INSIDE THE CAPITAL

SANTA FE, June 29—The business year has closed at the statehouse but it will be some weeks before the public knows who won the great debate on whether the state bank account was in the red or the black June 30.

Chances are strong that the governor's side will prevail and the bank account is solvent.

A windfall of \$600,000 from the construction of the Trans-western pipeline across the state that was not foreseen when early estimates were made.

And, No. 2, a sly reduction in bureau of revenue spending which the administration denied last winter but which was carried through with a saving of perhaps \$500,000.

The administration was apparently reluctant to admit the cut-back because it might appear that the governor and his people were heeding the warnings of the Legislative Finance Committee staff which said that the state was heading toward a deficit.

The finance committee statements had been branded by the governor as political, intended to embarrass his administration. (Continued on Page 5)

### THE CIVIL WAR IN NEW MEXICO

#### PART IX

"The 16th of April, 1862, commenced dawn beautifully upon the belligerents at Peralta. At the first break of day, General Canby ordered the federal battery to open fire upon the town; but he surely was mistaken if he had thought the retreating Texans wouldn't respond.

"Hardly had the first 24-pound shell burst over a group of the enemy when there appeared the white smoke from the muzzle of the confederate six-pound field pieces; perhaps the very ones captured at Val Verde, and soon the course of the solid shot could be traced coming down upon Canby's men.

"The first ball fell short, bounced over the troops and buried itself in the loose ground of the mesa close to the rear; the second shot was better. After making the circle high every one in the federal camp could hear the crash it caused among a pair of wheel mules in the battery, tearing away the whole face of the saddle mule and knocking the wheels on the head just under and behind the ear.

"Both animals came to the ground, perhaps not even knowing what struck them. As the train with ammunition, provisions, etc., was only a few paces off, the general ordered it further to rear, as also the cavalry and infantry to 'deploy' towards the main road from Albuquerque to Peralta.

"A train was seen coming just at that time down the road. The scouts ordered it in a minute to reconnoitre and sent back word that it contained the household goods and private property of Judge Baird of Albuquerque, or rather of Baird's Ranch near that town.

"As it was known that he not only was in sympathy with the enemy, but also in the act of joining his fortunes with that of the now 'Lost Cause,' of course orders were given to confiscate the train and capture everybody in it.

"Justice to the deceased compels us to interline here a paragraph, why Judge Baird had decided to abandon New Mexico. It is a historic fact that soon after the war with Mexico, Texas claimed New Mexico as part and parcel of the Lone Star State as soon it was known that the Territory was to be annexed to the United States.

"The Texas government nominated the deceased as judge of the district court of New Mexico and he came here to carry out instructions. The federal government, at about the same time, had sent out the late Judge Houghton to mete out justice as judge on the part of the United States.

"Of course Baird and Houghton could not agree as to who should rule supreme, and the matter in dispute had to be turned over to the United States government for decision.

"It decided that New Mexico was not a part of Texas, therefore upheld Judge Houghton in his position and Judge Baird upon being notified to that effect, and liking the new home, settled down near Albuquerque and commenced the practice of his profession in the courts of the Territory.

"Few of the lawyers in New Mexico, and we had then veterans like Ashurst, Benedict, Wheaton, Clever, and Jones—could expound the law in civil cases, or keep a native jury spell-bound and then gain them over to his side, in their own language, in criminal cases, like the China Texans—the curly-headed Texan—as the Mexicans called him.

"Soon after establishing himself in this Territory he went back to his home to get married, bringing his bride with him to share his

"He was a doting husband and kind father, when at home, on his ranch, where he spent his time if not otherwise occupied by his practice, tilling the soil and soon gained the reputation of having the model farm of New Mexico. Himself and family of southern birth of course he offered his fortune and services to the confederate cause.

"The ambulance containing himself and family escaped unhurt, but his chattels fell into the hands of his enemies. Before returning to the narrative of the doings of Canby, your readers will excuse me for occupying their attention a little longer about Judge Baird.

