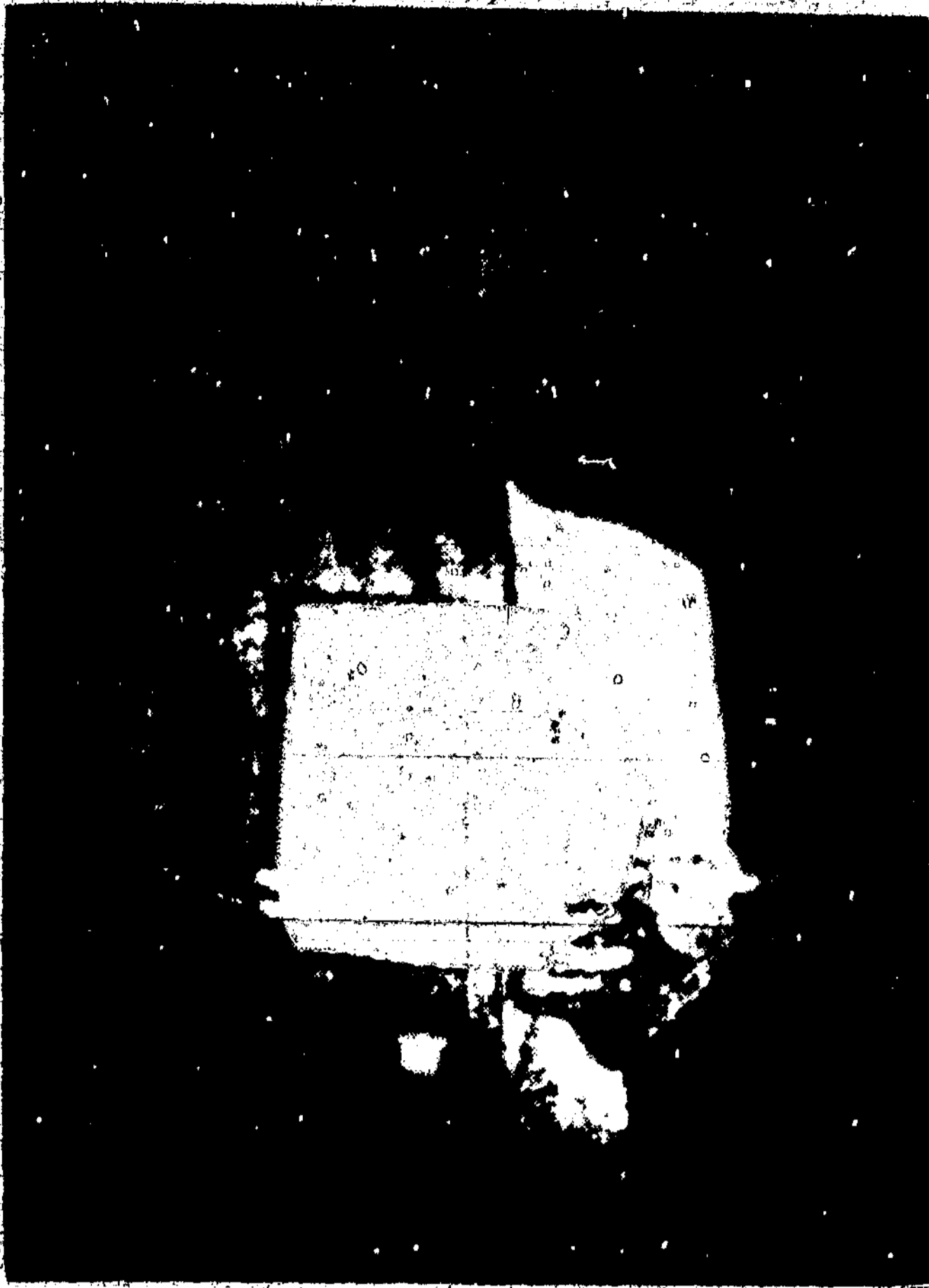


County cooperators given award for outstanding work in soil conservation

Frank Peters lauded for farm improvement work

At a meeting last Thursday of the Upper Hondo SCD supervisors in Capitan, Frank Peters of Timbo was awarded a certificate for his outstanding record as a co-operator in the district.

