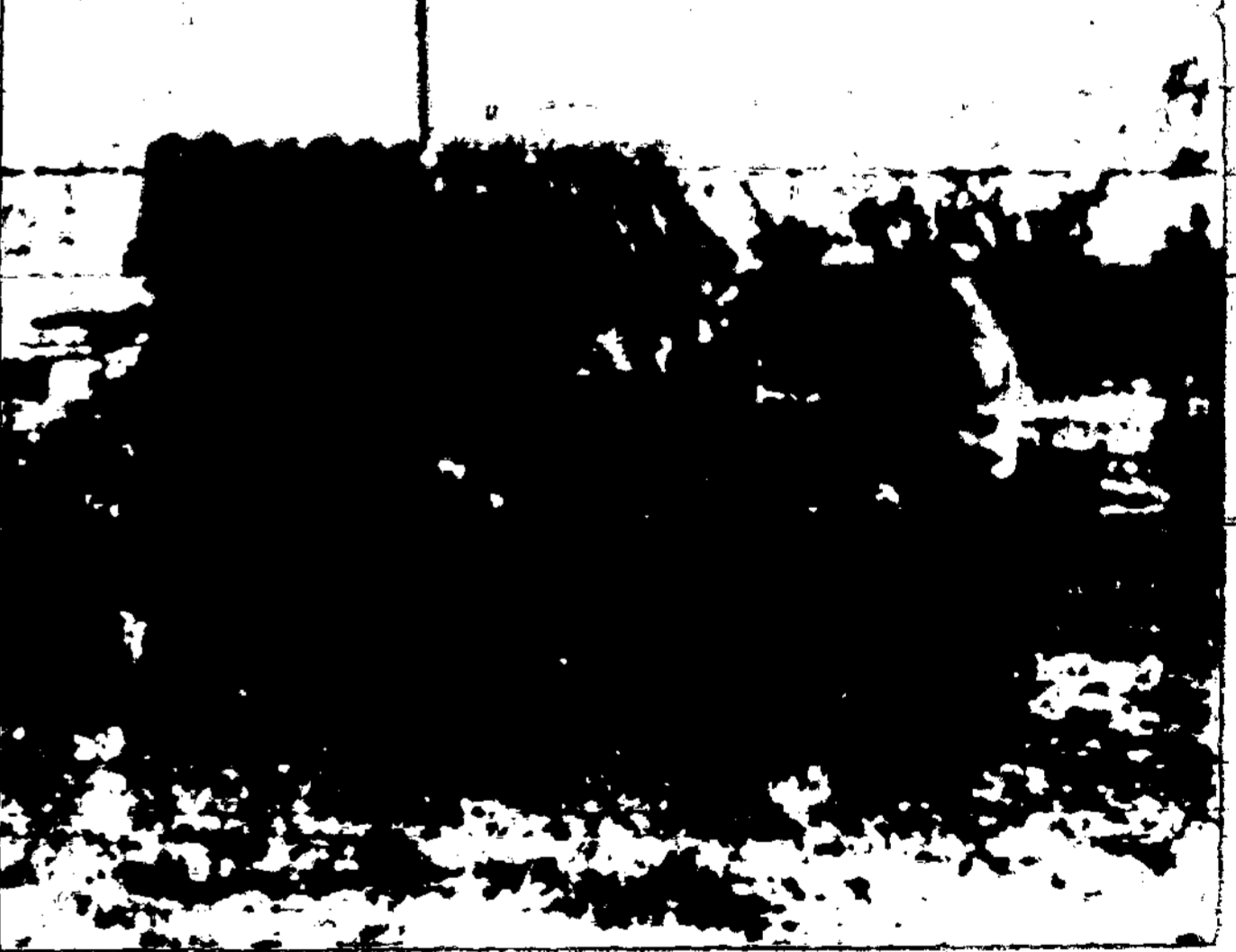

Nativity Scene at Fort Stanton



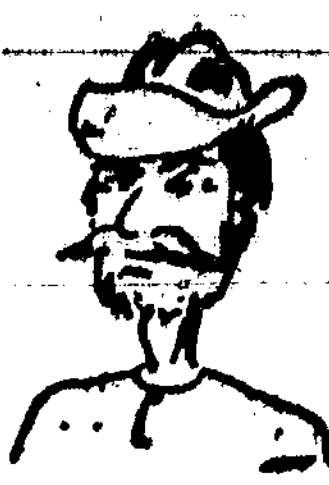
The Nativity Scene at Fort Stanton — part of the outstanding Christmas decoration which will remain on view through January 6.

