


Residents join in building small park


Highway crew works on Carrizozo streets

Alton M. Lenard interred at Angus

Services were held shortly after noon Monday, August 22, at the First Baptist Church in Portales for Alton M. Lenard, 23, who lost his life August 18 in a tragic accident in that city. Rev. Herbert Bergstrom officiated at the Portales service and interment was in the Angus cemetery, Lincoln county. The accident in which the young married man and father of three children lost his life occurred when he was installing a motor on a Portales city water well. He was holding a winch cable as a truck backed up. The winch came in contact with a high tension line. Alton was taken to the Roosevelt County Hospital where he died about two hours later. He had been in the employ of the Davis Pump Company. Mr. and Mrs. Lenard and their three children had made their home in Portales for the past two years. He had been attending Eastern New Mexico University and for those two years he had been pastor of the Crossroads Baptist Church, at Crossroads, N. M. Alton Morse Lenard was born in Carrizozo on February 11, 1926. He was graduated from Carrizozo High School in 1943 and was married to Miss Edna Elaine Shultz on December 25, 1951. He served with the United States Navy from 1951 until 1955 and was in the Korean conflict. Surviving are his widow, a daughter Deanna Christine, 3; two sons, Preston Leon, 6, and Austin Lee, 18 months; his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Walter L. Lenard of Carrizozo; a brother, Robert Leon of Carrizozo; a sister, Mrs. Mildred Velda Campbell, in Germany. Also by two grandmothers, Mrs. Mattie Littleton of Carrizozo and Mrs. Essie Hill of Cloud; his aunt, Mrs. Dorothy Current and Mrs. Edna Dale of Carrizozo, and Mrs. Leola Vanden of Wichita, Kans. An uncle, Raymond Littleton of Carrizozo survives; also other relatives and many close friends. Aetna palbearers were Jimmie Lloyd Grecham, Keith McCrary, Leon Bruce, Ray Reed, Bob Bell and D. J. Mead. Honorary pallbearers: Johnny Tina, James Littleton, Grady Littleton and Earl Block. Funeral arrangements in Portales were by the Wheeler Mortuary.



WILL HARRISON'S Inside the Capital GOVERNOR PROBES \$16 MILLION BONEY

Santa Fe—Gov. John Burroughs has undertaken an investigation of a boney by the state investment council in which \$16 million of state money was invested in a mortgage on a boat which was not secured according to law. Burroughs said he would undertake the inquiry after Land Commissioner Murray Morgan, member of the investment council, reported to him that there was "something wrong" in the investment office. Morgan said he learned of the \$16 million error in a newspaper (An account of the mistake was carried in this space a week ago.)

LAWYERS QUESTION LEGALITY OF DEAL Assistant Attorney General Boston Witt flew to Washington and New York in an attempt to correct the mistake by shifting the \$16 million mortgage to Treasurer Joe Callaway under terms by which it would presumably be fully guaranteed by the federal government. Some lawyers here question the legality of the corrective measure but do not anticipate any legal challenge which would impede the state money, about 80% of it belonging to the common schools and the balance by other state institutions.

DIRECTOR HESTER ON THE CARPET The object of Land Commissioner Morgan's complaint to Jack Hester, \$15,000 a year director of the investment council. He is a Santa Fe politician appointed by Burroughs last year after the members of the council had chosen former state Treasurer Joe Grant for the position.

FEDERALS COOL CARR PROPOSAL Gen. Pim Carr's announced objective of cutting the mothers of illegitimate children off the state welfare rolls suffered a setback the other day when the federal government turned down such a proposal in Louisiana. The federal pay about two-thirds of the cost of the aid to dependent children conducted by state welfare offices. The U. S. agency has a long record of resisting discrimination against illegitimate children. (Continued on back page)

Carrizozo school enrollment normal

The Carrizozo schools opened the 1950-51 year on Monday, Aug. 22, with faculty meetings and workshops held throughout the day. All teachers were present. Books and over \$4500 worth of mathematics and science equipment were distributed among grades 1 through 12. This places the Carrizozo system among the best equipped small schools in the state. Tuesday morning school doors swung open to pupils at 8:40 and a regular schedule of classes began. Enrolled in the high school were 126 students. The enrollment in the junior high (grades 7 and 8) was 75. Grades 1 through 6 saw 191 pupils beginning the year. Total enrollment remains approximately the same as last year.

