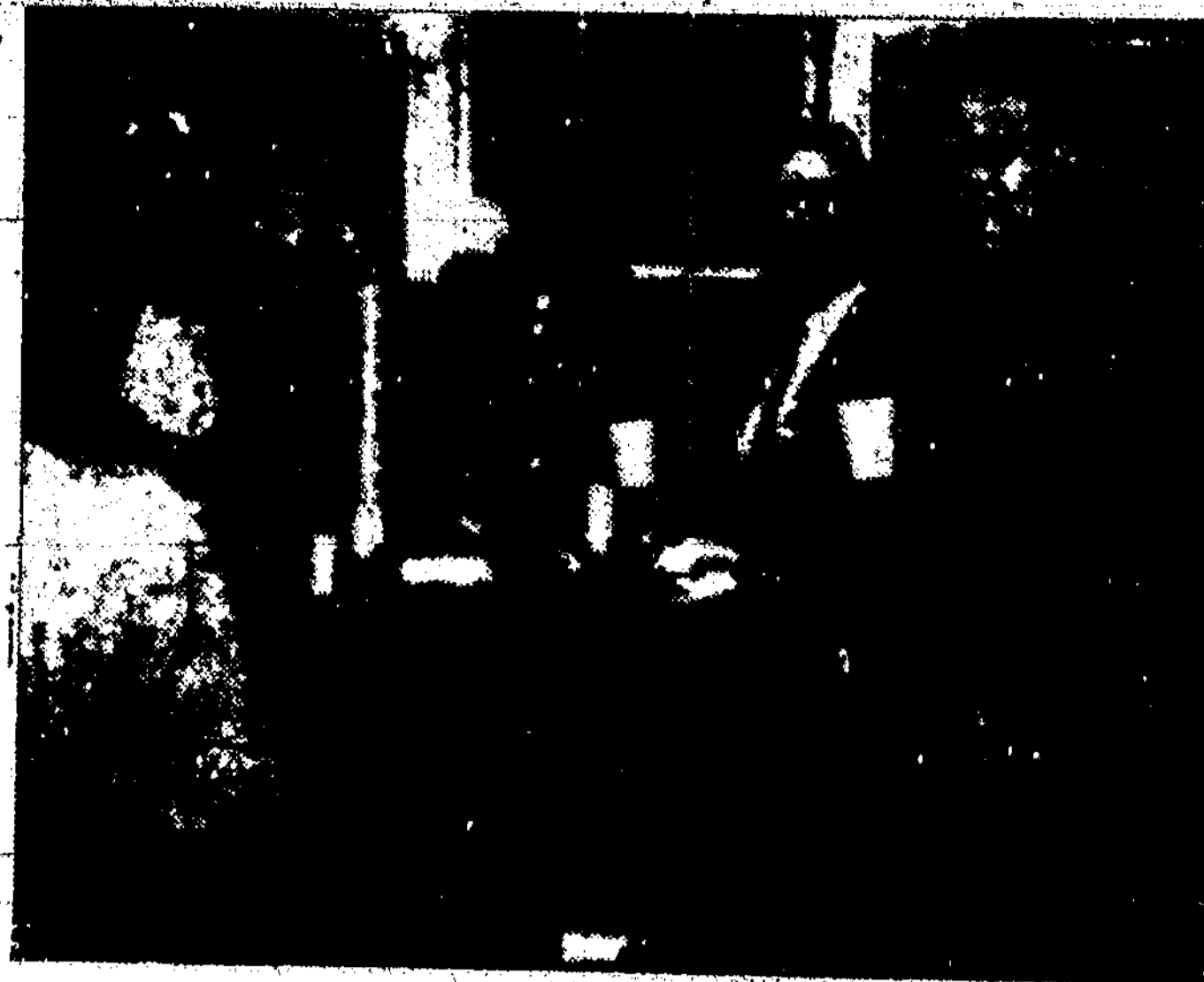


Favors for the Carrizozo Voter

The jury reported for duty in Carrizozo Monday, but were excused until November 21. Two cases set for trial were dismissed and new charges filed.

