

Road Planning Committeemen Meet in Carrizozo

(Following are the minutes of the county road planning meeting held Monday at the courthouse in Carrizozo):

The meeting was called to order at 10:30 a.m. by John Cooper, chairman; minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Correspondence was read.

Mr. Dunlap read the letter we had received from B. L. Smith on March 3, asking for a list of county road planning delegates up to date.

Roll-call was taken, members present: Charles A. Jones, Encino-so, Captain area; George W. Shanks, Lon area; John A. Cooper, Arabella area; Walt Wilson, Ancho area; Guy Dabney, Alt. Floy Skinner, Noyal area; Archie Perkins, Alt. A. C. Heater, Corona area; Kenneth Noaker, Glencoe area; Kelly Stephenson, Alt. Truman Spencer, Jr., Oscura area; and Pat Murphy, White Oaks area.

Others present included LeRoy McKnight, Walter Jones, Herb Lowery, R. G. (Buster) Bird, Jr., Herman McKibben, Fred Pfingsten, County Commissioners Emmett Reese, Clint Sultemeler, R. C. Nunez, Forest Officials Roy Callaway, Everett Doman, M. E. Guck, from the State Highway Department B. L. Smith and R. R. Sedillo, and County Agent Ralph R. Dunlap.

The two areas not represented were the Lincoln and Angus, Ruidoso, Alto areas.

Mr. Dunlap pointed out that the four year term is up this year for the even numbered areas, and that they will need to hold election in their area to vote on their members for the coming year.

John Cooper opened the election of officers for the coming year. G. W. Shanks nominated John Cooper for chairman, Charles Jones nominated G. W. Shanks. G. W. Shanks asked if Mr. Jones would withdraw his name, which Mr. Jones did, and Mr. Cooper was elected by acclamation. Kenneth Noaker nominated G. W. Shanks for vice chairman, he was elected also by acclamation.

Mr. Smith said that he and Mr. Sedillo were glad to be able to attend. The Angus, Captain project is the one recently let. This includes 8 7/10 miles costing \$273,000. Angus, crossing Indian Divide and into Captain on the arterial system; \$108,000 of it is to be from the federal aid secondary fund, and the remainder from the arterial road fund.

The reason the Corona-Lon road was not done before the Angus-Captain project is because we were unable to get the right-of-way straightened out until another survey had been taken. The Corona-Lon route will be the next project to be done. It is to be included in 1960-61 funds fiscal year. This 5 1/2 miles should cost in the neighborhood of \$230,000.

Pat Murphy asked what number Corona-Lon and the Angus-Captain area are under contract. Mr. Smith answered by saying the Angus-Captain is number 5, and the Corona-Lon is number 4A.

Kenneth Noaker asked Mr. Smith to thank whoever was responsible for covering up the rock piles in Devil's Canyon. Mr. Smith advised that we write to District Engineers in Roswell and thank him. Kenneth Noaker made a motion that we send him a thank you letter and George Shanks seconded the motion. Charles Jones asked to have the letter include a thank you for (Wedgick lane) drain, and fencing done on Highway 48. The motion carried.

Mr. Smith said that the County Commissioners and the Secretary should receive a letter from New Mexico State Highway Commissioners saying that they will go along with the road planning committee on any priority, but reserve the right of final approval.

Mr. Smith asked Clint Sultemeler if he was pleased the way the Corona-Lon road was surveyed the last time. Mr. Sultemeler said that they made the road the way the state wanted it. Smith also asked him if they met with them on the survey on the Corona-Lon road project. "No they were out the day we went to see them."

Emmett Reese said that he liked the way they did it. I am behind them 100%," he added.

Mr. Cooper asked what happened to the money allotted to counties that do not use the money allotted that year. Mr. Smith answered by saying that records were kept as to when enough money was set aside for a certain county they could draw it all out at once and use it on their next project. The State Highway Department will not approve a road priority until enough money has been set aside for it.

Perkins asked what has been accomplished since this committee has been set up. Mr. Smith said that his office keeps active records on all projects since their start in 1946 when the Federal Aid Secondary Highway Act came into being. \$1,177,000 has been spent in Lincoln county on secondary roads for 25 miles of road. The Noyal road is not included in this cost or mileage.

Perkins asked if \$108,000 a year

Three Being Held for Counts Store Breakin

Three young men, said to be AWOL from the Navy, are to have a hearing in district court March 13 on the charge of breaking into the Counts store in Tinnie last Friday.

