

Youngster killed and mother injured, hit by auto near Carrizozo postoffice

A tragic traffic accident in Carrizozo Wednesday afternoon took the life of Robert Charles Wilson, 4, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles P. Wilson of Carrizozo. The youngster would have been five years old December 4.

The boy was knocked to the pavement near the intersection of Highway 54 at the postoffice and he was instantly killed when the automobile's right front wheel struck his head.

The car, a '54 Lincoln, was driven by Mrs. Clifford Wheeler of Carrizozo. She told investigating officer, State Patrolman James Clayton that she was blinded by the setting sun and was unable to see the Wilsons.

Mrs. Wilson had parked their car along the curb a few feet from the intersection and had stepped out of the car, along with her son Robert. They were waiting for the approaching car to pass before crossing south to the post office when the Lincoln struck them.

Both were knocked to the pavement by the impact. Robert was hurled about ten feet and his mother about 15 feet. Mrs. Wheeler swerved her car to avoid striking Robert, but the wheel passed over his head.

The Shaw ambulance took Mrs. Wilson to Carrizozo hospital, where an examination revealed no broken bones.

The ambulance then returned to take the remains of Robert to the Shaw Mortuary.

Kimo Ortiz was an eye witness to the accident. When questioned by Officer Clayton about the accident, Ortiz said he was going east on Highway 54 and was approaching the intersection when he first saw Mrs. Wilson and her son standing beside their car and that they seemed to be waiting for the approaching car to pass. Apparently Mrs. Wheeler was blinded by the sun, he said, as she did not swerve her car and it seemed to hit both the Wilsons at the same time.

The impact knocked Mrs. Wilson and her son forward, Ortiz continued, and Mrs. Wheeler tried to swerve her car and avoid striking the boy, but the left right wheel passed over his head.

Mrs. Wheeler then made a left turn and parked her car beside the Petty Motel curb.

Ortiz sent his son Phillip to notify officers at the courthouse of the accident.

Both Robert and his younger brother were in the back seat of the Wilson car, but only Robert had stepped out beside his mother. The Wheeler car struck the half open door of the Wilson car. Mrs. Wilson lay on the pavement until the ambulance arrived. The hospital described her condition Wednesday night as "fair." The impact knocked both her shoes off and they were found about 15 feet from where she lay.

Buster Smoot and Russell Edings were sent to notify the father of the youth, who was on his ranch in the Elingham area. Before they reached him, he had been notified of the accident via the State Patrol.

State Patrolman Tim Pino assisted Officer Clayton in the investigation. Also at the scene of the accident were Sheriff S. M. Ortiz, Deputy Sheriff Hoppy Guzman and Town Marshal Choncho Morales.

This fatality is believed to be the first caused by an automobile in the city limits of Carrizozo. Tragedy struck in a different form July 18, 1947, at 12 noon when a plane taking off from Highway 390 crashed into the A. T. Roberts service station at the 390-54 intersection, killing the pilot and a bystander and injuring several others.

Ask county to rebuild two miles of road leading to ski park

Road matters in regard to the White Mountain ski park and recreation area were discussed at a special meeting Tuesday of the Board of County Commissioners.

The commissioners were asked to assume the responsibility of rebuilding and maintaining a 2-mile stretch of county Road 281, which leads from Alto toward Eagle Creek Lodge.

The county already has assisted in rebuilding a portion of the road—that leading to Mon Jean. The additional construction would lead from the Mon Jean road intersection, toward Eagle Creek Lodge.

The commissioners deferred action on the matter, leaving it to the discretion of the new board of commissioners who will take office after the first of the year.

Appearing on behalf of the Sierra Blanca Corp., developers of the recreation area, were Kingsbury Pitcher, president, and Jack Higgins, operations director.

Others attending the meeting were L. E. Wheeler and W. O. Johnston, of the State Highway Department; Gomecindo DeVargas, secretary secondary highway section; E. R. Huber, regional engineer, and Richard June, engineer, Lincoln National Forest.

School heads to meet in Carrizozo

The Carrizozo Board of Education recently reviewed the school finance situation at a regular meeting. They foresaw a shortage of operating funds before the end of the school year and are anticipating some action by the legislature to provide emergency funds so that there will be curtailment of the school year.

The Carrizozo Board, through its superintendent, T. Clegg, has extended to county school administrators to attend a meeting in Carrizozo on Wednesday, Dec. 7. The invitation is addressed to all superintendents, principals, board members and wives or husbands. A dinner will be served at 7 p.m. in the Junior High School cafeteria.