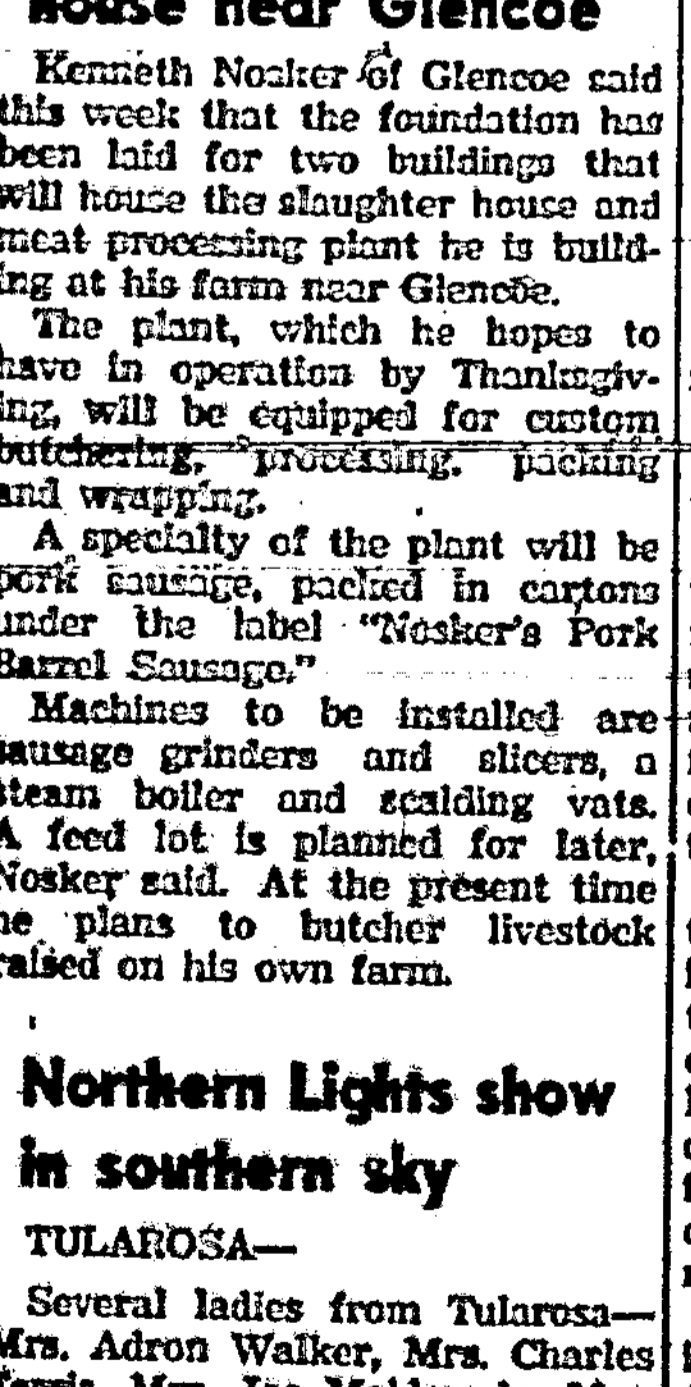
Building slaughter house near Glencoe

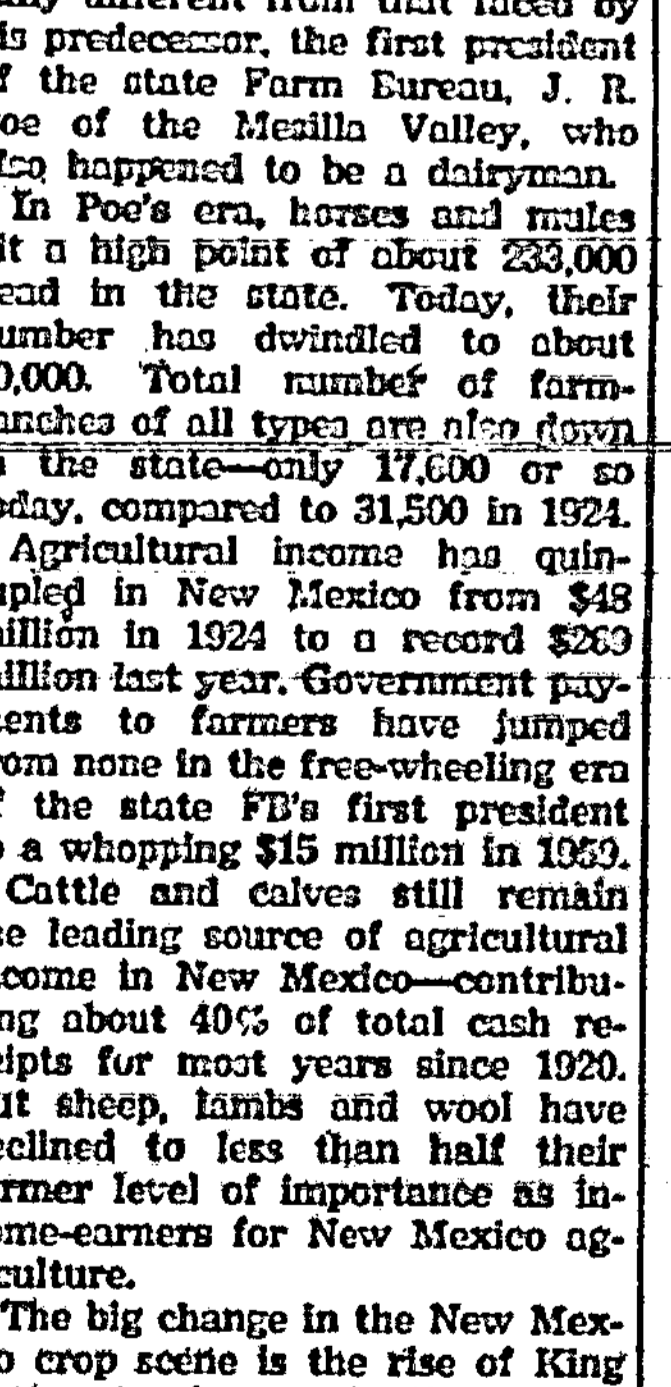
RANGE PITTING HAS PRODUCED GOOD RESULTS

This type of practice has produced good results on land in poor condition and aided greatly in establishing plants with reseeded operations. The purpose is to hold rain water on the land long enough for it to penetrate.

1920 — Year of the Great Blizzard

On the 12th day of December 1920, Lincoln County was visited by one of the coldest and severest snowstorms of all times since the year of 1888.

The work train was well equipped with a large snow plow in front and material of all sorts for such an emergency.

We boarded the train and we reached the Robart siding, the blizzard was under way again with all its fury.

Our chief concern was to receive the passengers, who had been without heat and light for many hours.

We finally made our way over high snowdrifts to the rear of the train and a force of about sixty men began raking a path in the snow to the observation car and to the highway, where conveyances were in readiness to take the passengers to Carrizozo.

The Golden State's engineer said he saw what lay ahead, but he relied on his "Mighty Mike."

When the snow piled up to about fifty yards until the giant driving wheels left the rails and the powerful locomotive's forward progress ended.

Telephone and power lines were down in the path of the storm and many communities were without these utilities until linemen were able to repair the damage for miles around.

Stockman, lost heavily and pastures were strewn with dead livestock. Margarito Ramirez missed his milk cow and when he went to look for it, he found the animal frozen to the wall of a coal chute, where it was driven by the wind in search of shelter.

An entire family left Corona in a wagon for Mountainair and were caught in the storm before reaching Gran Quivira.

Old-timers compared that storm to one they had in the year 1833, which also took a tremendous toll in livestock.

Joseph Tatti, who then owned the present Silva holdings in the Tucson mountains, lost close to two thousand head of goats.

They had good protection in the canyons and wooded areas of the Tucsons, but as fate would have it, that storm came in the springtime and Mr. Tatti had already begun shearing. The sheep which had been shorn of their fleeces were caught naked and perished.



State Auditor A. G. Whittier charged that the public school funds of the state had been squandered in high living by the officers placed in control to protect them.