They are Truman Ray Aulian, Robert Ginson and Darrel Griffin. The men were brought back from Amarillo where they drove in Aulian's car.

According to the sheriff's office clothing, several pairs of slippers were stolen; also a suit belonging to a school teacher in Hondo. The suit was hooked in Roswell.

Eather Neu was returned to Carrizozo Saturday from Carlsbad to face a charge of larceny. She is alleged to have stolen money from her daughter in Ruidoso Downs.

Truman Rustin is awaiting trial in district court March 13 on a charge of grand larceny.

Isn't normally spent in Lincoln county on secondary roads, and Smith answered yes to this. One of the cheaper projects is the Corona-Lon one for 5 1/2 miles that will cost only an estimated \$233,000.

Perkins asked what exactly was meant calling a road an arterial road. Mr. Smith called it a through road designated by the Highway Commission.

Mr. Smith agreed with Kenneth Noaker that the county has nothing to do with arterial roads. Mr. Murphy stated that the White Oaks road had approximately 14 to 60 cars a day, year round, driving over it, and asked where it stood with priority. It is number 6 on the list. Charles Jones agreed, but stated that if Lincoln and Chavez counties pooled their money together the Pine Lodge road (49) would be able to get almost twice as much road for half the price, by putting it all in one project.

It was agreed that they wanted to get the most for their money. Perkins said that he feels that we should pay the money on the road that shows the most need for it.

Mr. Smith stated that Chavez county will need two fiscal years to have enough money to start on this project.

Chavez representative Herb Lowery, said that he feels that the Pine Lodge road will be of first priority in his county, although they haven't had their meeting as yet.

Charles Jones asked how Archie Perkins got his road. Smith answered by saying it was given a priority for first system addition as it had a bad bridge, and it was recommended that money be spent on it four years ago, and still no bridge.

Mr. Murphy asked if we shouldn't just leave priorities as they are, and Mr. Smith agreed saying, I think your roads on the original priority of the secondary systems should be completed unless conditions change in the use of these roads.

Emmett Reese brought up the Farm-to-Market and Recreation road problem. He felt that we should get away from calling them Farm-to-Market roads and recognize the recreation use of these roads.

L. A. (Whit) Whitaker Dies in California

Word has been received in Carrizozo of the death of Lindsay A. Whitaker, Thursday, March 5, in Temple City, Calif.

Though he had been away from New Mexico for many years, he called it his home and had returned yearly to Carrizozo for a medical checkup, was a registered voter and also treasurer of the annual Billy the Kid Rodeo at Three Rivers.

He was 72 years of age, born in York, South Carolina. Internment was in the Sunnyside Mausoleum in Long Beach, Calif. A sister survives, Viola C. Turfiter.

Mr. Whitaker was a member of the Carrizozo Masonic Lodge. He was active in civic affairs in Carrizozo, being manager of the Country Club and a member of the ration board during World War II. He was a veteran of World War I.

He was a regional Ford dealer until the sale of his business to Roy Shafer in 1930.

A former Carrizozo resident lost his life in a car accident last Thursday morning. He was Claude Oswald, 64, of Los Lunas, who died instantly from a broken neck when his pickup crashed while travelling south on US-83, a mile south of Los Lunas.

New Mexico Has Opportunities for Agriculturists

New Mexico is a land of opportunity for progressive farmers and ranchers. Percy Burk, representative of the Ralston Purina Company told a group of interested listeners at the Village Inn Cafe Wednesday evening.

Mr. Burk's talk followed a dinner attended by a number of ranchers and businessmen.

New Mexico, Mr. Burk said, brings in from other states more pork, eggs and beef than it produces.

As an illustration he said that in the Pecos Valley (Chaves and Eddy counties) three packages sell 35,000 hogs annually and less than 5,000 head of hogs are produced locally.

"We need 150 more pig parlors, producing 200 hogs yearly," he said.

The same situation applies to poultry, he continued. "We have 50,000 laying hens in the Pecos Valley. We need 150,000 more hens to feed our growing population."

School Census to be Taken in Carrizozo

Carrizozo School District It is again time to take the school census. The school census must be taken between the first day of March and the first day of May of each year.

Section 4, Article 12. Such census shall only include all unmarried persons residents of district or districts over which such boards of education have supervision, who will be six years of age or over, and not over 18 years of age, on the first day of January of the year following the taking of the census.

