

Lincoln County Fair opens Friday in Capitan for an eventful two days

Fair time is here!

The Lincoln County Fair will start Friday and continue through Saturday. The Junior exhibitors will have their livestock judged on Friday, along with the Home Economics and Flower Show classes. The first place and champions for each of the classes will be the much-awaited event for the judging that day.

Saturday will mark the Open Class Livestock Show. Range beef cattle, range sheep and the registered Quarter Horse Show will climax the morning activities.

Other events for the day are the Apple Pie Baking contest at 9:30, parade at 1:00, and awarding of prizes for Showmanship, and other events.

FARM BUREAU TO FURNISH PRIZES FOR FAIR BINGO

County Farm & Livestock Bureau members are asked to bring homemade cakes, cookies, candy or apples for the Farm Bureau bingo game prizes at the county fair in Capitan.

The money from the games goes to the Farm Bureau scholarship fund.

Riding and roping events will be held each afternoon, with the Junior events for Lincoln County boys and girls.

The registered Quarter Horse Show will highlight the fair on Saturday morning. The beef cattle and range sheep show will round out the morning events.

At 1 in the afternoon the parade will be held, followed by the rodeo events. Trophies and Showmanship awards will be given out at 3 p.m. during the rodeo events. For the benefit of everyone at the fair, a new loudspeaker system has been installed.

BULL RIDING TO BE ADDED ATTRACTION

Bull riding will be an added attraction at the Fair Rodeo. The event is planned for the senior boys and should provide entertainment for all.

The Angus bulls, furnished by local ranchers, will make their one and only rodeo appearance at our county fair. Just fresh off the tall grass, it is expected these bulls will make an excellent showing.

See your all-over neighbor at the fair. You can visit as you watch the judging of the various classes, or play bingo. There is just one admission price and it entitles you to see all of the events of the day.

On Friday the Livestock and Home Economics judging start at 10 in the morning and the rodeo events start at 2 p.m. The County Fair Queen contest will be held that afternoon at the Rodeo grounds.

The State Highway Department has called for bids on Federal Aid Project No. G-1278(1), the Corona-Loa Highway 42 in Lincoln County. The approximate length is 6.318 miles.

Sealed proposals will be received until 10 a.m., September 16, 1960, at the office of the chief highway engineer, Santa Fe.

The proposed construction consists of two-lane, grade, drain, one course surface treatment, one 3-span precast concrete bridge or one 3-span pretensioned concrete box girder bridge, and miscellaneous construction.

New pastor for Trinity Methodist

Thomas A. Banks arrived in Carriazo last Sunday to assume the pastorate of Trinity Methodist Church. The appointment of the new pastor was announced by Rev. Earl M. Nowlin, superintendent of the Albuquerque district.

Mr. Banks, who retires from the Army this month after more than 20 years of service, is here on leave from Fort Lewis, Wash. He will return to his station later this month to make his retirement official and will return to his church early in October.

A native of Oklahoma, Mr. Banks is no stranger to New Mexico. He lived in Fortale and Fort Sumner prior to entering the Army in 1937. Later in his Army career he served a period of four years in Albuquerque with the New Mexico Military District and later at Sandia Base.

A veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict, he distinguished himself as a combat soldier. In all he has served in 12 major campaigns. During World War II he earned the Bronze Star medal for heroism and the Silver Star for gallantry in action. In both cases he was serving as a tank commander in Europe.

During the Korean conflict he was awarded the Army Commendation medal for outstanding service as a combat correspondent with the Army's public information branch. Recently he was awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster (second award) to the same decoration for distinguished service while serving with the Army Civil Affairs office, Munich, Germany.

Rev. Banks has been preaching as a layman for the past ten years and has served numerous parishes both in the United States and in Europe as a youth leader and as a part-time pastor. He has just concluded a pastorate at the Turnwater (Washington) Methodist Church, which he left to assume his Carriazo pastorate.

His wife, Dorothy, and their children, Sarron, 15, Thomas Jr., 12 and John 11, reside with him at the Methodist parsonage.

Raymond S. Proudfoot, district superintendent of the Tacoma, Wash., district, in a letter to District Superintendent, said, "I want to congratulate you on having such a fine man with splendid character and deep conviction to work under your leadership this past year."

The Carriazo Town Board of Trustees at their meeting Tuesday night, voted an increase in the garbage collection pickup rates.