School finances will be the principal topic of discussion at the meeting following dinner. Special guests will be Joseph Sreen, State senator; W. G. Shreeves, State representative, and their wives; also Jim Green, financial consultant of the New Mexico Educational Association.

To give the county legislators a picture of the school's financial problems and to offer some suggestions that may be helpful when they go to the legislature in January, school administrators from the five county schools have been asked to speak on the following subjects:

Ruidoso—Project the financial picture of the county schools for 1950-51.

Hondo—Repercussions of a financial crisis upon the teachers.

Corona—Present possible sources for new revenue.

Capitan—How may teachers be reconciled to the present financial status and confidence restored.

Carrizozo—What are some of the things that make our educational program more expensive—things which may have to be deleted or financed through other sources.

Ranch hand uses employer's own rifle to rob him

Ervin F. Crockett, ranch owner west of the Mal Pais, near Carrizozo, had a harrowing experience last Friday afternoon when he was held up at the point of his own .3006 rifle, by a ranch employee that had been hired about six weeks ago.

Crockett was confronted by Griffin Holcomb of Oklahoma who held the rifle against his employer's stomach and threatened to shoot him unless he wrote out a check for \$175.

Holcomb then fled in Crockett's pickup. Approximately six hours later he was picked up at a road block at Moriarty and returned to the Lincoln County jail.

An account of events preceding and following the holdup is related by Sheriff S. M. Ortiz, as follows: Last Friday morning Crockett gave Holcomb permission to use the ranch pickup to bring Snyder, another employee, into town. Holcomb returned to the ranch around 1:30 in the afternoon. Crockett was out in the pasture at the time and returned to the ranch house about 3, prepared his own lunch then lunch for Holcomb.

Afterward, Crockett lay down on the couch to read some mail that Holcomb had brought back from town. Holcomb approached him and said:

"THIS GUN IS LOADED!" "Say, look here! This gun is loaded. I want you to write me out a check for \$175."

Crockett tried to talk him out of it and agreed to forget everything if he would put the gun down.

Holcomb said he meant business and continued to point the rifle at his employer's stomach. Crockett asked Holcomb to stop pointing the gun, at his stomach. "If you want to kill me, point it between my eyes," he was quoted as telling Holcomb.

Crockett then wrote out the check for \$175 after which Holcomb ordered him to walk toward the windmill and corral, about a half mile southeast of the ranch house. The ranchman proceeded in that direction and when he neared the corral he heard a shot fired. He paid no attention and kept on walking but when he looked around another shot he looked back and saw that he had been hit. Then he started running zigzag and reached the shelter of a horse trailer.

Soon afterward Crockett saw his 1950 GMC pickup leave the house. He walked back to the ranch house where he had an older pickup but couldn't get it started. He discovered it had been disabled. The ignition wires had been pulled off and the ignition key was missing.

Crockett then went over to get his tractor, but found it had also been put out of commission. He got some feed, went to the corral and caught a horse, then rode 12 miles to the McDonald ranch. Here he phoned State Patrolman James Clayton in Carrizozo. Sheriff Ortiz was notified and road blocks were set up at Tucuman, Roswell, El Paso and along Highway 63. It was now 7 o'clock, 3 hours after the time Crockett had first been accosted.

ARREST MADE AT MORIARTY
Holcomb and a hitch hiker he had picked up were stopped at Moriarty at 9:15 that evening. Holcomb offered no resistance. He said he went first to Santa Rosa, picked up the hitch hiker and was going to Albuquerque on 66.

Before leaving Carrizozo, Holcomb cashed the \$175 check at the Village Inn. Following his arrest, he returned all of it but a few dollars, saying "The money doesn't belong to me."

Holcomb was arraigned in district court Monday morning before Judge W. T. Scoggins and entered a plea of guilty to robbery with and unlawfully taking a motor vehicle. His contention was deferred until completion of a pre-sentence investigation.

Sheriff Ortiz said that Holcomb had previously been working as a male nurse at the state penitentiary in Santa Fe. Prior to that he had served time at Huntsville prison in Alabama and at the New Mexico State penitentiary for writing hot checks.

TWO MEN ARRESTED FOLLOWING CAR WRECK
Sheriff Ortiz said two men were picked up in Carrizozo Saturday night and it was found they had wrecked a stolen car on Friday 1 1/2 miles south of Three Rivers.

