Game Dept. nets big catch of carp in Bonito Lake

An experiment tried at Bonito Lake Wednesday of last week proved to three conversation officers what they had long suspected—that the mountain lake has an over-abundance of rough fish population—namely, carp.

Charlie Bird, Ralph Little and Fred Harrington of the State Fish and Game Department, set out five gill-nets. After being in the lake ten hours, the nets were taken up and the catch was approximately 170 pounds of carp and only three trout.

Charlie says the smallest carp was 2 1/2 pounds and the largest one weighed 9 1/2 pounds. All of the carp were ready to spawn.

The largest carp had the potential of laying close to 1,000,000 eggs, according to the game conservationist, compared with about 2,500 from an average-sized trout. Because they propagate so much faster than trout, carp have a definite advantage over the game fish when they are in the same waters.

Regarding fishing at Nogal Lake, which many fishermen have reported as "slow," Bird says it is not due to lack of trout in the lake.

"We know how many we've planted," he says, "and we've kept a pretty accurate check on the number caught. Less than half of those planted have been taken out by fishermen. At the present time the trout are slow to respond to bait, but anglers using flies and lures are doing much better."

New judge named to hear injunction on town paving

District Judge J. M. Scarborough has disqualified himself in the case Minnie Roll, et al, plaintiffs, vs. W. C. Wilcox, mayor, et al, defendants, the Carrizozo paving injunction case.

In his request to be disqualified, Judge Scarborough stated he found it "impossible to hear the same without considerable delay."

A hearing on the request of the plaintiffs for a permanent injunction has been pending for months.

James B. McShee, chief justice of the Supreme Court of New Mexico, in an order dated May 22, appointed the Hon. George T. Harris, judge of the Fifth Judicial District, to "try said cause and to hear and determine all matters incident thereto."

Judge W. T. Steeglin will continue district court in Carrizozo on May 31.

PRIMARY ELECTIONS ARE VULNERABLE

New Mexico primary elections are vulnerable to monkey business. The chairman of the political parties nominate the election officials in each county.

Filo Sedillo, Demo chairman of Valenzuela, has guessed that Little Joe will be going for Senator Chavez' place in four years when the term expires. The Chavez people seem to have thought the same thing before the primary election.

Montoya stands to have a major voice in picking the delegates to the national convention in Los Angeles. He's for Lyndon Johnson.

SOCORRO LOSES INDUSTRY HOPE

Socorro has suffered another disappointment in the utilization of the old state TD hospital plant which was abandoned in favor of the Fort Stanton hospital three years ago.

Electric Components Corp., which was given a \$1 a year lease last September in consideration of paying the cost of maintenance of the plant was relieved of the maintenance responsibility this month and the state welfare department is now looking for another interested in using the extensive facilities.

Meanwhile a surplus food depot maintained at Carrizozo near Fort Stanton is being shifted to the old Socorro hospital.

EUGENE MANLOVE RHODES

... his stories of the West won him fame.

Plans are being completed for the annual pilgrimage to the grave of Eugene Manlove Rhodes, which is scheduled for Sunday, June 5.

Rhodes, noted western writer, grew up in Otero county and became nationally known for his southwestern stories. At his death in 1934, his body was returned to his own Rhodes Canyon in the San Andreas where he homesteaded in the early days.

Gene Rhodes taught school in the Cedar Creek country in Lincoln County. A few unruly lads had the habit of running the teacher out. The school hired Gene, hoping he would have better luck.

On his first day, Gene sensed that the group was about to gang up on him. When it was time for school to take up, he pulled his six-shooter from his pocket and snapped his heels.

"School will now come to order!" It did—and he had no more trouble.

Gene Rhodes' grave is within the bombing range of the White Sands Missile Range and each year, through cooperation of the Missile Range and Holloman AFB the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce secures permission for the way to be opened whereby Gene's family, old friends and fans may visit the area and pay homage to him and other old timers who brought development to the San Andreas and the Tularosa Basin.

The cavalcade will leave the Chamber of Commerce building in Alamogordo at 9 a.m. Sunday, June 5, and will be admitted into the range over the road leading west from Tularosa. This road has been recently paved across the basin, nearly to the foot of the San Andreas. Cars from Albuquerque, Socorro and other Rio Grande Valley points will be admitted through Engle.

Tales of the Old West will be spun throughout the day and picnic dinners will be spread on the grounds. Everyone brings their own lunch and drinks.

Among the old timers expected for the day are Nate Smith, Bob Martin, George Henderson of Truth or Consequences, who knew Rhodes in the 60's, and Dick Gilliland, Clay Smith and Rev. Lucy Slams of Alamogordo, close friends of the Rhodes family, and former Governor R. C. Dillon of El Paso who kept up a lively correspondence with Rhodes during his administration.