"Arriving safely in Texas, he offered his services to the South and served till the end of the Late War as Colonel in the Texas troops.

"After the surrender of Lee, he came to Colorado and adopted Golden as his family residence, although he himself resided most of the time at Trinidad, Colo., where he established his law office, and from where he attended also court in the first judicial district of New Mexico.

"On his return home from one of his trips to Cimarron, he suddenly took sick and died, during the summer of 1872, lamented and mourned by all who ever knew or came in contact with him."

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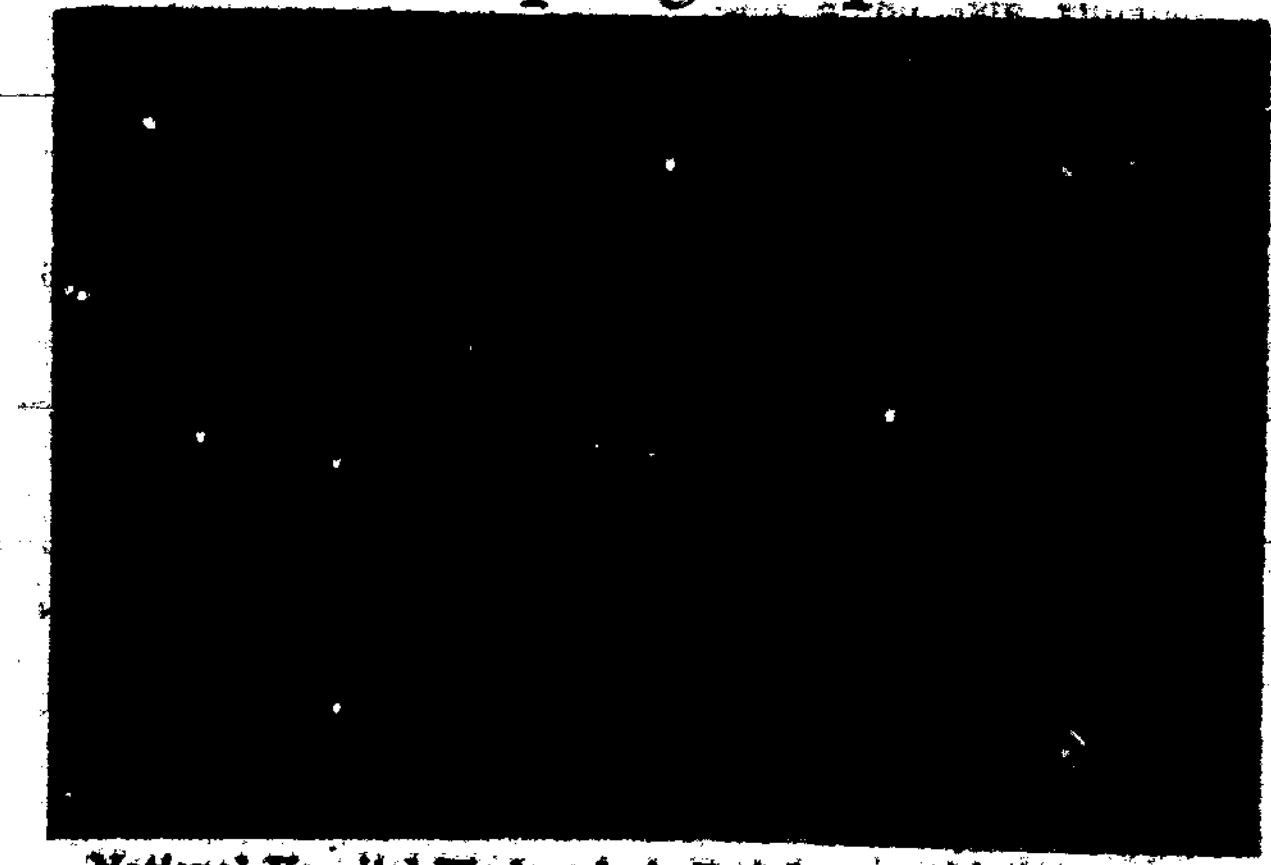

### Step Right Up



National Hospital Week, celebrated this month, focuses attention on the year-round work of the community hospital. It also points up the fact that, according to the American Hospital Association, the average stay has been cut from 12.5 days in 1939 to about nine days now.

