

Governor John Burroughs addresses Democratic dinner meeting in Capitan

"Highway 37 will eventually be paved with a sticky substance known as asphalt," Governor John Burroughs told a large audience in Capitan Monday night.

This remark was the crux of his remarks regarding his administration's stand on the disputed subject of asphalt purchases by the State Highway Department.

Prior to his administration taking office, the governor said "no body had a look-in on asphalt sales to the state except Spencer & Co., a brokerage firm located in Albuquerque. This company was the biggest contributor to the Republican organization in New Mexico.

"We got competition into the asphalt business," he continued, "and there was a drop of \$1.65 per barrel in the price of asphalt."

He asked his hearers to figure out what a saving that made to New Mexico which uses approximately 1,000,000 barrels of asphalt annually.

The governor's speech, in which he made no mention of his seeking a second term of office, also outlined achievements of his administration in the fields of finance, revenue collections, highway expenditures, Economic Development Commission and the Tourist Bureau.

His talk was the highlight of a county-wide Democratic dinner attended by approximately 250, who first enjoyed a buffet dinner served in the high school gymnasium.

Hollis Cummins, county Democratic chairman, presided at the meeting. He first introduced those at the head table: Mr. and Mrs. Fred Richardson, John Romero of Roswell, Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Hunt of Santa Fe; Mrs. Cummins; Ernest Tucker of Roswell and Jess Mitchell of Santa Fe.

Other prominent visitors from out of the county also recognized were Dick Robinson, G. Y. Falls, Betty Morris, Carl DeBord, Maude Eshom, Ingram (7-foot) Eickert, Johnny Walker and Kern Aldridge.

The chairman then introduced A. E. Hunt, Director State Department of Finance. Mr. Hunt congratulated Lincoln County on its political progress, noting that "political progress is always accompanied by social, cultural and economic progress. You have realized a great deal of progress. During the past year you have aided in the effort of a Democratic governor."

Lincoln county, he said, had progressed by having a new road from Capitan to Ruidoso, restoration of the Wootley Hotel at Lincoln, made possible by money from the governor's emergency fund and the expenditure of \$125,000 for a new wing at the Fort Stanton Hospital and the completion of a modern water system; also aid for Capitan's new sewer system and the new highway maintenance building.

He said school officials were pleased with the correction of a "deplorable condition in which 14 counties had school deficits."

At the outset of his speech, Governor Burroughs congratulated Ruidoso on its new radio station KXAR. Two technicians of the station were present and the governor's speech was broadcast in its entirety.

The governor said the recently concluded Democratic conference in Albuquerque of 19 western states, plus Texas and Oklahoma, was a most successful one. It was a workshop of problems of the west, he said, and also formulated plans to be submitted to the national convention in July.

Many potential candidates for office were also on parade he said, adding that "The Democratic party has enough men who are all good candidates. . . It is better than having only one candidate—a disease of Republicanism nationally that affects states also. . . We are glad to have contests in the Democratic party and hope we have competition."

"The Democratic party has a wealth of people who will fight for their position. No candidate who is pre-chosen can be aware of the problems in our state or in Lincoln County."

The Republicans, he charged, "are great at creating images. They have created the image of chaotic conditions in the state of New Mexico and they have had a great deal of help by certain segments of the printed press."

Financially, he said, the state's picture is a bright one with a cash balance January 1, of all funds, in all departments, of from \$46 million to \$50 million. "Few states have as favorable a financial picture as that," he added.

He said the Bureau of Revenue was one of the hardest-working groups in the state government. Also commended were achievements of the Highway Department, the EDC, Tourist Bureau and New Mexico Magazine.

At the conclusion of his speech the governor called attention to the basketball scoreboard in the gymnasium which read: "Democrats 59, Republicans 0," and remarked "With solid Democratic

To ask Federal aid for road to ski park

Directors of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce met last Friday morning with Dan D. Swearingin of Ruidoso, who told the group about developments in connection with a new winter sports area in White Mountain Park.

A considerable sum of private money has already been spent in making feasibility reports and, according to some of the nation's sports experts, this would be "the best winter sports area in the entire Southwest."

There would be three ski lifts with terminal points within 400-ft. of one another, parking space for 1200 cars, two classes of dining facilities, a glass observation building a quarter of a mile from the top of Lookout Peak and other facilities to make this one of the most modern, up-to-date recreational spots in the country.

Census takers will be paid on a piece price basis. A diligent census taker should earn about \$12 per day, the district supervisor said. A \$10 training fee will be paid to census takers who successfully complete the course of instruction required before they start their rounds, and accept a census assignment.

STATE GRABBING BOARD'S MONEY

Santa Fe, Feb. 6—The state finance department has snatched \$5,147 from the State Board of Medical Examiners, leaving the board without operating funds.

The board learned that its money had been taken and thrown in to the state's general account when a check for \$1.50 was turned down.

A sum in the neighborhood of \$44,000 was transferred out of the Plumbing Board's account to the general fund with yelps from the plumbers that they couldn't meet their payroll with a balance of about \$5,000 that was left in the account.

