Opening set for Wortley Hotel

On Sunday, May 1, 1960, New Mexico will see one of its historic centers of hospitality once more open its doors to travelers.

The Wortley Hotel in the town of Lincoln will again be in business.

Restoration of the frontier landmark has been accomplished by the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission for the State of New Mexico. The commission will operate the hotel and dining room as a service to the State and to the traveling public.

Originally built in the early 1870's, it was first operated by L. G. Murphy and known as "Murphy's Mess," but gradually it came to be known by the name of its cook, Sam Wortley.

The hotel provided meals and lodging to the men who were at work building Murphy's "Big Store," the imposing two-story adobe building which later became the Old Lincoln County Courthouse.

The Wortley Hotel also served as headquarters for Col. Dudley and his staff during the famous three-day battle of the Lincoln County War.

During terms of occupancy it was occupied by judges and lawyers, law men and other official visitors. In fact, it was here that Deputy Sheriff Robert Olinger was having lunch on the day that his notorious prisoner, Billy the Kid, made his escape from the Old Lincoln County Courthouse.

The hotel was operated by a succession of owners almost continuously until 1934, when it burned to the ground.

Rebuilding of the hotel has been planned and supervised by John and Nan Boylan, curators of the Old Lincoln County Courthouse State Monument. Plans and a working model of the restoration were made from data collected by excavating the old foundation and studying old photographs.

Situated comfortably off the highway, behind an old-fashioned white picket fence, the hotel offers a pleasantly reminiscent picture of life in the 1870's. Its 92 feet of front porch provides a haven for guests who enjoy the solace of a rocking chair.

Each of the restored hotel's nine rooms has its own outside entrance. Rooms at the rear of the hotel look out over the beautiful valley of the Bonito River and beyond to the majestic rise of the Captain Mountains.

Except for the kitchen, the entire hotel has been furnished in antiques. Each bedroom has its brass bedstead and marble-topped dresser. Dining-room tables are round and old-fashioned, the buffet ornate.

Each room has its own fireplace, even though a central heating system is available for cold weather. Double-thick adobe walls ensure pleasant coolness during the summer.

The hotel's dining-room will be under the supervision of Inez Grady who is well known in South-eastern New Mexico. Besides having operated her own coffee shop in Roswell, Mrs. Grady has managed the Nickson Hotel coffee shop and dining room for many years.

Mrs. Grady has been celebrated by the distinguished writer, Paul Hogan, in his second novel "Main Line West" as the coffee shop operator of the story.

A grand opening of the hotel is scheduled for the first of June, but service will be available during the month of May. Reservations for

Baptists to build Educational Bldg.

Plans have been approved and financing arranged for the construction of an educational building on the First Baptist Church property in Carrizozo.

The building, of block construction, is to be 42 feet by 48 feet in size and will tie into the rear part of the present church edifice.

This calls for remodeling the back wall of the church. A choir loft and new baptistry will extend into the new building.

The educational building will have eight classrooms, a study, assembly room and two rest rooms. Members of the church will do the carpentry and mason work, the electrical and plumbing work to be contracted for.

The old parsonage is to be dismantled and become part of the site for the new building.

Financing has been arranged through the Broadway plan, in the amount of \$10,000, and the sum is paid off through maturing bonds.

Freeze affects some fruit in county

County Agent Ralph R. Dunlap reports that some of the fruit growing areas in the county were hit by frost last week.

Around Lincoln the apples and peaches were nearly all killed, while below Hondo there was very little damage.

In the Limacher orchard, peaches one-fourth inch in diameter were noted.

The Ruidoso Valley suffered little from the freeze. Higher up the early apple blossoms were hit, but the later blooms will very likely set a commercial crop, if there is not another frost, the county agent said, adding:

"Before a freeze will hurt fruit it has to be 23° or lower. Even though it may freeze ice, it will seldom hurt fruit or blossoms if it stays above this temperature."

Carrizozo services for A. H. Aguayo

Services were held in the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo Saturday afternoon, April 23, for A. H. Aguayo, with Rev. Chester Bunch of Belen and Rev. Harold C. Ely of Carrizozo officiating.

The music was under the direction of Mrs. T. E. Kelley.

Interment followed in the family plot in Evergreen cemetery.

Mrs. Aguayo, who suffered from severe shock and a light stroke following the death of her husband, was unable to attend his funeral.

—Mr. Aguayo—a long time retired Lincoln County rancher, died of a heart attack April 20 at his home in Belen, where he had resided for the past two years. He was 83 years of age.

He was born in Tularosa on December 16, 1874. The family had moved to Lincoln during the colorful days of Billy the Kid and the Lincoln County War.

Survivors are his widow, the former Edith Sheppard; six sons, Paul and Jack of Belen; Ernest of El Paso; Elmo of La Puente, Calif.; Herbert of Phoenix and Donis of Yuleta, Texas; three daughters, Mrs. A. N. Bills, 150 Mile House, B. C. Canada; Mrs. John Helvy, Redwood City, Calif. and Mrs. H. P. Brimberry of Odessa, Texas, and a large number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. Sara Fisher and Mrs. Amanda Treet of El Paso and Mrs. E. V. Abeyla of Albuquerque.

pallbearers at the Carrizozo service were Roy Harman, Johnson Stearns, Leandro Vega, Marvin H Roberts, Albert Roberts and A. P. Sutton.