They came on into Carrizozo and stayed at the Bell Motel, checking out about 3 p.m. Saturday afternoon and re-registering at the El Cibola Hotel.


Johnson Stearns called police when he saw one of the men prowling the glove compartment of Bobby Stearns' car.

Free circular lists ABC's of soil testing

University Park, N. M. — You can't take the guessing out of the weather, but you can take the guessing out of your fertilizer program, a new circular released by the New Mexico State University Extension Service, points out.

Soil tests provide a scientific basis for regulation of the available plant food content of soils, the circular says. Fertilizer and other soil amendments are most effective when used in the proper amounts.

Soil tests take some of the guessing out of management by giving farmers and ranchers information on soil reaction (alkalinity or acidity), soluble salt content, texture, organic matter content, and available supply of some essential nutrients.

Single copies of Circular 312—"Cut Out the Guesswork with a Soil Test"—are obtainable at the county extension agent's office or from the Bulletin Room, New Mexico State University, P. O. Box 757, University Park.

Explosions awaken Tularosa residents

Tularosa residents in the east area of town had their early slumbers rudely shattered by a series of loud explosions Thanksgiving morning.

A huge Whitfield truck failed to make the right-angle turn from the existing highway to the new one. The truck, loaded with jet fuel, burst into raging flame, destroying a small frame building in an adjacent field and several valuable pecan trees.

Spectators tried to reach the truck but to rescue the driver but, according to one witness:

"When the truck started to tip, the driver hit the ground running."

Another witness said "The tank containing the fuel just melted and ran along the ground like molten lava."

Contrary to widespread belief, the explosions were not caused by the fuel tanks bursting in the intense heat. The tires were almost disintegrated by the blasts.

County pioneer dies in Roswell

Funeral services were held at St. John's Catholic Church in Roswell last Friday morning for Mrs. Antonia Z. Padilla, 96, who died the previous Tuesday night at 2 p.m. at her home following an extended illness.

Rosary devotional services for Mrs. Padilla were conducted from the Ballard Chapel Thursday.

The requiem mass was celebrated with the Rev. Father Robinson Einhaus, OFM, officiating. Burial was in South Park cemetery.

Mrs. Padilla was born Antonia Zamora in 1854 in Manzano, N. M., and later married there. She and her husband, Eduvijen Padilla, came to the Capitan Mountains from Manzano in 1891.

They applied for and homesteaded a tract of 50 acres of land, which is now known as the old Padilla Ranch on the south side of the Capitan Mountains. They later added more land to their holdings.

They raised 11 children, three of whom are deceased. Eduvijen Padilla died in December 1923 at the age of 63. In 1929 Mrs. Padilla moved to and resided in Capitan until she was taken ill. She has lived in Roswell for the past three years, having been hospitalized most of that time.

She is survived by five sons, Ramon of Capitan, Louis of Ruidoso, Juan of Alamogordo, Tony of Lovato, Okla., and Cruz of New York; by three daughters, Mrs. Gregorita Chavez of Capitan, Mrs. Mary P. Artago of Ruidoso and Mrs. Sarah Garcia of Hagerman; also by 41 grandchildren, 113 great-grandchildren.

Liquor could pay school deficit

Santa Fe—Now that the educationists have spent the schools broke they're suggesting new and higher taxes, chief among them "doubling" the state income taxes and jumping the sales tax.

There hasn't been a word said about raising the levy on liquor which could bail out the schools but which would be an unthinkable affront to that privileged business.

HIGH PRICES, MONOPOLY AND A VERY LOW TAX

New Mexico supports the hooch trade with legal maintenance of the highest liquor prices in the country and a legal monopoly for the vendors but gets a measly \$1.20 a gallon tax on liquor.

The rate is well under the national average and nationally sales taxes don't have a protected monopoly that prevents any from setting up in competition and don't have such high prices as are forced by law in New Mexico.

PROBABLY PREFER HIGHER BARY TAX

The liquor tax could be doubled or tripled to produce \$2 million to \$4 million more for the schools and by a slight lowering of the minimum "bary" tax on liquor would be sold the price of the stuff here wouldn't change much.

Such a tax increase is highly unlikely on a business that has been the pampered pet of legislators and politicians for more than 20 years.