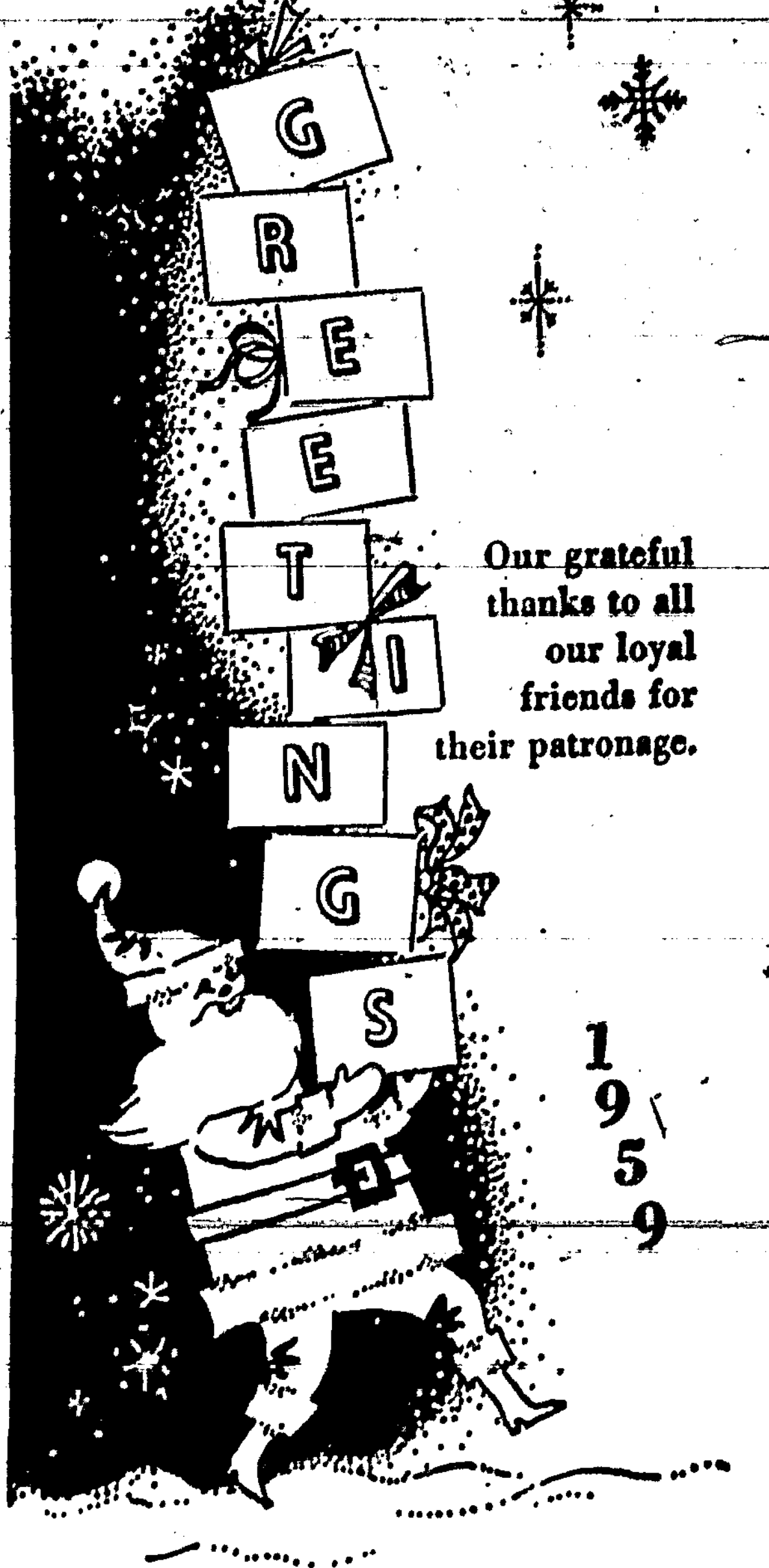

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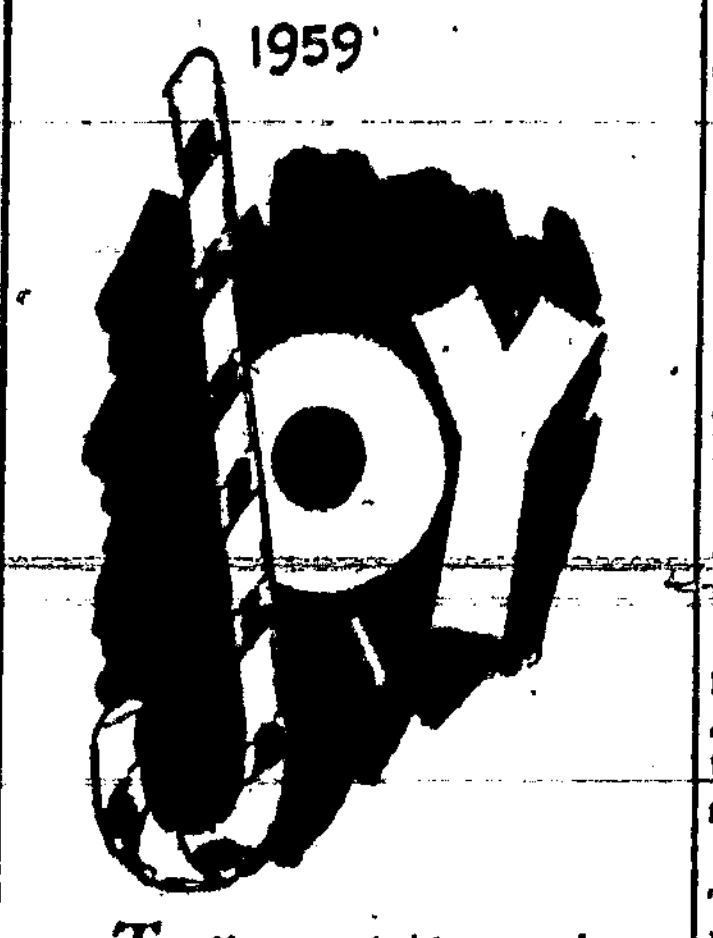