During his later years Mr. Aguayo had been interviewed many times, as people became more and more interested about the mode of living and colorful events of the early days. His children have gathered a number of recollections of their father in a paper "Incidents in My Life," such as the following:

"When only a child of 8 (the family was then living in Lincoln) my father hired a man to plow his field with a yoke of oxen and told me to go along as helper, which means I was to walk ahead of the oxen to guide them as they were newly broken in to this work. This

was a little hard for me to go as the steers were only about three feet behind me and I was afraid of them. As they pulled and snorted and rolled their eyes I would run to try to get out of their way. The old man became angry with me and catching me by the arm he threw me directly into the faces and horns of the oxen. Though I was not hurt I was a badly frightened boy. I told my father how this old man had treated me and he scolded him, then told me not to go out there again as it was too dangerous for me.

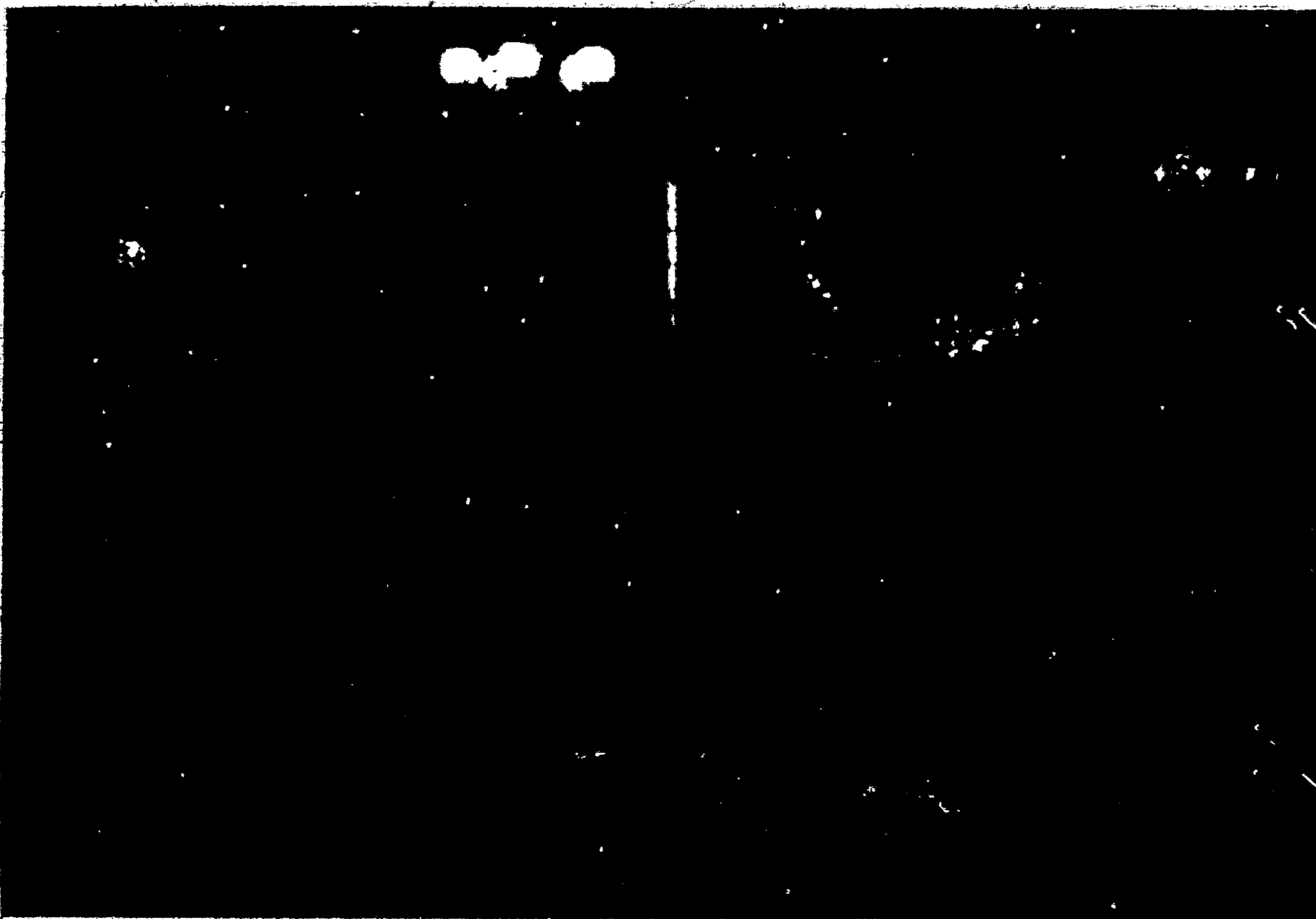
"In the years of 1900-01-02, A. H. Aguayo was working on the VV cattle ranch on the Bonito river near Angus. During the winter months he was sent to Glenora to ride the range in that locality. He boarded and lived with the Geo. Coe family for about three winters. The VV Cattle Co. and ranch was owned by James E. Cree of Edinburgh, Scotland, who was sent to this country for his health. He was a young man who had contracted asthma in his homeland from the damp and chilly climate there. His aged parents came with him and his father died a few years after buying the ranch from Pat Garrett and John W. Poe. His mother aged 70 stayed and helped manage the ranch and cattle for several years. Frank Allison was range manager of the outfit when A. H. began working there later he married Grace Coe, daughter of Geo. Coe. While boarding at the Coe home A. H. had the opportunity of hearing the stories told by Mr. Coe the being a member of Bill's gang! told him of many of the fights they had been through together.