The award was presented by Bill Gregg of El Paso on behalf of the Goodyear Company.

Summing up Peters' accomplishments in farming and ranching since 1940, Clem Weindorf, SCD work unit conservator, said Peters should be commended for building a ranch back to a condition classified as "good." Some of the work included:

- Taking out a lot of old orchards, leveling and leveling land and putting on uniform grades; installation of 1/2 mile of irrigated pipelines; cooperation with the Upper Hondo Water Pilot Project; installation of 1400 feet of stream bank re-planting; experimenting with different kinds of feed and milking own herd; growing his own alfalfa; and in an endeavor to cut down operating expenses, going into irrigated pasture to use in conjunction with feeding operation.
- Weindorf added that Peters is "not only a good cooperater; he is also a good neighbor."
- The Certificate of Merit read "For Outstanding Accomplishment in Soil Conservation."

Planning board makes first report

The Carrizozo town board of trustees in regular session Tuesday night, heard the first official report of the newly organized town planning board.

Joe Sargent, president of the commission, said that considerable progress had been made in getting the cooperation of property owners to repair buildings, clean up vacant lots and remove unused privies.

The planning commission made the following recommendations:

- If possible, have a regular system set up to clean the streets.
- Set up a city health commission as soon as possible.
- Publish a 30-day notice that all privies not in use be torn down; also notice to property owners to clean up vacant lots on which there is accumulated rubbish.
- Construction of new cesspools be stopped where the property owner has access to the sewer line.

After considering the recommendations, Mayor Withers, with the consent of the trustees, appointed a health commission, with Dr. J. P. Turner chairman. Dr. Turner to appoint two others to serve with him on the health commission. This commission will work along the same lines as the planning commission, making recommendations to the town trustees.

There is a market for old buildings and privies

That unused privy, standing at an angle, unpainted, and with cobwebs over the throne, can find a home somewhere in the country, it was brought out at Monday night's meeting.

Sargent said that at least one rancher can use three such structures. The going price was not revealed, but there is a market for privies; also for buildings that have usable lumber in them. Any owner who wants to get rid of out-buildings, notify the planning commission.

Mayor Withers said the town would like very much to have the cooperation of property owners in removing all outbuildings not in use.

In other town business, the trustees approved an additional grant of \$1,500 from recreation funds to continue work on the Carrizozo school athletic field.

Reporting on progress made in the field, Supt. Gregg said that trees and shrubs had been ordered for landscaping and that the field when completed would be one that the community could be proud of.

The recreation committee estimated that the balance in the recreation fund would be sufficient to finance the summer recreation program.

A building permit was granted Kenneth Means for a 1-car garage and storage room, at \$200.

The election proclamation was adopted calling for the biennial election to be held April 5, to elect a mayor for a two-year term and two trustees for 4-year terms; also a police magistrate.

Attorney E. Forrest Sanders advised the town he was pressing for a date for hearing on the paving injunction. He wrote that he had written Schauer & Stiff, attorneys of Roswell, representing the plaintiffs in the action against the town, that "we should obtain a trial setting in the immediate future prior to the municipal election in April."

An announcement of candidacy was filed by Tony Beltran for police magistrate.

It was brought out that 17 new type street lights had been put out and that there were 23 more to be installed. These new lights are much more efficient, yet use no more electricity than the old 175-watt bulbs.

BLM officials meets with county commissioners

At their regular meeting in Carrizozo Monday, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners discussed roads serving the public domain with Wm. W. Campbell, from the Bureau of Land Management.

Campbell requested that the Bureau be notified of any impending action on closing of any road leading to or across the public domain.

Pat Murphy presented a petition to the Commissioners asking that the crossing at White Oaks draw be kept in its present location and that repairs be made to the crossing. The petition had 20 signatures.

George Miller from the State Highway Department is in the county this week, making a mileage check, with Leroy McKnight, of the county's 1,387 miles of maintained roads.

