

School term starts Monday, Aug. 22

J. T. Clegg, superintendent of schools, informed the News this week that the roster of teachers for the Carrizozo public schools is complete for the coming year.

"Our faculty has definitely been strengthened this year and the program which was begun last year will be considerably furthered," he said.

"At the same time, Supt. Clegg announced the opening schedule for this fall. On Monday, Aug. 22, a general faculty meeting will be held in the high school library, beginning at 9 a.m.

On Tuesday, the 23rd, at 8:30 a.m., the school will be opened to the pupils for registration and full day of regular classes will follow. The school day will start at 8:40 and end at 3:35, with a noon period for high school between 12:04 and 12:40.

In accordance with state law, there will be 180 days of classroom teaching.

School will not be in session on Labor Day, September 5. This fall, students having written permission from parents, will be allowed one excused day for attendance at the State Fair, and one excused day for the fair in Roswell, with the provision that classwork must satisfactorily be made up.

School will close one day for hunting when the season opens.

October 27 and 28 are convention days for the New Mexico Education Association. No classes will be held at that time. School will dismiss November 23 for Thanksgiving and will reopen Monday, the 23rd. Christmas holidays will begin at the end of school December 21 and classes will reconvene January 2, 1961.

"In addition to the promotion of international understanding," Elovall said, "special emphasis is being placed by Rotary clubs in this district, which includes 43 Rotary clubs in New Mexico and the Big Bend area of Texas, 'service to this community through club service, vocational service, community service and international service. Rotary circles the globe and each club helps to weld together the spokes of all nations for a bond of understanding and cooperation."

Form District Youth committees for Lincoln County

The Hon. W. T. Scoggins, judge of the Third Judicial District of New Mexico, presided over a meeting of a group of citizens interested in the youth of Lincoln, on Thursday, July 14.

Superintendent of Schools J. T. Clegg, Frank Wagner, Fred Miller and Mrs. J. P. Turner, representing the Carrizozo School District, attended the session held in the County Courthouse.

Principal aim of the meeting was the formation of a District Youth Committee which would organize local committees to serve each of the communities of the county.

The general objectives of the district committee are to promote the general welfare of juveniles in the county; to serve in a consultative capacity to the juvenile court and to plan various programs in the county.

An important purpose of the committee is to appoint a community committee in each school district of the county. As far as possible, this local group will consist of an outstanding mother, an outstanding father, a prominent and active businessman or woman.

Three other members will be a clergyman, a member of the police department and a member to be selected by the parents of the juvenile who is in trouble.

It will be the duty of the local committee to study any juvenile case brought before the juvenile court for action; to sit down and discuss the background, history and facts of the case with the probation officer and then to make recommendations to the court.

Such a group serves a high purpose in the community, serving as it does the interests of juveniles who find themselves in legal difficulties.

Attending the organizational meeting, in addition to those from Carrizozo were Tranquilino Silva of Capitan; Miss Kathleen Massey, Mrs. Bram Vanderstok, R. H. Hedgecock and Dwight Watkins of Lordsburg; Mrs. Louise Babers of San Patricio and Mrs. Albert Kimbrell from the Honda area.

K. B. Barnhill of Las Cruces accompanied Judge Scoggins; Earl Scroggins represented the Alamogordo Probation Office and Miss Eugenia Ortiz and Mariel Chavez represented the Lincoln County Probation Office.

Superintendent Clegg was chosen chairman of the District Committee.

Wanted: Top guns; tall in the saddle

Young men not afraid of danger or rough horses. Must be tall in the saddle and supply own guns and horses. Ammunition free. Three day assignment calls for rearing law and order between rival factions in range war and bringing peace to Lincoln County. No pay, but plenty of glory.—Apply Johnny "Trigger" Meigs, Olympic 3-4341, or write: Billy The Kid, Box 98, Lincoln, New Mexico.

The foregoing call for help comes from officials charged with staging the annual pageant "The Last Escape of Billy The Kid."

Co-sponsors of the pageant, the Lincoln County Historical Society and the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, find that, with a good audience virtually assured, they are in dire need for supporting actors to re-enact the events in the tumultuous Lincoln County Range War of 1878, which led up to the last escape of the outlaw, Billy the Kid.

Seems that some of the Regulars who appear year after year, are getting along and find such goings on a bit too strenuous.

"The Last Escape of Billy The Kid" is perhaps one of the few remaining examples of genuine folk-drama in the country. It is a product of the people, staged and acted by residents of Lincoln County, many of whom, like Wilbur Coe, are descendants of actual participants in the war.

