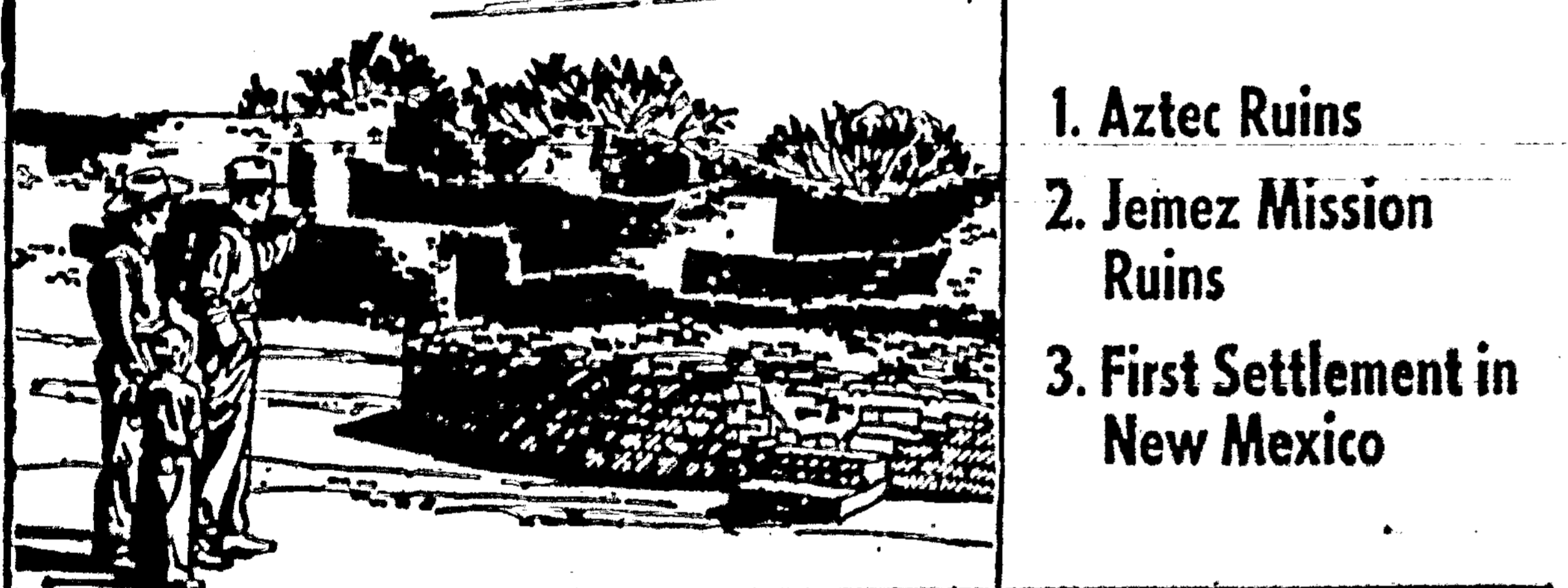

You can't wait for a completely Christian community before you decide to become a Christian and live a life with significance. You can't wait for Caesar's household to be Christianized before you start living like a Christian! I'm only too well aware of the conditions in Carrizozo that make it difficult for many to accept the way of Jesus—it's good to set out to change the circumstances and help others; but don't wait until Carrizozo is completely Christianized before you become a Christian. That may never happen—H. R.

Dear Rev. Reid: What would you have done if you'd been sent back to Carrizozo? I know it's none of my business, but I'd heard you didn't want to come back. Would you have had any choice in the matter—"A SKEPTIC."

Candy N' Cake For Mother
What better time than Mother's Day could the teenager in the house find to try making her first cake? Mother will not only be mighty proud of her daughter but she'll be delighted with the cake. But this young miss knows what her favorite is, too, so she's added freshly baked chocolate confectioners' sugar cake to her gift for Mother. With this two-fold combination, she can't miss when it comes to pleasing Mom.

CHERRY SPICE CAKE
(Makes 1 9-inch layer cake)
1 1-pound 3-ounce package honey spice cake mix
1/2 cup apricot jam
1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries, drained (about 10 cherries)
1 8-ounce package cream cheese, softened
2 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar

Prepare honey spice cake mix as directed on package for mixing. Bake as directed on package for 2 9-inch layer pans. Combine apricot jam and cherries; mix well. Spread cherry mixture on one layer. Top with second layer. Beat cheese until smooth. Gradually add sugar, beating constantly, until smooth. Frost sides and top of cake with cream cheese frosting.

CHERRY LAYER CAKE
(Makes 1 9-inch layered cake)
1 1-pound 4-ounce package white cake mix
1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
6 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
1/2 cup milk
2 teaspoons vanilla
2/3 cup cocoa powder
1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries, drained (about 20 cherries)
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
Maraschino cherries

Prepare cake mix following package directions for mixing. Bake cake following package directions for 2 9-inch layers. Cream butter and confectioners' sugar and milk alternately so butter and sugar fine mixture; beat until smooth. Add vanilla; blend. Remove 1 cup frosting. Add cocoa to 1 cup frosting; blend until smooth. Remove 1/2 cup cocoa frosting and reserve for garnishing. Add chocolate cocoa cherry frosting to remaining 1/2 cup cocoa frosting. Spread cocoa cherry frosting on 1 cake layer. Top with remaining cake layer. Spread top and sides of cake with white frosting. Garnish cake with reserved 1/2 cup cocoa frosting and cherries.