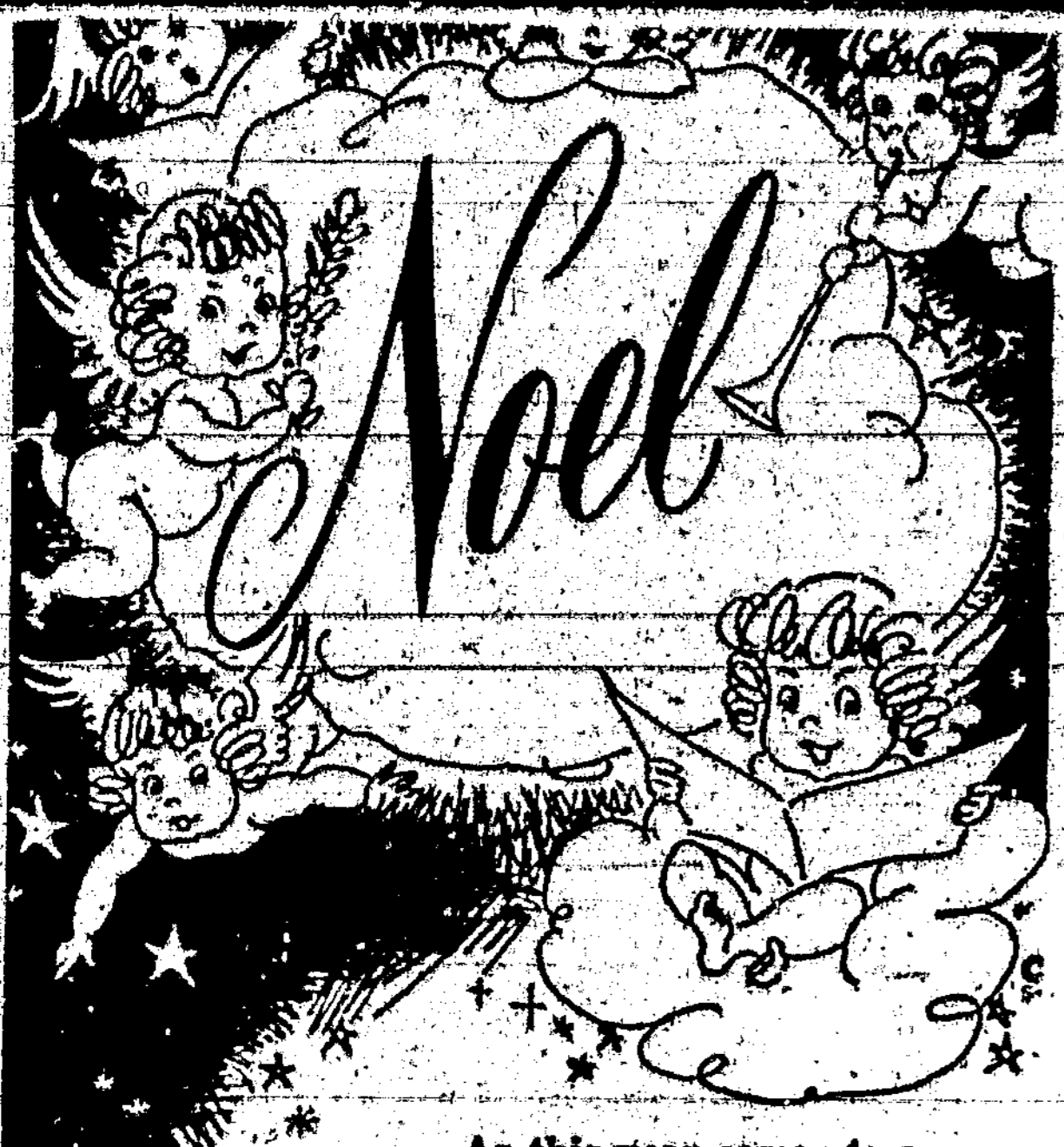

"Talking Back" is not an original title but was taken from a series of TV programs put out by the National Council of Churches. I liked the name and so I borrowed it. The column is meant for you (whether teenager or adult) to "air your views," ask advice and receive suggestions from the writer and the readers. I hope you will enjoy it—and, although it is not meant to replace the Teenster's Union I hope it will substitute for it until Pam feels that she can take-over again.

One of the chief "stumbling blocks" for Pam was that the letters she published were often attributed to her and she received the brunt of the criticism for ideas and "gripes" that were expressed by people who wrote in for advice and so forth. No one likes criticism, that's certain, but constructive criticism based on facts cannot be construed as negative. After all—the only way we learn is by criticism of the constructive sort and so any and all criticism is welcome if it be constructive!

A letter addressed to Pam is one that should be considered by all true citizens of Carrizozo. Here it is:

Dear Pam: I want the people from Ruidoso to know that all of us people from Zozo aren't alike. I know they probably think we're all the same. I'm talking about the suitcase someone broke into in the bathroom that belonged to a Ruidoso cheerleader. There were many other teenagers that were very disappointed and disgusted that anyone from Zozo could be so hateful. The trouble of it is, they take it out on the whole town. They can't do otherwise since they don't know who did it. I want them to know we're not all like that—"Zozozan."

Along the same line a letter came from Tularosa remarking about another incident that reflects adversely on this town:

Dear Teenster's Union No. 1: If the treatment you gave to us is the same you give to other visiting schools—then I hope we never have to go back there again! It's bad enough to be insulted, but when you start throwing rocks at our bus I think it's time to sever connections—if you know what I mean! "Julie from Tulle."

There were other letters—but these expressed the sentiments of both sides—and, of course, they are well-taken. It's simply this: either we act as civilized people or civilized people will have nothing to do with us! It's probably true that only a few so-called "sports" caused the trouble—but those few couldn't get away with it if we told them what we think. If rudeness and poor manners are accepted by the rest of the student body and disrespect and sloppy study habits are considered funny and cute then that's the kind of standards that will be maintained. The trouble is that when you must live in a community and go to a school where good citizenship is the standard you will find it difficult to adjust!

For instance—the kids are always looking for a "chaperone" for their dances; but I've been told by three different adults who have chaperoned the dances many times that they have never been thanked for their time nor had any indication that anyone appreciated it. It seems to me that since you have an organization—a secretary who could write a "Thank You" note or a committee that could at least give some indication to these good people who give-up an entire evening to chaperone—that it is appreciated! you'd have more willing chaperones.

Now, just a word to "Ticky Fingers." I suggest that you see a psychiatrist. It seems to me that you have a problem there—or perhaps if you wait another ten years you might be man enough to do something about it. Hard to say.

### Release report on stilbestrol in poultry

Stilbestrol required large individual dosages over one-third of the life-span of the test animal to produce tumors in poultry, according to Arthur S. Flemming, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, Washington, D. C.

In a telegram received from the Federal Extension Service by H. L. Mathews, poultryman with the New Mexico State University Extension Service, it is pointed out that the only poultry that might possibly cause cancer is the diethylstilbestrol-treated poultry (caponettes) by implantation only.

The Department of Agriculture urges all producers having live, treated birds to arrange for immediate processing regardless of weight and finish. The department will buy the treated poultry and divert this poultry to other usage. Less than one percent of the poultry produced would come under this classification, Mathews said.

Dollers, fryers and stewing hens are not treated individually with stilbestrol.