The Commissioners meet April 4 at a Board of Equalization. Their next regular meeting is April 7.

Science teacher to lecture in Carrizozo

W. C. Robinson, one of twenty specially trained science teachers participating in an eight-state traveling science demonstration lecture program, during the 1958-60 school year, will spend a week in Carrizozo High School, beginning March 14.

The program is supported by a \$335,000 National Science Foundation grant to Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, where Robinson spent three months during the past summer in preparation for the job.

Mr. Robinson will bring to Carrizozo a repertoire of lecture materials designed to inform and stimulate teachers and students in the areas of science and mathematics and is equipped with a station wagon loaded with unique science demonstration apparatus.

A native of Iowa, Robinson is on leave from Clovis, N. M., high school, where he teaches mathematics. At the end of this school year he will return to his regular classroom duties.

Set school bond election in Capitan

The Capitan Municipal Board of Education, at their regular meeting Wednesday, March 4, received a petition signed by approximately twice the number of required eligible voters, requesting that an election be held for the purpose of voting bonds to build and furnish three classrooms, a multi-purpose room and a health nurse's office and room.

The Board of Education voted unanimously to accept the petition and set the date of Tuesday, April 12, for voting on the issue.

The classrooms will house the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. This will ease the crowded conditions in both the present grade and high school buildings.

The multi-purpose room will be used for grade school assemblies, grade school physical education, and high school and grade school plays. The room will also be available for community meetings.

John D. Spencer and Tom Riddick of the State Department of Education, made a survey of the building needs of the Capitan school and the resulting petition and board action is in keeping with their recommendations.

Superintendent of schools Fernin S. Montes was honored at the last Hondo Valley PTA meeting for a quarter of a century service in the Hondo schools.

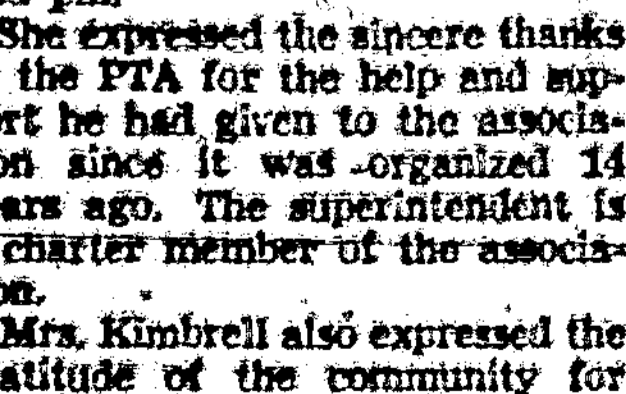

State Senator aspirant lists qualifications

John D. Spencer, candidate for State Senator on the Democratic ticket, this week listed his qualifications for the office in a prepared statement submitted to the News.

He nominated and re-elected, Vigil promises to carry on the same type of service that was given during his two former administrations and during the present two administrations of Mrs. Marian Schlarb.

Democratic candidate for commissioner has message for voters

Kennan Fuller of Corona will be campaigning for the Democratic nomination for County Commissioner District No. 2. In a statement to the News this week, Fuller had this message for the voters:

"I consider the office of county commissioner one of our county's most important offices. I would like very much to contact personally each voter in Lincoln county, but the cost of an extensive campaign prohibits. I will try to visit each precinct and I hope to meet you.

"I moved from Texas to Corona in 1930 and finished high school here in 1933. I married a native Lincoln county girl, Mary Frances Jones, daughter of the late H. S. (Sid) Jones of Corona, in 1934. Since that date I have engaged in farming, ranching and dairying in Lincoln and Torrance counties. At present we operate a dairy 13 miles southwest of Corona, where I live, and our small ranch is in Torrance county.

"We have two children, a daughter, Mrs. Harold Porterfield, who is a senior in E. N. M. U., Fortales, Harrell, our son, is a second year student of International Service at the American University, Washington, D. C.

"Since 1931 I have served our county on various boards and committees, for about 20 years. I know Lincoln county and its problems and I have watched our growth with pride. I have tried to help.