"The stories he told A. H. of the Lincoln County War are related in his book, word for word. "Frontier Fighting," published in 1937. A. H. enjoyed hearing Mr. Coe tell of the fighting and of the many narrow escapes he had from death during these perilous times including the battle of Blazer's Mill, where Coe lost a finger from a bullet from Burgess Roberts gun, just before the latter was killed.

"My parents lived in Lincoln when Billy the Kid first came to this country. My father was a practitioner of the peace in Lincoln at that time. When Billy was in need of advice or information on anything concerning his affairs he would come to my dad for a word of advice and encouragement etc. My dad had a round track office chair for visitors to sit by his desk for a chat or any assistance he could give them. Billy had sat in that chair many times. The chair rather worn, is now owned by my sister, Mrs. E. V. Abeyla of Albuquerque and is a prized relic.

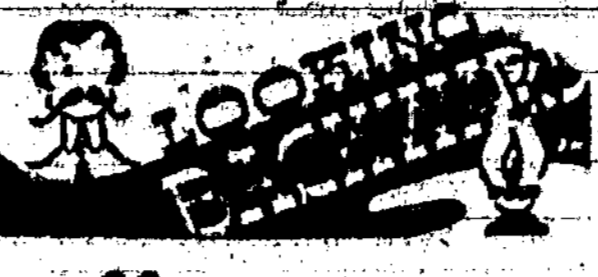

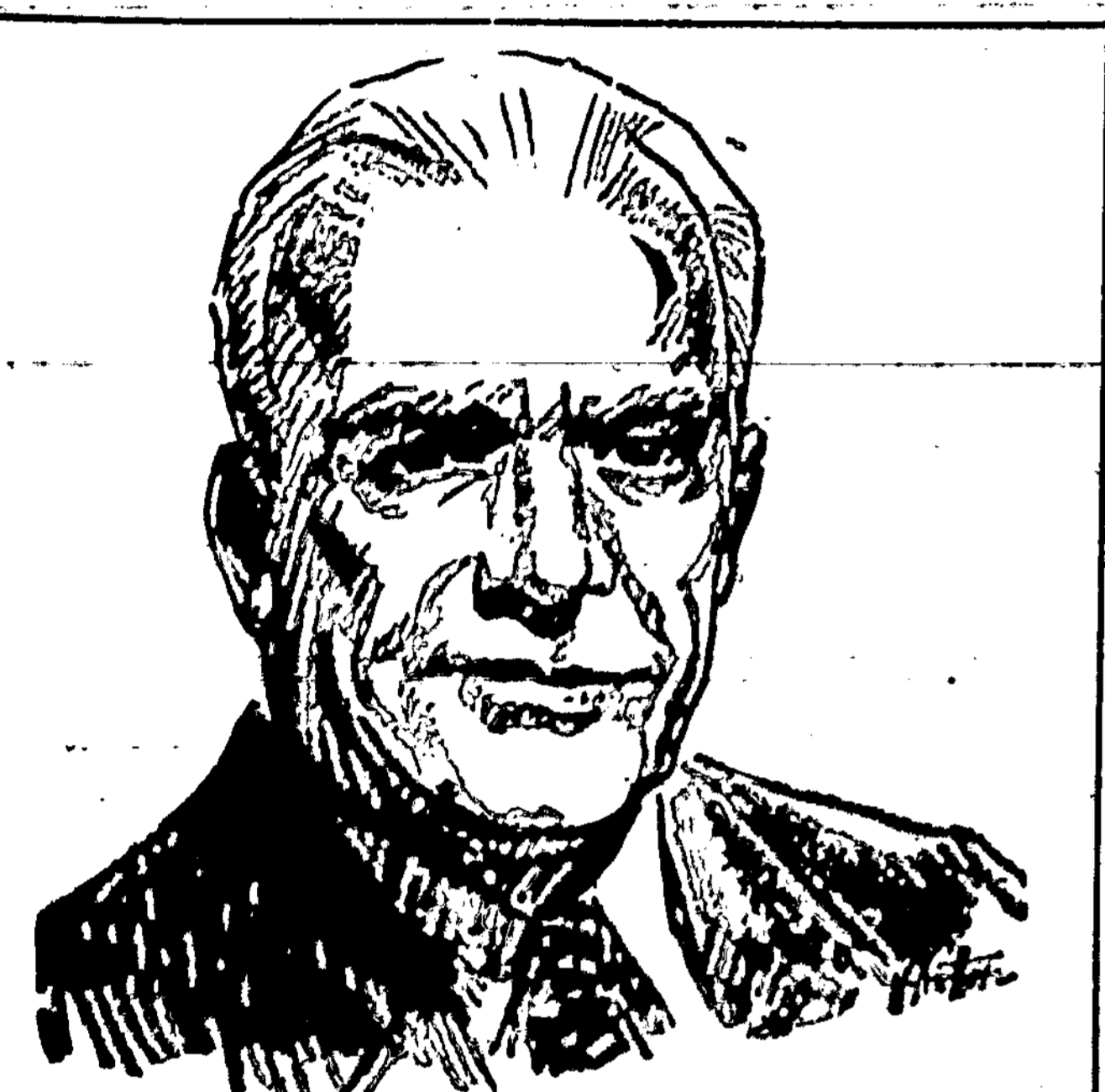

County had its share of good musicians in by-gone days

Lincoln County in bygone days had the cream of the crop in good, natural-born musicians.

First, there were the Montanos of historic Lincoln. Then came Prof. Juan L. Reyes of White Oaks, the king of them all, and whom we have mentioned before.

In the very early days of Carrizozo, Prof. Gallindo & Sons came to the new and booming railroad town and organized a small band. Among the musicians were Ben Sandoval, Scotty Garcia, Saturnino Chavez Sr., the Vidaurri brothers, Damlan Holguin, Justo del Toro, Pablo Telles, Juan Solis, Jau-reguis, and others.

In 1915, the Lucero brothers Aurelio and Patricio, and Thomas Serrano, came to Carrizozo from Santa Rosa.

Those boys couldn't read a note of music, but they had been playing music together since they were 6 years of age and they delighted the large dance crowds with their fine and very talented playing.

They had a phonograph as their only instructor, and not only did they learn a piece to perfection, but they even improvised on it. They were born geniuses and it was a pity they never had the opportunity to learn to read music. When Patricio and Serrano teamed up with Elias Sanchez, an expert guitarist, and Juan Guerra, a flute player.

We recall when that trio played for the big Fourth of July dance in the dining room in Fort Stanton in 1916.

Other good musicians of olden times were the late Judge Elardo Chavez and his brother Abraham, Tello Romero, Primitivo Brady, Nicolas and Yeabel Peralta.

Tularosa also had a genius in the person of the late Andy Wilson. When he died a few years ago, Tularosa and Otero county lost much of the spirit of the real-old-time dances.

