retirement age, One solution, as the drawings and "before" photograph show, is to remodel the house into a modern, two-family home to provide retirement in-The house in the photograph was a neighborhood eyescre, but was structurally sturdy. The drawing and floor plan show what was done to turn it into a house that would be a credit to any community.

The first step was to apply a new roof of asphalt shingles.