You are more likely to see an increase in the sales tax on such things as doctor bills, funerals, food, births and all that comes under the sales tax, than any disturbance in the liquor situation.

STATE SCHOOLS RETIREMENT POOR

The bum planning of last spring when school budgets were made that couldn't be met and the subsequent failure of the state to get the school money are only part of the trouble that has fallen on the schools.

The schools are retirement poor. In 1957 the state was putting aside 2% of the salary fund for teacher retirement. In 1953 and 1952 it was 4%, then 5% and now around 8% with most all the school systems operating under both the state retirement plan and federal social security. It is costing more than \$4 million a year, up \$3 million over three years ago.

Under the plan a teacher who started work at 25 and quits at 60 with a salary of \$6,000 can get \$2,800 state retirement, plus maybe \$1,500 from the federal program.

High salaried superintendents can get \$6,000 a year and more.

NEED MORE DOUGH FOR MORE MEETINGS

Watch the legislators go for more dough themselves when they meet here in January.

There's some justification for it. The \$20 a day they get doesn't meet costs in Santa Fe and their deficits will go higher with the annual sessions of the legislature approved at the recent election.

Now they meet 60 days in odd numbered years, 30 days in even years, plus extra sessions that might be called. The annual sessions start on the last Tuesday in January.

VERY FEW JOBS FOR LAME DUCKS

The lame duck situation at the legislature is critical with jobs in sight for only a few of the large number that can't seem to get along on anything but the state payroll.

The Democratic land office under Johnny Walker which customarily hires a hundred won't see many changes and it is the biggest Demo payroll in the capitol after the Republican governor takes over.

There are only a handful of jobs in the Demo corporation commission, auditor, treasurer and secretary of state offices that stand to be open for the January job hunters.

In the last Republican Mechem administration, 1956-58, the displaced ones flocked to the highway department where the legislature maintained a Democratic control but such relief is doubtful this time.

Bond Co. ok's plans to finance swimming pool

The Carrizozo Town Board of Trustees met last week with members of the Juvenile Recreation Committee and Bruce Newman of Boettcher & Co., bonding firm, for the purpose of discussing financing of a municipal swimming pool, using funds from the cigarette tax.

The meeting was attended by a number of interested citizens. Newman explained that this method of financing had been used several other places in the state and was working out very successfully. He said that Carrizozo's tentative plans for the pool seemed to be more in line with funds available that had been adopted in some other communities.

The Carrizozo municipal swimming pool would be financed over a 12-year period, leaving money available in the fund for other recreational needs.

By charging small fees to the swimmers cost of the pool operation would be defrayed.

The town board has been assured by Newman that as soon as definite plans have been made and a location secured, the money would be made available to begin construction.

The board is interested in hearing from townspeople their ideas on the place location for the pool. James L. Smith of the Sterling Cofliders was present to discuss with the board certain revisions needed to be made in the town's ordinance. Several other towns have expressed an interest in the town code of Carrizozo, which is said to be as modern and up-to-date as may be found in any town, small or large, in the country.

The code books are available at the town hall and may be checked out by property owners and businessmen at any time.

Flatley ranch home destroyed by fire

The six-room Ross Flatley ranch home was burned to the ground last Friday morning just before sunrise.

Mr. Flatley was home alone in the house as Mrs. Flatley was in Roswell.

When he awoke smoke, he climbed into the attic, to find the walls in flames. He went back for water and tried to put out the flames, but had no success.

The house lights had gone out and steam from the water on the walls was added to the smoke. Flatley groped his way to the outside entrance and escaped.

The fire spread rapidly and he was able to save only a few articles of furniture, including the TV. It is believed defective wiring was the cause of the fire.

District Court

In District Court Monday, Judge W. T. Scoggins considered the case State of New Mexico vs. Bob Guzman, charged with starting a motor vehicle without the owner's consent. The defendant entered a plea of guilty. He was placed on probation one year, assessed \$250 costs and ordered to make restitution of \$75 (damages to vehicle).

State vs. Herman Philpott, who was charged with handling deadly weapon in a threatening manner. A plea of nolo contendere was entered by defendant. He was given a deferred sentence for five years, placed on probation 5 years and ordered to deposit his weapons with the district court.

State vs. Griffin Holcomb, who faced two charges: Robbery while armed with a deadly weapon and unlawful taking of a motor vehicle. A plea of guilty was entered to both charges. Sentencing was deferred until the pre-sentence report is completed.