### N. M. Heart Ass'n offering prizes for State Science Fair

The New Mexico Heart Association will again offer cash awards totaling \$50 at the New Mexico State Science Fair to be held next April at New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology in Socorro. The announcement was made by Edwin Hyatt, program chairman and W. H. Foster, school health chairman of the State Heart Association.

Two awards will be made in the biology division, with \$30 going to the student judged to have the best exhibit in the senior division, and a \$20 award in the junior division. Qualified persons selected by the Heart Association will judge the exhibits according to the criteria announced by the state Science Fair director.

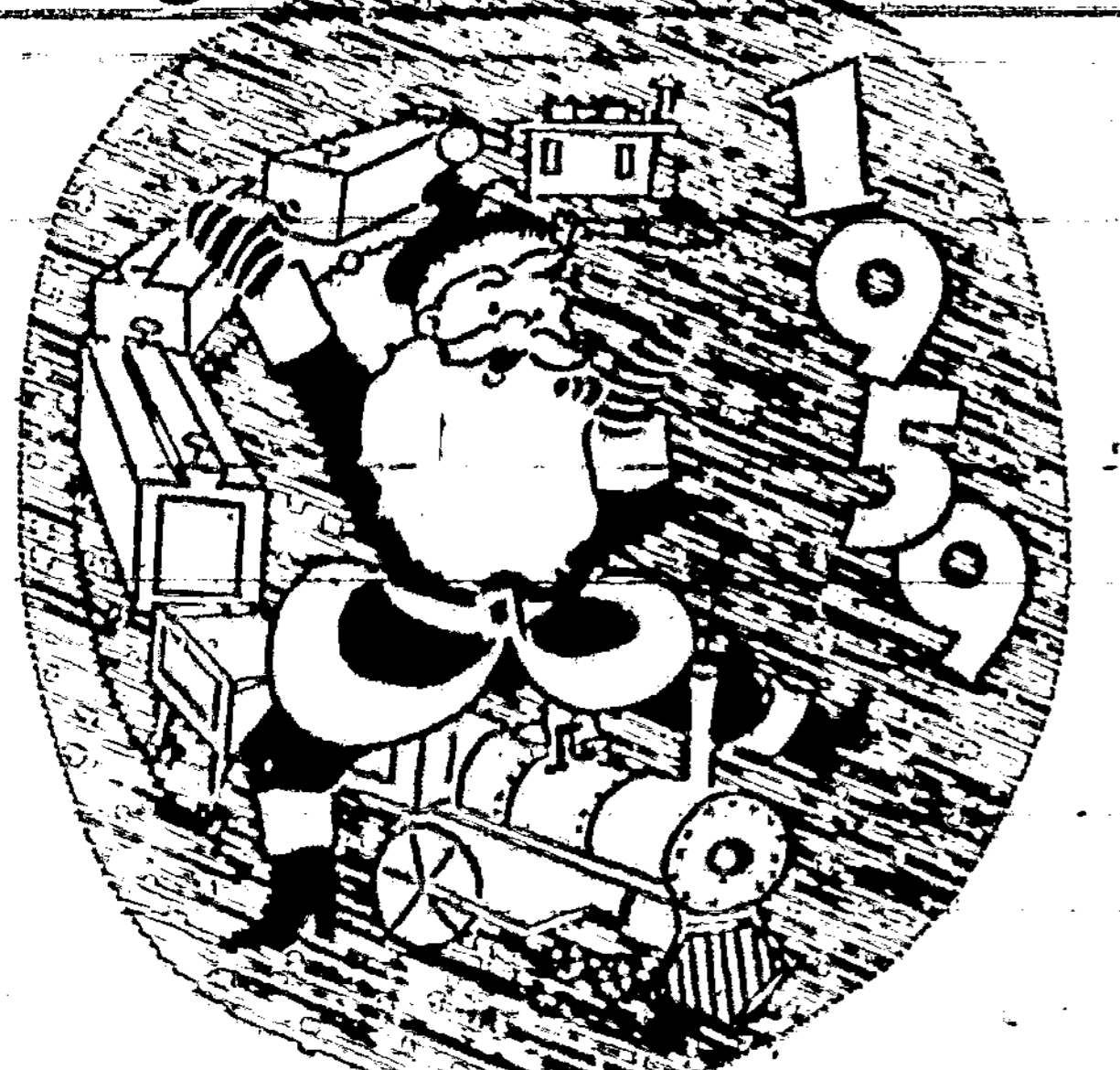
The Heart Association has available a list of heart-related projects suitable for science fairs, which students may request by writing to New Mexico Heart Association, Box 2178, Santa Fe. Exhibits need not deal with heart topics to be eligible for the announced awards.

### College course stresses teaching problems in elementary science

Socorro — A special college course, "Problems in Teaching Elementary Science" — designed to train elementary school teachers in techniques of conducting laboratory-like scientific demonstrations in the classrooms — will be offered during the spring semester at New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology.

Dr. William Hume, director of the college division, said the two-semester hour course will help the elementary teacher cultivate in children an interest in science at an early age when they have a great deal of natural curiosity.

## War duty not required for veteran to be buried in national cemetery

Burial in a national cemetery is available for a deceased veteran, regardless of whether his military service was during peace time or war-time, according to Donald E. Crow, manager, Veterans Administration regional office.

A basic requirement is that the veteran's last period of service was terminated honorably.

The grave site and actual interment, including opening and closing of the grave, is provided by the government without charge.

The wife, husband, widow, widower, minor children, and, under certain conditions, unmarried adult children of the eligible veteran may also be buried in national cemeteries. Burial for parents of the veteran is not available, Crow said.

If the wife dies before the veteran, the veteran's written intentions to be buried at the side of his wife should accompany the application for burial of the wife.

Applications must be to the superintendent of the national cemetery in which burial is desired. The VA office will furnish information and assist in preparing and filing an application.