After a discussion on the amount of money the town is taxing on its present rate and comparing it with rates charged in several neighboring towns, the board members voted to increase the rates to:

Householders' pickup, one each week to 75 cents a month. Business houses an extra 50 cents a month for daily pickup.

An additional charge of \$2.50 for business houses requiring two pickups daily.

The board also voted to raise the salaries of the town's two lowest-paid employees, from \$1.10 an hour to \$1.25 an hour.

An occupational license was approved for Gordon Campbell, d.b.a. Zoo-ran Water Softener Co.

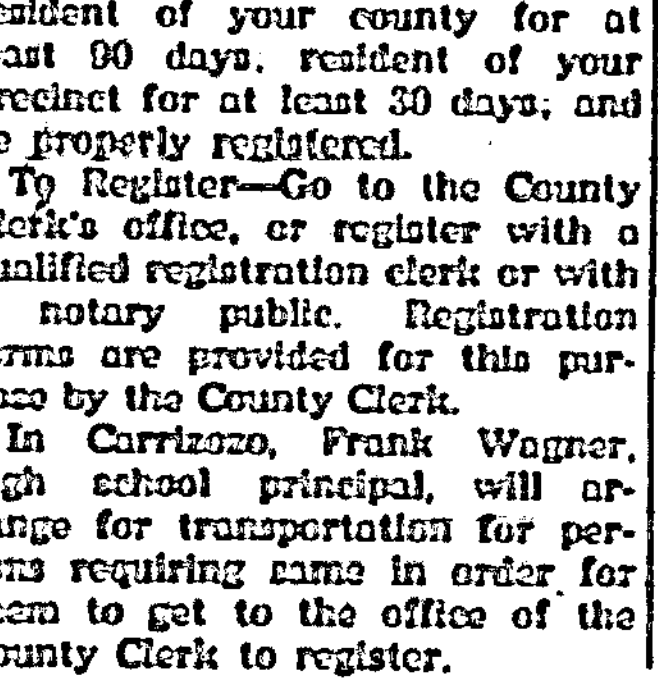

STATE MUST WAIT FOR LOAN SURETY

Santa Fe, Sept. 7.—An appeal by the state investment council to Gov. Clinton for an act of Congress to secure a \$16 million loan on a steamship plying Atlantic waters was made too late and the state's millions are in jeopardy until the Congress can act next year.

Congress adjourned shortly after the appeal was made and Clinton had no time for the bill.

The state investment council bought a \$16 million mortgage on the S. S. Defender and after the money was gone learned that the state was not eligible for U. S. guarantee of the loan. Then the loan was shifted to New Mexico Treasurer Joe Callaway, and questions arose about whether that was legal.

The final act came in an appeal for an act of Congress making the state subject to the federal guarantee of the loan, and it did not come through.

SOME GOOD JOBS ON THE DEFENDER

Meanwhile politicians of these parts have been agitating to bring the tanker, Defender, back to New Mexico for service in the Rio Grande.

LOAN ANOTHER \$4 MILLION ON NORTH DAKOTA HOUSING

The New Mexico loan of \$16 million on the boat was a whopping "that attracted attention" all over the country and now we have another that is buzzing.

The public employees retirement board has loaned \$6 million to a couple of California contractors for a "Capitan" housing project at North Forks, N. D., where a couple of contractors have already gone broke and are being rescued by their bonding companies.

The PERA loan was negotiated by Fred Standley, lawyer for the state highway department and former attorney general (1957-59) for an undischarged fee paid by the contractors getting the money.

BURMA SQUAWKING HE DIDN'T MEAN IT

Dr. John H. Burma of Grinnell College, Iowa, who uttered a devastating indictment of the schools, welfare practices, politics and social customs of Taos and Rio Arriba counties for a \$2,000 fee to a crying foul because of publication of his report in this space and elsewhere.

The survey was conducted by the board of Northern New Mexico College at El Rito which kicked in \$1,000 and the Ford Foundation put up an equal amount.

Burma told a board member the other day that his report was a crude draft requiring refinement and editing before release to the public.

The report found Taos and Rio Arriba a sub-normal area and recommended El Rito school as an institution for past high school training to overcome some of the deficiencies

Savings Bonds sales showed July drop

Residents of Lincoln County invested \$1,966.84 in U. S. Savings Bonds during July, according to a report from the Treasury Department by Tom Hood, County Savings Bonds chairman. This total is smaller than the \$3,001.69 total of July, 1959.

