Carrizozo town trustees name planning board

Group to present plans for clean-up

At their regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening, the Carrizozo Town Board of Trustees named five members to a planning commission for the town.

The planning commission is an advisory group of citizens who will make recommendations to the town board along the lines of town clean-up and beautification which had been under discussion at a special meeting of the town board the week previous.

Members named to the commission are Fred English of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce; Joe O. Sargent, Carrizozo Rotary Club; Jete Voss, Carrizozo Lions Club; Mrs. C. A. Snow, Carrizozo Woman's Club; and Dr. A. N. Spencer.

These names had been presented to the board as selected representatives from their respective clubs.

Use trash cans for all litter, please

"Don't be a litterbug!" applies to a town as well as to highways and forest playgrounds. Everyone can help Carrizozo's appearance by using receptacles for paper instead of tossing it on the street.

The planning commission will meet in the near future to name a chairman and begin their study of ways in which the town can be cleaned up and beautified. Their recommendations to the town board will follow.

In further business Tuesday the town trustees:

Approved a request by W. F. Ball to add two units to the Frontier Motel; cost \$4,000.

Adopted a resolution authorizing the use of juvenile recreation funds for the football field improvement and a track at Carrizozo High School.

Adopted an ordinance providing for the condemnation of buildings when declared a nuisance and defining same.

Discussed the removal of trees along Highway 54 on two properties across from Food Mart.

Heard a suggestion from King Orle, president of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce regarding street and highway improvement.

A telephone call made to C. D. Nickman, district highway engineer, revealed that he would be in Carrizozo within the next few days to discuss the paving situation on Highway 54 through town and the 360-bypass over B avenue.

Mayor Withers stated that all attention should be given to grading, sanding and rolling will continue as rapidly as possible.

Carrizozo's fourth water well recently completed on its tract of land south of town, is a good producer at a depth of 145 feet. It was brought out at the board meeting. On a 24-hour test the well maintained a steady flow of 300 gallons per minute with maximum draw down of 120 feet. The well was drilled by Jim Ham.

The new well is located approximately 300 feet east of the town's Well No. 1.

Club urges action on town improvement

The Carrizozo town board met Thursday of last week in special session at the request of four civic organizations, seeking means to clean up and beautify the town.

Joe O. Sargent, speaking for the Carrizozo Rotary Club, said the job was too big for any one club to undertake and that the Lions Club, Chamber of Commerce and Carrizozo Woman's Club had joined heads in the program.

"We feel," Sargent said, "that planning will eliminate eyesores, health hazards and fire hazards and we wondered if the town has resources to take care of this."

Others who spoke on phases of the cleanup and beautification were Mrs. E. T. Fletcher, Dr. A. N. Spencer, Arvell Posey, Jete Voss and Fred English.

The discussion ranged over topics of unsightly privies, failure of many to take the sewer system, the boards, dilapidated buildings and the poor condition of the town's streets.

Capitan is planning to have their Smokey Bear Museum ready for this summer's tourist season. With the death of Joe Rench, the building foreman, many people have wondered about the continuation of the construction. His widow, Mrs. Margaret Rench, has agreed to carry out his plan for the completion of the log cabin.

As word of the weather makes it possible, several Newell friends of Joe Rench, who are holidaying, have offered to come to Capitan and complete the fireplace planned for the museum.

The chief source of funds for the building project has been the dances held at the Legion Hall every other Saturday night. The next dance will be February 6, with "The Moonshiners" furnishing the music. Tickets will be reduced to 75 cents a person and may be purchased before or at the dance. Door prizes will be given and refreshments will be available.

A meeting of the Smokey Bear Club February 2 resulted in a change of officers: President, Mrs. Virgil Wallace; secretary, Dorothy Guck and treasurer, Margaret Rench.

Former president, Bill Holmes, is responsible for getting the construction started. Mrs. Ross Flattery, former treasurer, has not only handled all finances as secretary, she also supervised all of the collection of Smokey Bear products for the club.