## Political planning may disrupt private enterprise system, says F. B. official

Chicago, Ill.—The alternative to the market system is political planning, political management and political price fixing, Roger Fleming, secretary-treasurer of the American Farm Bureau Federation, recently told delegates to the 41st annual meeting.

"Most fundamental of all the issues... is the question whether we are going to protect the opportunity of the market system to continue to be the primary decision-making mechanism in America," Fleming told the delegates assembled at Chicago's civic opera house.

Fleming, who also is director of the Washington office of the world's largest farm organization, reported to the delegates that membership in 49 states and in Puerto Rico had climbed beyond the 1,600,000 mark during the year. He said that during 1959 membership had increased by 25,000 to push the total to 1,625,117 farm families.

Thirty-eight states, including all those in the midwest, gained in membership, he reported, and the western region reached an all-time high.

Membership has a special significance "during these times when agricultural policy is so much in the public limelight," he said.

Fleming discussed the question of the market system vs. political planning under the heading of "private competitive enterprise," one of six areas which he described as "major theatres of decision" for the American people.

He listed the other five as:

1. State responsibilities and states' rights. "Farm Bureau opposes the trend to over-centralization of power in the federal government."
2. Labor-management. "So long as labor unions retain their exemption from anti-trust statutes, so long as they are free to consolidate their bargaining power on an industry-wide basis, so long as they have the monopoly power that results from compulsory unionism, so long as they can use for political purposes the dues of their captive membership, extracted by check-off—so long as all of these things exist, unions will continue to have more economic and political power than is consistent with the general welfare."
3. Government farm programs.

### Three Lincoln National Forest landmarks Renamed in honor of Smokey the Bear

Names of three landmarks on the Lincoln National Forest are being changed in honor of Smokey the Bear — to commemorate his rescue as a small burned cub from a 14,000-acre forest fire there in May of 1950, the U. S. Forest Service has announced.

The motherless little bear, who is now recognized and accepted as the international symbol of forest fire prevention, recovered from his burns and today resides in the National Zoo in Washington, D. C.

He has grown into a big, husky cinnamon-colored 10-year-old (full grown for a bear) and is visited by hundreds of thousands of fans each year.

The fire which destroyed his home was started by a careless smoker, who flipped a match or cigarette into the dry woods along the road going through Captain Gap. The smoke was first discov-

ered from the Block Lookout. This blaze took place on the Captain Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest above the town of Captain, New Mexico.

The following name changes are being made:

Capitan Ranger District, with its ranger station in Capitan, will henceforth be the Smokey Bear Ranger District and Station.

Block Lookout will become Smokey Bear Lookout; and Capitan Pass, which is locally often called Capitan Gap, is being changed to Smokey Bear Gap.

Since the adoption of Smokey Bear as a symbol and the launching of the nation-wide cooperative forest fire program by the Forest Service, state foresters and the Advertising Council, the number of man-caused forest fires and acreage burned has been drastically re-

duced. However, there are still too many millions of acres of valuable timber and watered lands being damaged by fire each year because of human carelessness or indifference.

With an ever-increasing number of recreationists going into our national forests year by year, every forest user must be extra careful with every fire.

### Santo Domingos to reenact Christmas traditional dances

Santo Domingo Indian Reservation, New Mexico—With millions of people all over the entire world deeply concerned and worried about the advancement of the atomic bomb and the atomic age, the Santo Domingo Indians, who live in the valley at the foot of the mountain on which Los Alamos, N. M., "The Atomic City," is located, where the atom bomb was invented, are interested in only one thing, the customs, traditions and beliefs bequeathed them by their forefathers.

This amazing Indian Pueblo Indian village still continues a pattern of living following that of their ancestors. These native Indians live a type of peaceful life that their white brothers would if they could. With world destinies at stake, headlines heralding the arrival of foreign dignitaries, the traveling of our own chiefs of state and the nearby Los Alamos scientists continually improving on the atom bomb, the Indians of Santo Domingo still carry on.

They continue their traditional way of living. To them holidays are still celebrated in ancient tribal manner.

Following their forefathers' customs, the Santo Domingo Indians will open their traditional four-day

ceremonial Christmas dances on Christmas Day at their reservation 30 miles north of Albuquerque. The centuries-old dance will start immediately following the Christmas Eve Mass in the picturesque Santo Domingo mission, itself hundreds of year old, with many of its furnishings in constant use since 1605.

Visitors are invited to attend the dances each day and are also invited to attend Christmas (midnight) mass which will start at 2 a.m. Christmas morning, and be celebrated by Father Lambert, Franciscan father from Pena Blanca. Everyone worshipping at the ancient church must kneel or sit on the dirt floor as the mission, reflecting the simple and traditional life of the Santo Domingos, has no chairs or benches. It is recommended that visitors bring a small rug or cloth to sit and kneel on.

At the conclusion of the 2 a.m. mass the Indians start their dances inside the church and continue to dance inside the mission until daylight. They then adjourn to their sacred dancing plaza located between the two ceremonial kivas in the center of the village and continue the dances all Christmas day.

The second day the children, some of these barely out of the toddler stage but, instinctively talented, do the dancing. The third day the older tribe members dance and the fourth day (Monday, Dec. 28) everybody joins in a most thrilling and exciting dance.

The Santo Domingos have two parties, the Squash and Turquoise, who vie for the tribes leadership and the dances Christmas Day are said to be among their most important ones. Reportedly, the party that puts on the best dance has the best chance of electing one of its members to be the governor of the tribe for the coming

year. Because it is a contest, the dance each group performs is not announced in advance, but in previous years the groups have presented such dances as the Buffalo Dance, with its participants dressed like buffalo, deer, elk, etc.; the Comanche dance, with the male dancers wearing the brightest of feathers, ribbons, shells, bells and animal skins, and the squaws adorned in beautiful full-length natural colored buckskins covered with valuable shell beads, jasper, opal and turquoise and silver jewelry, as well as many other dances that require colorful costumes.

Other Indian Pueblos schedule dances to commemorate the Christ Child, but none has a program as ambitious or as colorful as the Santo Domingos. These Indians never dance outside of their village and never dance for money as some of the more modern Pueblo Indians do. They never allow picture-taking at any time, but the dances are open to the public each day.