If you were going to White Oaks from either direction, in the nighttime, you could hear Reyes' violin, echoing in the canyons, four or five miles distant from where he was playing for a dance. The same was true of Aurelia Lucero in Carrizozo. His music could be heard all over town.

Primary Election Proclamation

WHEREAS, under and by virtue of Section 3-3-1, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation, it is made the duty of the Board of County Commissioners to proclaim and give notice of elections; AND WHEREAS, under and by virtue of Chapter 2 of New Mexico Laws of 1938 (Special Session) known as "Primary Election Code," provision is made for the holding of direct primary elections throughout the State of New Mexico and in each county and precinct thereof; AND WHEREAS, the Governor of the State of New Mexico has heretofore issued Public Proclamation calling a Primary Election to be held in the State of New Mexico on the 10th day of May, A. D., 1960;

NOW THEREFORE, the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, New Mexico, in session at Carrizozo, said County and State, on this the 22nd day of April, 1960, does hereby proclaim and give public notice of a Primary Election to be held in each of the precincts and election districts of said County, on Tuesday, May 10th, 1960, between the hours of eight o'clock A. Moise seeks return to Supreme Court bench

Seeking to retain his seat on the bench of the New Mexico State Supreme Court, is Justice Irwin S. Moise of Albuquerque.

Moise was appointed by Governor John Burroughs to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of the late Justice Dan Sadler in May of 1959.

A native New Mexican, Justice Moise was born in Santa Rosa in 1906, where he attended the local public schools. He studied at the University of Colorado and the University of Michigan, where he received his law degree in 1928. That same year, Moise, just 21 years old, was admitted to the New Mexico Bar Association.

He opened law practice at Tucuman, remaining there until 1932. In 1932, Attorney Moise returned to his home town; there he resumed his law practice until 1934, at which time he went to Washington and worked in the legal division of the NRA, and later as deputy administrator.

After two years, he returned to New Mexico and served for a time as state director for the Federal Housing Administration. Shortly thereafter, Moise was elected district judge for the Fourth Judicial District at Las Vegas. Only 36 years of age at the time, Moise has been the youngest person ever to hold a district judgeship in the state. He held this position for six years.