Rhodes' son and daughter-in-law, Alan and Betty Rhodes of Apache, N. M., hope to be here for the occasion.

A special feature in connection with the event this year will be a lecture on Saturday evening, June 4, to be given at the Desert Aire by Dr. C. L. Sonnenichsen of Texas Western College in El Paso, on the life and works of Eugene Manlove Rhodes. The program is sponsored by the Friends of the Library group, who last year assisted in securing a \$500 collection of Rhodes material for the Alamogordo library.

Rhodes is buried at a high point on his old ranch. His gravestone is a great boulder, inset with a bronze plaque, which was placed there by the New Mexico Historical Society. It bears an epitaph that "Gene Rhodes would like—'Eugene Manlove Rhodes, Paso Por Aqui' (He Passed By Here).

All the persons arrested were filed on the charges varying from taking part in an affray, scandalous conduct and assault with a deadly weapon.

Sedillo was released on \$1500 bond and is to appear in district court before Judge Scoggin on May 31.

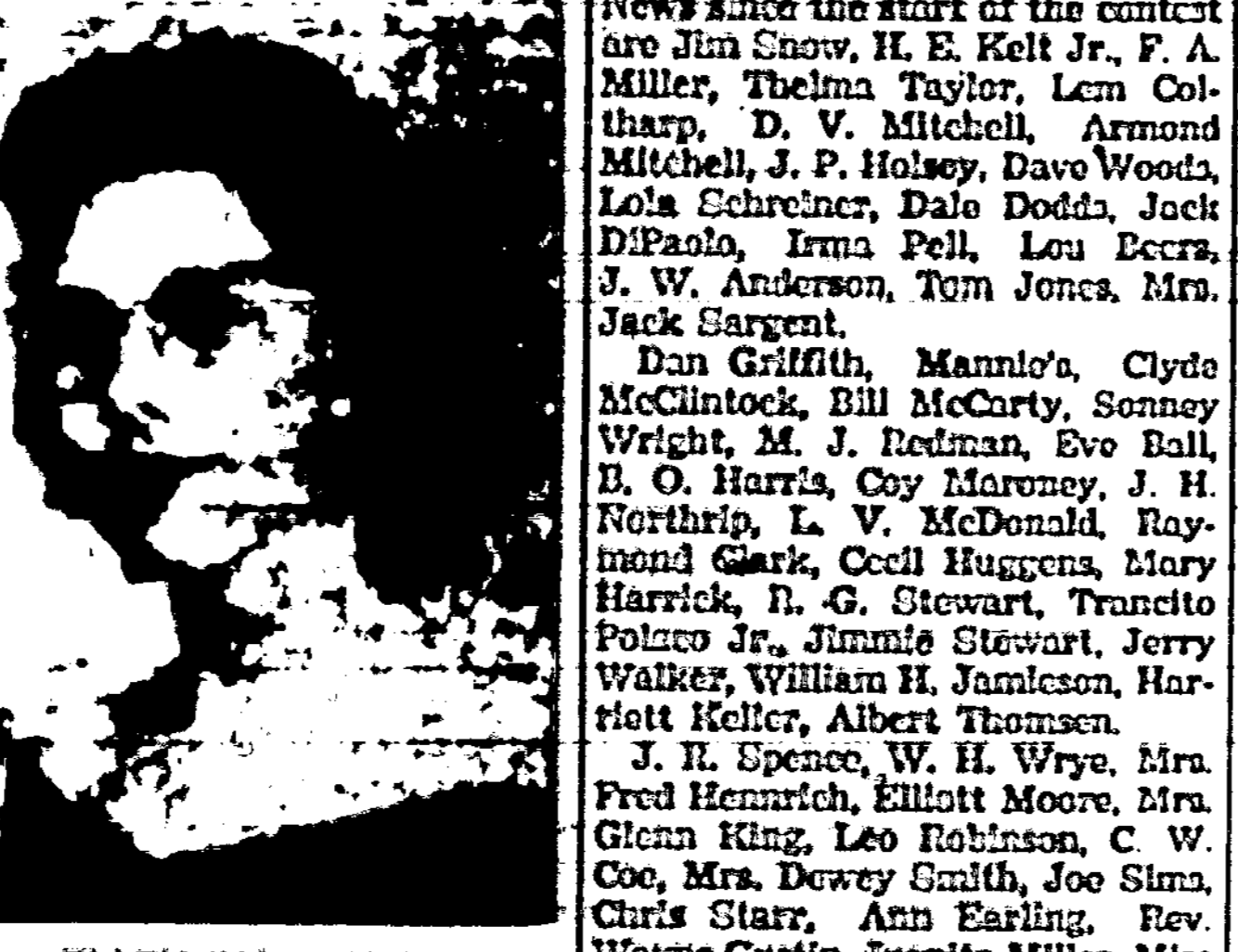
Work day Saturday at Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting grounds

New Mexico lowest in nation's divorce rate

SANTA FE—While the nation's marriage rate increased 1.2% in 1959, New Mexico's rate showed a decrease of 5.9%. Divorces nationally were in the plus column by 4.8%, whereas New Mexico's divorce rate dropped, losing 29.9% over the preceding year.