The museum when completed will be a tourist attraction of benefit to all of Lincoln County. The nationally-known Smokey will attract many motorists wishing to see the memorabilia of his birthplace. The bear's life story will be shown in pictures and murals in the museum, with some of the original art work of the Smokey poster artist.

The museum will also have Capitan Mountain wildlife and habitat displays set up by the U. S. Forest Service, the EGS, and the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. Souvenirs and Smokey products will be available.

Financially, it has been a hard job for Capitan to raise the money for the log museum. Our county neighbors have been most generous. With your continued cooperation, we'll be able to give Lincoln County a most worthwhile tourist attraction.

Services here for Carroll Johnson

Services were held in the chapel of the Shaw Mortuary in Carrizozo Tuesday, Feb. 2, at 10 a. m. for Carroll Johnson, 63, who died last Saturday at the Carrizozo Hospital where he had been a patient for six days.

Rev. Homer Reid officiated at the funeral service, assisted by Mrs. Jane Shafter, pianist and Rev. W. P. Lytle, soloist. Interment was in the family plot in Evergreen cemetery in Carrizozo.

Charley Carroll Johnson was born April 12, 1886, at Nogal, the son of F. M. and Laura Ann Johnson. His parents came to New Mexico from Victoria, Texas, in 1885 and settled at Old Mesilla.

About ten years later the family moved to the Carrizozo-Nogal area. Carroll spent his early boyhood at Nogal and attended grade school there. The family moved to Carrizozo when he was 13 and he continued school here.

He started to work as a cowboy for the Bar-W Ranch, then in Three Rivers to work for the Hatch Cattle Company. For a time he was an inspector for the New Mexico Cattle Sanitary Board.

Altogether, he lived at these rivers for more than forty years, continuing his ranch employment with Thomas Ryan III when he purchased the Hatch Cattle Co. Carroll Johnson's philosophy in life was one to make friends, not enemies. It is said that his chief enjoyment in life was the companionship of friends.

He was popular with people of all walks of life. Among the large throng of mourners attending his funeral service were Joe Shanta, Apache chief and nearly thirty members of his tribe, whom Mr. Johnson frequently called "his people."

The Ryan Ranch borders the Mesilla reservation and Mr. Johnson's home was a little more than a stone's throw from a small Indian village. His relations with them were cordial and helpful.

Closest friends of the service were Howard McDonald, Bert Bookout, Mervyn Smoot, Bill Sawyer, G. B. Jewell and Cecil Wesley.

Also elected director for a three-year term was Jim Tully, Glenwood. The officials were chosen at the recent annual meeting of the Council at New Mexico State U.

W. G. Shreeneast, Hondo, president, reports that Council members discussed the possibility of cooperating with the New Mexico State University in extending assistance to students in the fields of horticulture and marketing.

Members said students should have practical experience as well as technical training upon graduation from college.

President Shreeneast will appoint a committee of apple growers to work with the university officials in planning on-the-job training in orchard management.

At their business meeting, Apple Council members also discussed plans to participate in National Apple Week festivities, the State Apple Pie Baking Contest, and reporting of the state's apple production and prices.

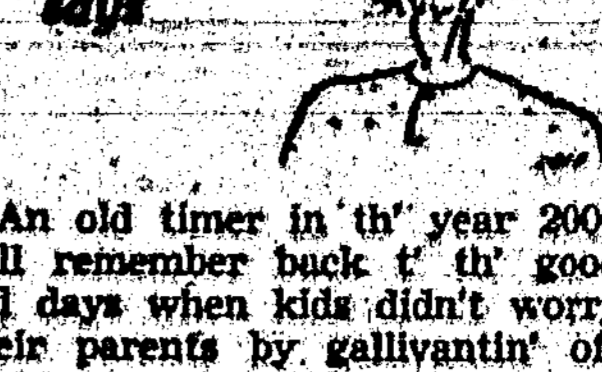

Keep an eye out for minor damage and attend to it before it entails major repair bills. This can be done through periodic preventive maintenance inspection of facilities.

NATIONAL EFFORTS are being made to improve the quality of vocational education. Further development of vocational education could mean less loss of business to skilled foreign craftsmen.