Moise's vast experience also includes three years in the Navy, during World War II as a Lieutenant. He spent 18 months as gunnery officer at sea.

Prior to his appointment to the State Supreme Court, Moise practiced law in Albuquerque from 1946 to 1959.

He served under both the Republican and Democratic administrations as attorney for Interstate Streams Commission from 1946 to 1959.

An incumbent, Justice Irwin S. Moise is seeking re-election in the Democratic primaries, May 10 to the post of State Supreme Court Justice.

Letter to Editor

Editor, News:

In the interest of fair play, I submit an editorial, written by Orville E. Pricetley, editor and publisher of the Las Cruces Sun-News and headed "Tempered With Justice".

Now that we are into this matter of discussing the suspending of revoking of driver's licenses it might be well to take a second look at the matter.

The safety council or commission in Santa Fe is the authority which revokes driver's licenses. Driver's licenses are supposedly automatically suspended or revoked when a defendant is convicted of drunk driving; driving while under the influence of narcotics; or for three moving traffic violations.

The Safety Commission on more than one occasion, we have been advised, has called individuals in for consultation on the suspending of the driver's license for one of the above causes and more particularly the three moving traffic violations.

They have leaned over backwards seeking to be fair and reasonable. In some instances a conference has resulted in the disclosure the defendant has really not been guilty of three moving traffic violations but has pleaded guilty when they should have fought their case.

Justice Irwin S. Moise of the Third Judicial District has leaned over considerably in some cases which have come before him. He has employed discretion, in an effort to protect a man's job.

We would not like to be in a position of taking a job away from a man who has a family to support by suspending his driver's license. There have been instances when the private or personal license has been revoked or suspended, but the license to drive a truck or a car at work has been granted.

If helping a man to continue to be able to work to make a living and support his family is using discretion a district judge doesn't have, then we are in favor of him having this right.

If tempering justice with mercy is wrong and illegal and not right—then we believe we should make some changes.

We know that politics plays a part in the suspending of driver's licenses. It always has and probably always will.

And we feel sure a district judge certainly has more authority to extend consideration to individuals deserving the second chance. We are glad one of our district judges does just this and we sincerely hope he is re-elected to continue to serve the people of this district.

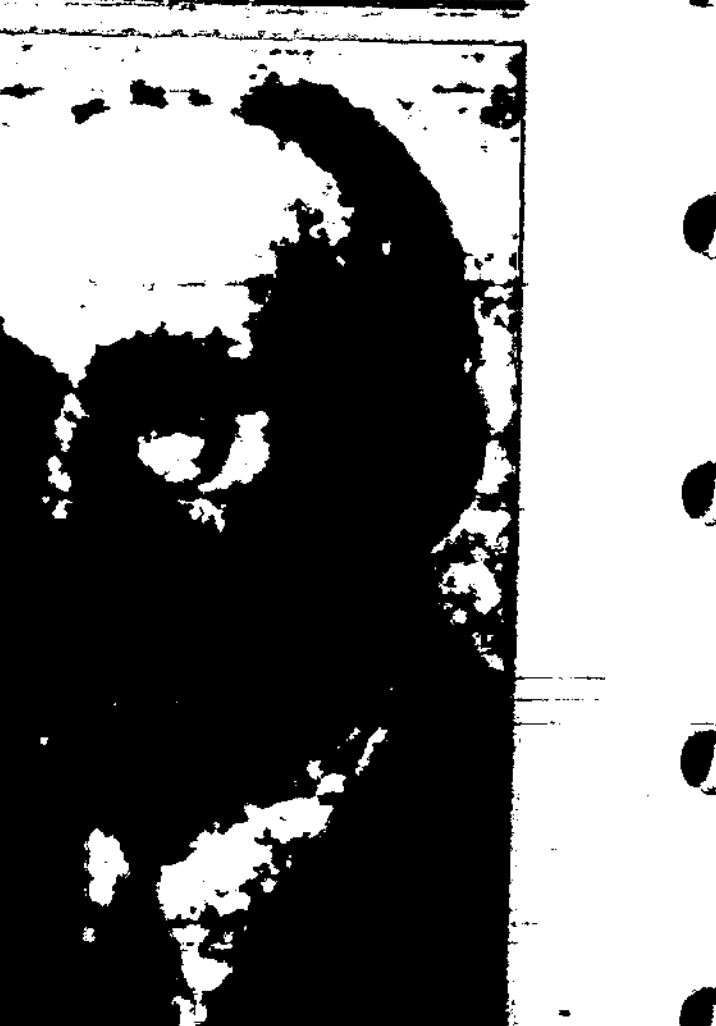

TALKING BACK ALTO BRIEFS

By HOMER REID
Dear Rev. Reid: In your column of April 22, you said at the end: "As a matter of fact, Kennedy gave to 'Look' magazine for publication on March 3, 1959, a statement covering the answers to these questions. It was remarkable for its candor and breadth." The questions you listed were concerning the "boycott of public schools; the tax support of parochial schools and the appointment of an American ambassador to the Holy See." I would be interested in knowing what that statement of "candor and breadth" was and just what is your objection to the above policies.—"INTERESTED."

