Tribute to Nellie A. Branum

"Blessed are the dead that die in the Lord from henceforth; for of them it is said that they rest from their labors; and their memorial is from generation to generation." Rev. 14:13.

How shall a son proceed to compose a tribute to his mother now deceased? What can he now say that has not already been too long delayed in the saying? How much can he put into sincere simple language, devoid of maudlin sentiment? The answer to all these questions is simple. A man is composed of many abstract and complex things, more or less enduring in nature, most of which sprang from seed planted and nurtured by his mother.

These parts of a less enduring nature include a small boy's complete and abiding faith in the warm sanctuary and comfort of his mother's arms and his fascination with the magical skill of her quick sure hands with simple things like pie crust or a crochet needle, where-with beauty is fashioned from ordinary things. But these things are so much a part of boyhood as to be almost obliterated in the process of attaining manhood. A man likes to flatter himself that he has put away the things of his boyhood. Make no mistake, however, they are still a part of him, and will live as long as the man.

The chief structure of a man's character, astonishing as it may seem, is planned and directed by women; his mother, his grandmother, the teachers in elementary school and Sunday School, and in later years, his wife. From them he obtains his first and deepest impressions of the noble sentiments, religious persuasion, loyalty, honesty, patriotism and filial devotion. Fortunately indeed is the man who obtains these impressions from his mother.

Aside from these, which are a part of the man and may perish with him, what inheritance do we have from mother? The magic of her gentle, skillful hands is now no more; and the exquisite products of that skill are suddenly in limited supply and must eventually perish since they are material things. So the inheritance which may endure consists of these: Faith, knowledge, patience, love, suffering, goodness, brotherly kindness, love; all of which she dispensed, without reserve, in "full measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over."

Let us therefore, from the example of the deceased, take increased concern for the living, in order that we may endow the new generations with the precepts by which she lived; that we are in this life for the sake of our fellow man, that none shall be turned away hungry, or cold, or sick, or in need of anything we can provide. If we succeed in some small measure, then surely her memorial shall indeed be from generation to generation. —Lin Branum

Bill Would Permit Wider Policy in Trout Plantings

A bill which would permit the State Game Department to plant trout in Bonita Lake has been introduced in the Twenty-fourth Legislature by Rep. W. G. Bradley (R) of Lincoln County.

Co-sponsors of the bill are Reps. John J. Merabon, Dale Scott and Earl L. Turner.

The act, which authorizes the State Game Commission to stock fish in certain waters where reasonable restrictions upon fishermen prevail, is further worded:

"Section 1. In order to provide licensed fishermen with a maximum opportunity to fish, the State Game Commission is authorized to stock municipal lakes and reservoirs, waters on Indian lands and waters on privately owned lands where they are open to the public for fishing and the State Game Commission finds restrictions upon fishermen imposed by owners or operators to be reasonable. The operation of any such waters for a commercial purpose shall be considered an unreasonable restriction."

House Bill No. 144 (above) has been reported to committee, the News has been informed.


He will be at an office in the courthouse between the hours of 10 a.m. and noon.

Wyoming History Related to Lions

One of Wyoming's famed legends—the story of Tom Horn, notorious gunman of the early days, was related to the Lions Club Thursday evening by Frank C. Wagner, high school principal.

He was raised in southeastern Wyoming in the area, bounded by the north fork of the Platte River that curves into the central part of the state. It was here that the Johnson County cattle war took place between the cattlemen and the homesteaders and sheepmen.

As a boy Mr. Wagner heard from his elders stories of the bitter conflict in which many people were killed on both sides.

Of all the gunmen brought in by the cattlemen to fight the homesteaders and drive them away, Tom Horn was the most feared.

Person after person met death from his gun until he finally killed a young boy by mistake. After that he was brought to trial and sentenced for the crime.

He escaped jail only to be recaptured and hung. However, later events raised doubt in the minds of many if it really was Tom Horn who was hung, or someone else in his place.

Methodists to Have 24-hr. 'Prayer Vigil'

In cooperation with all the Methodist Churches of the Albuquerque District the Trinity Methodist Church is conducting a "prayer vigil" for the 24-hour period beginning Friday the 13th at 5 p.m. (which is the World Day of Prayer) and lasting until Saturday the 14th at 6 p.m.

The entire 24-hour period has been divided up into half-hours with members and friends of the church assuming "responsibility" for each half hour of prayer.

Everyone is welcome to participate in the service or attend the special services that will be conducted on Friday at 6 p.m.; at midnight Friday, and noon Saturday and again at 6 p.m. Saturday to end the prayer vigil.

Rev. Homer Reid suggests that: "Prayers should be offered for yourself; for your spiritual needs; that you may truly share the love of Christ with all people with whom you come in contact."

"For your home; that it may have the peace and love of Christ. For every member of your family personally. For your church; its leaders and members. For a great deepening of the spiritual life and an enriched sense of Christian fellowship."

"For your community. For all in your community who are Christians that they might give a witness, consistent and helpful witness to the world."

"For all in your community who are not Christians that through Christian witness and influence they may come to know Christ as a personal Savior and have their lives remade."

"That your community may have its sin-spots removed, its unwholesome influences eradicated, and that it may be a happy one and a good place in which to live. For our world; with its agonies and strife that there might come a new spirit of righteousness, understanding and peace."