The Santo Domingo pueblo is one of the largest and the most centrally located of all the Indian villages along the Rio Grande, located halfway between Albuquerque and Santa Fe. New Mexico state highway signs and a large state Tourist Bureau marker indicate the west turnoff from U. S. Highway 63 onto New Mexico 22, which is a paved road running into the pueblo.

The stern Puritans of New England, who frowned upon the celebration of Christmas as a pagan rite, went so far as to enact "blue laws" banning the making of mince pies. World Book Encyclopedia reports that mince pies are associated with Christmas because they were originally baked in the shape of a manger.

In the 300's, however, this attitude was beginning to change. World Book Encyclopedia reports that in the year 334 the Bishop of Rome declared December 25 to be the anniversary of the birth of Christ.

But it took another pagan ritual to help establish Christmas. The ancient peoples of Europe had been accustomed to celebrating the winter solstice, when the sun seems to return to the Northern Hemisphere, in late December. The pagan feast commemorating the victory of light over darkness was simply replaced by the Christian festival honoring the "Light of Life."

Jack L. Ruttle, sheep and wool marketing specialist with the New Mexico State University Extension Service stated this week that the Champion Territory Fleece at Chicago was shown by the Circle F Ranch of Roswell. The champion fleece was a fine wool, and was also first place in its class.

The reserve champion territory fleece was a one-half blood shown by J. L. Merritt of Yeso, It, too, was named first in its class.

Three other New Mexico growers were also among the winners. The Flying H Ranch, near Hope, won second place in the one-half blood class. Second place in the fine wool class was awarded a fleece shown by Curtis Hill of Roswell. Marley and Whitney of Roswell exhibited the second place fleece in the three-eighths blood class.

"New Mexico wool growers have made an exceptionally fine record in the 1959 national wool shows," Ruttle added. "The International was the list of six major wool shows in which New Mexico fleeces have competed in 1959. In these six shows, some 44 New Mexico fleeces have been shown. Of these, 42 have been awarded ribbons."

Judging will begin with swine on February 8 and will continue through February 12, ending with the judging of quarter horses—performance class.

The junior livestock auction sale will begin at 1 p.m., Feb. 12.

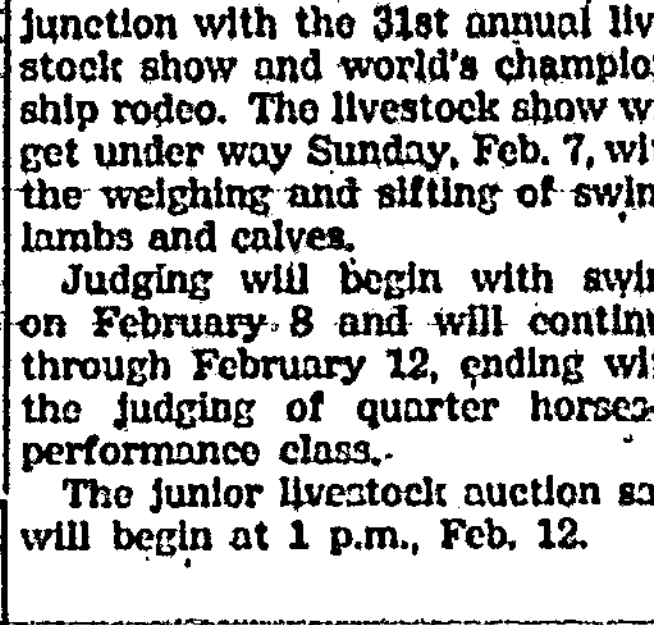

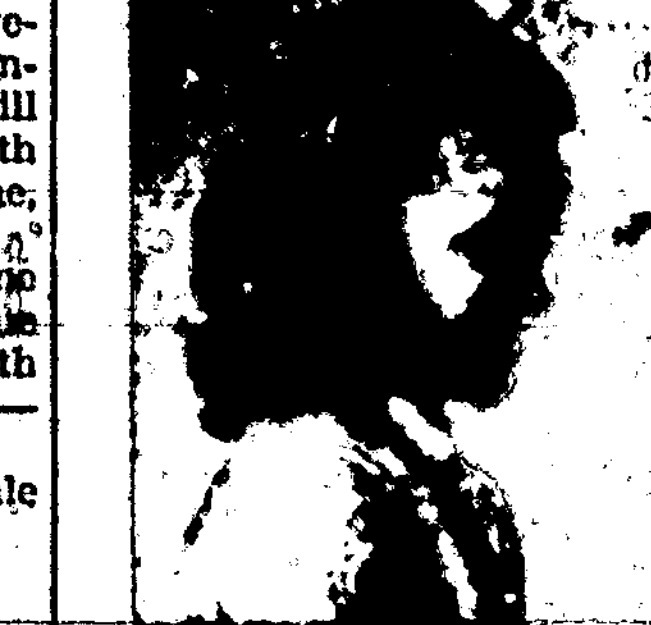
## Christmas in New Mexico reflects three cultures

Santa Fe, New Mexico—A state that prides itself on its heritage of three cultures, reflects these influences most strongly at Christmastime. The first citizen, the American Indian, stages spectacular dances, a combination of ancient pagan rituals and modern religious practice. Most of New Mexico's pueblo Indians begin their dancing shortly after midnight Mass, held in the local church. The Santo Domingo Indians have competitive dances and those chosen to dance rehearse long hours for many days before the big event.

One of the most impressive of these beautiful ceremonies is the famous "Procession of the Torch" held at the Taos Pueblo in northern New Mexico. Roaring bonfires light the way to the church, and colorfully costumed dancers line the path, chanting as the status of the Holy Mother is carried from the church in her finest robes.

Hundreds of brilliantly lit cedar torches fill the sky with orange light and the sound of guns shot into the air is frequently heard, warning the evil spirits to keep away. The following day at Taos, the Deer Dance is performed. Most of the other pueblos that dot the northern part of the state have dances and these go on for days. Old Christmas, in the early part of January, is also celebrated in certain areas.

