





**Enthusiastic reception for reading program in Carrizozo schools**

The reading program, which has been under long study by the Carrizozo elementary and Junior high school teachers, is now in full operation in grades 1 through 8, Fred Miller, principal, said this week.

The enthusiasm of both students and teachers for the program has been beyond expectation and even in this short time results have been evident, Miller said.

Rather than separate children into different reading groups, this program makes it possible for all youngsters in one grade to stay together, yet account for varying levels of ability.

"The children and I are having a wonderful time with this new reading," one teacher commented.

Another said "I feel that I have a reading tool that is really going to succeed."

One pupil who has had reading difficulties said "Gee, these books are swell."

He's probably crying God for making him work and pray. It's a good thing that God is not looking for gratitude. I hope you will keep writing the column—it's the best thing I've read in years! It's about time we all stopped and think—we've been too busy rushing around accomplishing nothing but our own destruction!—A BELIEVER.

Dear Believer: Thanks for the letter. Yours was the only one I received last week, but I have a couple of others that are held over, and perhaps that answers your question concerning Jack's questions. We felt that we had to answer some of the other letters that were coming in, and couldn't devote all of our column to answering Jack—although his questions were very far-reaching and of general interest to everyone.

You are right—we seem to live in a world of "much-ado about nothing." I think if we asked ourselves two simple questions and answered them we'd probably act differently than we do.

1. Is material gain the important thing in life? If it is, then let us cynically devote all of our time and energy to getting rich and accumulating things for ourselves. If this is a spiritual universe where only spiritual things are lasting and important—then certainly so many of us are wasting our time because 99% of our time and energy is devoted to everything else but the spiritual.

Look at it this way: We have so much time to prepare for a journey into a far land. We are told on good authority that the only thing that is worth taking to the "far land" is a knowledge of the language because all our needs will be amply supplied over there. If we know how to ask for them, there is no use taking money, or weapons or goods of any kind because we will have no use for them—what we have here in this country for money and what we use for weapons—or the merchandise of this country have absolutely no value over there.

The only thing that can gain for us any benefit is a knowledge of the language. The wonderful thing about it is that there are teachers who are willing and able to teach us the language. But instead of seeking out these teachers and learning the language we will need, we decide to build up a fortune in gold and merchandise here.

We know that we won't be able to take these things with us—but it is so much fun acquiring them and it is so pleasant to have them and even if getting these things takes all our time so that we don't have a moment to spare to study the language—we hope that somebody else will study it for us and be able to interpret for us over there.

So we spend a little of our money on the teachers and the students and we feel a little better about it; but little by little we begin to realize that the money and goods and weapons we have here are not giving us any real satisfaction and, in fact, keeping us from learning the language—the trip to that "far land"—we rush to the teacher and try to learn as much as we can. But we really never get beyond the "first grade" and we're so afraid to start out on this trip we have to take! You see, it's a trip that has to be taken alone!—Sincerely, Rev. Reid.

Dear Jack: I believe your final remarks were about "faith." You say (and I quote) "You preachers are always saying: 'Have faith!' Faith in what? The only faith I have is in my own ability to succeed..." etc.

Let me say this: There are two kinds of faith. One is the type of faith that you have inherited, so to speak. You believe certain things because your parents believed them and they have sort of handed them down to you. This is the type of faith that you accept from someone else—an infallible source, so to speak. You believe things because someone tells you they are so and you accept the statements without question. Actually, this is a very pleasant condition to be in, because you don't have to think too much and you can be quite happy as long as you are living the way someone else wants you to live.

There is another kind of faith, however, that starts with a great big doubt! You doubt what someone else has told you; you doubt that certain things are so because someone says they are. You have to find out for yourself! Now this isn't the most pleasant condition to be in because you are going

to be criticized for not conforming; for not accepting the established system. You, my friend, are a radical, an outcast and one to be shunned! You dared to think for yourself!

Now many of us have cast off the religion handed down to us, but we have found nothing yet to take its place, so we're neither "bound nor free"—we just don't have a faith of our own and we have refused to accept somebody else's. Now I think that a great faith is achieved in only one way—that is, a faith that is your very own and not someone else's—and that is by exercising our God-given capacity to doubt.

Jesus himself was a magnificent doubter. Wild ideas of a war-making Messiah who would overthrow Rome were prevalent in his time. He doubted them. "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" was the true law, they said. He doubted laws as essential to true religion and he doubted them all. He saw men believing in ancient traditions just because they were ancient, and he poured his skepticism on such reactionaries: "It was said unto them of old time, but I say unto you..."

Samaritans are an inferior race was the popular idea, but He scorned it; a good Samaritan, He said, is better than a bad priest. We are saved by Jesus' faith, we say. Yes, but just as truly as any scientific pioneer did, He reached His faith through His daring doubts. Don't despise your ability to doubt. A great faith, if it is really to be one's very own, always has to be fought for.

That has been my experience. I could not swallow the Christian faith unquestioningly. I had to fight for it. And so it's mine! Every doubt raised against it, every question asked about it, I have faced often with agony of mind. I am not afraid of atheism—of all my disbelief I most certainly disbelieve that! And now, when I'm older, I understand the saying: "Who never doubted never half believed."