During the first seven months, Lincoln county has been credited with \$26,222.29 in purchases of these bonds, achieving 29.13% of its annual \$90,000 goal. For the same period of 1959, the total was \$40,530.49, the chairman recalled.

The U. S. Savings Bonds program has been the pattern for savings bond and stamp projects operated by the governments of half a dozen other nations, which have sent officials to Washington to study and observe our methods.

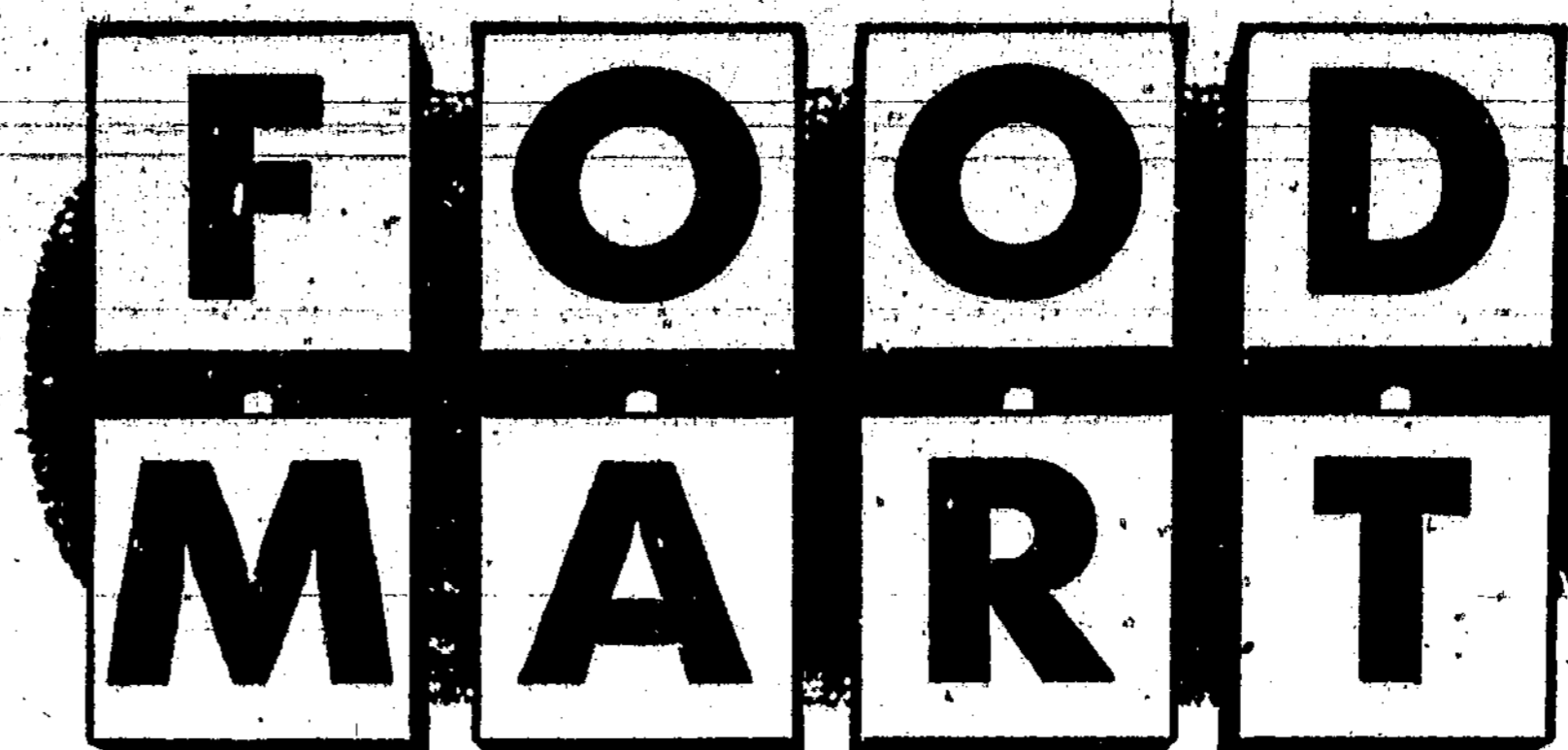

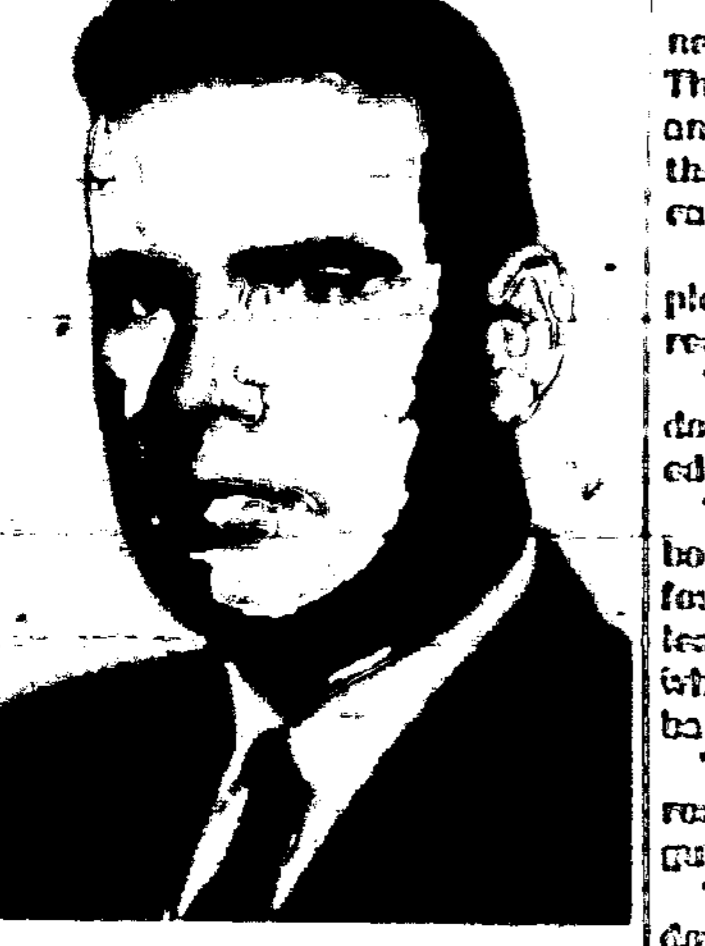

Prospectus of the Carrizozo municipal school system

(This prospectus was prepared by the Carrizozo Public Schools and sent to White Sands Missile Range in answer to questions regarding Carrizozo's school facilities.—Ed.)

The city school system of Carrizozo, New Mexico, with an enrollment in grades 1 through 8 of 271 pupils and 142 in the high school, proudly boasts of several outstanding qualities for a system of its size.

Carrizozo is one of the leading small schools in the state in its mathematics and science departments. Taking advantage of Federal aid under Title III, school authorities obtained the newest equipment available in a mathematics laboratory at a cost of \$1575. To match the equipment, teachers with the highest qualifications have been employed.

New science equipment also has been installed this year, giving the high school a lead in Lincoln County. This is a step in a program of broadening the whole secondary level science program.

The language department in the high school has been refurbished with the newest equipment and materials. Over \$3000 has been spent this year in strengthening these latter two sections of the school.

Machinery has been added to increase the teaching efficiency of the shop and industrial arts, which is directed by an instructor who lacks but one summer's work to acquire a master's degree in industrial arts.