Dear "Interested": Kennedy's statement to Look magazine was as follows:
"Whatever one's religion in his private life may be, for the officeholder, nothing takes precedence over his oath to uphold the Constitution and all its parts—including the First Amendment and the strict separation of Church and State. Without reference to the Presidency, I believe as a Senator that the separation of Church and State is fundamental to our American concept and heritage and should remain so. I am fully opposed to appointment of any ambassador to the Vatican. Whatever advantages it might have in Rome—and I'm not convinced of these—they would be more than offset by the divisive effect at home. The first amendment to the Constitution is an infinitely wise one. There can be no question of Federal funds being used for support of parochial or private schools. It's unconstitutional under the First Amendment as interpreted by the Supreme Court. I'm opposed to the Federal Government's extending support to any church or its schools. As for such church matters as buses, lunches and other services, the issue is primarily social and economic and not religious. Each case must be judged on its merits within the law as interpreted by the courts."

I think Kennedy answered most of the second part of your question—"Just what is your objection to the above policies." It happens that in the Look magazine for this week this subject is treated fully. I think that all thinking Americans should read that article.

The most important question which Senator Kennedy ignored in his first reply to his non-Catholic critics was that of his attitude toward his church's boycott of the public schools. However, there is no evidence that Kennedy believes in the coercive principle of Canon 1374. Indeed, his education, which has been almost wholly non-Catholic in character, creates the presumption that he rejects the coercive features of that canon.—H. R.

Dear Preacher: That letter the week before last criticizing our school administration and our teachers seemed a little out of line to me. I'm probably one of the biggest critics of our school system because I don't think the graduates of high school are prepared even for simple office work—most of them can't even spell! But let's put the blame exactly where it belongs!

The blame for anyone not getting an education in this country is with the individual himself! I came to this country 27 years ago with only a third grade education, but all I needed to do was ask and I was given an education—the opportunity was there. All I needed to do was take advantage of it. After all, it boils down to one thing: Do you want an education? If you don't, there is nothing any one can do to give it to you. If you do want an education and have a desire to get one, there is nothing any one can do to prevent you from getting it!

These modern kids are so used to being "spoon-fed" they won't even reach out and take what is offered to them so willingly! Blame the parents, blame the teachers, blame everything you want to, but the fact remains that it's the individual who will suffer and the individual who will pay the consequences!

Each one is responsible for his own destiny! It was Henry Ford who made the shortest speech in history—when asked to say a word or two he did—at a big banquet in his honor: "There is no such thing as no opportunity!" That's truer today than ever before!—A. W. HENRY.