Mrs. Rachel West will again be the census enumerator for Carrizozo. Much of the necessary information can be secured from the school record. However, it is essential that we get all children that will be starting to school for the first time on the census. This helps us to correctly plan for the beginning group. Suit Against Carrizozo To Have Day in Court

Judge Garnett R. Burks of Socorro is to preside in district court April 7 in the case of Cecil Clark, former chief of police, vs. the Town of Carrizozo, a suit for damages.

The plaintiff claims wages are due for dismissal without a hearing. He is represented by the law firm of Frazier and Cusack, Roswell.

The town is represented by Attorney Forrest Sanders of Las Cruces.

A town official informed the News this week that Mr. Clark did not request a hearing at the time of his dismissal.

Judge Burks will hear a trial by jury case April 8—Frank Trujillo vs. Gerald Thompson, a suit for damages.

Jury trial previously set for March 17, Judge W. T. Scoggin presiding, has been postponed to a date to be set later. He will preside over a district court session March 13.

Commissioners Award Truck Bids

Two sets of bids were considered at last Thursday's meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

On bids for three pickup trucks, the City Garage turned in the lowest and it was accepted — total price for three \$5,198.96, less the trade-in.

The bid on a tilt-bed trailer, lowest submitted, was awarded to Leonard Motor Co. of Albuquerque — \$2,226.80.

T. B. Hood met with the commissioners to discuss the depositories of the county.

Jack Kannady, Ruidoso registered engineer and land surveyor, will assist the commissioners and county clerk in working out a satisfactory size for standardizing the plats and maps filed in the county clerk's office.

Jack Parnell, Homer Allison and Louis Smith appeared to discuss with the commissioners the right-of-way easements being obtained for U. S. Highway 70 in the Ruidoso Downs area.

Carrizozo Mayor Wayne Withers appeared on behalf of the town's paving project, which includes the streets by the courthouse and the county hospital. The commissioners were favorably inclined toward the proposed paving but requested more definite figures.

J. G. Harris, new county sanitation, met with the board.

The commissioners meet April 6. Following their regular business meeting they will sit as a board of equalization on tax schedules. This review will take two or three days.

'Bonito Bill' Awaits Governor's Signing

House Bill No. 144, which would permit the stocking with trout of municipally owned reservoirs and permitting "reasonable" restrictions, was passed this week by the New Mexico senate.

The bill now goes to the governor for his signature.

HB 144 was introduced by W. G. Bradley, Lincoln county representative, with Bonito lake specifically in mind, although other municipally owned lakes in the state may benefit.

Waters on Indian lands may also be stocked by the Game Department, under provisions of the bill, though the cause permitting stocking of waters on privately-owned land was deleted from the bill by the senate. The house approved this minor change in the bill.

N. M. House Knocks Out Pari-Mutuel Tax Bill

House Bill 303, setting up fees and taxes on pari-mutuel betting (except for state and county fairs) was killed this week by the New Mexico House of Representatives.

If passed the bill would have sounded the death knell to race tracks in the state, according to W. G. Bradley, Lincoln county representative. He was one of the leading opponents to passage of the bill.

It was introduced by Repr. James R. Patton of Dona Ana county and Repr. Anderson Carter of Roosevelt county.

Both the New Mexico House and Senate worked on legislative matters over last week end, with the prospect of adjournment this coming week end.

Courthouse Water Tank Being Dismantled

The concrete water stand and supporting foundation at the courthouse were being dismantled this week, as part of the courthouse grounds operation cleanup and improvement program.

LeRoy McKnight, in charge of the project, was being assisted by a crane operated by Sgt. George Morris of White Sands.

The cement tank, built almost like a battlement, was strongly reinforced with steel and its supporting foundation was three feet thick.

The site will be leveled and gravel hauled in to make a parking lot. Some recreation facilities are also planned, it is said.

Bears don't like to ride in motor vehicles. At least Capitan's bears don't. Smokey was quite upset with his airplane trips in 1950, and our new little orphan cub protested loudly all the way to Albuquerque and back home last week.

Game Warden Charlie Bird took her to the Duke City to have the Albuquerque zoo keeper check her over, but the keeper was on vacation.

The morning of February 27 our cub had a surge of colic just like any baby, but by afternoon was feeling better as she proudly exhibited two newly cut teeth, just like any baby.

