Know Your Schools

(The second of a series of articles to give all a better understanding of the problems confronting the teachers and administrators of our public schools.)

Parents and educators have not always seen eye to eye in the matter of interscholastic athletics in the junior high and elementary schools. For that matter, teachers do not agree among themselves on this point.

Now comes an enlightening statement from the Committee on School Health of the American Academy of Pediatrics. For children aged 12 and younger, athletics become highly competitive and undesirable when the main emphasis is placed on winning.

"Developmental needs of elementary school children are best met if physical activities are informal and not highly competitive," the committee said.

"Athletic competition should be gradually introduced with simple games involving few participants; five small groups are better than one large one."

The administration of the Carrizozo Junior High and elementary school have recognized the limitations involved in athletics for youngsters through age 12, and have seen the dangers of exceeding the bounds of good practice.

Interscholastic competition for junior high members has been confined to the basketball court, and conducted under a very relaxed scheduling of games. Last year the school withdrew from an athletic association set up for this age level. Its decision is supported by the pediatricians who stated that it is vital to remember that boys and girls are children and not "little men" and "little women."

The Carrizozo school authorities equally recognize the importance of body building. To compensate for the very doubtful loss of athletic interscholastics, a carefully planned, closely guided physical education program, following the recommendations of state and national authorities in their fields, has been installed in grades one through eight.

All the children have an opportunity to develop skills in a variety of activities, instead of only a few in a special sport.

Every activity is geared to the age and developmental level of the youngsters participating. Competition which is healthful and properly guided is arranged.

Each child is expected to take part in group activities. Failure to do so through lack of interest or physical or emotional causes is carefully checked and analyzed.

In checking the aims, interests and methods used in the Carrizozo school, the authorities have been understandably pleased and proud that this school system so very closely follows the recommended procedure and goals suggested by such experts in child growth as the American Academy of Pediatrics.

"Carrizozo parents can be justifiably confident that their school is meeting the standards set by national authorities in their respective fields," said Superintendent J. T. Clegg.