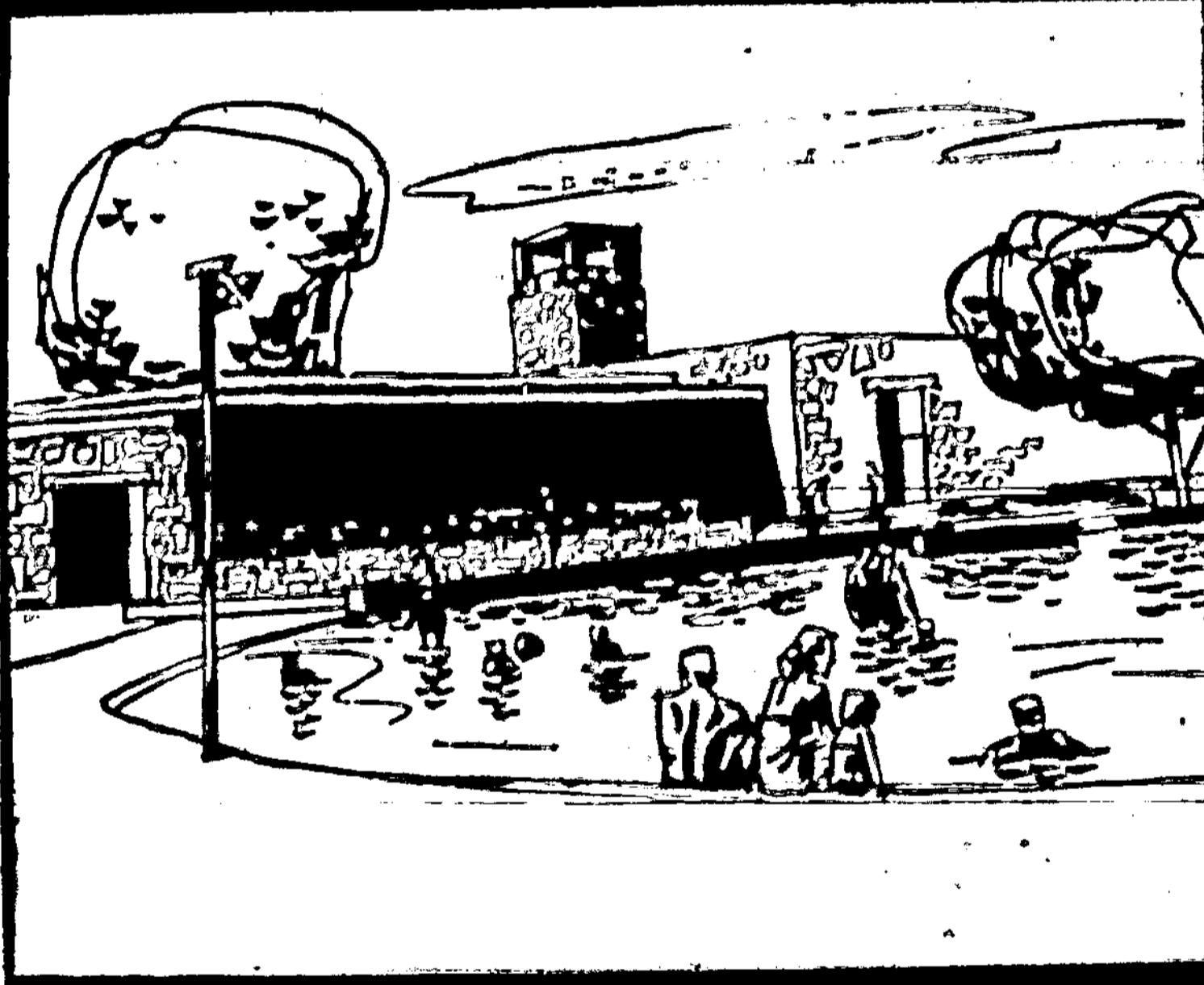

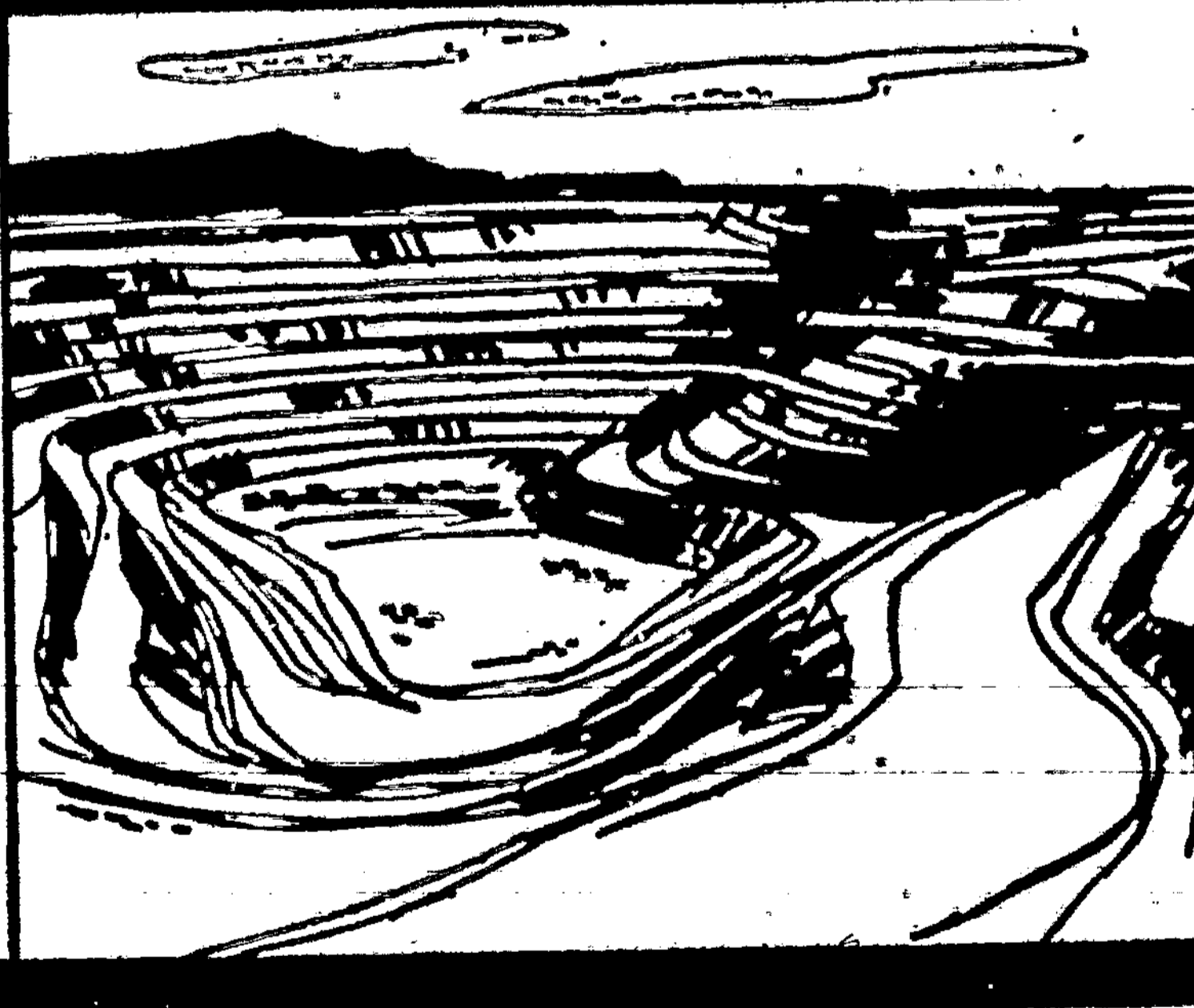

Candidates give views on issues

A party of six Lincoln County people returned Wednesday from Albuquerque where they attended the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau's "Measure the Candidates" luncheon Tuesday at the Hilton Hotel.