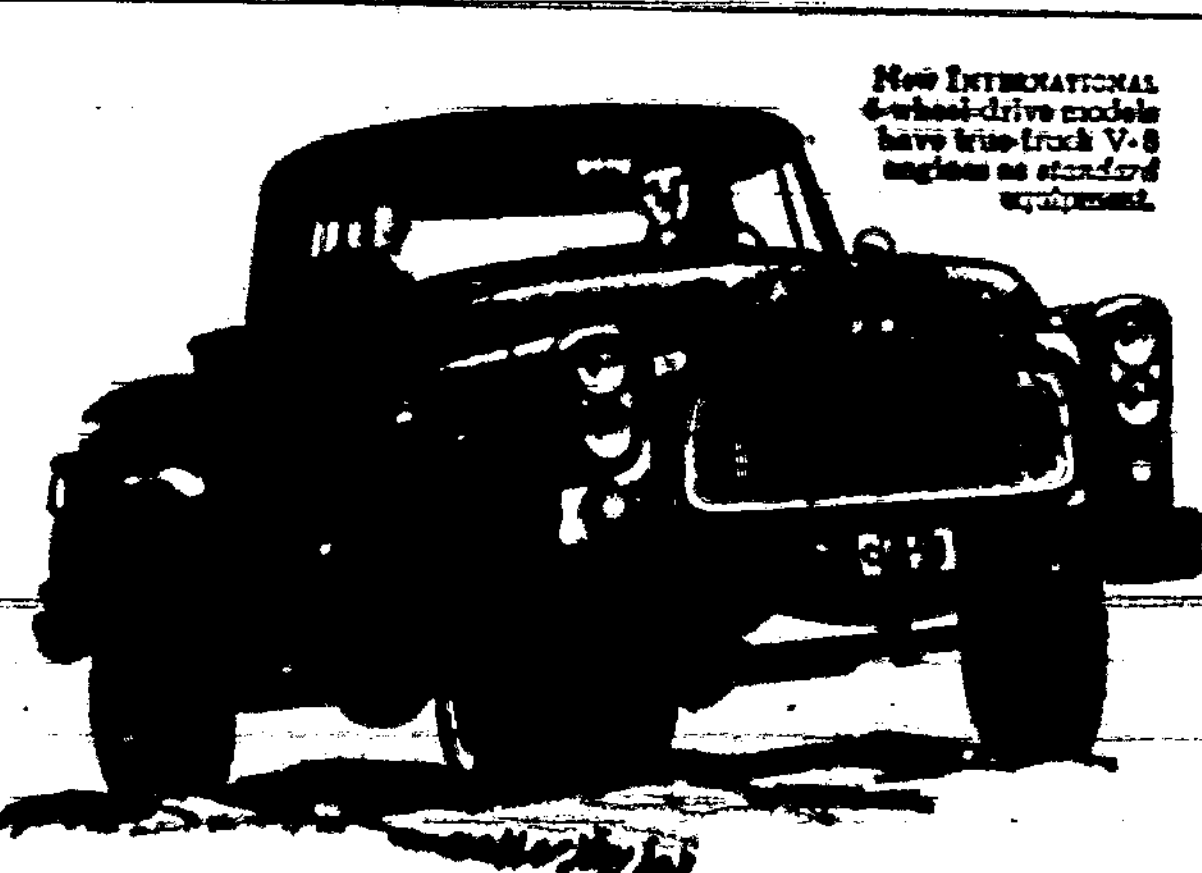
Judge Mechem held in favor of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners after a grand jury had returned charges of excess political activity and nepotism.

New phone directories in customers' hands

The 1960 telephone directories were delivered last week and are usual the first thing people wanted to look at was to see if their names were spelled correctly and their listing exact, Russell Eddings, local manager for Mountain State Telephone Company, says.

"As long as there are people, there will be a few mistakes in an undertaking as vast as compiling a telephone directory. In all of the directories printed throughout the United States by the Bell Telephone System, there is fewer than one error in 10,000 listings," Eddings stated. "But the chances are great that there is nothing wrong with any individual's listing."

The manager explained that from the time an order for a telephone is taken, the name, address and telephone number is checked time and time again by various departments in the telephone company. This information is relayed to the printer who sets up the name in type as it will appear in the directory, and sends it back to the telephone company. Again it is checked. Sometimes if there is a question, the subscriber is called for verification.

Despite all of this Eddings said, an occasional error does slip thru. Most of the errors which do occur are in the spelling of a name or street address.

The manager once again suggested that everyone make sure there is nothing of value either written on or hidden in the old directory before disposing of it.

Each telephone directory has much information of value. Starting on page 2 there is such vital information as emergency telephone numbers. This includes the police department, the fire department, the sheriff and the state police. It also tells what to do if you desire to contact the FBI.

Date set is Saturday, Dec. 3. The place will be the new school gymnasium and auditorium, and the curtain will rise at 8 p.m.