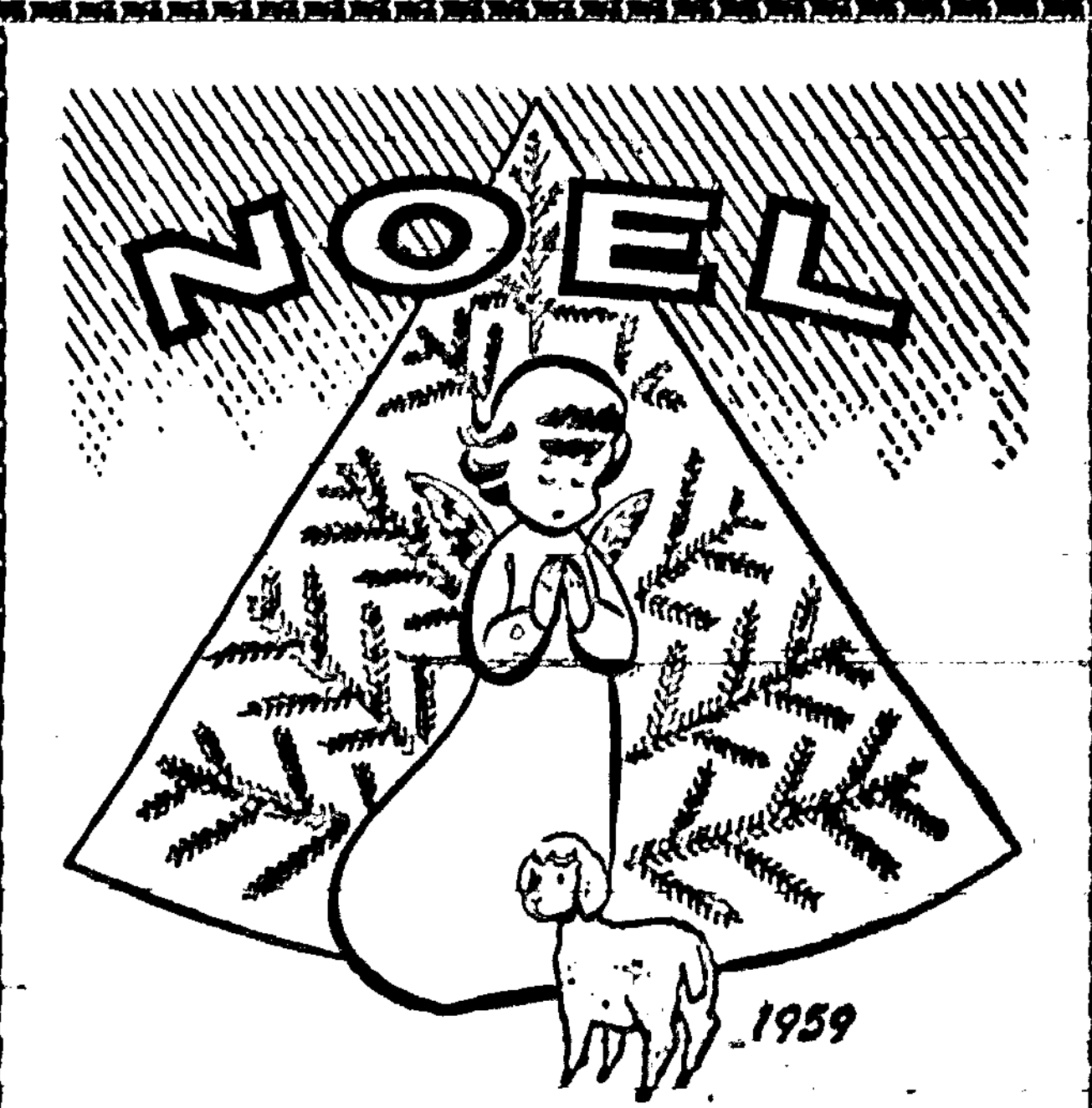

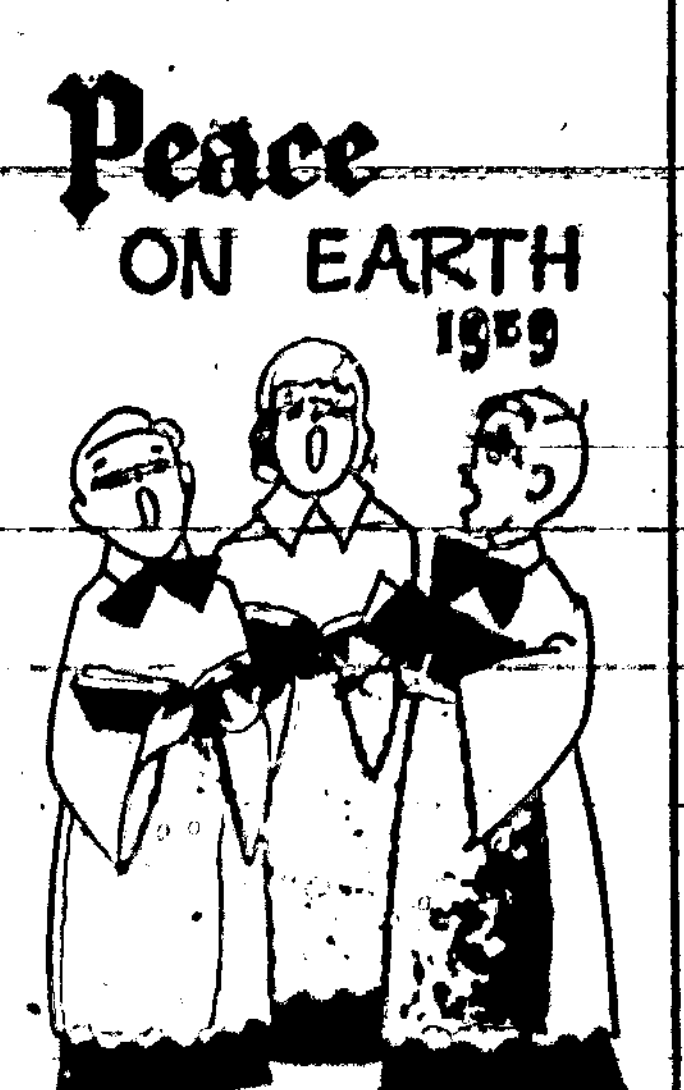

 "Almost all flags being flown today," said Steve Duggar, chairman of the committee, "have only 48 stars. They are out of date. They are not the real Old Glory. We think that everyone ought to own the real flag of our country. It would be great if every family in every street had one."  
 The new flags which these patriotic young pupils are selling measure 3 feet by 5 feet. They have sewn, non-fading stripes and printed stars. The flags alone, packed in a sealed polyethylene bag, sell for \$3.15. They may also be obtained, boxed complete with a two-piece pole, a gilded ball for the top, halyard and socket, for \$4.85. Profits will be used for extra curricular school activities.  
 During the past two or three years many people have put off buying a new flag because of the expected admission of Alaska and Hawaii into the Union. Now that they are states, a new flag can be bought with assurance that it will be a long time before any more stars will be added.  