Improved medical techniques, better diagnosis, and new drugs help get patients home in record time. Better skill, physicians can often treat people at home before the disease makes too much headway, saving millions of dollars in hospital bills every year.

Medicines more precious are the thousands of lives saved each year by doctors using drugs—particularly antibiotics—that were not available at any price 20 years ago.

And yet, the fact is, there is a program. Physicians are feeling better satisfaction into even more potent weapons against disease. Thus, penicillin has been modified so it can be given with greater effect by mouth. "Marsipin" in many cases now replaces the need for penicillin injections.

Another "break" came when a new antibiotic called "streptomycin" was developed against the different kind of bacteria, in a laboratory modification of the medium-range antibiotic, chain-strep. Studies have shown it helps control the "respiratory" steps—cough, sputum, chest pain—necessary to pneumonia.

Penicillin may seem to be available in tablet form—of children will no longer have to line up and roll up their sleeves to get their pills.

In a matter of years, some authorities believe there will be more patients undergoing home treatment for chronic diseases and perhaps some patients in hospital, once some studies will be largely completed. Meanwhile, the community hospital continues to provide high-quality, year-round care for those who need it.

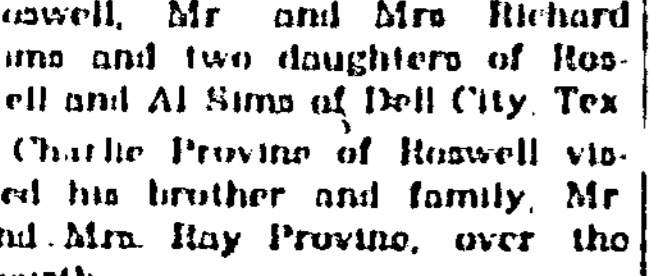

## New book is "Trail Guide to Upper Pecos"

Socorro—"Trail Guide to the Upper Pecos"—a guide for persons who like to venture on high mountain trails in one of the most beautiful recreational and wilderness regions in the Southwest—has been published by the State Bureau of Mines and Mineral Resources, Division of the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology.

The 84-page, well-illustrated guidebook is the sixth in a series called "Scenic Trips to the Geologic Past, published by the Bureau of Mines since 1955. The books are designed to interpret the geology of the state in an educational, interesting and non-technical manner.

The guidebook describes 12 suggested trips in the upper Pecos region of the southern Sangre de Cristo Mountains. The region is known for its game, trout streams, pine and aspen forests, alpine flowers and towering 13,000-ft. peaks. The Pecos River heads in an area near where southwestern Mora, northwestern Santa Fe and northeastern Santa Fe counties join.

The trips include a ride from Pecos to Cowles via Highway 63 along the Pecos Valley, Cowles to Beatty's Cabin via the Hamilton Mesa Trail, Cowles to Beatty's Cabin via the Round Mountain Trail, Cowles to Pecos Baldy Lake and South Truchas Peak.

Also Beatty's Cabin to Truchas Lakes and South Truchas Peak, Cowles to Mora Flats and the trail to Roeloda, Cowles to Lower Mora Canyon and the Valle Medio, mouth of Willow Creek to East (Elk Mountain) Divide via Mica Mine Road; Holy Ghost Canyon to Spirit Lake, West (Santa Fe) Divide and Lake Peak, Cowles to Lake Katherine and Santa Fe Baldy, and Cowles to Caves on Cave Creek and Horzothel Meadows.

The home owner saved money by using walls of windows. He followed an architect's axiom that large groups of windows cost less to build than wall areas with many small window openings.

