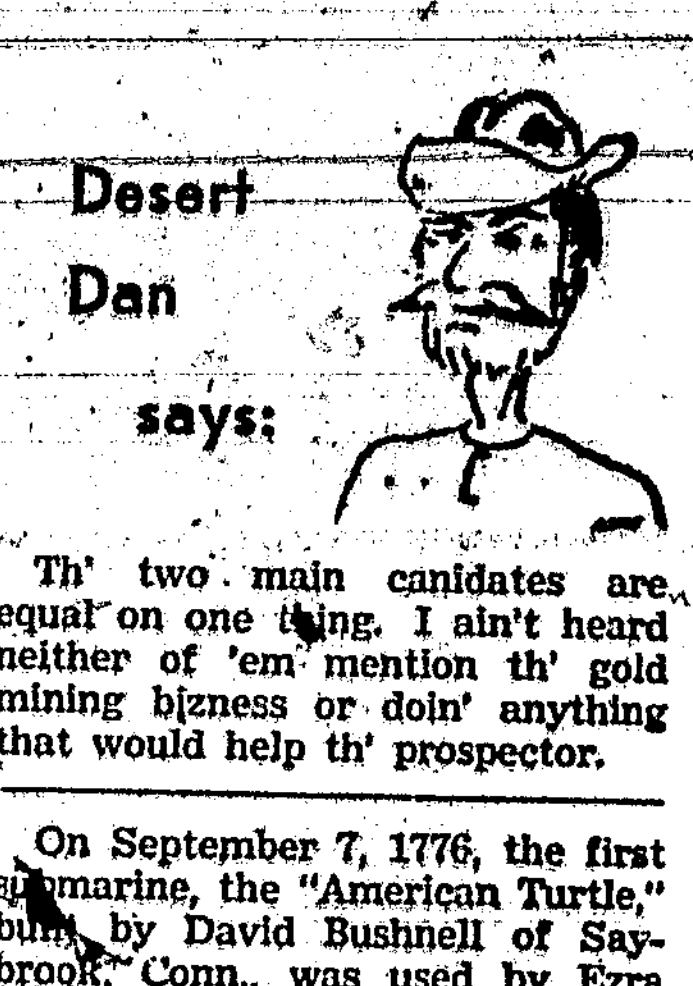
J. E. Thornton and W. L. Burnett recently returned from a trip through six states. They visited relatives in Arkansas and Mississippi and friends along the way.