"Our county, with the rest of our state, will be increasing in population rapidly in the future. We must be ready. We should encourage any and all sound enterprises at the same time not forgetting our past mistakes. We must construct, but not neglect what has been constructed; we must spend, but spend wisely.

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Corona-Lon road next on agenda

The annual county road planning committee met in Carrizozo Monday, March 7, to consider roads in Lincoln county.

B. L. Smith said that the Corona-Lon road is set for August, but that final approval depends on the State Highway Commission, which meets next week.

He said that plans have been made to recommend that the Pine Lodge road from Spindle to Roswell, be included on the Federal aid secondary system, as soon as a definite project has been planned on the road.

The committee approved a motion that the Lincoln vicinity road planning area be included with the Capitan area, if agreeable with the two areas involved.

Bill Hart and T. B. Hood gave a report on the progress in developing the White Mountain Park area. Plans are to have access from the Eagle Creek road. They stated that 5 million people reside within a day's drive of the area and that it would be a year-around recreation area.

Mr. Calloway of the Forest Service said that a preliminary survey made of the area showed 11.3 miles of road needs at an estimated cost of \$450,000.

The committee recommended that the road be included on the FAS system when Federal funds become available.

Calloway also reported on the forest road work in Lincoln county and remarked that a recreation area is planned for the South Fork of the Bonito.

Emmett Reese reported that the county now owns \$150,000 worth of road equipment, bought in the last three years; also that the county has a first-class maintenance shop and yard for road equipment at Capitan. He also said that the county is working with the city of Alamogordo in establishing a park below the Bonito dam.

Also mentioned the need for improvement on the Nogal-Bonito Dam-Angus road.

Pat Murphy mentioned the need for roads into the county from all sides, also the need for improvement on the White Oaks road.

The county commissioners told the group that a large percentage of the car license fees comes back to the county, therefore it was good business to buy license plates in this county for the benefit of the road improvement and maintenance funds.

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The S. W. T. B. Oil Co., drilling on all well south of Oscura, was down 900 feet and was setting 18-inch casing.

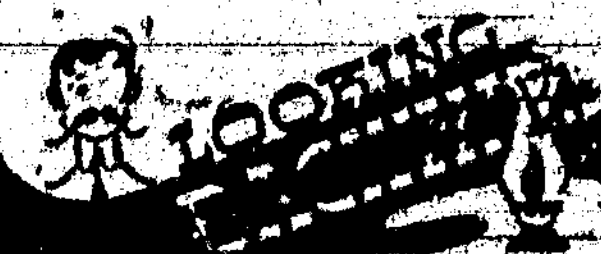
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Jim Woodland, former manager of the "Outlaw" team of ball players, was in Carrizozo from the Black ranch.

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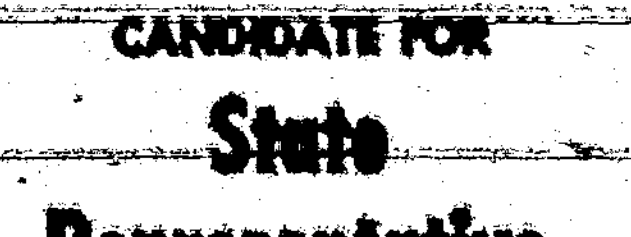

TALKING BACK

By HOMER REID

I received a very interesting letter last week with the top part of the letter containing a "scrawled" caption saying: "I strongly doubt that you have enough gumption to print this in your column."

Actually I'm delighted every time I get a letter—and certainly I do not expect everyone to agree with me—especially on such controversial matters that we are discussing. It isn't a matter of gumption, but rather one of the limitations of space that can be devoted to this column. I have just so much space (and I've been constantly running-over the space allotted) and cannot put every word of every letter I receive in the paper. However, I should like to quote the greater portion of this letter because it brings out something that possibly hasn't been considered in exactly the way I'd like to consider it.

Dear Rev. Reid: In your column of February 12, issue of the News, you said: "I refuse to believe that the 'Father' as represented by Jesus would put any soul into a place of 'eternal' torment. Punishment must be for a purpose and eternal, hopeless, purposeless punishment is serving no one, not even God." . . . You went on and said one would be in hell "until he learned his lesson and repented. . . ."