 Orders for these flags may be placed directly with any pupil in the Sophomore grade of the Carrizozo High School, or Mr. Wagner, high school principal.

## Legumes build ewes before lambing

Here's a tip for farm sheep operators whose flocks will be lambing soon. Research tests have been conducted to determine how much grain is needed by a pregnant or nursing ewe for best performance.

All ewes in the test received four pounds of legume—grass silage and legume hay free choice.

(Good quality legume hay may be substituted for the legume-grass silage as used in this research test.) Three levels of grain mix, consisting of two parts oats and one part corn by weight, were fed.

The amounts of grain mix fed were one-half, one, and one and one-half pounds per day per ewe eight weeks prior to lambing. After lambing the levels of grain mix fed were raised to one, two and three pounds per head per day.

The fastest gaining lambs came from the lots fed the medium and heavy grain ration: Ewes on the light grain ration did not produce enough milk for best lamb performance.

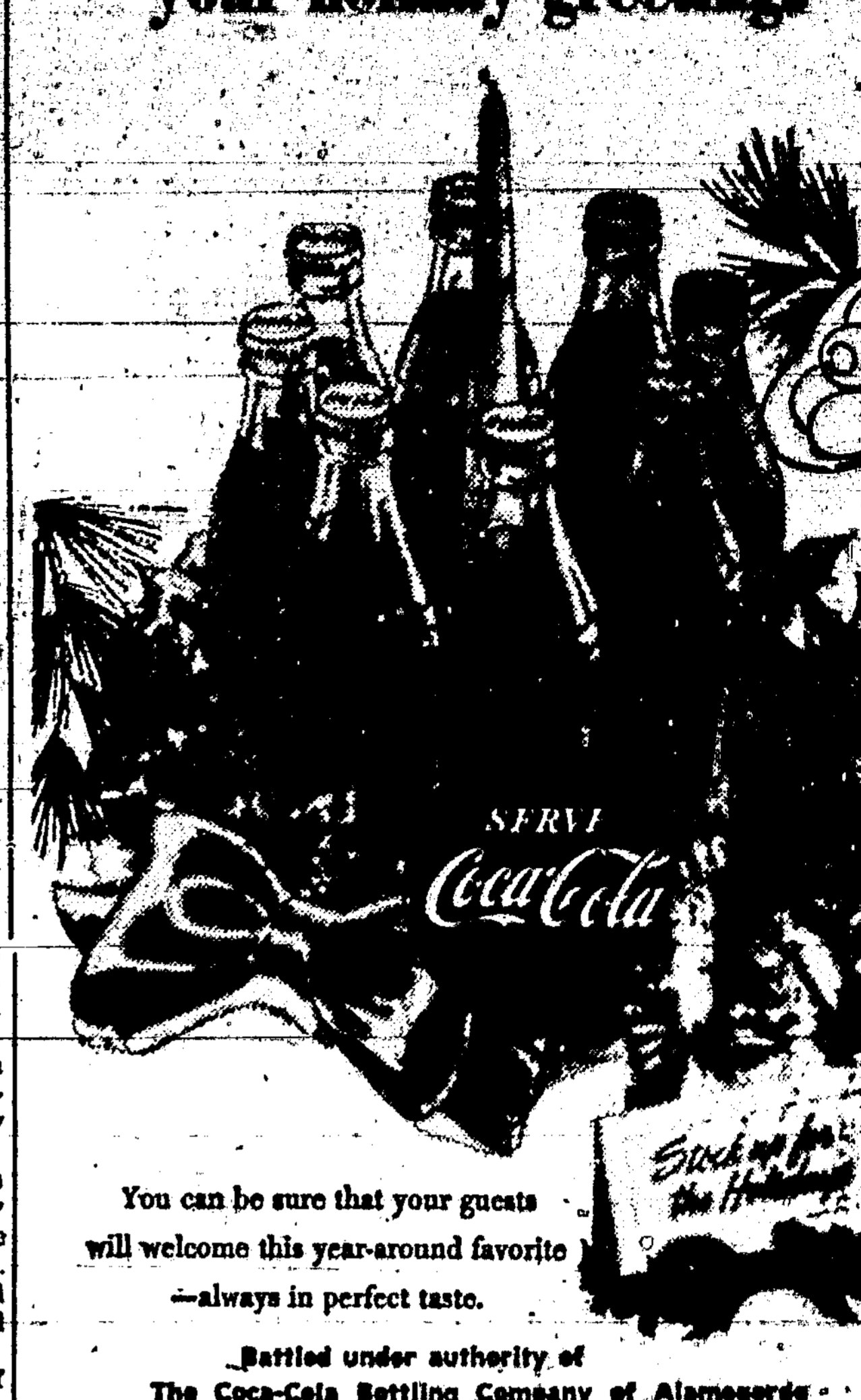