School officials recognize that teachers and equipment need to be supplemented by a good testing and guidance program. Last spring, and to continue this school year, the entire Carrizozo system, conducted one of the best testing programs of any school of its size in this area. Authorities took advantage of aid under Title V of the Federal testing and counseling program. Science-Research-Associated and the Iowa tests were extensively used and evaluations were made by the SRA people and the testing department of Oklahoma University.

The physical needs of the students have not been neglected. A new, well equipped playground area, well completed at a cost of \$10,000, this is available to every grade in the entire system. Along with this, a carefully planned physical education program is in use in each grade. Each pupil in the system is afforded the opportunity to develop his body coordination. Athletics are conducted separately under excellent coaches who believe in building good sportsmanship as well as good teams.

The elementary and junior high divisions have not been neglected in the building of a new school designed to meet today's challenges.

A complete reading program was placed in grades 1 through 8 last year so successful in it and so enthusiastic are the teachers and pupils alike, that teachers in other schools are inquiring into it.

Again, school authorities were willing to meet the reading problem and spent nearly \$2000 to install the program. Results were almost immediate.

Accompanying the science building of the central school, the elementary and junior high have been more than adequately equipped. Science, as science to now taught and demonstrated in everyone of these grades.

The mathematics program is now undergoing revision and strengthening in all grades. The junior high has already taken long steps toward advancing mathematical levels. Next year it is planned to teach Algebra I and General Science in the eighth grade. At present a pilot class in these classes is being conducted.