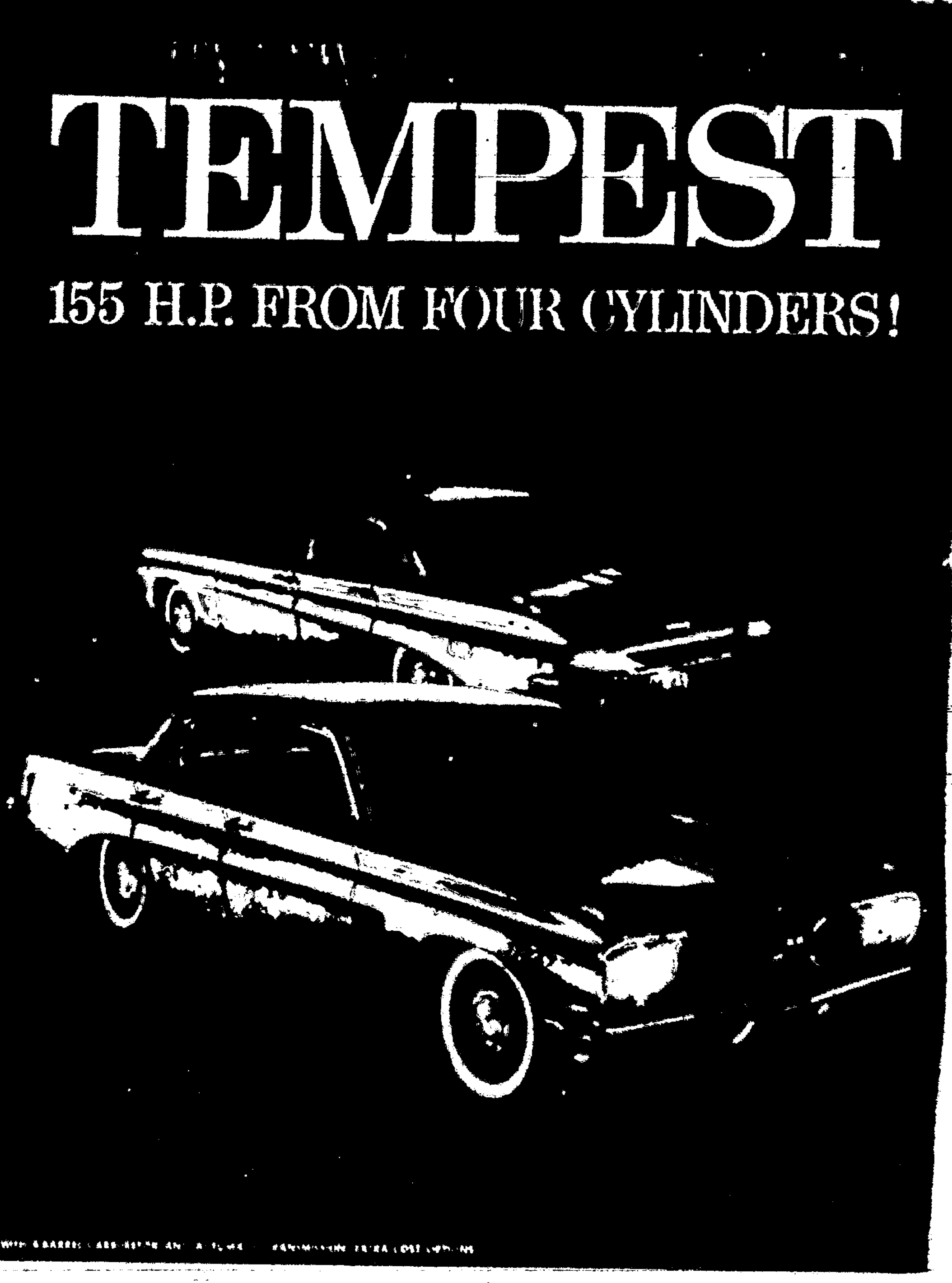

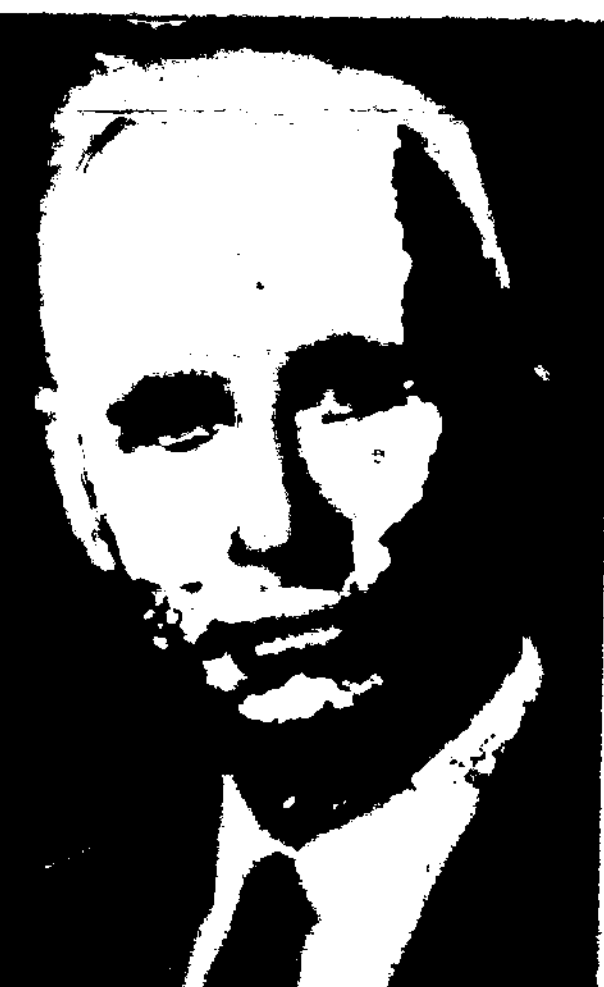

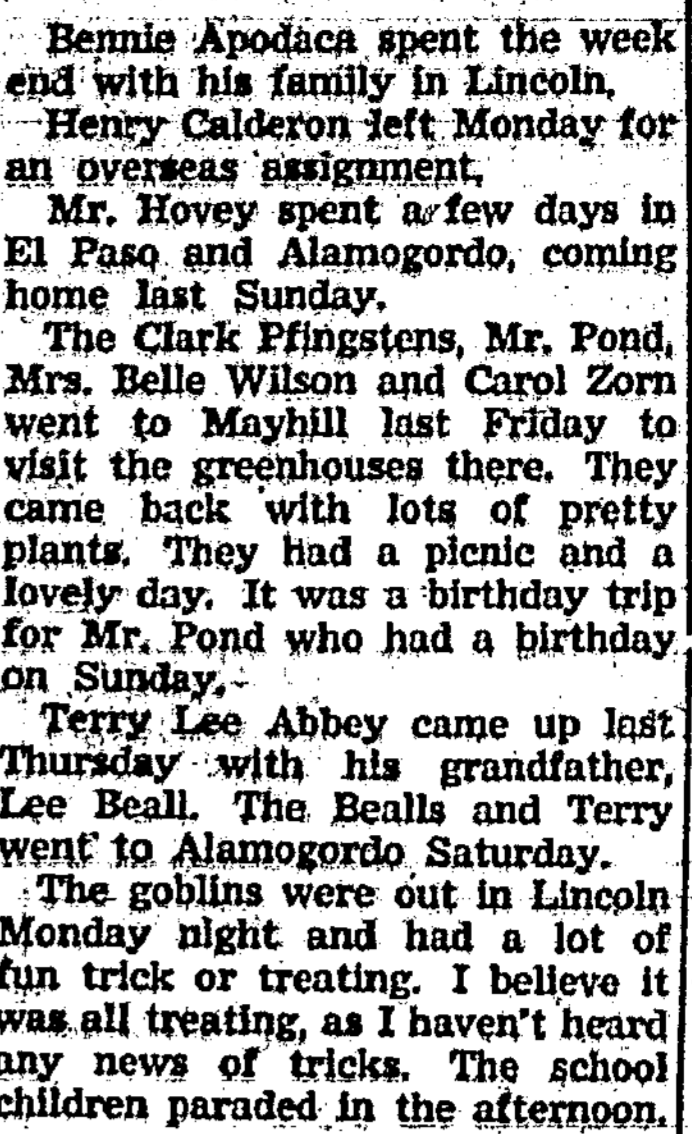

In the following game, the person whose number was called had to go forward and talk for one minute on an object handed to him or her. The last one called

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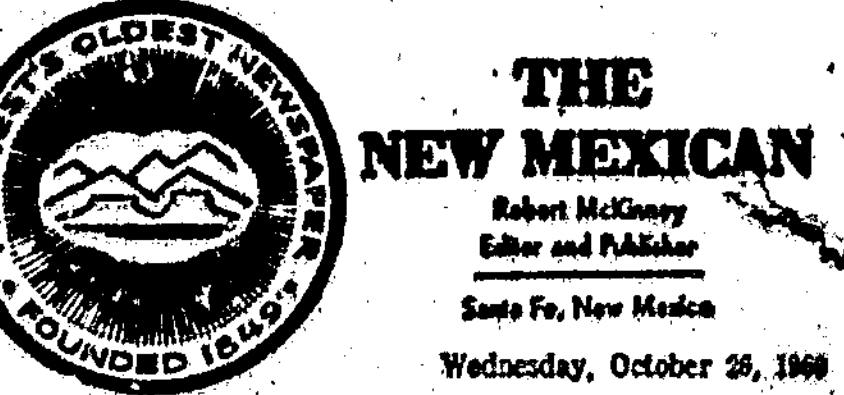

**The Candidates, Lieutenant Governor.**

**Joseph A. Montoya**

Joe A. Montoya, 50, the Democratic nominee for Lieutenant Governor, is an Albuquerque salesman who served ten years in the Legislature from Bernalillo County. He was elected to three consecutive house terms in 1942, 1944 and 1946 and to a four year Senate term in 1948.

Montoya is a graduate of Albuquerque High School and briefly attended the University of Arizona.

A long-time political figure, Montoya won the state-wide political spotlight in 1950 when political observers agreed he caused the defeat of Lt. Gov. Joseph M. Montoya's bid to unseat Congressman Antonio Fernandez. In that race, Fernandez received 41,795 votes and Joseph M. Montoya 38,900 with another 10,070 split off by Joseph A. Montoya.

While in the Legislature he introduced a bill which would have removed the limit on interest rates charged by small loan companies—which was killed by his fellow legislators on grounds that it would be ruinous to poor people desperate in need of loans. He sponsored a bill to require wood cutters to post a \$1,000 bond and pay a \$10 annual license fee. He sponsored legislation to legalize slot machines and to set up a lottery which would have been held on alternate months in Santa Fe and Albuquerque.