Those making the trip were Mr. and Mrs. Bud Bagley of Corona, Kenneth Vance of Carrizozo, Joe Sheen of Pico and W. G. (Bill) Shreevogost of Honda.

The Albuquerque Journal carried the following report of the meeting:

Four of the five candidates for governor of New Mexico answered questions on the state's fiscal policies, proposed changes in its minimum wage law and federal aid to states.

Participating were Edwin L. Mechem and Paul W. Robinson, candidates for the Republican nomination; Joseph A. Bury and Thos. A. Holland, seeking the Democratic nomination. Only Gov. John Burroughs, seeking Democratic renomination, did not appear.

FISCAL POLICIES

One question was: "What fiscal policies will you carry out to keep the State of New Mexico operating within its income and to avoid an increase in taxes?"

"Cut out the fat," answered Mechem. "That is the only thing that is going to take care of New Mexico's fiscal problems."

"We should eliminate all these political hirings and payroll padding, and I'm the man who can get that done," said Bury.

Holland furnished reporters a written answer: Collect all income due the state, but no one on the state payroll unless his services are required and conduct affairs according to principles of sound financial management.

MINIMUM WAGE

On changes in the state's minimum wage law, Mechem said he would oppose extending it to cover agricultural workers; the other three opposed any increase in the present rate.

A question on highway taxes was worded: "How do you propose that trucks bear their proportionate share of the cost of maintaining adequate highways in New Mexico?"

Mechem said, "A top-mile tax." Bury said, "Equalization within the industry." Holland cited figures he had tentatively shown "an upward revision of trucking fees is in order." Robinson did not get to the question.

Another question: "What are your ideas on federal aid to the states?"

Robinson said, "We need federal aid for highways and hospitals." Mechem said, "Every time we send a dollar to Washington, we get far less of it back than if we sent it to a state or local government. I would not like to see any extension of federal aid."

Practically all of New Mexico's candidates for Congress, U. S. Senator and governor appeared for the "Measure Your Candidate" session. More than 500 Farm Bureau members, representing 27 county Farm Bureaus, attended.

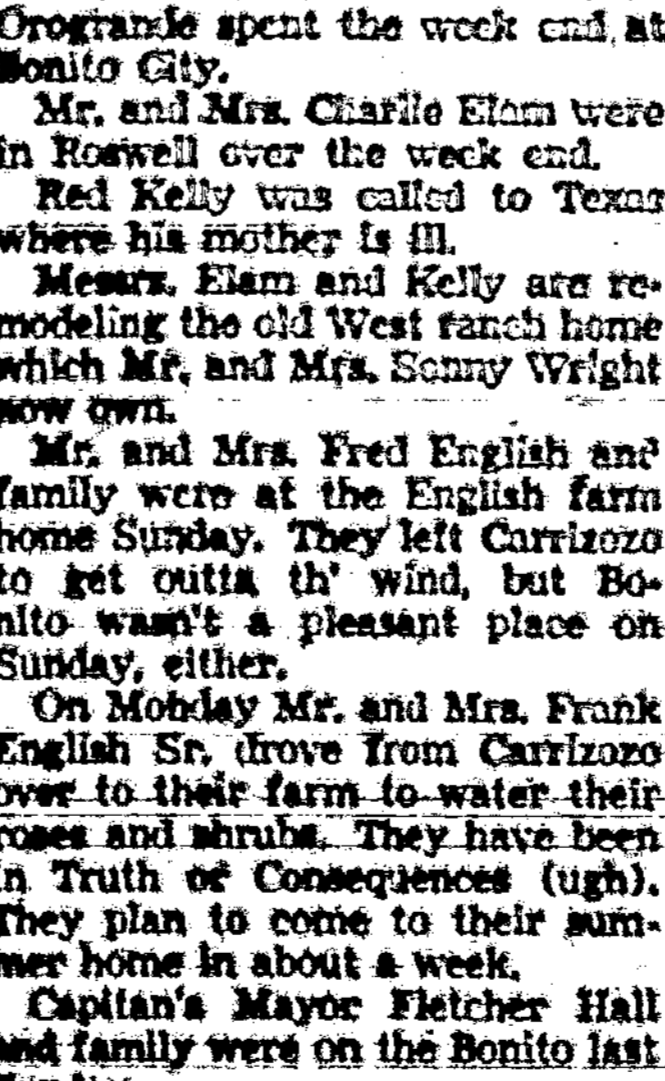