FOOTBALL PRACTICE BEGAN LAST WEEK Grizzly football practice started Wednesday of last week, with 43 aspirants turning out under the watchful eyes of coaches Laabs and Bode. The coaches report that due to two factors the squad is not as far advanced as last year's. Some of the boys were working as practice go under way, some were in quarters were limited because they wanted to save the grass on the newly-planted football field. "It may be a few weeks before the team will jell," Coach Laabs told the News this week.

GOP 'Bandwagon' to tour state

A number of Republican state candidates for office were in Lincoln Sunday afternoon to attend a meeting called by the county GOP central committee. They were Merle H. Tucker of Gallup, state campaign manager; Col. Mears of Albuquerque, organizational director; Tom Bolack of Farmington, candidate for lieutenant governor; Wm. F. Colwes of Santa Fe, for U. S. Senate; Howard Wilson of Gallup for land commissioner; Warren Cobean of Roswell for corporation commissioner; Mrs. Sam H. Reed of Las Cruces for board of education. All were introduced and spoke briefly, including Mrs. Linda Lambert of Mosquero, woman's state organizational director. The meeting was called by H. H. Shier, county chairman, to perfect organizational work for the coming election, with emphasis placed on registering voters and getting voters out to the polls. County candidates for office were present and spoke briefly. Abe Sanchez was introduced and announced he was heading a movement which he called "Democrats for Republicans." Sanchez was an unsuccessful candidate in the Democrat primary race for the nomination of sheriff. Tucker said all state candidates would team up in September and October to criss-cross the state in a bus, called the "New Mexico Band Wagon," visiting every community. He said dates for the visit to Lincoln county will be announced two weeks in advance. County candidates will be asked to join the band wagon in each county. Mrs. W. G. Shreengost, county women's chairman, distributed campaign material and displayed a campaign basket which she said would be much in evidence until election time. Every "drop in the bucket" will help with campaign expenses, she said with campaign.

"SNAKE STEAK—300 LBS. OF IT "Think you killed a big rattler? Mrs. D. C. Kelley of Lake Placid sends along this clipping sent to her by her mother who lives in Texas:

"The largest rattlesnake on record has been killed near Roodoso, New Mexico. The snake weighed 300 pounds and measured 16 feet and seven inches long. Its head was as big as a steering wheel and its tongue was a yard long.

"The snake was killed by Juan Baca, a ranch hand, and Mike Gonzales, in the lava beds northwest of Carrizozo, N. M. They have been offered \$500 for the head of the snake and \$750 for the skin.—Tomball Tribune.

Prepare now for fair exhibits

"Whether you plan to enter a fat lamb or a rose," he said, "a dress or a jar of jelly—they will all need to be prepared for exhibit. The fat lamb needs bleaching and trimming. The rose needs fertilizer and water. The dress needs to be carefully made so that its construction will have no flaws. "The 4-H girls' exhibits require a complete exhibit before they are eligible for prize money. An example: The Home Living I projects exhibit, to be complete, needs to have a dust mitt, hand towel, apron and three drop cookies." It was announced that within a few days, Ziegler Bros., the oldest dry goods firm in Carrizozo, would shortly close out its stock and discontinue business. The firm was organized in White Oaks in 1888 as Goldman, Ziegler & Co. When the new railroad was routed through Carrizozo, Ziegler Bros., Paden's Drug Store, the Exchange Bank and several other firms moved to Carrizozo.

### STATE ASSISTING 7,000 SUCH TOTS

New Mexico is helping some 7,000 illegitimate children and their mothers, a number that constitutes about a third of the people in the state's aid to dependent children program.

It is bigger than the old age assistance program and costs about \$900,000 a month, with the figure rising about \$20,000 a month. The families receive an average of \$115 a month.

The state is also assisting "a number" of aliens in its several welfare programs under encouragement from the federal government.

Texas has excluded aliens from its welfare program.

New Mexico Welfare Director Murray Hints recalled that in 1955 legislators from Dona Ana county, on the Mexican border, complained that the state was supporting alien subjects in that county.

Hints said that an investigation revealed that some of the old and best known families in Dona Ana were aliens who had never bothered to go through the formality of securing citizenship.

The legislators dropped the complaint after seeing the report. Hints said that the department makes no distinction concerning aliens and has no count of the number on the rolls.