Coe is the son of Frank Coe, who was on the side of Tunstall-McSweeney group, as was Billy the Kid. For many years Wilbur Coe has contributed time and effort to the pageant, but now finds himself unable to participate to the extent he would like.

And so it goes. The pageant is a labor of love. The Lincoln County citizens who take part in it often truck in horses from over 50 miles away, and are absent from their chores for several days. But, somehow, the necessary help is always recruited. Whether it is the thought of carrying on the traditional celebration, or just the fun involved, and the chance of seeing old friends again, or both, that bring them back each year, is hard to say.

This year the pageant takes place each evening of August 5, 6 and 7, there is an amphitheater next to the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, complete with sets, lights and so forth.

During the days, food will be available and, if this year follows the pattern laid down in previous years, there will be an old-time fashion show, cowboy music, fiddlers and perhaps an antique automobile show.

For the first time accommodations and food are available at the Worley Hotel, which has been restored by the State. Accommodations are also available in nearby Canyon, Hondo, Riverside and other communities.

"The flavor of the Old West comes alive each year in Lincoln, but the ammunition is blank and the desperadoes are only pretending. Everyone has a good time, even the badmen. So, if you have gun and will travel, you're a wanted man in Lincoln.

"Particularly needed," says artist-director John Meigs, "are three horses that can pull buggies. We have the buggies, but lack the horse power to move them. Agility of movement is not necessary for these harness-pulled."

The first pageant rehearsal is scheduled for Friday, July 22, 6:30 p.m., at the Old Courthouse.

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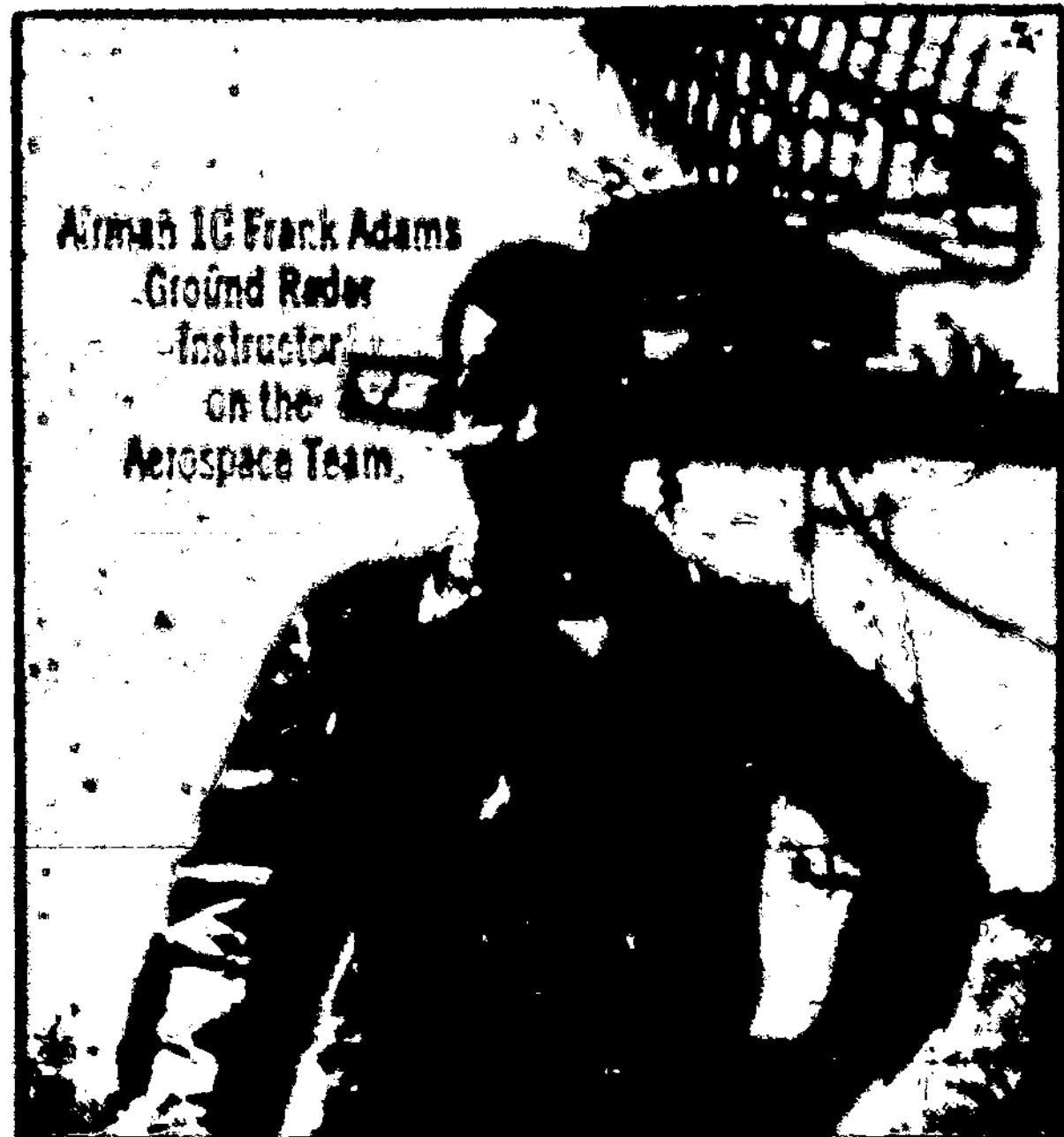

