

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

(Ed Note: The author of the following articles on Lincoln County has asked that his name remain anonymous.)

Some years before his death I had the opportunity and high privilege of visiting with and talking to John Meadows, one of the colorful pioneers of Southeastern New Mexico. John Meadows had been a trusted and valuable deputy sheriff of Lincoln county under George Curry. He had served with great credit to himself and to Curry, who became sheriff of the county at a time when there was little semblance of either law or order.

At the time of my visit with him, John Meadows was living in Tularosa, a small hamlet at that time in Dona Ana county whose early day residents would be amazed today, could they see and know the growth and development which the Army and Air Force installations to the south have brought to all of the Tularosa Basin. A large business building in Tularosa still bears the name "Meadows Building."

The occasion of his coming to Roswell was an Old Timer's meeting and program which was given for the benefit of the Roswell Museum and which was sponsored by Mrs. Corrine Whitney, Mrs. Amelia Church, Mrs. W. W. Phillips, Mrs. C. D. Bonney, and others and which incidentally made a considerable amount of money which was used most judiciously by these pioneer women in furthering the interests of the museum.

John Meadows was the "Old Timer" and was to answer any and all questions put to him concerning the very early days in Lincoln county, when this great county reached from the Rio Grande on the west to the Texas line on the east, and where for a number of years there was probably less law and order than in any like area in the United States.

The stage where the program was given was so constructed that it vividly resembled a cowboy camp at night, with the camp fire burning, the Dutch oven and the coffee pot on the coals, and the cowboys there resting on their saddles, after a hard ride during the day. John Meadows was the Old Timer providing the answers and Hiram M. Dow and C. D. Bonney were the questioners.

There was a lot of talk back and forth that night about Billy the Kid, Albert J. Fountain, Oliver M. Lee, Pat Garrett and others who had made colorful history in the great Southwest. The hall was packed. The large crowd did not want to miss the rare opportunity to hear early and authentic history first hand. Indeed, it was an occasion never to be forgotten and one which brought rich monetary rewards ranch, arriving late at night.

During the occasion of John Meadows' visit to Roswell, and in a private conversation later, he told me that after Billy the Kid had killed his guards, Bell and Olinger at Lincoln, Billy came to the Meadows ranch, arriving late at night, and then and there told Meadows all of the circumstances surrounding his escape and the killing of the two deputies who had been left to guard him while Pat Garrett attended to official business on that day in the then booming mining town of White Oaks.

John Meadows said that he warned Billy the Kid that Garrett would surely kill him and advised him to leave the country immediately and go to Mexico. Meadows further said he told Billy that he would give him the best horse that he had.

"I know Pat Garrett," Meadows said he told Billy the Kid, "unless you get out of the country at once, he is as certain to kill you as you are sitting there right now."

On this occasion John Meadows disclosed that Billy said he knew that if he remained in the territory or the United States for that matter, Garrett would kill him, since he had been elected Sheriff of Lincoln county on a law and order platform and was an utterly fearless man.

"I want to make a last visit with my girl at Fort Sumner," John Meadows said Billy told him, and "after this visit you may be sure I will leave the country forever."

Evergreen Cemetery Soon to Have Water

Completion of the new water system for the Evergreen Cemetery in Carrizozo before Decoration Day is the goal of the Cemetery Association.

Pipe has been purchased for one 1 1/2-inch main line running the width of the cemetery and for eight 3/4-inch laterals, taking off from the main line and running north and south.

The south laterals run from the main line across the center of the cemetery to the south boundary; the north laterals, four in number, extend northward half the distance of the south laterals.

T connections are to be placed in the main line at every driveway for later tie-ins of additional lateral lines.

Kiers, with faucets and hose lines are to be placed about every 20 feet on the laterals so that lot owners desiring to do so, may use hoses for watering.

Loida Callagosa has been engaged by the Cemetery Association to lay the water line, trenches for which have been dug.

Mrs. Mary Johnson, Association president, said responses to recent letters mailed out had been very good. "The money we have received from lot owners will go a long way toward paying the costs of the new water system," she said.