TRYING TO WIN POLITICAL DECISION

The scratching for money from the boards is part of an intensive drive to bolster the state's general bank account which has become the subject of a serious debate—whether it will be in the red at the end of the business year, June 30, or in the black.

The medics, who were left without enough for stamps, their part-time secretary or part-time lawyer, went to the attorney general for relief but no early decision was indicated.

TIBO WITHDRAWS, CROSS COMES UP

Tibo Chavez's decision to go for another term in the senate and not for lieutenant governor has returned Floyd Cross of (ugh) Truth or Consequences to major consideration for the loot gov nomination.

Rep. Morris Dickinson of Tucuman and Rep. Sabu Gallegos of Santa Fe have been talking about running, and Victor Salazar of Albuquerque said that he might be interested in the Demo nomination.

Cross, presently state personnel officer at \$750, has made two stints at the race, once but he made good showings and got acquainted.

Of course there is always that dark one, Albuquerque Joe Montoya. He ran for lieutenant governor last time with hardly a cent more than the \$250 fee and ran second behind Ed Mead and well in front of Cross.

BOARDS WATCHING HUGE BOND SWAP

The investigation of the \$27 million bond swap which was undertaken by the New Mexico Taxpayers Association and the New Mexico Education Association, is being watched by many of the school boards and municipal boards that have the responsibility of paying off the bonds.

If the investigation shows that the trade of the local securities for federal securities that yield a little higher interest is bad for the state it is doubtful if it could be stopped through ordinary legal procedure.

The contract for the trade was signed by the state investment council in the middle of December.

Local boards, however, might put a kink in the procedure by refusing to pay interest to the new owners and forcing the owners to go to court to get what they could.

REPUBLICANS WORK IN DARK

Republicans, without knowing whether their only man with a winning record is running for governor, Lieutenant governor or for nothing, are going ahead with the organization of a ticket for the March 1 take off.

For Congress it looks like J. D. Robb, the recently retired dean of music at the University of New Mexico, and Ed Ealcomb, Bernalillo county commissioner.

Republican leaders, tired of Alva Simpson's talk about running for governor, would like to boost him in to running against Cur Clinton for the Senate. Simpson of Santa Fe who made a lot of money in uranium was welfare director under Gov. Ed Mechem in 1933-34.

It looks like George McKim, Albuquerque, for treasurer; William Colver, Santa Fe, corporation commissioner; Ben Chavez, Albuquerque, state auditor, and maybe Paul Robinson, Albuquerque district attorney, for attorney general.

That sounds like a lot of Albuquerque but maybe the Republicans figure that's where the votes are.

BOB ANDERSON GAINS FAVOR

Talk the past week has leaned toward Robert O. Anderson of Roswell going for governor and Mechem for lieutenant governor.

If Mechem should be talked into the governor's run Tom Bolack of Farmington would try for lieutenant governor and Anderson might land in the run for U. S. senator.

Applications for jobs as census takers may be obtained from the District Census Office, P. O. Box 595, University Park, N. M., or in Lincoln County from the Republican county chairman, H. H. Shier, whose address is Box 38, Hollywood, N. M.

Applicants for jobs as census takers must be over 18 years of age, be citizens of the United States, and have a high school education or its equivalent. Candidates will be required to pass a selection test demonstrating their ability to understand written instructions and read maps. Persons who are presently or recently associated with law enforcement or tax assessing or collection agencies are not eligible.

Census takers will be paid on a piece price basis. A diligent census taker should earn about \$12 per day, the district supervisor said. A \$10 training fee will be paid to census takers who successfully complete the course of instruction required before they start their rounds, and accept a census assignment.

Advance Census Report Forms being distributed

Advanced Report Forms for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing will be distributed by the post office this week to all households in this area, Slater announces.

The Advance Report Form is a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit.

The district supervisor urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1.

The district supervisor pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Federal law.

In spite of Father Inchofer's indignation, he was wrong! Do you think that perhaps your mother might have been wrong about some things, too?

Two Farmhands Who Enriched America

The two men pictured above were both American farmhands. Born sixty-nine years apart, one became a great president, the other a great poet. The two men never met, yet today their lives are inseparably linked together.

The president is, of course, Abraham Lincoln; the poet, Carl Sandburg. And the link between them is Carl Sandburg's "Abraham Lincoln: The Prairie Years and The War Years." Hailed as "the greatest biography of our generation" when it came out in a \$4.00 edition some years back, this work is now available from Dell in a handsomely boxed paperback edition at just \$2.99, and in three separate volumes at seventy-five cents each.

Other than his biography, however, these men have something else in common: a love and respect for the "plain" man. It seems that a particularly fitting tribute to both men's ideals that Sandburg's biography of Lincoln is now available inexpensively to people in every corner of America. Truly, too, since 1908 is the hundredth anniversary of Lincoln's election as President of the United States.

FARM NEWS

In my recent visits to the Hondo area, I noticed nearly everyone pruning their orchards, and doing a good job of it. They were pruning the broken branches and winter sprouts first, then were taking the low hanging limbs and removing excess limbs from the trees.