In the 19th you said the "unpardonable sin was blasphemy against the Holy Ghost. This was a direct contradiction of your previous statement, since this person must be punished eternally. This place of eternal punishment must be eternal hell."

A more direct contradiction is in the same issue (19th) where you say, "In the first place, I do not believe that any one sin is unpardonable. There is no one thing you could do that would send you to eternal and endless Hell." Then you turn right around and said just the opposite when you quoted Matt. 12: 31-32: "Therefore I say to you that every kind of sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven to men; but blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven. . . ."

Further down the column you denied this passage by saying that no sin would not be forgiven "if the right attitude were taken."

The writer then goes on to quote proof of hell, description of hell and the eternity of Hell. The quotations are Apoc. 20: 14-15 (Apocalypse is the Roman Catholic name of Revelations) and Isiah 14: 9-20—these are the descriptions of hell. (Isiah is the Roman Catholic name of Isalah.) Quoted also is Apoc. 20: 9-10.

The writer volunteers to quote other passages that are proof of eternal hell providing the request is forthcoming and if "reason is sensible."

The letter ends with this interesting statement: ". . . your column amuses me and doesn't interest me. It is amusing to see you contradict yourself. And you call yourself a man of God?—'Amused.' "P. S.—'When are you going to answer Jack's questions? So far all you've done is beat around the bush. It seems like you could have done it in the month and half you've taken.'"

Dear "Amused": Thanks for the letter. I'm assuming that you are of the Roman faith, the "Roman Catholic" that is, since you quote from the Roman Catholic version of the Bible and use names such as Apocalypse and Isalah for "Revelations and Isalah." I am pleased that you find the column amusing, however, I might say that as long as your attitude of mind is one of "condescension"—since that is what "amusing" implies—then I doubt that anything I say would be treated with any serious interest at all. You and I approach the whole question of "religion" from a different viewpoint. However, in spite of this difference in attitudes and environment, I feel that fundamentally, as sincere Christians, we have a common basis of understanding.

Let me first clarify a little bit

more my statements that you quoted so fairly and literally: The dictionary defines "blasphemy" as "the expression of defiant impleity and irreverence against God or things held sacred." Cardinal Manning, in his book, "Sin and Its Consequences," chapter 5, p. 153, says: "What is this blasphemy of the Holy Ghost? It is the resistance of the known truth."

But truth can be resisted thru ignorance—or one might be mistaken about what truth is. However, that is another question we do not have time to consider now. What I'm trying to say is that "blasphemy" is not one particular sin—it is a series of choices—false choices—the constant refusal to seek spiritual enlightenment; closing one's mind to truth as it is revealed from day to day, until that faculty of spiritual perception is atrophied and unable to choose right from wrong.

This is punishment, if you want to put it that way, and I must confess it is "eternal" in the sense that unless one makes the effort himself to learn and acquire spiritual sense he will remain in the condition he is in. God is not interested in punishment because he enjoys, ecstatically speaking, seeing people suffer. He uses "evil" in this sense as a means of "teaching us."

As far as God is concerned, no sin is unpardonable. He will pardon; but often we are unable to accept that pardon because we have isolated ourselves and insulated ourselves from the loving mercy that God is offering to us.

Now about the answers to Jack's letter, we try to publish the letters immediately—if we can—and sometimes the order of the discussion is upset so that the continuity is lost—but if you will start from the first and follow through, I think that I have answered Jack's questions, though I admit that the answers may satisfy very few people.

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Trading Stamps Used For Fund Raising

Have you been trying to come up with an idea to help your favorite charity?

Charitable fund raising, no matter how worthy the cause, has encountered increasing difficulty even in this time of general prosperity due to inflation and to the many spending demands. Most families spend for necessities and either save for luxuries or buy them through finance plans. But even though charitable donations are tax deductible, they are rarely provided for in the family budget.

Marie Carlson, president of the Trading Stamp Institute of America, calls attention to an important new trend in the world of charitable organizations.