**Tom Bolack**

Tom Bolack, 42, the Republican nominee for Lieutenant Governor, came to New Mexico as a young man and got a job as a "roughneck" in the San Juan Basin oilfields. He later formed his own company and made a fortune, currently estimated at \$7 millions, in the oil and gas industry.

In addition to oil, gas and other mineral interests, Bolack operates the B-Square experimental farm and has run a one-man campaign to promote production of vegetables and other non-surplus farm products in New Mexico.

Bolack served as representative from San Juan County in the 1957 House of Representatives where he compiled a record generally considered good. He made an unsuccessful bid for Congress in the 1957 special election.

Bolack has been active in state and civic affairs, serving as chairman of the State Heart Fund and various other non-profit fund raising ventures. He is a director of the Bataan Memorial Hospital, a member of the Boy Scout board of directors, a field advisor of the Small Business Administration and a member of the U. S. Assay Commission.

**Our Choice**

In New Mexico the principal task of the Lieutenant Governor is to serve as presiding officer of the State Senate. Although he may vote only in case of ties, the man with the gavel potentially has considerable influence.

He serves as acting Governor when the chief executive is out of the state and would become Governor if the chief executive dies or resigns.

Because of his position in the Senate, legislative experience is important in considering the qualifications of candidates for Lieutenant Governor. Both men must stand on their records in the Legislature, and Montoya's record is certainly not one to instill confidence in a voter.

Some of the legislative proposals sponsored by Montoya were merely silly. Some were considerably worse.