Lawn Seed, Fertilizer Now Come in Strips

A little sharpener kept handy will speed and ease the job of installing bands and blankets of mineral wool insulation. Cutting mineral wool insulation will fill any hole quickly, since mineral wool is made of rock or sint-hard mineral heated to liquid form and transformed into millions of fibers.

A new way to seed lawns is with a 24-inch-wide strip of fabric that has grass seed, lime, and fertilizer built in.

Ideal for slopes and narrow areas, the strip is simply laid atop soil. Heavy rains can't wash the seed or fertilizer away, and the fabric backing disintegrates after the seed sprouts.

One of the best investments a home owner can make today is in remodeling and home improvement, according to most economists.

The principal reason for this is that recently planned remodeling and home-improvement activities add cash value to the home—frequently more value dollar for dollar than the total cost of the improvements.

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INSIDE THE CAPITAL

For the past seven or eight years the state has had surplus money of several million at the end of each fiscal period. In 1959 there were prospects of a \$7 million surplus until the legislature went to work on the dough and the bureau of revenue spending was arbitrarily hopped half a million for the first half of 1959. The result was that it was all gone at the middle of this year and the administration is claiming a victory for not going in the red.

COLLEGES LOSE \$38 MILLION. The legislature attempted to give the colleges \$6 million of the saved up money to be used for construction, the customary use for surplus money. They got \$2.2 million but the remaining \$3.8 million didn't come through because it had been used for current operational purposes.

POLITICAL HARBORS EXEMPT FROM CUT. Most all the Institutions have money enough to ride out the reduction but it is going to leave them without mighty short balances. Not affected by the cut are the state's biggest harbors for politicians, the bureau of revenue, ports of entry, state land office.

SPEND THE DOUGH OR HOARD IT? There is a broad difference of feeling about surplus money between the current Democratic administration of Gov. John Burroughs and that of the preceding Republican, Gov. Ed Mechem - opponents this year for the governor's office.

BUROUGHS HOLDS THAT THE STATE IS NOT IN THE MONEY HOARDING BUSINESS and that tax money should be applied to public service. Mechem held that only part of tax money necessary for public service should be used and all possible accumulated for construction and other capital improvement which would otherwise require borrowing.

FAVORED BY SOME. There is merit in both ideas. Mechem may have neglected current services in accumulating a surplus of \$7 million. Burroughs may have gotten the state in trouble by using surplus money for current operations.

COULD CUT TAXES WHEN SURPLUS GROWS. Another approach is obvious. That is in reducing taxes when money accumulates beyond the state debt. Mechem did this in 1956, cutting the state's share of property taxes by 20%.

# Old 'Eyesore' Remodeled Into Two-Family Beauty



A big old house can be a problem when its owners reach retirement age. One solution, as the drawings and "before" photograph show, is to remodel the house into a modern, two-family home to provide retirement income.

The house in the photograph was a neighborhood eyesore, but was structurally sturdy. The drawing and floor plan show what was done to turn it into a house that would be a credit to any community.

The first step was to apply a new coat of asphalt shingles. These were chosen because they are long-lasting, fire-resistant, and could be applied directly over the old roofing, saving the time, expense, and mess of tearing off the old material. A deep shade of green was chosen for the roof to make the tall house appear lower.

New siding in a soft gray was chosen to harmonize with the roof, and the old front porch was removed to make room for a small, concrete stoop and attractive foundation planting.

In keeping with the Colonial motif preferred by the owners, all windows were replaced with new stock double-hung units of ponderosa pine in an early American style. Windows at the front were finished with stock lower shutters of wood, and a complete new front entrance was built around a Colonial-style door of ponderosa pine.

The floor plans show how rooms were rearranged to provide two complete new apartments. Careful planning resulted in the need for a minimum of structural changes.

One important addition which required no structural changes was complete insulation to make the big old house cooler and more economical to heat. Thick mineral wool was blown into walls and the upstairs ceiling under six inches from outside the house. This was done by drilling small holes in the old siding to get the mineral wool into the walls and ceiling in a complete, sweat-saving blanket. The holes were repaired and covered by the new siding.