"Trading stamp plans and premiums," observes Mr. Carlson, "have become an effective and painless method whereby charitable organizations can procure goods or raise funds for worthy causes."

Mr. Carlson points out that redemption centers where stamps are exchanged for gifts or premiums now include a vast variety of quality merchandise rivaling well-stocked department stores, and such unusual items as book club selections, Broadway theatre tickets, and trips to Europe are being offered by certain trading stamp companies. The Trading Stamp Institute president points out that there are several methods currently popular with fund raising groups.

Organization members and their families may exchange stamps for merchandise which is then donated directly to hospitals, institutions. They may award the merchandise at fund raising parties or social functions as prizes. They may exchange stamps for cash.

Among the groups availing themselves of this convenient method of acquiring money or goods for worthy causes are the Jaycees of Wappinger Falls, New York, with 3,000 families involved in saving trading stamps to finance a large Christmas party for underprivileged children; the Central Palmy Auxiliary of Miami, Florida, enlisted the stamp saving activities of 400 families to acquire award merchandise for fund raising. Fifteen hundred families participated in a charitable trading stamp collecting project for the New York Lighthouse For The Blind, purchasing a station wagon.

"Hospitals, boy scouts, women's clubs and educational groups are among the many who have adopted group saving of trading stamps for community and organizational charity support," the Trading Stamp Institute president concludes. "We are most gratified to realize that the trading stamp is being utilized in programs of lasting community value."

They returned to Santa Fe and in the next two weeks a surveyor will arrive to survey the site picked out east of Capitán, for the best terrain for drainage purposes.

Now, the question is voiced, "When we want the sewage, we can have it." All of the above "bolls down to one point." How can we buy in Capitán if businesses are not here to buy from (I mean businesses that handle things we can't buy in Capitán as of now). Why won't they locate here? No water was the former reason; now, no sewage. How about the people who have voiced the thoughts they would like to build their summer homes here in Capitán? What keeps them from doing so? First it was the water, then the sewage.

It would seem that we are not quite anxious enough for them to establish or build here. Why? Are we going to sit on our haunches the rest of our lives and bemoan the fact that we are not getting the revenue rightfully due Capitán and Lincoln County because we are too lazy to do something about it? Are we going to continue to be "a sleepy little country town," to quote one newspaper's description of us?

There is some contention existing that the people's taxes will be raised to pay for the sewage. That is not true. There will be a charge, of course (ever get anything for free) except "the best things in life that are free" and they are within each of us and here again we are too lazy to look within ourselves to find the best things that are free, only for the asking—a charge to connect onto the sewer line and a small service charge each month, but in time to come the charge will not be noticed or missed. Anyway, isn't the old adage quite true, anything worth having (such as the sewage) is worth fighting (paying) for?

Cannot we think for ourselves and voice our thoughts we feel within ourselves as right? I can't say you! Good, attend the next Chamber of Commerce meeting at the City Hall Monday night, Mar. 21, at 8. If you have a question, ask it, you will get an answer. Think for yourself—speak up—and stand on your own God-given two feet. I am going to help make Capitán a united community that makes a better community. See you, Your friend and His, Dick Sparks.

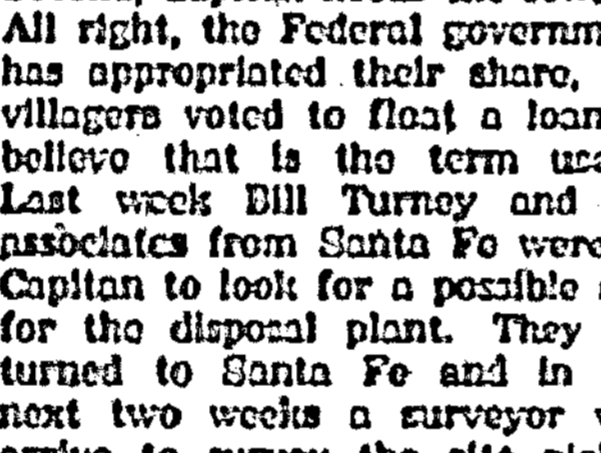