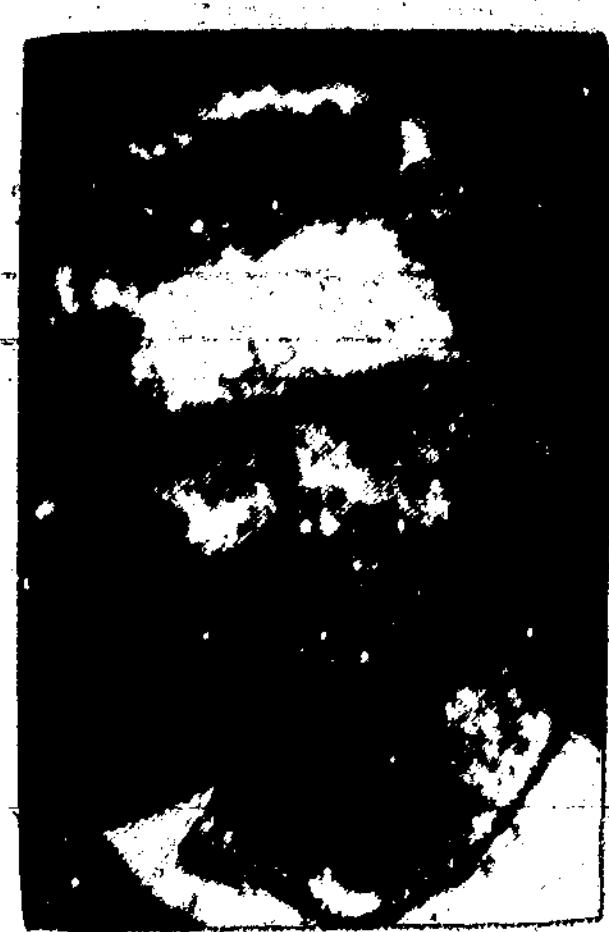

LEGAL NOTICE

TOWN OF CARRIZOZO ORDINANCE No. 74

CONDEMNATION OF BUILDINGS

4-6-1: NUISANCE DECLARED: The Board of Trustees shall have the power, expressed by Resolution duly adopted, to require the removal from the Corporate Limits of any building or structure or ruin, damaged or dilapidated as to be a menace to the public comfort, health, peace or safety.

4-6-2: OWNER TO BE NOTIFIED: It shall be the duty of the Mayor, upon the adoption by the Board of Trustees of such Resolution, to notify the owner, occupant or agent in charge of such building by serving a copy of such Resolution upon him, and in the event that the owner, occupant or agent in charge cannot be found, such notice may be completed by posting a copy of the Resolution upon the premises, and by publication one (1) time in a newspaper of general circulation in the Municipality.

4-6-3: REFUSAL TO ACT: Such owner, occupant or agent shall thereafter, within ten (10) days, remove such building or structure and if such removal is not commenced by the owner or written objection filed with the Clerk and signed by a hearing, then the Municipality shall have the power to remove such building or structure at the cost and expense of the owner, and the reasonable cost of such removal shall constitute a lien against such property so removed and the lot or parcel of land from which such removal was made, and said lien shall be foreclosed in the manner prescribed by State Law.

4-6-4: PROTEST HEARING: If the owner files a protest and asks for a hearing within ten (10) days of the service of the notice, the Board of Trustees shall then fix a day for hearing and shall consider all the evidence submitted for and against said removal order, and determine whether or not its previous action should be enforced or rescinded.

If it is determined that the removal order should be enforced, and the owner fails for a period of five (5) days to comply with the order, the Municipality may proceed in the same manner as provided in Section 4-6-3 for such removal; provided, however, that any person aggrieved by the decision of the Board shall have the right to appeal to the District Court by giving notice of the appeal to the Board within five (5) days after said order, and filing his petition in the Court within twenty (20) days thereafter and the District Court shall hear said matter de novo and enter judgment in accordance with its findings. (1960 Code.)

There are no telephones there at all.