She tolerates the vigorous cleaning the dashdown gives her with his long tongue; the gentle petting of little Kay Bird is more to her liking; a feminine temper is displayed in scratches on the hands of the Game Warden and Shorty Jones; but fill her tummy with warm milk and honey and she'll sleep contentedly for hours.

Dr. Staley, Alamogordo veterinarian was contacted for advice on the diet and care of the bear. He telephoned the Smithsonian Institute for information on the proper handling of such a small motherless creature. As a result, our cub is given one Zima vitamin drop daily. Her diet has been switched from homogenized milk to raw cow's milk and she takes six ounces at a feeding.

At first the Capitan cub crawled across the floor, pushing and rolling. Then she tried a wobbly stance on all fours. There is no more stumbling about on unsteady legs now—the little lady is an sure of her step as any bear should be.

This is National Wildlife Week with the theme, "Conservation in the Schools, the 3 R's and Resources." Capitan is hoping to keep "Conservation of Our Forests and Wildlife" a theme to be observed in Lincoln County all year long.

With two bears, Smokey and the new cub, to remind us to be careful with fire in the forest and to obey the game rules of good sportsmen, our community should succeed in making this world a better place in which to live for bears and people.

## Camp Wehlnahpay To be Enlarged



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

## Carrizozo Schools To Give Physical Fitness Tests to 250

On Saturday, March 7, J. T. Clegg, superintendent of the Carrizozo Municipal Schools and the Coaches and PE instructors, Bernard Laabs, Miles Miller, Albert Burch and Richard Thorp, attended the New Mexico Physical-Fitness Testing Clinic on the campus of the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology at Socorro.

Robert M. Hazlett gave demonstrations and instructions on giving the tests.

The physical-fitness tests will be given to 250 students from grades five to twelve, inclusive. These tests will be conducted in the next few weeks by the above named instructors according to the schedule as set up by the building principals. The object of these tests is to determine how the youth of Carrizozo rates in physical fitness in comparison with national norms. The tests which will be given are those set up by the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

The youth fitness test of the AAHPER consists of seven tests which are given in the gymnasium or outdoors and three aquatic tests. All but the aquatic tests are to be given the Carrizozo students.

The first test is the pull-up for boys and modified pull-up for girls. For boys, this consists of chinning themselves on an elevated bar. The girls' test is a modified chinning test.

The second test is a sit-up wherein the student lies on his back with legs extended and feet about two feet apart. His hands are placed at the back of his head, with fingers interlaced and while a partner holds his feet down, he rises to a sitting position and alternately touches his right elbow to his left knee and left elbow to right knee.

Test number 3 is a shuttle run, where in the students run a specified course, picking up small blocks of wood at one end and placing them down at the other. The fourth test in the program is a standing broad jump.

Test number 5 is a 50-yard dash and the 6th test is a softball throw for distance. The final test is a 600-yard run-walk in which walking is permitted, but the purpose is to cover the 600-yard distance

More and more letters about dancing, some for, some against. Like Pease Porridge in the pot. Some like it in the pot nine days old; some like it hot, some like it cold. Mr. Baker thought this question was a "dead issue" but I guess it isn't. I won't print all the letters this time because most of them are a "re-hash" of the same old thing but I would like to quote one letter—or parts of it because it is typical:

Dear Pam—I'll write. I'm not a teenager but I'll say what I have on my heart and what I've experienced. . . . You asked about a Christian dancing: John 3:3 2nd Corinthians 5:17. . . . I learned to dance when I was sixteen. For a long while I was just about as good as anyone in my set. I went to some of the best ballrooms and I went to some of the lowest dives. When I was 28 years of age I sought and found the Lord Jesus Christ as my own personal Saviour. I lost the desire of dancing, smoking cigars, drinking that old mountain dew (alcohol to you) picture shows and a host of other worldly pleasures and sins. . . . I say, on the authority of God's word, that anyone that continues to indulge in the pleasures of the world has never come to know God, through faith in his son. . . . Walt Mercer.