Only five states reported a decline in divorces: New Mexico, Arkansas, Maine, Minnesota and Vermont. New Mexico's percentage decrease was larger than the total decrease in the four other areas.

In New Mexico, the birthrate increased 2.4% and the state followed the national pattern with a slight decrease in the deathrate.

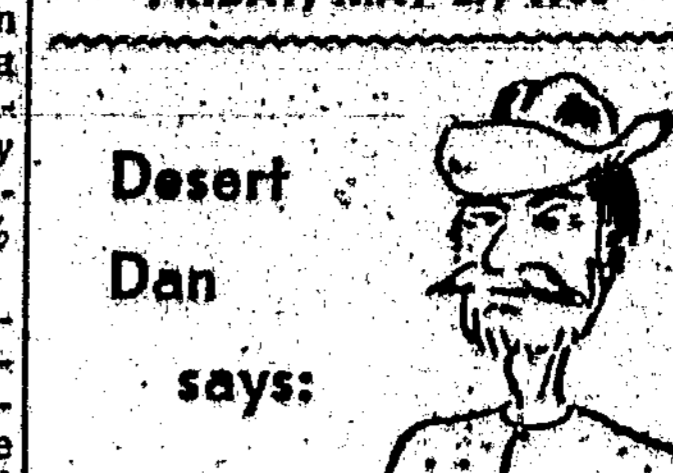

ALBUQUERQUE JOE CONFOUNDS DEMOS

Santa Fe, May 18—The Democrats have Albuquerque Joe Montoya as their candidate for lieutenant governor and don't know what to do about it.

If they should induce him out of the race to let another run the backing might be severe and the costs high.

If he stays in, the party ticket is likely to be subject to a lot of criticism for putting the erratic Albuquerque Joe in the place that is only a breath away from the governorship.

NEVER PROVED THING ON HIM

Montoya is a janitor supply salesman who was in the legislature from 1943 through 1952, a time when he was subject to scores of accusations and scandalous rumors but nothing was ever planned on him more serious than running away to El Paso with a bill affecting Albuquerque, and a record of unpredictability on how he would stand on any issue in the legislature.

The Albuquerque Montoya (Joe A.) is commonly regarded as having exploited the similarity of his name to that of Santa Fe Joe M. Montoya, congressman and former lieutenant governor and legislator.

In 1950 Albuquerque Joe filed in a congressional race against Santa Fe Joe and got enough votes to keep Joe M. from the nomination.

RAN WITHOUT GROUP SUPPORT

Albuquerque Joe won the nomination without the support of any of the recognized party factions. The Chavez Democrats backed Geo. Hannett, the statehouse Democrats were for Filo Sedillo, and many in the Bury-for-governor movement aided Peter Gallagher.

Montoya is opposed by the formidable Republican Tom Bolack of Farmington.

SENATOR FAILS, BURROUGHS GAINS

Last week's voting smacked down Sen. Dennis Chavez who failed in his assault on U. S. Rep. Joe M. Montoya of Santa Fe, and the results brought an air of confidence and security to the Gov. John Burroughs camp.

Burroughs whipped the challenger Joe Burey, by more than 17,000, a substantial margin over the 13,000 dividing line that was regarded as a yardstick for measuring the governor's popularity.

Burroughs beat Burey in 1953 by 13,000.

ELECTION SLATES A RETURN MATCH

On the Republican side Ed Mechem, the three-time governor, was even more impressive, snowing his rival Paul Robinson by a three-to-one runaway. No one expected it.

The results matched Burroughs and Mechem for a return contest, the first one going to Burroughs by 1,900 in 1953.

MORRIS, MONTAYA POPULAR ONES

Aside from Mechem and Albuquerque Joe Montoya, the strong ones of the 1960 primary election were the two Democrats' congressmen, Joe M. Montoya and Tom Morris, and Earl Hartley, the Clavis candidate who won the Demo nomination for attorney general.

Hartley beat the former AG, Joe L. Martinez, who was going in a field against four angle candidates. Morris and his fellow congressman, Santa Fe Montoya, ran far ahead of expectations.

PICKETT WINS BY SHORT LEAD

Seven-Foot Pickett, the corporation commissioner, got in by a not very impressive score over Dick Robinson in an election that probably marked the end of Pickett as a major political figure in the state.