"For the persons you know and think of who need your prayers and who have been laid upon your heart."

Rev. Reid extends a cordial invitation to all churches in the community to participate in this prayer vigil. A new altar has been built for the occasion by one of the members of the MYF. The church will be open all week for prayer and meditation.

Funeral services were held in Carrizozo at the Shaw Mortuary chapel Tuesday morning for Mrs. Nellie A. Branum, 82, who died Sunday morning in the Carrizozo hospital, following an illness of several months.

Rev. G. F. Mickey of Socorro officiated, with music by a mixed quartet from Roswell. Zane Kerr, leader. Interment was in the family plot in Carrizozo's Evergreen cemetery.

Mrs. Branum was a Lincoln County pioneer. Her parents, Thos. W. Henley and Nancy M. Henley, settled on the Bonito in 1880. Mrs. Branum had been a continuous resident of the county since that time.

Nellie Ann Henley was born April 27, 1876, near Jefferson City, Mo. She was married to Lin Branum June 6, 1896, at the family home in Nogal, N. M.

She was a past noble grand of Coslora Rebekah Lodge of Carrizozo and was a member of the Church of Christ.

Throughout her life she was steadfast in her devotion to her Christian faith, to her family and her friends.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Margie Clouse of Carrizozo; by three sons, Lin Branum of Woodland Hills, Calif., Rufus Branum of Dinuba, Calif., and Clint Branum of Albuquerque; by eight grandchildren, seven great grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Other ranchers placing high in the show were Joe Skeen, Slaughter Ranch, Kenneth Vance, H. P. Joyce, Herman Goodrum, Bud Walker, Walter Jones, S. P. Johnson, Jr., McKnight & Shanks, John A. Cooper, Buzzy Johnson, and J. L. Merritt.

In the Junior Wool Show, Lincoln County 4-H members placed high. In the fine wool ewe class John (Punk) Cooper took second, and Joe Hays fourth. In the fine wool yearling class Howard Shanks took fifth, Walter Jones sixth. In the half blood and coarser ewe fleeces, Joe Cooper placed third, Jud Cooper, 5th, Edwin Hindl, 7th, and Ronnie Merritt, 9th.

Johnson Clark Hust Dies at Las Cruces

News was received in Carrizozo this Wednesday of the death of Johnson Clark Hust, in Las Cruces. He had attained the age of 91 years and 91 days.

He passed away peacefully in his sleep Tuesday night at the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Hust near Las Cruces, where they had lived for about 30 years.

Funeral services will be at 2:30 Saturday, Feb. 14, at the Graham Funeral Home in Las Cruces. Interment is to be in Las Cruces.

Mr. Hust was one of Lincoln County's old timers and he was widely known in adjacent counties.

Before Carrizozo was a town he was proprietor of the Top O' The Morning Saloon in Nogal and also operated the Nogal and Walnut Stage line to and from Nogal to evening trains. He also rented livery rigs.

His original homestead is now part of the Bryco Dugger ranch and Mr. Hust lived in Carrizozo for a number of years.

He was called "Old Sage" because of his down to earth advice to friends who asked his opinion, sometimes on legal matters.

His motto was to live and be a friend to all mankind, especially those who had little worldly goods.

According to those who knew him he was a man of great wit and a keen sense of humor.

Johnson Clark Hust was born in Missouri on November 11, 1867. He came to Lincoln County at the age of 9 and lived in and around the county for about fifty years.

On December 26, 1900, he was united in marriage to Fannie Cochran. To this union was born eight sons and three daughters. One son and daughter died in infancy.

His survivors are his devoted wife, Fannie; sons Sidney Hust of California, Clayton of Magdalena, Dee of Santa Fe, Clark Jr. of North Carolina, Maynard and Howard of Kentucky, and Don, who is in France. By two daughters, Mrs. Barbara Beauford of Indiana and Mrs. Ben Billips of Las Cruces; four grandsons and seven granddaughters and by several nieces and nephews.

The entire family, except Don, are present in Las Cruces.

Mrs. John W. Harkey of Carrizozo is a niece of Mr. Hust. She and Mr. Harkey paid the elderly couple a visit in Las Cruces last Christmas.

Carrizozo Buys New Police Car

The Carrizozo town board met last Thursday evening, two days after their regular meeting date, due to the illness of Mayor Wayne C. Withers. After a covers case of flu, the mayor presided, though still not feeling up to par.

Three bids from Carrizozo firms were opened for a new police car. By unanimous vote the lowest bid was accepted—that of the Lincoln County Motors for a 1933 custom V-8 Ford sedan—costing the town \$1500 net after trade-in.

The board accepted the resignation of Albert Collier as town patrolman.

Additional revisions were reported made on the new set of town ordinances which will be adopted in the near future.

It was brought out at the meeting that Carrizozo was without power for less than ten minutes last week when the main power line near Las Cruces broke, shutting off current to a quarter of the state. Carrizozo's standby power plant was started up and was feeding current into the town's power lines within approximately seven minutes.

Two of the town's streets have been improved with gravel surfacing. The gravel to be excavated to make a garbage pit and is stockpiled for use.

Work was reported started on the right-of-way for the new REA power line, Capitan to Carrizozo.


23 on Program for TB Workshop at Ft. Stanton



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
