**THE CIVIL WAR IN
NEW MEXICO**

(Continuing an account of the Civil War in New Mexico.)

PART VI

"Nearly three hundred Texans, that a few minutes before had defiantly swung to the breeze, came rolling to the ground; most of the horses turned about with empty saddles to seek refuge. The Texas batteries had splendid gunners; their shots told well, and several times the Val Verde Battery had to make false moves to keep from being silenced.

"Lieut. Mishler had fallen already a victim of the strife, pierced by a grape shot, slapping hands to his pocket in his death agony, and signaling to the gunner that he had the 'spikes' in his possession in case of need; the columns had advanced several times its line under the direction of Col. Roberts; but, in an unguarded moment after Canby took command, by wanting to relieve the thinned out ranks of the reserve around the guns, the Texans charged again and demanded a surrender.

"Never," cried McRae, himself a southern man, from Kentucky, I believe, and fell back a corpse from a ball at powder burning range. The artillery men cut their traces to escape on horseback, and the guns were taken in possession by Sibley's lancers.

"Boys, rally, charge, let us recapture our guns," shouted some cavalry officer, Captain Lord, I think it was, 'charge bayonet, infantry,' re-echoed a foot officer in another quarter, and everybody seemed inclined to turn the fate of the day, with one exception, the advance and old-time commander of the commanding officer bringing orders 'Retreat to the Fort, let every man escape the best he can.'

"About wheeled the advancing columns, hope columns, receiving the charge of their own guns in their back. Most of the Volunteer and Militia men, with colonels and generals 'escaped' toward their homes. Carson's regiment and the regulars formed into platoons after recrossing the river and marched in good order back to Ft. Craig.

"The casualties were, on the federal side: Captain McRae, killed, and Capt. Stone and Wingate severely wounded (both of them died from the wounds). Lieut. Mishler and Bacon killed, and among the ranks, as buried on the 22nd day of February, 1862, were 63 killed and 243 wounded, and Lieut. Russell and some ten or twelve men of the 10th Infantry and Volunteers, taken prisoners.

"Of course few expected to keep peaceful possession of the garrison for many hours, but the Texans having suffered more severely, did not want to take advantage of the position, and rather sent Colonel Steele, as bearer of a flag of truce to the fort to ask for medicinal aid, which was promptly furnished.

"From the long pile dug as graves by the confederates, in the vicinity of the battlefield and near Stopleton's ranch, they must have lost nearly a whole fourth of their 4,500 men in that day's engagement.

"Fever and other sickness thinned out their ranks more than casualties from their wounds there after; for their hospitals at Socorro and Albuquerque were literally filled with sick and dying from the effects of the change of climate.

"Canby allowed the Texans to advance, undisturbed, up the country, relying on the few regulars and the newly arrived Pike's Peak Volunteers to check them near Ft. Union. Of course, the commissary in Fort Craig could send signs of depletion; no trains could reach there with the enemy between it and the supply post, at Union, and the troops were forced to live on reduced rations.

Cook peppers in boiling salted water 8 minutes. Drain. Melt butter. Add celery and onion and cook 5 minutes. Combine celery mixture, shrimp, crumbs, evaporated milk, egg, salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce; mix

4 large baking potatoes
1 cup cooked dried shrimp

Bake in moderate oven (350°) 20 minutes, or until thoroughly heated.