Many growers have ordered or received fertilizer to put on their orchard. Ralph Bonnell had already put some on his orchard before the last snow and rain, which coated it in well.

Order insecticides now to be sure and have them on hand when you need them. For a delayed dormant use a lime sulfur oil spray. After the calyx, follow a spray schedule, at regular 10 to 14 day intervals.

A new deer and rodent repellent shows promise in this area. It is Thiram, sold under the trade name of Arason-B. In spray application use two gallons of the repellent to 100 gallons of water, or 5 tablespoons to a gallon. Other areas report three to six months' protection from deer, rats, rabbits and birds, with this repellent.

While visiting with Doug Bryant, extension horticulturist, he mentioned that two peach varieties are showing up very well. They are Red Haven, a yellow freestone, and Italian Race, a white partial freestone. They both bloom later than Elberta and might do well here if you are planning to replace some peach trees or set out a new orchard. Consider these two newer varieties.

It a little more than usual. The timely awareness that it pays to be careful when you're picking apples was prompted by a letter which crossed their desk. The author, they say, is unknown.

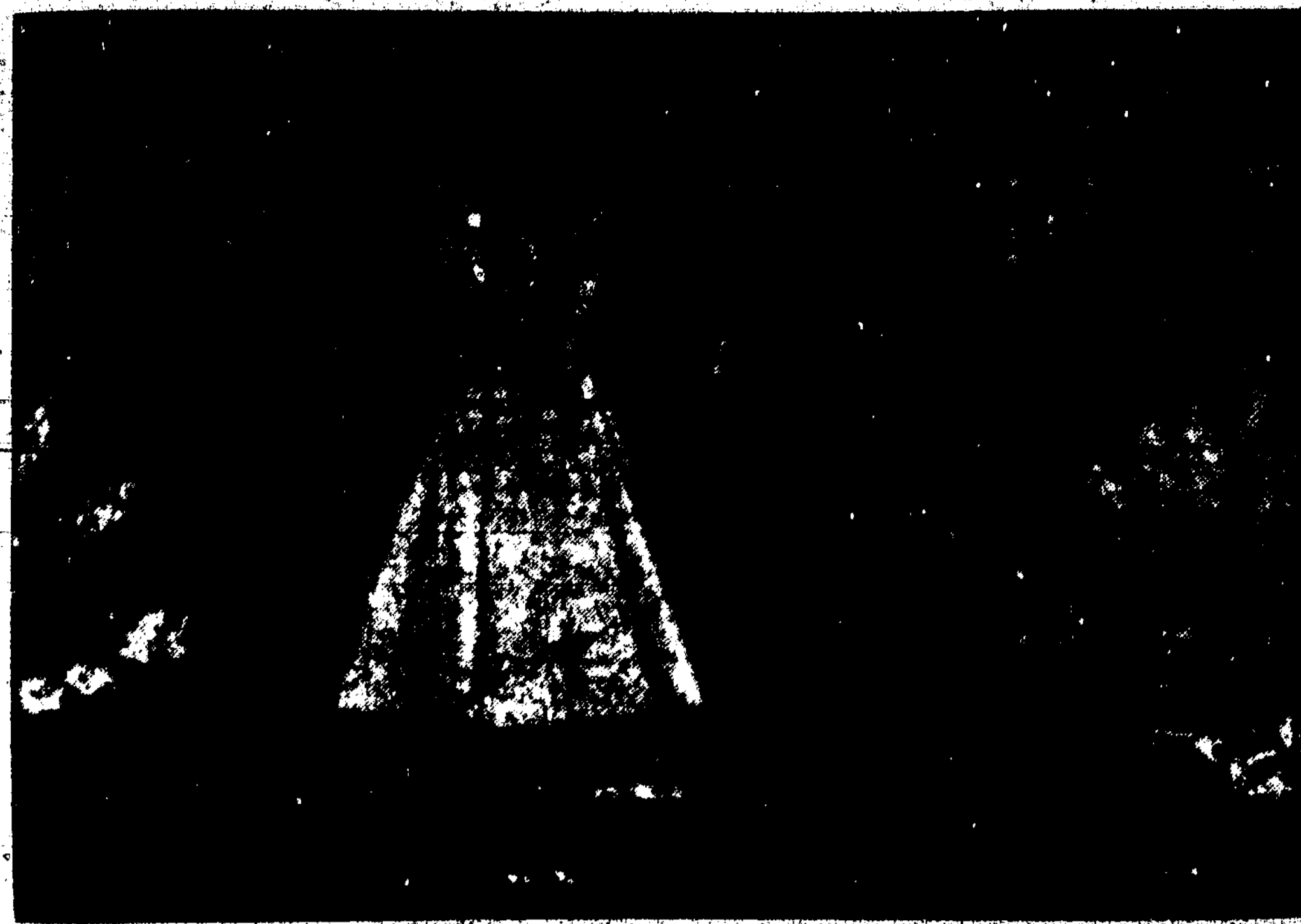