The Russian olive trees planted last year are in good condition, as are the well-established Chinese elm trees.

Plan More Expansion of Ft. Stanton Water Plant

The State T. B. Hospitals' Board met Monday, May 11, at the Fort Stanton hospital facility.

An important item of business was the review of the bid summary on the first phase of the Fort Stanton water supply expansion.

These old orchards along the Bonito are blooming like new—makes one imagine what a happy valley this must have been more than 50 years ago. Folks raised most of their food and lived a slow pace with the wagon and team. Now cars buzz up and down the canyon foggin' dust in each other's faces trying to hurry to a picknicking place and then home for miles away or to church at night on Sundays.

The forest fire just east of the dam was in a funny place for a fire—but it covered a little ground. The wind slowed down, rain came, and the Indians from Mesalero made fast work battling the blazes. Several men from Bonito Creek and Huidobro helped in the worst of the fire when the fire was first discovered.

The Jal Dudes were in their cabin over the week end. Some of the names I didn't get—but Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Crawford, daughter Sharon, and Mrs. Crawford's mother, Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Ely, sons Steve and Mike and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Morris had a barbecue turkey dinner Saturday evening.

Some old timers were on the Bonito Sunday: Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Reddy from Huidobro; Mr. Reddy's brother Roy and his wife from Carlsbad; their guests who were along were Mrs. Iven (Margaret) Clowe of Artesia; Mrs. Avis Prather of Napa, Calif.; and Mrs. Nellie Woodworth of Raton. Both Mrs. Clowe's sisters, and Mr. and Mrs. Don Adams and son Don Adams II of Artesia.

Mr. and Mrs. Reddy moved to Kraut Canyon, above Bonito dam, from Carrizozo when they were first married 56 years ago. Mrs. Clowe told me that when the young couple moved to Kraut by wagon in the fall she had planned to come with them but found there was no room—what with house building materials, garden fence, furniture and a few chickens—so she decided she could make the trip on her horse following the wagon.

When they got to the first orchard up the Bonito just above Mills Canyon it was about dark but she was tempted to get herself some apples. That was it—she was so sore and stiff she couldn't get back on her horse and the old apples had been frozen anyway—but she had to walk and lead her horse on to Turkey Canyon in the dark—which is about three miles. A card came to us from Louise Coe from India. The card pictured a building which is the most beautiful one in the world in Kashmir, India. It is covered with white marble. (Continued on Back Page)

1959 Farm Incomes May Show Decline


University Park—This year's net farm incomes are likely to be somewhat under 1958, says W. Y. Fowler, extension economist at New Mexico State University. Last year they were the highest in five years. Farm cash receipts are likely to reach 1958 levels with heavy marketings. But farm costs are at record highs. Soil Bank payments are reduced by termination of the Acreage Reserve. These factors will cause realized net income to decline about 1 billion dollars from the 13.1 billion of last year. The net figure should remain over a billion above the 1957 level.

Missile, Aircraft Power Shows at Holloman on Armed Forces Day

Air Force Missile Development Center, N. M. — The greatest display of missile and aircraft power ever assembled at Holloman Air Force Base in southern New Mexico for an Armed Forces Day observance will be one of the top features of this year's open house for "all the world to look at" on Saturday, May 16, when America celebrates her 10th Armed Forces Day across the nation.

From 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. the Holloman entrance on Highway 70 west of Alamogordo will be wide open to the public in welcome to an "Air Force show of ground and air events that will thrill young and old alike.

A smart military parade through Holloman's main area and past its reviewing stands will start the early morning proceedings. In all, some 14 squadrons will be high-flying past Brigadier General Daniel E. Hooks (AFMDC Commander), and other distinguished guests at a magnificent flyover of F-100's, B-37's, and T-33's streaks by in an additional salute from the skies.



LINCOLN COUNTY IN BYGONE YEARS

20 Years Ago

(From the files of the Lincoln County News, June 16, 1939)
The White Mountain Association, I.O.O.F., was to have a two-day program at Camp Leo Robinson June 17 and 18.

Messrs. Boyd and Hendren were named committee chairmen of the Fourth of July celebration at Fort Stanton, and were planning a barbecue, among other star events.