Hurley, N. M. — "Time — What's that? I have plenty of it. In fact, I'm just like the Arkansas Razor-back hog — tomorrow or the next day mean nothing to me."

The above is the statement of Marvin C. King of the Arenas Valley near Silver City — but don't you believe a word of it.

King is as busy now as he was a year ago before retiring from Kennecott Copper Corporation's Chino Mines Division. Today his time is occupied with his hobbies, and they have turned into full-time occupations. King's hobbies are lapidary, rock-hounding, and collecting historical material about the Southwest.

Always interested in history since his youth in southern Alabama, King moved to New Mexico in December 1918 to seek a cure for tuberculosis contracted during World War I.

With time on his hands during the long recuperation, he started reading historical books of the Southwest. Within a year the New Mexico cunahing cured the tuberculosis, so he decided to remain and investigate first-hand the interesting history which surrounded him.

University Park. — Now is the time for farmers and ranchers to apply for federal tax refunds on gasoline, according to W. Y. Fowler, economist with the New Mexico State University Extension Service.

The application for refund will cover all gasoline used for farming purposes during the fiscal year 1959-60.

Claims may be filed anytime between now and October 1, Fowler says.

The refund this year will be computed on the basis of 3 cents per gallon for gasoline purchased between July 1 and October 1, 1959; and 4 cents per gallon on gas purchased between October 1, 1959 and July 1, 1960.

The refund can be claimed on all gasoline used for operating the farm including that used by custom operators and exchange work done on the farm. Refunds cannot be claimed on gasoline used on the highway or for personal or non-business purposes, emphasizes the economist.

Form 2240 will be mailed directly to farmers who filed last year. The completed form should be mailed to the U. S. Director of Internal Revenue at Albuquerque.

## immunizations of school children should be checked

Summer vacation from school has reached the half-way point, bringing a reminder from Dr. R.G. Wanner, district health officer, that parents should check the immunization status of their children without delay.

State law requires parents to have their children immunized against polio, smallpox, diphtheria and tetanus (lockjaw) for school attendance. Dr. Wanner urged parents to take their children to the family physician for the necessary vaccinations now, before the back-to-school rush begins.

When school reopens in the fall, all pupils in public, private and parochial elementary, junior high and high schools who have not yet completed all of their immunization requirements will be required to produce evidence to their school within the first month of school attendance that they have completed or are receiving their series of immunizations. Children who are already known by their school to have completed all immunization requirements will not need to present further evidence to the school.

Current regulations require for school attendance the following immunizations, which may be given by any licensed physician or nurse under his direction: a minimum of three polio injections; at least one initial smallpox vaccination, plus one revaccination within the last five years; and a minimum of four diphtheria-tetanus injections, the last injection having been received with the last five years.

A record of five combined diphtheria-tetanus-tetanus (DPT) injections is acceptable instead of the four diphtheria-tetanus (DT) injections, at the discretion of the attending physician.

Not required for attendance, but recommended during school years, are a fourth polio injection, additional smallpox revaccinations at five-year intervals, and additional diphtheria-tetanus booster injections at three to four year intervals, all at the discretion of the attending physician.

New Mexico's school immunization regulations are based on the latest recommendations of national medical and public health authorities who emphasize the importance of beginning the child's immunization in infancy.

Pre-school children who have followed and completed the recommended immunization schedules, starting from the first year of life, will have met all requirements for school attendance by the time they are ready to start first grade. The family physician will have kept the records and will provide the necessary evidence required for school attendance.

"Call or see your family doctor now, to be sure your child will be ready to enter school," said Dr. Wanner. "If further information is desired, contact your physician or local health department."