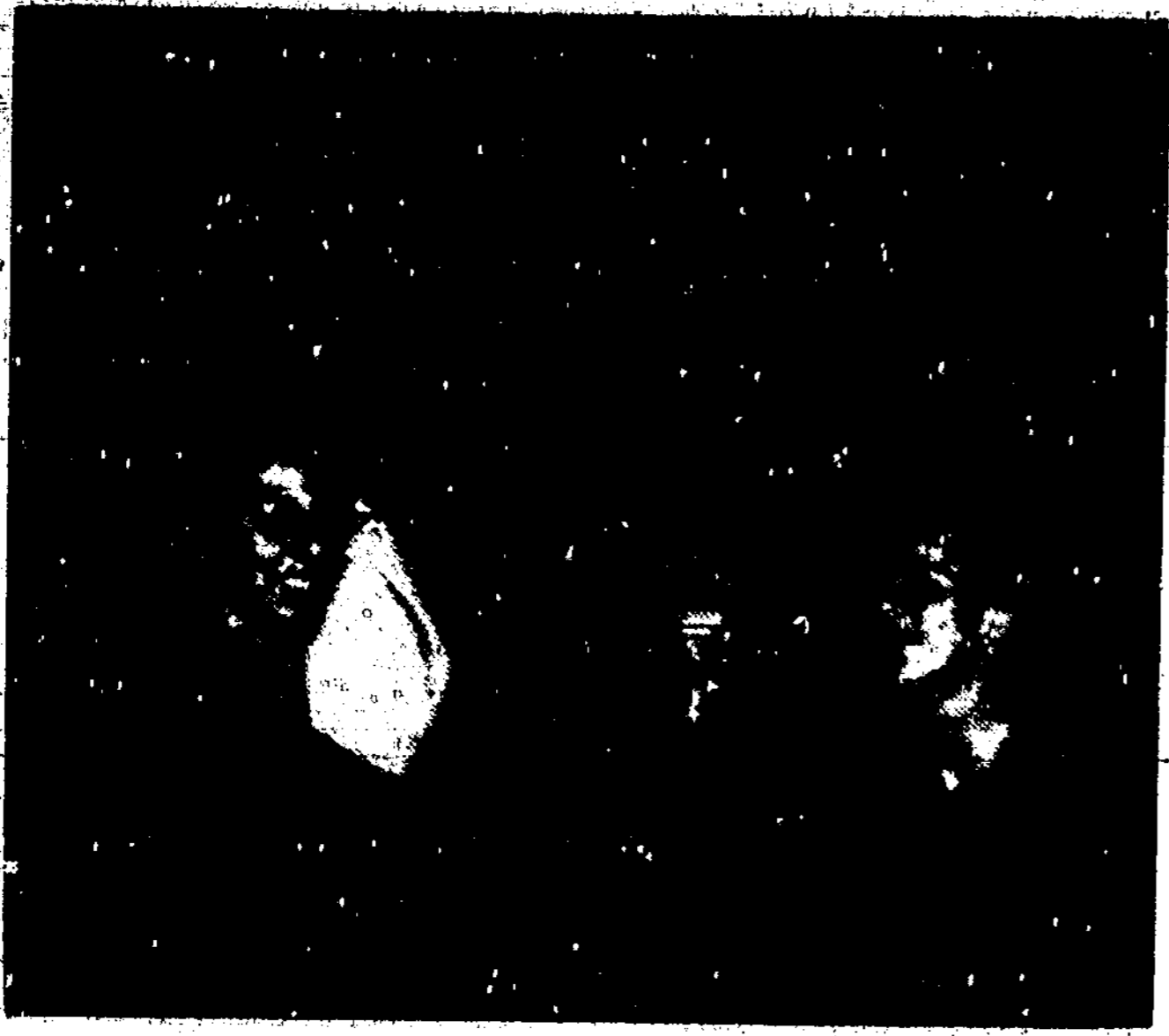
Mrs. Harold Jones will be director of the show—always a big success here.