Bids were called for a federal aid road project between Hondo and Lincoln.

Have you ever looked at one of the real old adobe houses in Tularosa and wondered what, if anything, could be done to make it attractive, comfortable and altogether livable?

It is easy to fasten them to the walls.

The floors? Well, the easiest thing usually is to cover them with a good carpet. You are going to need lots of paint. The light, bright colors are preferred.

But, you say, this is going to be expensive. Sure it's going to cost, but anything worthwhile is always somewhat costly. When you've finished you will have a good, sturdy (these houses all have a firm foundation) house that will last another century and, best of all, you don't need an air conditioner in summer and your heating bill in winter will amaze you for its smallness.

FARM NEWS

Orchards Damaged Some by Freeze

Freeze hit some of the upper orchards in the Bonito and Ruidoso Valleys. The full damage of the freeze cannot be accurately estimated until a week after the freeze.

I visited several orchards with John Durkin, extension entomologist, last week and some thrips were noted in the Pflingsten orchard above Honda. These thrips are small crawling insects about 1/8 inch long and suck the sap from the leaf. They can easily be controlled by including DDT, dieldrin or heptachlor in your next cover spray.

Some powdery mildew was noted especially on the Jonathan apple, which are most susceptible. Although the mildew is not as bad as last year, you should consider using karathane or sulfur to help control it.

Wool prices took a jump at the last wool sale held at Roswell. Some Lincoln County ranchers received the top prices on the market. Shanks Brothers received 69¢ to top the Roswell market, and J.A. Cooper received 57¢. Kenneth Vance received 47¢, but as his ewes sheared heavier, he very likely made more per ewe than the wool growers receiving the top price.

The average price for Lincoln county wool for the 1959 marketing year was 80.9 cents per pound, grease pound, if this is the national average the percentage payment would be close to 68% for wool sold in the 1958 marketing year ending March 31, 1959.

Market reports from different areas report all contracts on calves, yearlings and a few lambs. The prices contracted for good and choice calves in Montana were \$34.50-\$35 for better calves. In Clovis area choice stock calves brought \$34-\$35 for steers and \$33-\$34 for better calves for fall delivery. In West Texas, mostly choice 400-475 pound stock calves sold for October-November delivery at \$32-\$40 for steers and \$32-\$36 for helters.

In Montana, 80 pound feeder lambs sold for \$18 for early October delivery.

NOTICE TO ALL DOG OWNERS

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Capitán, Lincoln County, New Mexico:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep within the Village of Capitán, New Mexico, any dog, male or female, without first having paid a tax in the sum of one dollar on male dogs and a tax in the sum of two dollars on female dogs. Any person who shall keep on his or her premises any dog, without having paid the tax herein provided for, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in the sum of ten dollars together with the costs of prosecution.

Section 2. Said tax shall be paid to the clerk of the Village of Capitán on the first day of April of each year and it shall be the duty of such clerk to issue a license to such owner or keeper with a tag bearing the license number, which tag shall be, by the owner or keeper, attached to and worn on a collar around the neck of such dog.

Section 3. The marshal or any police officer of the village is hereby authorized to impound and kill any dog found running at large within the limits of the village without a license for the proper year.

Upward Trend in New Mexico's Birthrate

Santa Fe—The April 30 report of the Division of Vital Statistics confirms an upward trend in New Mexico's birthrate for the first quarter of the year, with a total of 7,085 births in 1959, compared to 6,774 for the same three-month period in 1958.

Deaths in the same period this year totalled 1,586 compared to 1,597 last year. Heart disease was the leading cause of death, followed by cancer in second place, and accidents in third.

Sixty-six fatal accidents in March, 31 of them caused by motor vehicle on the highways, brought the total of accidental deaths for the first quarter to 184. The percentage of deaths per 100,000 population from all accidents is up to 32.8 from 71.3 a year ago, and up to 41.5 from 39.2 in the motor vehicle category.

Immaturity is listed as the leading cause of infant deaths in the quarterly summary, with the percentage rate per 10,000 live births up to 73.4 over 57.6 in 1958.