Dear Walt Mercer: Thank you for your letter. I admit I'm confused. All these letters make me think that we're not talking about the same thing. I looked in Funk and Wagnall's dictionary for a definition of dance and this is what I found: Dance — "A series of rhythmic bodily movements and steps taken either alone or with another or others, or the passing with a prescribed step or steps through the concerted movements of a certain figure, the time of which is usually marked by music." Using that definition of the dance I must ask, what has this to do with drinking, smoking, going to low dives? I'm not talking about drinking or smoking cigars or going to picture shows or "a host of other worldly pleasures and sins"—I'm talking about dancing as defined above. My parents let me dance; they do not let me drink or smoke or go to low dives. I respect and love my parents and I do not believe they would permit me to do anything that would be really harmful to me. They trust me and I trust them.

You say "on the authority of God's word any one who continues to indulge in the pleasures of the world—" and then, I presume, you feel "authorized" to define what the worldly pleasures are that keep people from knowing God. You say you lost the desire to smoke, dance, drink and go to movies. These activities you consider "un-Christian." I take it. This is the effect your religion has had on you—and who am I to say it's wrong? Recently here in Carrizozo a stack of Bibles were burnt be-

In the shortest possible time. When the tests are completed, charts prepared by the AAHPER will give the Carrizozo PE instructors for a comparison of local results. The program is being initiated this year in several schools of New Mexico.

It will be expanded to cover the entire state later, so that all schools may compare test results in physical fitness not only with the national norms, but also with state levels.

The AAHPER youth fitness manual and standardized tests were prepared in 1957 after stimulus for a youth physical fitness program was given by the President's Council of Youth Fitness. The disquieting rate of draftee rejections during the Korean War prompted the creation of the President's Council.

cause that particular version did not agree with the "accepted" version! That's hard to believe, isn't it?

You probably consider that a great evil — for people to do a thing like that—because it's the Bible you use — but I'm sure the person that did that felt he had "the authority of God" to do so! I don't know whether you noticed it in last week's column or not but two people wrote in; one was in favor of dancing under proper conditions and one was against dancing under any circumstances. Certainly they have a right to their opinions but the interesting thing was that both quoted the Scripture (the same scripture that was burned here in Carrizozo) to sustain their opinions: Matt: Chapter 7.

I read that chapter and the only thing I could find that sustained the idea of dancing — or against dancing was: "Judge not, that you be not judged."—there's talk about the "narrow gate" and I suppose this could be interpreted to mean dancing is the "way that leads to destruction." I frankly do not know. I dance, I don't smoke cigars nor do I drink. I do go to picture shows, when my folks will let me. I watch TV and some people say TV is worse than picture shows.

I just don't see how these things can be used to judge a person's sincerity in religion—in fact I just can't see that they have anything to do with it at all. We have picture shows in church quite often—is that bad? Our youth group goes on picnics sometimes, they go bowling too, sometimes, is that bad? Are they any less Christians because of it?

I hope to go swimming, horse-back riding and (forgive me) dancing this summer—and again, I ask, can't a be a Christian and do those things? I'm thankful that the question of my religion does not depend on such trivial and inconsequential things! I've known plenty of good religious people who do not object

A familiar scene across the nation this spring: neighbors turning out with clippers, garden tools and power mowers. The first mowing of the fresh

spring lawn is very important. Most experts recommend letting the spring lawn come up to a height of about three inches before first mowing.

**Attractive Garden and Lawn Requires Planning, Patience**

In all likelihood one of the things you discussed with your neighbor last fall was the new, dynamic, and up-to-date approach you were going to carry out this spring on your established lawn.

Actually, getting the established lawn off to a good, vigorous start is an orderly project that requires a minimum of effort and offers a maximum of reward.

Regular fertilizing, proper liming and correct cutting make up the main ingredients of any good lawn. The home gardener has two main responsibilities: to know the order and manner in which to use these ingredients and to take time and care in reading and understanding the directions governing their application.

Lawn care authorities suggest the following simple outline as a guide to maintaining and improving the established lawn in the spring.

Check the lawn to see if it requires rolling. The main objective

in rolling a lawn is to press back grass plants that have been heaved up by alternating frosts and thaws—not to simply flatten the lawn.

Then go over the entire lawn with an aerator to loosen up the turf and top soil and improve circulation.

If investigation discloses small burned areas where grass has thinned or disappeared altogether, the region should be loosened with a rake and reseeded. In the event the new grass has trouble taking hold, inquire about one of the recommended revitalizers.

As for the feeding of the lawn, bear in mind that well-fed grass grows thickly, choking out weeds. Undernourished grass invites weed growth.

Most well-established lawns require liming at least once every two years. Some are limed as often as twice in a single year—in spring and again in the fall.