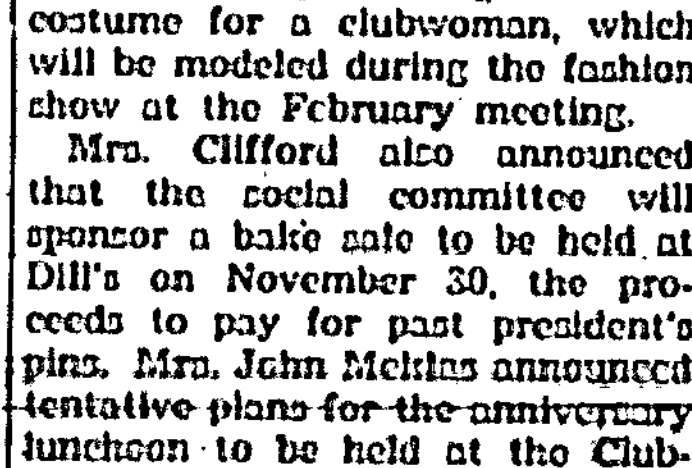

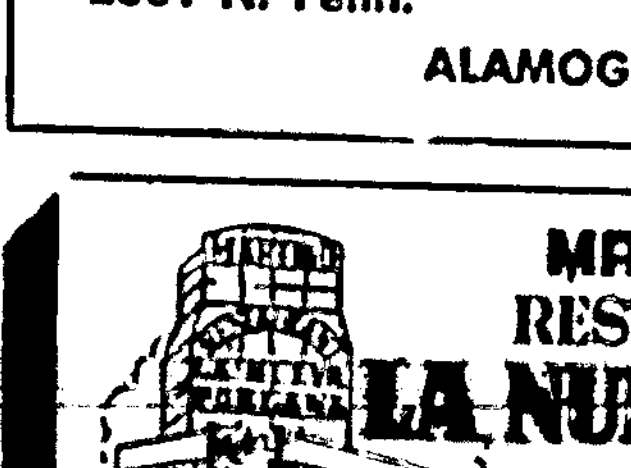

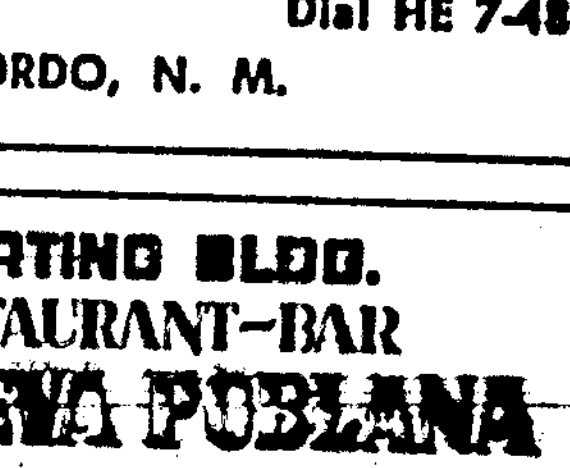

Red meat production up over last year

Commercial slaughter of all livestock in New Mexico during September totaled 7,937,000 lbs. live weight, according to the New Mexico Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This was 10% lower than the previous month, and 2% lower than a year earlier.

Commercial slaughter of all livestock for the first nine months of 1960 totaled 72,789,000 pounds live weight, 10% above the 65,949,000 pounds slaughtered during the corresponding period a year earlier.

Cattle slaughter in September totaled 6,600 head, 800 head more than August and 600 head more than a year ago. The number of calves slaughtered totaled 2200 head. Hog slaughter is estimated at 7,900 head, 400 head above August but 900 head below September last year. Sheep and lamb slaughter during September is estimated at 3,700 head, 100 head above August, and 800 head below last year.

Pat Wittingham, ranger, in patrolling this area, George Fuchs is on Montjeau Lookout.

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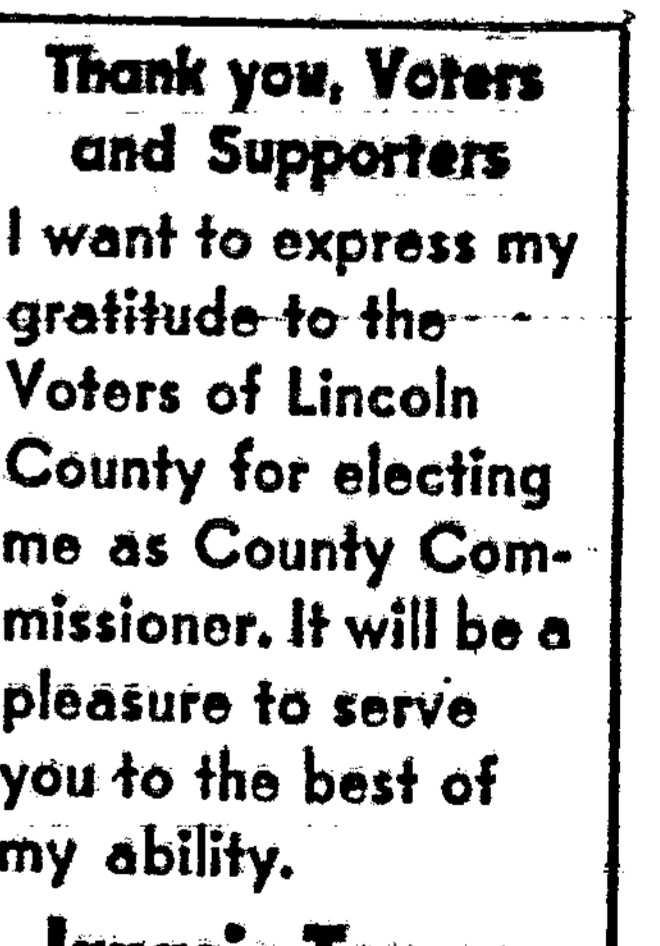
